Plans Expected To Be Completed In 60 Days For New Court House

Lamb County due to build and have occupancy of new court-house in 1953, having already voted bonds for that purpose, saw those plans move a step nearer toward fulfillment when Otha Dent announced this week that an undetermined number of architects from various points both in and out of the state will come to Littlefield Thursday, where they are scheduled to meet and talk with the commissioners' court, and the members of the courthouse advisory committee.

From among these visiting architects will probably be chosen the person or firm which will draw the plans and supervise construction of the new building. The judge also stated that the bonds recently voted are expected to be disposed of early next year. The bond issue totaled \$600,000.

It has already been decided that the structure is to be built of pressed brick, and erected on the ground south of the present courthouse.

No definite dates for anything can yet be set. The courthouse hopes to be able to have plans completed in the next 60 days, and have tentatively set the date for letting of the building contract, after bids not later than April 1.

Arrest Made On Liquor Violation

Olton Schools Closed Tuesday Due To Epidemic Of Influenza

Olton schools were dismissed Tuesday, and will not be in session until Monday December 29. The reason for the long holiday—or early holiday is that more than 200 students, and several faculty members are suffering from influenza.

The announcement came from Carl Macon, superintendent of the schools, who himself is affected by the virus.

Half of the High School enrollment is affected, as well as several teachers, who have been absent the past week.

Dr. James E. Fite, one of the three Olton doctors, and city health officers said that as many adults as children are affected with the flu, which has reached an epidemic stage. Approximately 150 patients have been treated daily at the Olton Memorial Hospital during the past few days, Dr. Fite said.

The schools were closed on the advise of the three doctors. Also affected by the virus are Springlake, Hart and Earth.

A faculty Christmas party scheduled for Thursday in the school lunchroom has been cancelled. The children's individual classroom parties will be held Dec. 29, the day students return to school.

The football banquet was held as scheduled Tuesday night in the school lunchroom.

French Expert Tells How To Select Gift Perfumes

Frankincense and myrrh were two of the choice gifts brought by the wise men when they greeted the newborn infant. No doubt these gentle aromatics were chosen carefully by the Magi for their subtle scents.

Fragrances in every form have been popular and proper Christmas gifts ever since. It is the gift even a new acquaintance can present with the assurance that it is in good taste—not so with other expensive items.

But perfume must be chosen wisely if it is going to make a hit with the recipient. The best method for selecting Christmas perfume will accent the personality of the recipient, says Raymond Barbas, head of Jean Patou and president of the Haute Couture. He explains:

"French women select their perfumes with deliberation. They know that men can be repulsed or attracted by the scent they wear. So they make sure they get a good scent's worth."

When choosing perfume, advises Barbas, remember the woman is going to live with perhaps even wear it 24 hours a day. That is why it must be appropriate to her. Keep these pointers in mind:

1. The chic woman will enjoy a distinctive perfume, especially one that is exclusive and fabulously. She likes a good scent to be identified with her, although she might be fussy about scent preference.
2. Career girls enjoy matching perfume and cologne, so that the lighter scent may be used during the day and the heavier scent used on the after-five date.
3. The young college girl will enjoy a fragrance that is light, sparkling and crisp. A floral scent with the right touch of spice appeals to the young in heart. She will not risk offending anyone if she wears one of these light florals with its nice clear scent.
4. The young matron is proudest, usually, wearing a feminine but sophisticated fragrance. A woody tang with a pungent touch is the perfect choice for the housewife.

5. When buying perfume take a whiff of it before you decide. If it is for your best girl she should enjoy wearing the perfume which pleases you.
6. If you are consulting the sales girl, and she asks you the girl's type, she doesn't expect you to say "oh, she's a cute little redhead with blue eyes" or "she's tall and dark." She wants to know her type and the best answers would be perhaps, "She's the matronly type," she's fra-

mor. This scent ("Moment Supreme") is a popular gift item.

7. The best idea is to notice the perfume your girl wears, and ask her the name of it. If you like it buy it for her. But if you decide it isn't the right one for your glamorous beauty, this is a good chance to buy her a more appropriate scent.

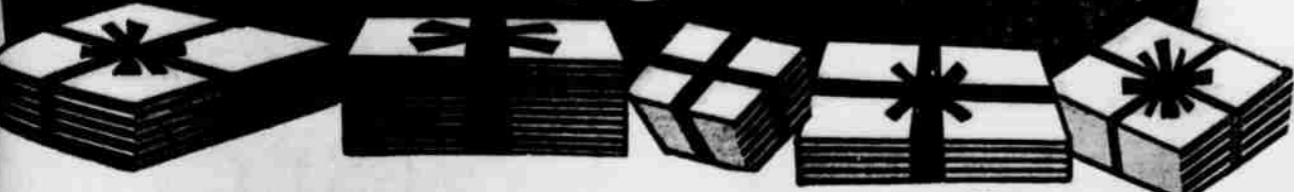

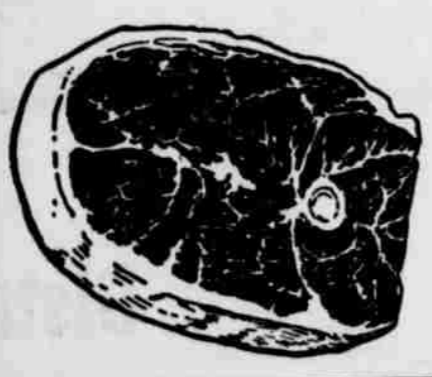

2 cups ground, cooked ham
1/2 cup cornmeal
few grains pepper
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 cup Fat Milk

2 Tablespoons flour
3 Tablespoons hot fat
1 cup mashed, jellied cranberry sauce
1 teaspoon vinegar
3 Tablespoons water

Mix in a bowl the ham, cornmeal, pepper, mustard and milk. With wet hands, shape into 8 balls. Roll balls, one at a time, in flour. Brown slowly in skillet in hot fat. Cover with a mixture of cranberry sauce, vinegar and water. Cook slowly, covered, 10 minutes. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.

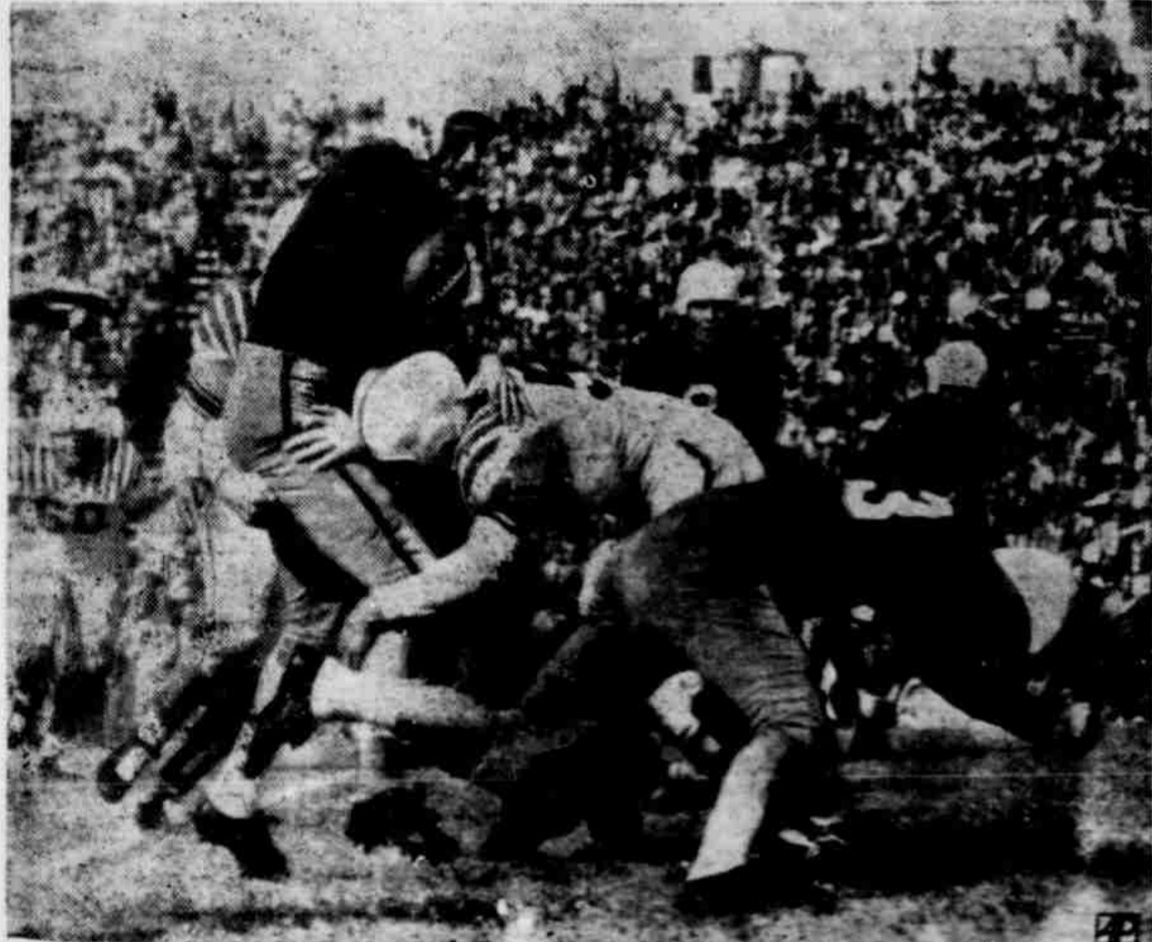
