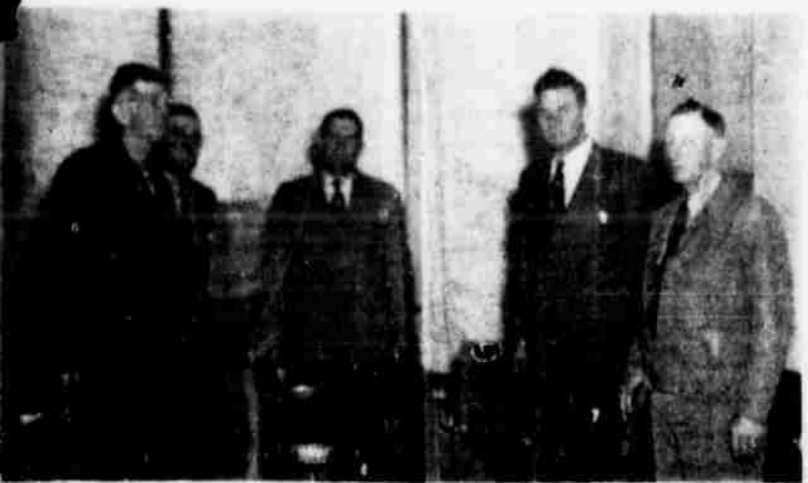


## New County Officers Take Over Duties

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## Reburial Rites For Pfc. Clark Sunday

The remains of Pfc. Van Eugene Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. Van Clark of this city, who lost his life in Germany, April 17, 1945, will arrive in Lubbock at 8:15 A. M. Saturday.

A number of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of this city, Hammons Funeral ambulance and relatives of the deceased, will meet the train.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2:30 P. M. Sunday at the First Methodist Church, Littlefield, with Rev. C. A. Long, Pastor, officiating, and re-burial in the Littlefield Cemetery.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars will be in charge of the service at the grave. The young soldier will be buried with all military honors.

Pfc. Clark was born July 2, 1925, at Littlefield, and lived his entire life here with the exception of the time spent at college and in the service.

He graduated from the Littlefield High School with the class of 1942; and attended Tech College a year and a half. He was a member of the Centaur Club, a social organization.

He entered the service Dec. 9, 1943, with the Eighth Armoured Division, and later was transferred to the Armoured Infantry with whom he went to France from Dec. 10, 1944.

Pfc. Clark was guarding a chemical plant with three other men at the time of his death, 75 miles west of Berlin.

Pfc. Clark's death was caused by an explosion. He is survived by his parents, and a sister who is a pre-med student at Texas.

## 3 Killed Enroute Here

Paul Zahn, 79, and his wife, 76, of Haskell, and their son, Albert, 50, of Dallas, parents and brother of Paul Zahn, Jr. and Bill Zahn, both of Littlefield, were killed and two other persons injured Friday just before midnight when the late model station wagon, in which they were enroute to Littlefield for a New Year's visit, overturned and catapulted its occupants onto the road shoulder, seven miles west of Haskell, and four miles east of Rule.

Under treatment in a hospital at Haskell are Mrs. Albert Zahn and her son, Albert, Jr. The latter is suffering from cuts and bruises and a possible head injury. Attendants said his condition was more serious than that of his mother and he was semi-conscious.

The son, 10 and daughter, 12 of Herman Zahn of Oakland, Calif. who were visiting their grandparents and also were passengers in the car, escaped injury.

Cause of the accident was not immediately determined. The crash of the car awakened Date Anderson and Mrs. J. B. Parmely, who reside near the scene and who summoned ambulances. Officers who investigated said the car, driven by its owner, Albert Zahn, apparently went out of control and turned over several times, though it stopped in an upright position.

The elder Mr. and Mrs. Zahn and Albert Zahn were thrown out on the north side of the highway. Ambulance men from Rule said all three were dead when picked up.

The other four occupants were hurled to the south side of the pavement.

The accident happened only a few minutes after the party left Haskell for Littlefield, to visit their two sons and their families here.

## "White Way" System To Be Installed In Downtown Area

### Additional Lights For Residential Streets Planned

An extensive street lighting program is underway by the City of Littlefield.

An agreement was made between the City and the Southwestern Public Service Company at a meeting Wednesday afternoon whereby the Power Company will install a "White Way" street lighting system in the downtown section, and street lights at intersections in the new residential districts south and west of the city.

It is reported that in the great growth of Littlefield there are many of the newer streets that have no lights. It is the plan to extend the lighting system to include these areas.

Under the plan all the old lights will be taken down and the new Mercury vapor system installed, which gives considerable higher candlepower and better lighting.

According to Mayor A. C. Chesher, the electric company asked for a year in which to carry out the contract, but it is hoped that steel will be available within the next few months sufficient to carry out this program.

The program is being set up on a five year basis, the city agreeing to pay the rate set up under such a contract.

## Hearing Set In Injunction Suit

Suit has been filed by Dr. C. E. Payne and Dr. I. T. Shotwell, Jr. against Dr. O. W. (Jack) Still to enjoin Dr. Still from the practice of medicine and surgery in Littlefield or within a radius of 50 miles of the center of this city for a period of ten years.

The suit is based on a contract entered into December 22, 1947 between Drs. Payne-Shotwell and Dr. Still, who was associated with the Payne-Shotwell Hospital and Clinic until recently when he became connected with other local doctors.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs are Bills and Street and T. Wade Potter, of Littlefield and Crenshaw, Dupree and Milam of Lubbock.

Monday of this week Judge C. O. Russell of District Court granted an order restraining Dr. Still from practicing in the area outlined and a hearing will be held in the District Court room at Plainview at 10:30 A. M., Saturday to decide whether a temporary injunction will be granted to the same effect as the restraining order.

Under court procedure after the judge passes on the matter of a temporary injunction, there is a trial later on the merits of a suit to determine if the injunction will be made permanent.

## Use of Dam for Highway River Crossing Is Approved

Bad weather cut down on the expected attendance at the Highway 51 Association meeting here Monday, but the thirty some odd, present conducted the business at hand, namely unanimously passing a resolution concerning a dam across the Canadian river.

The resolution read: be it resolved that if a feasible site for a dam is found across the Canadian river, approximately north of Vega, that this Association recommend and request, in so far as has authority, that said dam be constructed, and that it so be constructed as to afford a crossing for said highway, etc.

Fifteen West Texas counties will go on record as favoring this resolution because of the value to the highway. Several others will favor the dam because of the water situation. Amarillo, Plainview and Lubbock are working towards this project and will present a brief, as will the Panhandle water authority proposing and favoring the dam and site.

It was brought out in discussion by the group during the meeting

Bill Swanson, President and Mayor of Vega, presided, that in all probability a low water bridge will be built below the dam rather than crossing on the dam. This, however, would entail a much smaller cost than a bridge at the present time. Several reasons were advanced for this view but it does not mean that it is certain traffic won't pass on the dam.

Another resolution was made concerning the southern end of the Highway. It was to take steps to have the State Highway Department take under advisement the improvement of the road from Sheffield to Sanderson and designate it as a State Highway.

The Association also admitted Terrell County to its membership.

## Public Service Company Sponsors Electrical Show

Scores of wonders from one of the nation's top electrical research and electronic research laboratories will be shown here Monday night, 7:30 P. M., January 17, at the High School Auditorium, when Southwestern Public Service Company brings the General Electric "House of Magic" show to town.

The production here will feature the most striking of the many exhibits designed by General Electric scientists and research men to acquaint laymen with the advances that are being made in making electric power more useful to mankind.

While some of the exhibits are of a scientific nature, others are produced as entertaining exhibits of electrical miracles that have more practical uses.

Dan J. Castles of the Plainview office of the Southwestern Public Service Company serves as emcee for the show.

The exhibit includes demonstration of light bulbs in all sizes, with some of the newer developments in lighting such as the match stick sized 1000 watt bulb used to light air fields during the war. Also shown is fluorescent light, being used for many purposes, and the mercury vapor lamps being used for street lighting.

Other developments from the GE laboratory include stroboscopic lighting, photo electric cells which are used to control lighting, the use of electrical energy to turn gears through space, black light which cannot be seen, and the use of polaroid lenses to diffuse light rays.

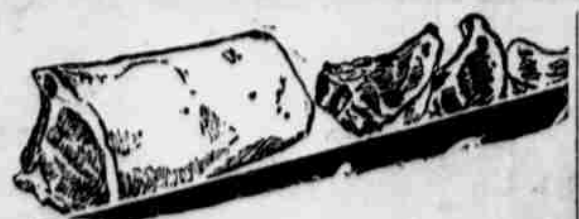

All members of the Scott family attended the Littlefield schools.

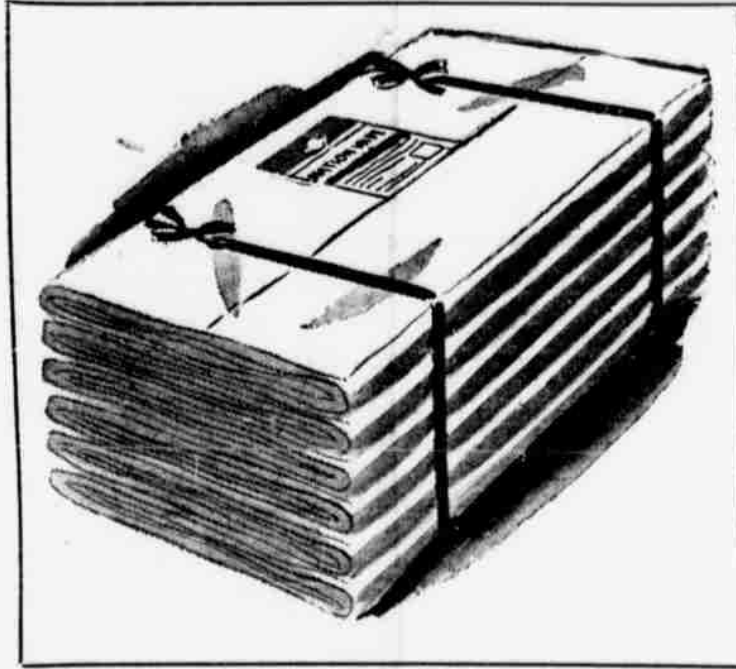

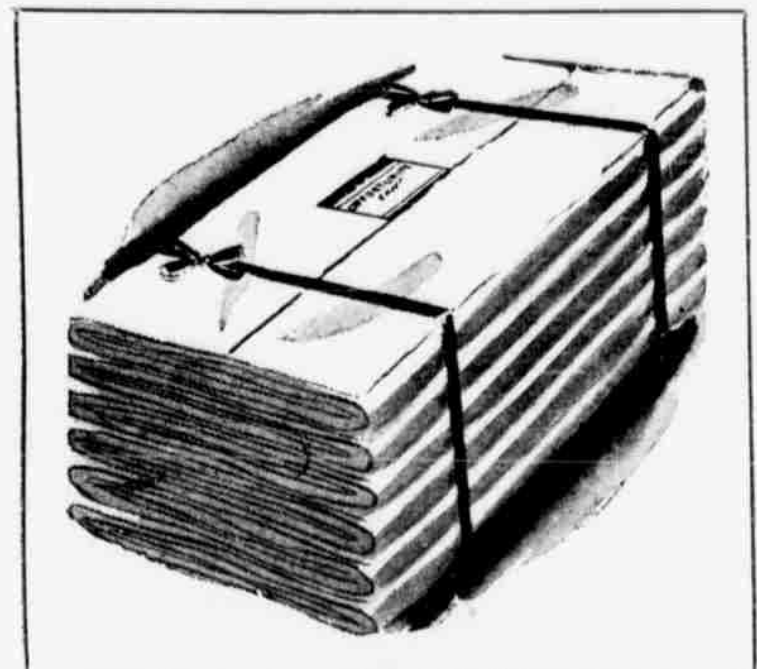

4 teaspoons vinegar  
1 1/2 cups drained, whole kernel corn  
1/4 cup finely cut stuffed olives  
1/2 cup Pet Milk

Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup water. Heat to boiling a mixture of tomato juice, grated onion, salt, pepper and vinegar. Stir in softened gelatin. Take out 1/3 cup of mixture and mix with remaining 2 tablespoons water. Pour into an oiled quart mold. Chill until firm. Chill remaining portion of gelatin mixture until slightly thicker than unbeaten egg whites. Fold in mixture of remaining ingredients. Put on top of chilled tomato mixture. Chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce. Makes 4 servings.

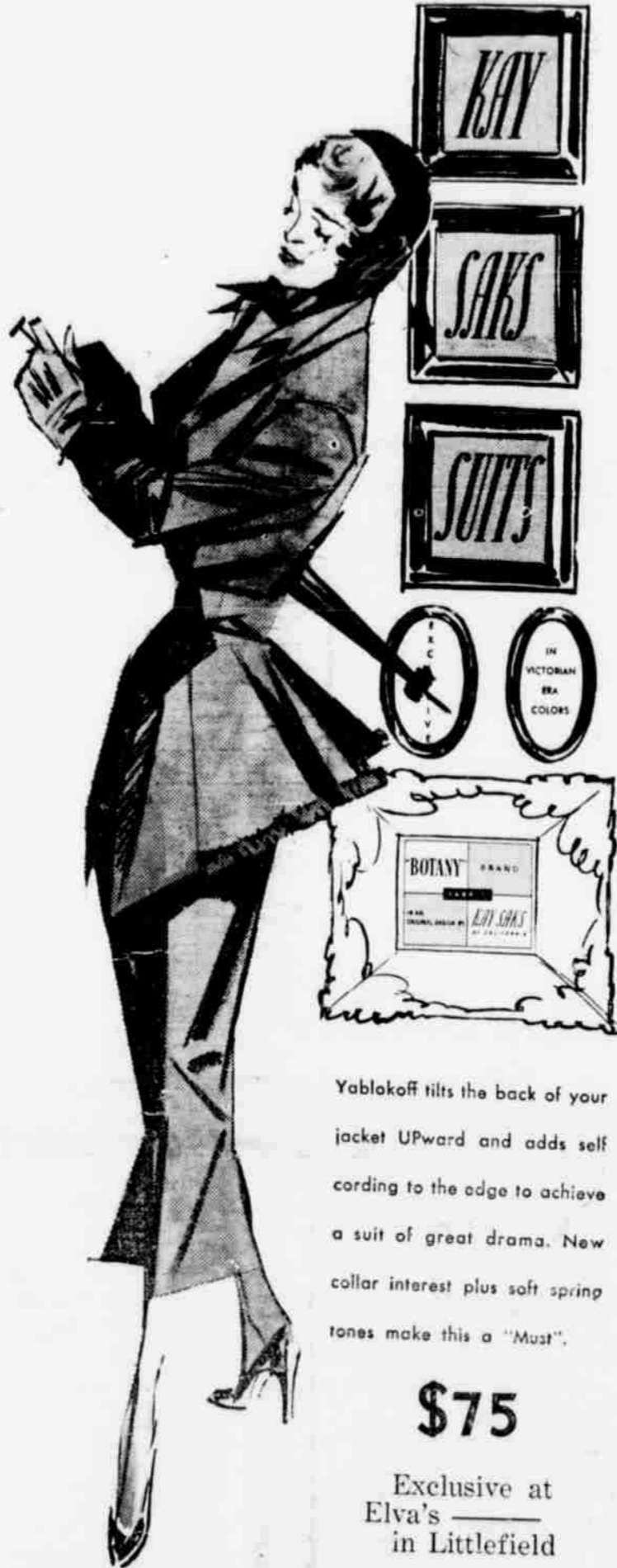

## Income Tax Returns Must Have Wage Statements Attached

The office of the Collector of Internal Revenue cautioned taxpayers today that income tax returns filed on either of the individual income tax forms could not be accepted unless statements of wages earned, Form W-2, from employers are attached.  
 The Form W-2, issued by all employers to their employees, can not be used as a return this year.  
 Instead, all persons filing individual returns, must use either Form 1040-A or Form 1040. Form 1040-A should be used by all persons having income from wages or salaries not in excess of \$5,000.00. It can be used as a joint return of husband and wife. All Forms W-2 received from employers, for both the husband and wife, must be attached. The Collector's office will figure the taxes or refund due on these returns.  
 Forms 1040-A may be secured from employers, post offices, banks and field offices of the Collector of Internal Revenue.  
 Persons having income in excess of \$5,000.00 must use Form 1040. If any income was from wages or salaries, the Forms W-2 must be attached.  
 Under present law, employers must give their employees their Forms W-2 not later than January 31, 1949.  
 Income tax returns received in the Collector's office without the necessary Forms W-2 attached will be returned to the taxpayer for correction.

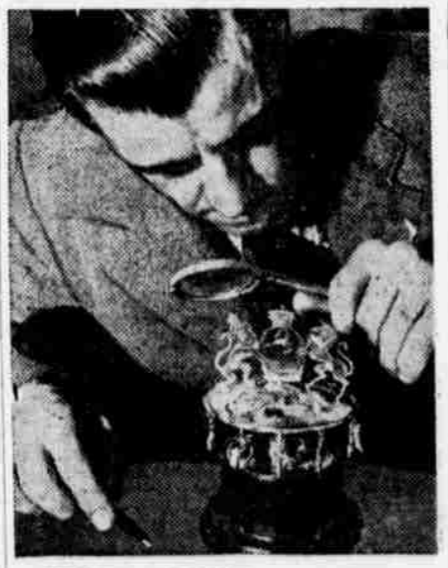

The Home Demonstration Clubs of Lamb County had Clothing and Home Improvement as their major demonstrations in 1948.

In the county 25 dwellings were constructed, 20 dwellings remodeled, 16 sewerage systems installed, 18 water systems installed, 6 central heating systems, 40 added needed storage space, 16 rearranged or improved kitchens, 30 improved arrangement of rooms, 60 upholstered and refinished furniture, 164 families selected house furnishing or equipment while 40 families improved home grounds.

In Clothing, 1599 garments were reported having been made that 17,000 quarts of fruits were canned, 50,000 quarts of vegetables, 1000 quarts of meats, 100 pounds of fruit was dried and 400 pounds of vegetables, 30,000 pounds of meat was cured while 4000 quarts of fruits and 35,000 quarts of vegetables were frozen and 70,000 pounds of meat was frozen.

The 4-H girls reported 200 quarts of fruits and 100 quarts of vegetables canned and 600 pounds of meat frozen, which was mainly chickens; they made 500 garments and remodeled 100 garments while 200 girls selected food and prepared meals, 369 girls were given training in leadership.

The agent made 308 farm or home visits, 775 office calls were made, 63 news articles were written, 53 radio broadcasts were made, and 2990 bulletins distributed. She drove 11,524 miles in carrying out the work.

CLUB BOYS REPORT COUNTY RAINFALL

According to David J. English, Assistant County Agricultural Agent, only two club boys with rain gauges reported rain in Lamb County for the month of November 1948. These were at Olton .59 and Earth .18. County average .13 inches.

This is 1.28 less than November of last year which was 1.41 and .53 less than the 35 year mean for November.

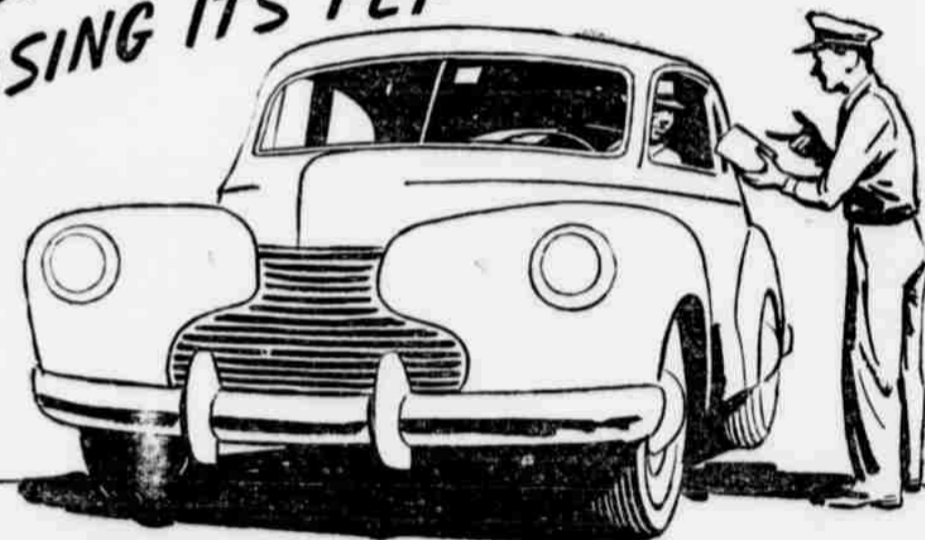

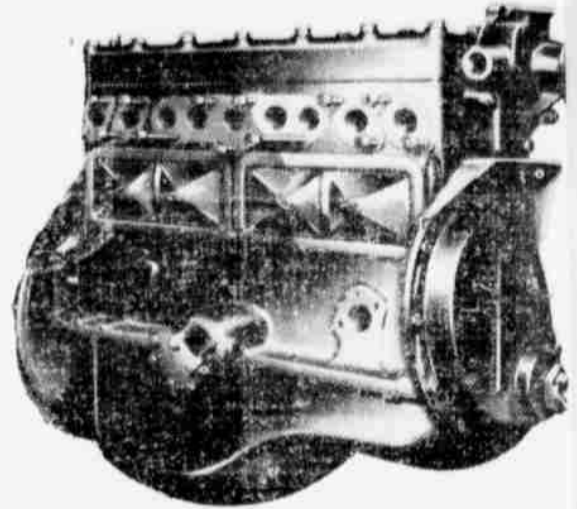

**January 15 Tax Payment Day For Most Farmers**

January 15 is an important date for farmers. It's income tax payment day for most of them.

(It is also one of four installment payment dates for millions of other persons who were required to file declarations of estimated income for 1948.)

Farmers are the only group of taxpayers permitted to wait until after the end of the year to file their declaration of estimated income for

that year. At the same time, having waited and not having made any previous installment payments, they have to pay all the estimated 1948 tax in a lump sum by Jan. 15.

Uncle Sam then permits the farmer to wait until March 15—like every one else—to file his income tax return and settle up any difference not accounted for in the January 15 declaration and payment.

However, if the farmer chooses to file his regular income tax return and pay up the amount due on or before Jan. 15, he is all washed up with his income tax worries for the year and doesn't have to file a declaration at all.

If the farmer's business year does not start January 1, then he can wait until 15 days after the end of his business year to file his declaration of estimated income and pay the amount estimated to be due.

Since most farmers operate on a calendar year basis, however, Jan. 15 is the big date for them, and this year it has extra importance because of changes in the tax law. Important changes include these:

1. The Internal Revenue bureau has new rulings concerning sales of livestock considered capital assets.

2. The new "split income" clause allows a husband and wife to split their combined total income, frequently reducing the tax.

3. Personal exemptions have been increased from \$500 to \$600.

4. Taxpayers with income of more than \$5,000 now may enter a deduction equal to 10 per cent of their income, up to \$1,000, for such things as interest, contributions, taxes and other deductible items. They may do this without itemizing deductions. Heretofore the limit was \$500. (They still may list deductions and claim the full allowable amount if this is greater than 10 per cent.)

As for rulings on livestock sales, a farmer's bulletin issued by Cornell University says:

The taxpayer is allowed, under some circumstances, to list the sale of dairy, breeding or work stock as the sale of a capital asset. As such, only one-half of the gain, or profit, usually is taxable, instead of all the gain.

Here are the requirements: The farmer must have had the animal or animals for more than six months. The animals must have been used for dairy, breeding or work purposes at the time of sale.

Also, the sale must have reduced the normal size of the herd, or made room for replacements to change the quality or breed of the herd.

Of course the farmer may have had losses on other capital items—such as machinery or buildings—that are greater than his profits on the cows.

In that case the gains and the losses may be balanced, or partially so. But technicalities and legal definitions may complicate the situation. If the farmer has a major problem of this sort he may save money by consulting his county agent or a farm tax authority.

Air Force service men skilled in certain specialties for initial assignment in the European theatre was announced here today by Sgt. First Class M. T. Waldrop in charge of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Station at 114 W. 4th St. in Littlefield, Texas.

The program is intended to secure qualified volunteers as replacements for men now serving with the U. S. Air Force in Europe whose enlistments are expiring and whose tours of foreign duty have been completed. Among the occupational specialties currently required are radio operators and mechanics, airplane engine mechanics and maintenance technicians, radar mechanics and repairmen, aerial engineers, mechanics, cooks, and clerk-typists.

Qualified individuals will be enlisted in the U. S. Air Force Unassigned for periods of 3, 4, 5 or 6 years for initial assignment to the European Command.

Qualified veterans will be accepted for enlistment in grades commensurate with their ability and military experience. Men reenlisting within ninety days of discharge automatically receive their former grade. All men accepted will receive an extra 20 per cent pay for overseas duty but dependents will not be authorized overseas travel.

## County Officials Commence Duties For New Term

County Judge Otha Dent administered the oath of office to incoming county officials Saturday morning in a public ceremony at the County Court House after bonds for each of the officers had been approved by the outgoing Lamb County Commissioners court.

Those officers whose bonds were duly approved by the Commissioners court of George C. Brown, Fred Wilson, Sam Cearley, Buck Ross and Judge Dent were new commissioners, L. R. Tarpley and Roy Gilbert representing precinct two and three respectively, Sheriff Sid Hopping, County Clerk Joel Thompson, District Clerk Mrs. Jerry Quigley, Tax Assessor-Collector Clarence Davis, County Treasurer Mrs. Bill Pass, County Attorney Bob Kirk and Judge Dent. The first four of those named are new officers, the others are holdovers although Mrs. Jerry Quigley was formerly county clerk and succeeds Herbert Dunn to her new office.

Sam Farquhar, justice of peace, did not take his oath of office with the other officials at that time because of a delay in receiving his bond, however, Judge Dent administered it to him later in the day.

After Bob Kirk had sworn in the new commissioners court and Judge Dent, the Judge called on the two outgoing commissioners for a few words.

Both Buck Ross and Sam Cearley expressed their appreciation for the

cooperation they had received during their terms of office on the Court from other members of the Court and Court House officials, as well as commenting on how amiable relations had been between commissioners in as much as Judge Dent had never been called on to break a tie during the past two years.

Former Sheriff Hugh Rice and District Clerk Herbert Dunn were spectators at the ceremony. Mr. Rice gave his best wishes to Sheriff Hopping and his new officers when Judge Dent called on him to speak and Mr. Dunn said he had enjoyed working for the county during the last six years and wished the new officers the best of luck.

Three of Sheriff Sid Hopping's deputies, Buck Creamer, J. D. Chester and R. D. Dennis, were present at the swearing in ceremonies. The fourth, Wayne Waters, took over his duties Monday after returning from a trip.

Judge Dent called on all of the new officials to speak as well as those leaving office. Generally, they all said they would do their best to keep things going as smoothly as they had during the last term and that they appreciated the cooperation they had received from the other officers.

Others present included Sam Hutson, formerly sheriff, who wished all of the County officials the best of luck, Ernest Jones, County Superintendent of Schools who was not up for re-election, who thanked everyone for the cooperation he had received in his work from the Court House, and ex-County Attorney E. S. Rowe, Sr., who briefly congratulated all of the last term officers for the exemplary work they had done.

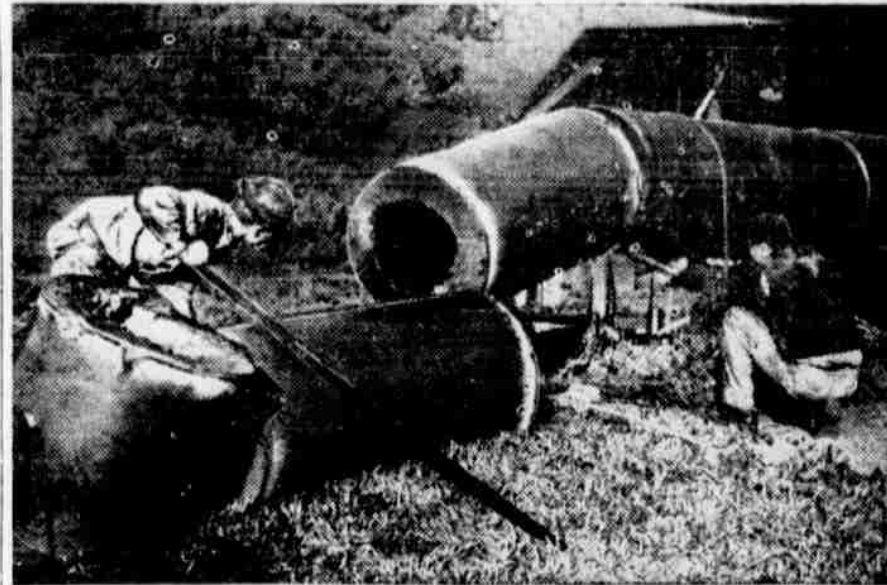
