#### LITTLEFIELD DRIVE CHURCH OF CHRIST

"God is a spirit and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth..." (John 4:24.)

In this passage from John's account of the gospel we see the way in which God desires, yea, even more, demands to be worshipped.

God must be worshipped in SPIRIT: This is so because God is a spirit. That which we render unto Him must be spiritual. Worship that is carnal—worldly—would not be acceptable to God. Our hearts must be reverent, aware of the might and majesty of God and the frailty of the family of man. We must never lose sight of the fact that God is a divine entity and as such, is entitled to the first fruits of our praise and adoration. Let us then, in attempting to worship the God of heaven, draw our affections and our mental faculties in from the world and the rudiments thereof and center them upon the Creator and Preserver of mankind.

God must likewise be worshipped in TRUTH: This naturally raises the question as to what is "truth"? By what criteria shall we judge the worth of our worship—the words of men or the words of God? Let Divinity answer: "THY WORD IS TRUTH." (John 17:17.) This is an excerpt from the prayer of Christ, prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane, in the night in which He was betrayed. He affirms that God's Word constitutes "truth." Hence, we must of necessity base the worth of our worship upon what God, in His revealed word, has said.

Note the Divine pattern of worship as outlined in the New Testament:

  3. Sing. (Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16; I Cor. 14:15.) Read these passages carefully and note that absolutely no mention is made of the use of mechanical instruments of music in Christian worship. The command is to "SING" and nothing is said about "PLAYING." Let us then in obedience to God, do the things he has commanded and refrain from doing things He has not commanded.
  4. Commune. (I Cor. 11:23-30; Acts 20:7.) The disciples in the Apostolic Age met on the first day of the week to commune. Since each week has a first day, we are to commune weekly.
  5. Contribute. (I Cor. 16:1-2.) This is essential to the well-being of the church and the growth and spread of the kingdom of God. God gave his all for us; we should certainly be willing to return to Him a portion of that with which we have been blessed.
- To modify this plan is to altar God's divine plan and render our worship unacceptable to Him.

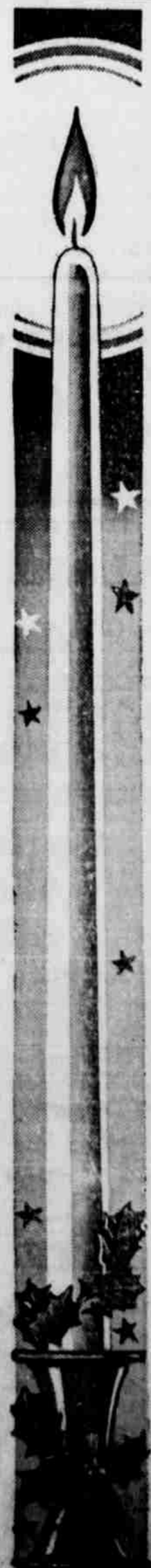

## B And C Coupons To We Worth 5 Gals.

The Office of Price Administration has announced a simplification rationing program, effective December 1, under which all "B" and "C" books issued by local War Price and Rationing Boards will contain fewer coupons than in the past, but each coupon will be good for more gallons than heretofore. No increase in the amount of gasoline allowed is involved, however.

All "B" and "C" coupons issued throughout the country on and after December 1 will be worth five gallons each, as compared with the present value of two gallons for coupons of those types in the east and midwest and three gallons in the far west.

The new supplemental gasoline ration coupons of five gallons value will be issued with the designation, "B-2" and "C-2" on their face. As present "B" and "C" and "B-1" and "C-1" coupons run out, they will be replaced by the new higher-unit-value coupons. Meanwhile, outstanding coupons issued before December 1 will continue to be worth only two gallons in the east and midwest and three gallons in the far west.

OPA explained that "B-1" coupons are a reprint of the earlier "B" coupons, they are used in the same way and have the same value. The same thing is true of "C" and "C-1" coupons.

While the change does not mean more gasoline for holders of supplemental ration books, it does mean that they will receive their rations

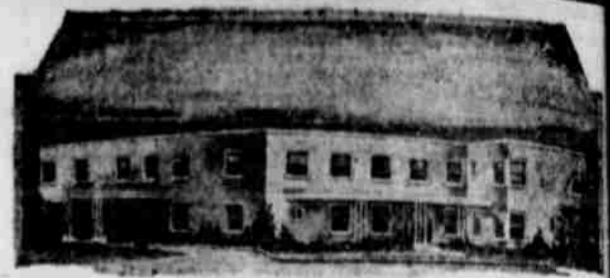

**Rationing Calender  
Nov. 26 to Dec. 3**

**SUGAR**—Stamp No. 29 of War Ration Book IV became good November 1 for five lbs. and will be valid through January 15, 1944. Nos. 15 and 16 in Book I for canning, which expired on October 31, if still unused by consumer may be taken to local War Price and Rationing Board and used in making application for sugar certificates.

**MEATS AND FATS** — Brown stamps G, H, J and K are all valid

and are good through December 4. L became valid Nov. 21, M will become valid November 28, and N will become valid on Dec. 5. L, M and N all will expire on January 1, 1944.

**PROCESSED FOODS**—All blue stamps in Book II have expired. Green stamps A, B and G in Book IV are valid and will be good through December 20.

**SHOES**—In addition to Stamp No. 18 in Book I valid indefinitely for one pair of shoes, Stamp No. 1 on airplane sheet of Book III is also valid indefinitely. Consumers will be notified 30 days in advance of the expiration date of either the No. 18

Stamp or the No. 1 airplane stamp.

**GASOLINE** — (Gasoline coupons must be endorsed on front immediately upon receipt.) No. 9 "A" coupons became valid for 3 gals. each on November 22 and will expire on January 15, 1944. "B" and "C" (2 gals. each), "E" (1 gal. each), "R" and "TT", (5 gals. each), all issued for three months with any coupons left over valid for further use. "D" coupons are good for one and one-half gals. each for motorcycles.

**TIRES AND INNER TUBES**—All new tires, used car and truck tires, all new inner tubes and truck recaps require certificates. Passenger car tire recaps, used tractor and implement tires, and all used inner tubes require no certificate.

**TIRE INSPECTION**—"A" book holders must have third official inspection by March 31, 1944; "B" book holders, fourth inspection by February 29, 1944; "C" book holders, fourth inspection by November 30; and "T" book holders, inspection every six months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. Speedometer reading should be written in on record.

**USED COMMERCIAL VEHICLES** — A certificate of transfer is required and must be signed by both seller and buyer and presented by buyer when he applies for gasoline at his local War price and rationing board.

**OTHER RATIONING** — Certificates from local board required for new cars, domestic cooking and heating stoves, bicycles, typewriters, rubber footwear and from USDA War Board for farm machinery and pressure cookers.
