#### Court Approves Unemployment Ins. Provision Of Act

The Supreme Court held constitutional Monday the unemployment insurance provisions of the social security act.

Justice Cardozo delivered the opinion, which affirmed a ruling in favor of the legislation by the fifth circuit court of appeals and gave the administration another victory.

The unemployment insurance provisions taxed employers of more than eight persons to assist in caring for the jobless and provide a fund against economic depression.

The final rulings on validity of social security act providing old age pensions are yet to come.

**BROOMCORN** 

**OUTLOOK** 

Prices for broomcorn, as with all other farm products at marketing about 300,000 acres normally are time, are governed largely by supply

and demand and there is no set present high price levels for broomrule by which to measure profits corn, at planting time. Only a general outlook, based on existing conditions, can be forecast.

to meet domestic and foreign consumption, is around 60,000 tons and required each year to produce this amount. During the past two years, a normal acreage has been planted the five commercially producing States but because of unfavorable weather conditions, the tonnage produced has been far short of consumer needs. So much so, in fact, that our carryover stocks this spring are estimated as low as 8,000 tons by the trade as compared with normal carryover stocks of around 25,000 The outlook, therefore, for fair price returns for early broomcorn seems almost certain. The season's production later will factor in sustaining present high price levels or tond to lower price levels, depending entirely on the final acreage planted and growing conditions for the crop during the next 90 days.

The present outlook is for a reduced acrenge this year in Illinois, Oklahoma and Colorado with about the same planting interest as last year in Texas and New Mexico. The high prices for feed stuffs and grain and planting interest in cotton is diverting interest to these major erops and less broomcorn, while in Colorado, weather conditions have materially cut planting prospects. The "dust howl" of Colerado, Kanas and Western Oklahoma, in years past, has produced almost one half of the broomcorn produced in the U. S. Whether this section will produce much broomcorn this year is problematical. In fact the acreage outlook for this year to date is de-cidedly favorable for maintaining
