LITTLEFIELD DRIVE CHURCH OF CHRIST

"God is a spirit and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth . . ." (John 4:24.)

In this passage from John's account of the gospel we see the way in which God desires, yea, even more, demands to be worshipped.

God must be worshipped in SPIRIT: This is so because God is a spirit. That which we render unto Him must be spiritual. Worship that is carnal-worldlywould not be acceptable to God. Our hearts must be reverent, aware of the might and majesty of God and the fraility of the family of man. We must never lose sight of the fact that God is a divine entity and as such, is entitled to the first fruits of our praise and adoration. Let us then, in attempting to worship the God of heaven, draw our affections and our mental faculties in from the world and the rudiments thereof and center them upon the Creator and Preserver of mankind.

God must likewise be worshipped in TRUTH: This naturally raises the question as to what is "truth"? By what criteria shall we judge the worth of our worship-the words of men or the words of God? Let Divinity answer: "THY WORD IS TRUTH." (John 17:17.) This is an excerpt from the prayer of Christ, prayed in the Garden of Gethsemenae, in the night in which He was betrayed. He af-firms that God's Word consti-tutes "truth." Hence, we must of necessity base the worth of our worship upon what God, in His revealed word, has said.

Note the Divine pattern of worship as outlined in the New Testament:

 Assemble. (Heb. 10:25.)
 This is essential to the rendering of worship. The place is immaterial. It may or may not be within the literal church building. It may be in a private home, rented hall, or under the shade of a tree.

2. Pray. (I Thes. 5:17-18.)

Prayer is essential to the devel-opment of a well-rounded Christian character.

3. Sing. (Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16; 1 Cor. 14:15.) Read these passages carefully and note that absolutely no mention is made of the use of mechanical instru-ments of music in Christian worship. The command is to "SING" and nothing is said about "PLAYING." Let us then in obcaience to God, do the things he has commanded and refrain from doing things He has not commanded.

4. Commune. (1 Cor. 11:23-30; Acts 20:7.) The disciples in the Apostolic Age met on the first day of the week to commune. Since each week has a first day, we are to commune weekly.

5. Contribute. (I Cor. 16:1-2.) This is essential to the well-being of the church and the growth and spread of the king-dom of God. God gave his all for us; we should certainly be willing to return to Him a portion of that with which we have been blessed.

To modify this plan is to altar God's divine plan and render our worship unacceptable to
