Community Chairmen Announced

Auction Sale Again Planned; Horne Cites Hike In Polio Cases

Announcement of the appointment of community chairmen for the 1955 March of Dimes campaign in Lamb county which begins Saturday were announced yesterday by County Chairman Howard Horne of Littlefield.

Community chairmen are: Mrs. Basil Sherman of Olton; Mrs. E. C. Hudson of Earth; P. T. Dunning of Spade; Mrs. Louella Ferguson of Sudan; J. F. Stephens of Amherst and Albert Miller of Littlefield.

Horne reported that everything is in readiness for the January drive, adding that Texas showed a 55 per cent greater polio ratio than any other state last year.

He said success of the campaign is imperative since Texas had more than 3,200 new cases of polio reported last year. It will mean the number of carry over patients will be greater for 1955 than ever before, he added.

Horne said some 30,000 Texas school children received the Salk Polio vaccine during 1954, and that the state will be included in the proposed 9 million series of vaccine inoculations during the spring of 1955 if the current evaluation test prove the vaccine effective.

The county goal this year in the month long drive will be \$10,000. Horne said, and one of the principal revenue-raising projects will be the repetition of an auction sale which met with great success last year.

Held on the Santa Fe depot grounds the auction netted \$1,800 for the Dimes drive and literally everything except a pound of coffee was sold. No date has been set for this year's auction yet, Horne said.

Baby 'New Year' Will Need More Than Diaper To Keep Warm In This Weather

Baby 'New Year' will need more than his usual diaper to keep him warm in Lamb county if Wednesday's near zero temperature reading and icy conditions continue.

The Western Cotton Oil Co., at Littlefield reported that the plug was evidently pulled from the thermometer Wednesday morning when a chilly six degrees was reached. But at 8:30 a.m. the temperature had gone up to 16 degrees and weather observers generally predicted higher readings for New Year's Day.

Snow which blanketed the county Tuesday was hailed as beneficial to crop prospects. Western Cotton Oil reported that a measurement of 4 and 1-2 inches of snow was reported on level but that it might be heavier 5 or 5 and 1-2 inches. It is believed that the snow fall added about a half-inch of moisture to farmland, helping both sub-soil and surface soil.

Saturday Is Holiday

Most store and businesses in Littlefield will be closed Saturday according to Manager Jesse L. Everett of the Chamber of Commerce.

Banks and the post office will observe the holiday but the county and city buildings will remain open until noon. At 10 a.m. Saturday, newly elected county officials will take their oaths of office.

Agriculture observers pointed out that the snow will no deeper in the soil than would a quick shower and should bolster the crop outlook.

But while the snow helped the farmer in moistening his land, plowing will have to be speeded up in the county to prevent soil from blowing away by high winds which will soon be in the making. Snow generally puffs the top soil and if it is not plowed quickly it would blow worse than if there had been no snow, agriculture observers point out.

Littlefield hospitals reported Wednesday morning that there had been no injuries because of the storm. Highway patrolmen and city and county police said there had been rashes of minor auto accidents with damage to property but no injuries because of icy conditions.

Winds up to 30 and 40 mph swept the falling flakes in great swifts through open fields and deposited them near obstructions, causing drifts up to two and three feet in the country.

Two Fires, Wrecks And Firecracker Vandalism Mar Littlefield's Holiday

Littlefield spent a Christmas merry with three auto accidents, two fires and firecracker vandalism.

The J. D. Hagler residence, 1223 S. Phelps av. was reported a total loss Monday by Fire Chief Bob Cox when a fire of unknown origin gutted the interior. The Haglers were visiting in Vernon at the time.

Insurance representatives said the loss would approximate \$25,000. The fire was reported about 5:30 a.m. by a neighbor, a millman who was taking the funds. Having called the E. M. Lowe residence, 29th and summoned the fire department.

The firemen arrived and had collapsed. After the blaze under control, the fire broke out and firemen were summoned. Friends of the family who were visiting at the time reported that the house contained many antique pieces of furniture which cannot be replaced.

Littlefield's second fire occurred Christmas night in the Col. Roberts subdivision in an unoccupied house belonging to an Amherst resident. A son, P. Latin American. Police Lawrence Walraven theorized that children playing in the yard with firecrackers set off the blaze. Fire Chief Bob Cox reported that it was the third time the building had had a fire.

Walraven reported that he had located "three or four" shots for setting off firecrackers in the city limits in violation of city ordinance. Firecrackers in general were placed in the city limits during the holiday.

These wrecks investigated during the holiday resulted in no injuries and only property damage. Walraven reported that Littlefield has gone through without a motor vehicle accident.

The Living God

For January 9, 1955

In the next three months the Bible school lessons will go on the great Christian doctrines. Many churches are basically ignorant about these doctrines. You should go into a church and hear a man about the living God, or at the Holy Spirit, or about the denomi- nation of the man- from the Bible. Various churches have their own creeds. Dr. Foreman is their official interpreter of Scripture. But since these creeds are concerned with the Bible rather than with the special views of particular churches, but rather try to point out some truths which we all hold in common, and which we derive from the revelation we find in the Bible.

Blue nowhere tries to prove that God exists. If I were talking to you or writing you a letter I would not waste time trying to prove that I am a real person. The Word of God simply as- serts that God IS. But that is enough for a vital faith. The God just IS, like the law of gravity or the binomial theorem in algebra—quite real but not to be seen. Suppose I were to be just IS, like the other side of the moon, always there but never to be seen? Suppose I were like a block of granite in a remote corner of the world, never worked on but never seen? No—by no means! The Word of the Bible is the Living God who does things. Read the Bible the first book in the Bible. Who is the principal character? Not Adam, not Abraham or Joseph, but the story of the Bible is the story of the mighty acts of the living God can be seen.

Book of John 4:24 can be read just as correctly "God is a Spirit," and we should believe the first verse better conveys the meaning. This does not mean you are to be sent around and sent to God? You are not you are not God. The living line in existence is the living spirit and matter. It is the one, the only, living God on the one side, and the created spirit and matter on the other side. As we believe, we can be sure of the living God. One is that God does not have a body. If he had a body he would have to be in two places at one time. A body he would be by his body as we all are. The living spirit he can be, and he is not bound by space. Because he is not bound by space he is not far from any of us... in him we can move and are.

The Testament tells us about God, but the New Testament tells us more. It is only in the New Testament that God is called "Father." The Testament, but in the New Testament using the word "Father" about God more than any other word. There is a sense in which God is Father of all men, a more intimate sense in which he is Father of Christ and his disciples. Consider the words of the Bible. He has been just as beginning the Lord's prayer... O Lord, Almighty God... Judge of all things. But Jesus passes by and teaches us to say "Our Father" when we pray.

Important, most distinctive of all truths that about God in the Bible, that set up in Jesus' words: "I and the Father are one." The Bible shows that Jesus came to say he and his Father are one person, one individual. To see God we must see the face and into the mind of Jesus. As Paul later wrote of Jesus Christ, "Christ, who have given great things to us, and we are agreed with God, any notion about him, must be that he is the first of Jesus Christ. 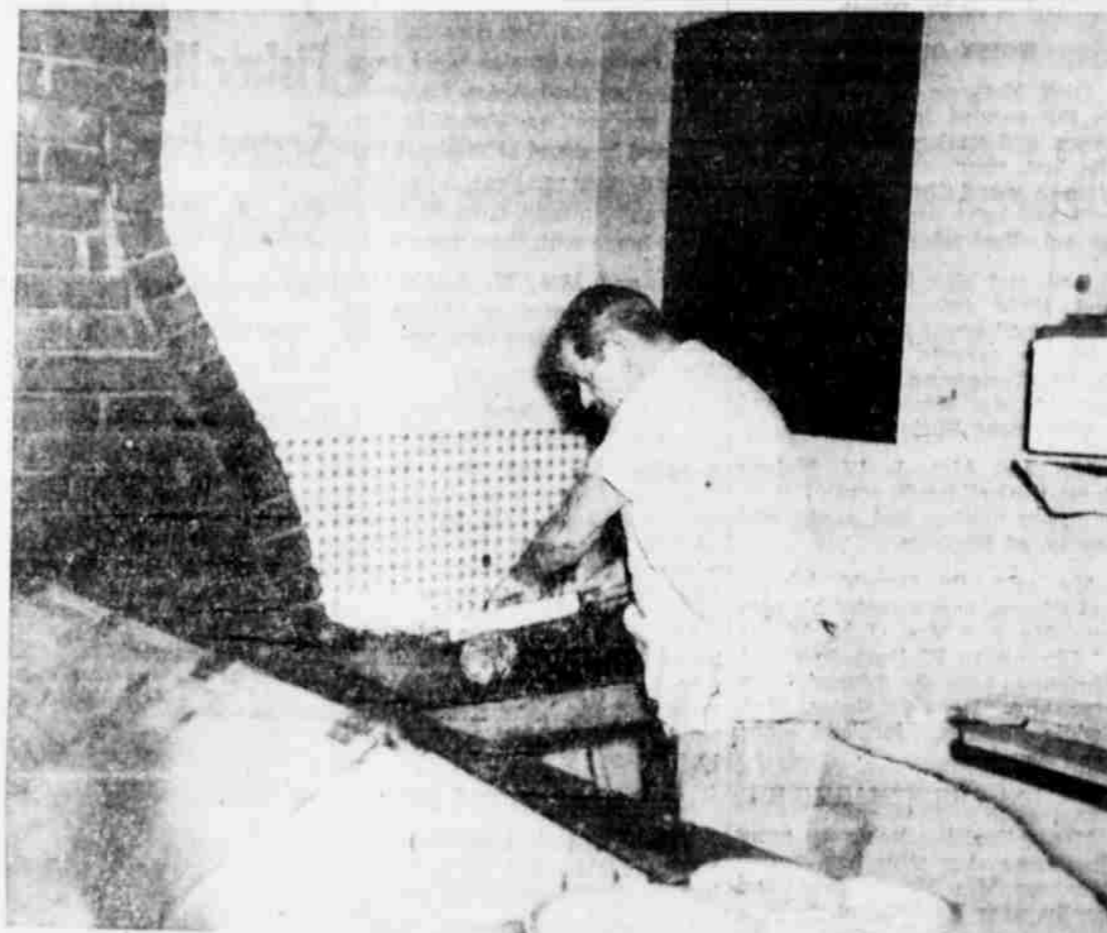

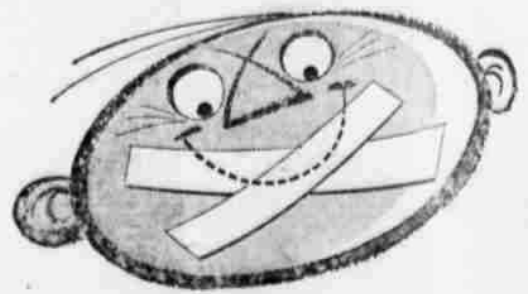

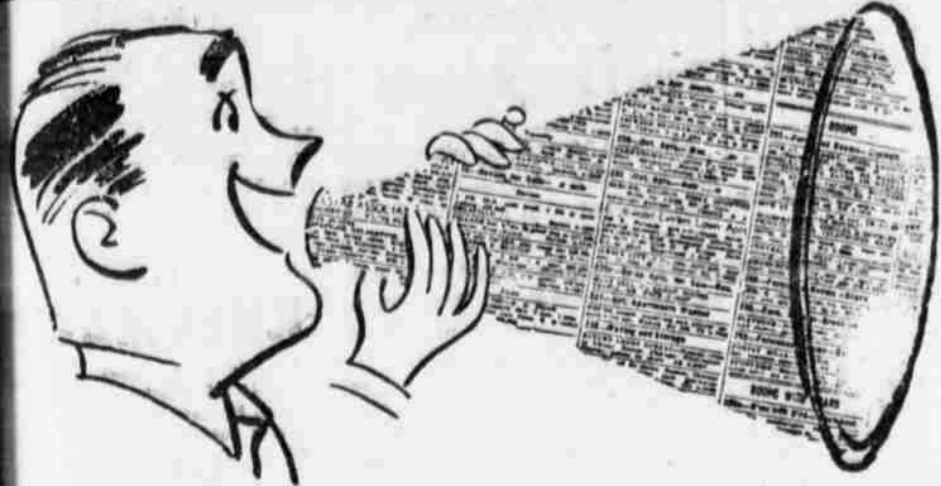

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Support Rates For Oats, Barley, Rye And Sorghums Set At 70 Per Cent Parity

AMHERST — Support rates for the 1955 crop of oats, barley, rye and grain sorghums were announced this week by Charles Hill of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office here.

Hill said that Commodity Credit Corporation price supports for these crops will be at levels reflecting 70 percent of the parity price as of Nov. 15, 1954.

70 Percent of Parity

He said the national average "dollars and cents" supports for 1955 reflecting the 70 per cent of parity, are:

Oats, 61 cents per bushel for Grade No. 3 or better; Barley, 94 cents per bushel for Grade No. 2 or better (except mixed barley); rye, \$1.18 per bushel for Grade No. 2 or better or No. 3 on test weight, but otherwise grade No. 2; grain sorghums, \$1.78 per hundred weight for Grade No. 2 or better (except mixed grain sorghums).

Hill pointed out that Price support levels for these small grains have varied widely in past years. The highest which have been in effect were 85 per cent in both 1953 and 1954. Before that, during the approximately 15 years when supports have been used for this group, supports have at times been as low as 44 per cent of parity for barley, 35 per cent for grain sorghums, 69 per cent for oats, and 38 per cent for rye.

Desirable Relationship

The support rates announced for 1955 production are aimed at promoting a more desirable relationship between the production of these four grains as a group and the overall utilization of feed Hill said. Production of these grains in 1954 was substantially higher than in 1953, and there will be no restrictions on their production in 1955. Indications are that much more of them will be placed under price support this year, and with high level price supports this trend could have continued next year. The lower supports are expected to encourage better adjustment and freer flow of the four grains into feed use, he added.

Eligibility requirements and operation provisions are substantially the same as those for 1954-crop, with a modification in barley that raises the minimum requirement from Grade No. 5 to Grade No. 4. Support will be carried throughout Commodity Credit Corporation farm storage loans, warehouse loans, and purchase agreements.

These will be available through Stabilization county offices from time of harvest of 1955-crops through January 31, 1954. Oats, barley, and rye loan will mature

on April 30, 1956 and grain sorghums loans on March 31, 1956. However, earlier maturity dates may be announced later for some States because of local storage conditions or early harvests.

Eligibility Requirements

Minimum eligibility requirements for obtaining price support on these four grains follow:

Oats, Grade No. 3 or better; barley, Grade No. 4 or better, or No. 4 garlicky or better; grain sorghums, Grade No. 4 or better or No. 4 smutty or better, and containing not more than 13 percent moisture; rye, Grade No. 2 or better, or No. 3 on factor of test weight only, except containing not more than one per cent ergot.

The national average prices compare with average support prices for 1954-crops (reflecting 85 percent of parity) of 75 cents per bushel of oats, \$1.15 per bushel for barley, \$1.43 per bushel for rye, and \$2.28 per hundred weight for grain sorghums.

The relatively greater change in the grain sorghums support level is due to the fact that the

parity price itself is lower this year for sorghums. The shift from old to new parity formulas, directed in the controlling legislation, had not yet been completed for grain sorghums. Sorghum parity dropped 5 per cent in 1954 under "transitional parity" provisions of this legislation. The other three small grains had completed their "transition" to the new formula before this year.

Special Controls Removed

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has announced the removal of previously proposed special controls on the production of some crops in 1955. The specific action, aimed at greater freedom of operation for farmers and made possible by changing conditions, is as follows:

1. Cross-compliance requirements among individual crop acreage allotments will not be in effect for 1955. (Under regulations announced last June, a producer would have been required to comply with all crop allotments established on his

farm for 1955 in order to be eligible for any crop price support.)

2. Previously proposed limitations on the use of acreage diverted from allotment crops to produce commercial vegetables, potatoes, and sweet potatoes will not be in effect for 1955. (Under a proposal announced last September, the 1955 harvested acreage of this vegetable - potato group could not have exceeded the 1952-53 average on farms crop allotments were established, without loss of all crops price support eligibility.)
