**Enchiladas Is Favorite Dish Of Yandell Family**

With cooler weather approaching many of us will be hungry for good Mexican food. This reporter conducted a search for a homemaker who prepares good Mexican dishes. Several people suggested we contact Mrs. Reed Yandell to secure her enchilada recipe and this is just what we did.

Mrs. Yandell more or less made up her recipe several years ago and says it is rather difficult to put down the exact amount of ingredients. Seasonings may be increased or decreased according to individual tastes.

Reed and Geraldene Yandell, 1300 West 2nd Street, are parents of three sons, Don, a 1965 graduate of Littlefield, who is attending South Plains College at Levelland; Ronnie, a high school senior, who is employed part time at Brittain Pharmacy; and Kevin, the youngest member of the family, who is a first grader in Miss Iris Hamm's room.

Reed has been employed with the Pioneer Natural Gas Company for about 12 years. They lived at Earth and Sudan before moving here nine years ago. Geraldene works part time at Montgomery Ward's.

The Yandells are members of the Parkview Baptist Church. She is president of the Mary Martha Sunday School Class and he teaches a class of intermediate boys.

Geraldene enjoys cooking and sewing and especially likes to play volleyball. If you attend an outsiders volleyball tournament in the spring you can usually find Geraldene on the court enjoying the sport. She has been playing with the same group of ladies for a number of years and they have won quite a number of trophies at these tournaments. Her husband likes to play volleyball too and also lists bowling as a favorite pastime. They enjoy playing 42 and 84.

The family members really like Geraldene's enchiladas. She sometimes prepares them for Sunday School parties and has received many compliments on them. The recipe follows as well as one for enchilada sauce, which can also be used as a dip.

- ENCHILADAS**
- 1 1/2 to 2 pounds hamburger meat
  - 1 onion, finely chopped
  - 1 Tablespoon black pepper
  - 1 teaspoon garlic salt
  - 1 tablespoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon cayenne (optional)
  - 3 tablespoons Mexican's Chili Blend
  - 1/2 cup catsup
  - 2 cups water
- Brown meat and finely chopped onions. Add the remaining ingredients and cook slowly 30

minutes. Dip tortillas in hot grease, drain on paper towel. Take each tortilla, add meat, grated onion and grated Velveta cheese and roll and place in a lightly greased baking dish. Sprinkle grated cheese over this, cover with foil and bake 20-25 minutes in about 350 degree oven. Serve with El Monterey Sauce which can be bought at local grocery stores. Makes 18-24 enchiladas. Serve with tossed green salad and crackers.

- ENCHILADA SAUCE**
- 1 can tomato sauce
  - 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
  - 1 package crushed red peppers
  - 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Mix together and serve on enchiladas or tacos. This can be used as a dip.

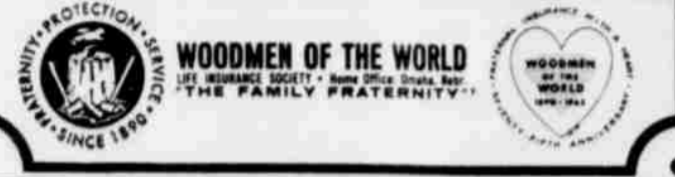

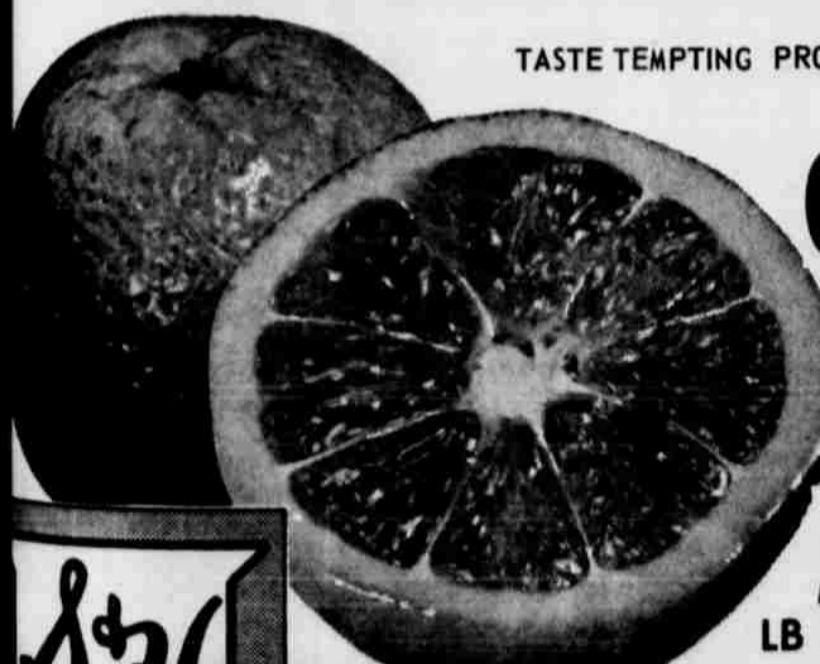

Providing that nothing in the Amendment shall be construed to amend, modify, or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of the Constitution.

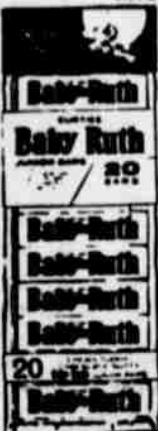

The mechanism to make payments to participants according to the degree of participation. The authority to make payments on only a part of the acres planted—such as 50 percent of the base but in excess of the acres planted—would provide the additional flexibility to permit the farmer to make the greater contribution to the surplus reduction.

The limitation that land disallowance and price-support payments could not exceed 20 percent of the fair market value of the land has been removed. The value is not always a fair market value. Criteria of producing capacity. Land in suburban areas is priced higher while not necessarily as a result of superior productivity. In any event, payments would be directed to the farm's productive ability since they would be based on the farm expected yield.

Producers who are prevented from planting their feed grains because of some natural disaster will be permitted to use the same program benefits if they had planted the acreage in not subsequently planted to an income-producing crop.

Yields on which diversions payments would be based would be the yield on the farm in the first year rather than being based to a historical 5-year average.
