EDITORIALS

Like Your Garden Hose

One of the cogent reasons for the recent increase in the price of crude oil - - the first such increase since 1953, when wage and other costs were materially lower than they are now - - was to encourage producers to seek new supplies. Demand for oil products is running at extremely high levels, and the situation has been conplicated by the need to supply American oil to Europe in great quantities.

We have, of course, big crude oil inventories on hand. But, due to the nature of the oil business, much of it is not available in the normal sense of the word.

The president of the American Petroleum Institute has explained this with some simple examples. Before water will come out of an ordinary garden hose, the hose must be filled from end to end. Similarily, if water is to be drawn from taps in the home, the home's whole water system must be filled.

The oil industry is in the same position. It must have a tremendously large amount of oil to fill its vast crude oil and product transportation and manufacturing systems. This liquid oil is in a continuing form of dead storage. "As a matter of fact," the API's top executive said, "more than twothirds of all the crude oil inventories reported by the Bureau of Mines and the Department of the Interior as in storage, are actually unavailable and must remain unavailable if these transportation and refining facilities are to function properly.

Crude oil must flow day and night in huge quantities into facilities. New reserves of crude oil must be pinpointed to make sure we will have plenty of oil for futre years. And only a profitable price can encourage men to take the long risks that are an inescapable part of opening up new oil wells and fields.
