## Low Temperature For Past Week 21 Degrees

Slowly rising temperatures Wednesday promised relief from the cold weather, which has brought freezing rain, snow and ice to the South Plains within the last several days.

The entire South Plains was covered by a blanket of snow Monday night, ranging in depth from a quarter of an inch in the Littlefield area to four inches elsewhere.

Snow was reported from Amarillo to Clovis to as far south as Sweetwater. Snow ranged from three to four inches as far south as Snyder. Lubbock reported one inch with the low temperature of 21 degrees.

Wednesday morning the City was in a blanket of frost, and everything was beautiful to see, with frost on the trees and ground.

The coldest temperature for the week was recorded Monday morning between 8:30 and 9 o'clock at 21 degrees.

The temperatures for the past week, as recorded by the West Texas Gas Company's thermometer, were: Thursday, high 55, low 22; Friday, high 52, low 28; Saturday, high 66, and low 32; Sunday, high 64 and low 50; Monday high 35, and low 21; Tuesday, high 54, and low 26, and Wednesday, low 22, and high 61.

## Oil Cementing Co. Moves Machinery Into This Area

Interest in the oil development in the Littlefield area continues daily, and it is the general opinion of those in a good position to estimate, that within the next six weeks considerable more activity will be underway.

The Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Tucker, outpost of Lamb county's discovery well in southeast Lamb county, has reached 5,017 feet, in lime and is drilling ahead. It is to drill to about 6,800 feet. Reports indicate that the formation is favorable.

An indication of the growing interest in Lamb county's oil development is the fact that outside well cementing and oil well supply companies are becoming interested in this territory.

The Haliburton Cementing company of Duncan, Okla., are moving cement machines into this area, and employees for this company have already arrived.

Plans are also underway by the Continental Supply company, an oil well supply concern, to establish a warehouse in Littlefield.

The general opinion of oil men working this territory is that according to the tests being made, this area will have an oil field.

Members of the Commissioner's Court left Monday for Austin to meet with the Highway commission in connection with their program of endeavor to secure more farm-to-market roads in Lamb county.

Those who left for Austin were: Judge I. B. Holt, H. A. Hysinger, of Olton; Sam Cearley of Earth, E. C. (Buck) Ross of Littlefield, and E. L. Yarbrough of Amherst.

The Highway commission is composed of Brady Gentry, chairman, and Reuber Williams, and F. W. Knetch. The county commission is asking for construction of several farm to market roads under the Federal and State plan, without cost to the county.

In an interview with Judge Holt Saturday he had hopes of getting some of the roads, but that they would probably not get as much consideration as they were hoping for. He said they had an outlined plan to submit to the Highway commission.

Mr. and Mrs. John Cary also received a telegram from Pfc. Mitchell announcing his arrival at New York. They also talked to him over the phone Sunday afternoon and again Tuesday.

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**With South Plains Men In the Armed Forces**

Sgt. Payton Harrell, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. P. Harrell, is stationed in Belgium.

Included in a letter written to his parents under date of January 12, was the following:

"I haven't heard from you in quite some time, but I suppose the mail is being held up somewhere. The mail is pretty slow right now anyway. How is Jimmie and the baby? Tell them hello. The light is so dim that I can hardly see to write this letter. Kinda like a black-

out in Ireland. Well, not that dark, but it's pretty dark anyway.

"How is everything in Littlefield now? Is it cold there?"

"I have received several Littlefield papers lately. Seems they come in bunches of three or four at the time when I get them.

"The snow gets deeper here by the day. I'd even like to see a good ole sand storm now.

"Say, has that package ever arrived yet? Seems like everything I send gets lost or is six months getting there. I sent Reba a bottle of perfume while I was in Brest and it hasn't got there yet. Some of the fellows sent packages the same time I did while we were on the Seigfried

Line, and they have already got home.

"This seems to be all I know so I'd better close and get a few hours sleep. It so happens that I am on guard from 1 until 2:30 a. m. in the morning. Lucky should be my middle name."

Capt. Hershel Harrell, another son of Mr. and Mrs. G. P. Harrell, pilot of the 343rd Bomb Squadron, 98th Bomb Grp., stationed in the European area, wrote his parents recently as follows:

"Received your packages O.K. Got them early in December. I wrote you when I got them, but the letter must have gotten lost.

"Have you received a war bond yet? I'm having a \$50 bond sent home each month along with the \$125 allotment. It may be too early for the bonds to be coming in yet. They told me it might take two or three months for the first one to arrive.

"Had another letter from Pete a few days ago. He is still O.K., but he says the snow is pretty deep.

"My engineer and navigator both heard from home and each is the father of a baby girl. You should see the big smiles they are wearing.

"Things have been pretty slow around here recently. The weather hasn't been good.

"If you can send a few things such as canned meat or anything to eat, I would be glad to get it. We have a little midnight feed around here once in a while and it's almost impossible to get anything from our mess hall outside of meal hours. Anything you could send that wouldn't spoil enroute would be O.W. We get plenty of candy, but that gets old after a while. Oh, yes, please don't send any spam or Vienna sausage. We get those things most every day.

Pvt. Grisham has been overseas two years. He is with Gen. Patton's Third Army, and the 359th Infantry.

Pfc. Roy Lee Grisham, son of E. E. Grisham of west of Littlefield, has recently been sent to Santa Monica, Calif., where he is finishing up his instructor school work. He will graduate from there March 15, and then go to Camp Luna, N. M., and for replacement somewhere in the U.S.A. or elsewhere.

Speaking of Santa Monica he says it is a real place. He says he is also helping build the new C-45 Cargo ship, and learning it throughout. It is called the sky master of the air, one of the largest transports now, but there will be another one still larger in June, the C-74.

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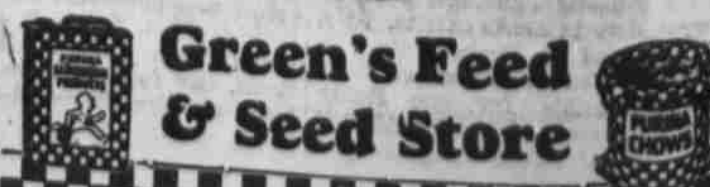

## Red Cross Fund

The Red Cross is launching today its war fund campaign for raising \$17,900 in Lamb County. Littlefield, with I. D. Onstead as chairman, has a quota of \$5,996.50 to raise.

The war service of the Red Cross extends to the fighting fronts, where the world humanitarian organization extends aid to the able-bodied and wounded. Despite this responsibility directly related to the war, the Red Cross is always ready to provide emergency relief for any community in this country, or elsewhere, when suddenly overtaken by disaster. It seeks to alleviate the condition of the wounded in service hospitals. Its vol-

unteer members have made millions of bandages for the armed forces, and the Red Cross blood banks have saved many lives on the war fronts.

Lamb County and Littlefield last year over-subscribed their quota of \$18,400 for the county and \$6,164 for Littlefield.

This year with many more on the battlefields, and the greater need for the Red Cross service, donations should surpass the call to permit the Red Cross to exercise its humanitarian usefulness and to assure our men overseas that the people at home are aware of their difficult situation and seek to ameliorate it as far as possible.

### Slaughterers Not Eligible For Subsidy Payments

Non-federally inspected slaughterers will not be eligible to subsidy payments on more than 50 per cent of weight of hogs on which they collected payments for the corresponding period last year, Dan L. Boyd, District Representative, has announced.

Previously WFA had announced this weight would be limited to 70 per cent but it has become necessary to reduce the percentage to 50 effective February 26.

This new action is intended to channel more hogs into federally inspected plants where pork will become available for procurement for military and war services.

During current month, slaughter of hogs under federal inspection has dropped to 46 per cent of the number slaughtered a year ago. Despite substantial reduction in total marketings, this indicates an increase in slaughter of hogs in plants not under federal inspection. Because non-federally inspected pork is prohibited in interstate commerce, this is causing unequal distribution of civilian supplies, as well as a decrease in quantity available for our armed forces, Mr. Boyd said.

**Lobos Take District Basketball Title**

The Levelland Lobos captured the District 4-A basketball title at Levelland Friday night by brushing aside the O'Donnell Eagles and Sudan Hornets for the right to represent the district in the regional meet at Plainview March 2-3.

In winning the tournament finals, the Lobos ran their season's scoring record to 1,033 points, with Jess Clairdy, high scoring star of the club, flipping in the 100th point of the year.

Levelland fought off a game Sudan rally in the last half to win the final game, 36-27, with Clairdy looping in 14 of the points, followed by Palmer and Garrison with nine. The Sudan scoring was well divided, with Eddings getting eight, Albert Lynch seven, Lloyd Lynch six and Rector

six.

Levelland bounded away to a 21-10 lead in the first half. Sudan came back to score eight straight points to pull up to 21-18, and a few minutes later took a 26-25 lead, but Levelland turned on the heat in the last quarter.

Sudan eliminated the two south half teams from the race, knocking over Slaton in the first game 31-23, and coming back in the only afternoon encounter and beating the powerful O'Donnell Eagles 35-27, but were unable to stand up to the pressure of the third game.

In the opening game, three men scored all of the Sudan points, with Eddings getting 11 points, and Albert and Lloyd Lynch each getting 10. Hanna paced Slaton with 10.

In the meeting of the first round winners, Levelland handed O'Donnell its first loss at the noon game, 37-26 as Clairdy poured in 18 points and Palmer 10 to lead the attack. Brownlow topped O'Donnell with 13.

O'Donnell then suffered its second defeat of the day, falling before Sudan as Lloyd Lynch hit the hoop for 14 points and Albert Lynch

followed closely with 11. Pearson led O'Donnell with nine.

**Treating Cottonseed Before Planting Is Good Insurance**

Treating cottonseed chemically before planting the 1945 crop is good insurance for increased yields and income for growers and greater production of cotton and cottonseed products needed in the war, says E. A. Miller, agronomist, Extension Service, Texas A. & M. College, in a statement released by the War Cotton Production Committee of Texas.

Miller said Texas Agricultural Experiment Station tests show cotton yields were increased by seed treatment by averages ranging from 4 per cent at the Lubbock Station up to an average of 25 per cent at College Station. Increases varied from year to year, depending on soil conditions.

In recent tests at the Temple Station several chemicals gave good results, Miller said. Increased yields as high as 205 pounds of seed cotton per year were obtained with an expense of only about 10 cents per acre for the chemical.

Advantages of treating planting seed listed by Miller include the probability of obtaining a better stand, especially if conditions are unfavorable for quick germination; and reducing damage from seedling diseases, such as damping off, sore shin and anthracnose. It also reduces damage from angular leaf spot and bacterial boll rot. Another advantage is increased seedling vigor, enabling plants to make more vigorous and healthy growth during the first few weeks. This makes possible earlier cultivation to control grass and weeds.

Cottonseed for planting may be treated with a commercial treating machine, or in a tight container such as an oil drum, with a tight-fitting lid, arranged so the container can be revolved on an axis. Directions on the container of the chemical should be followed closely.

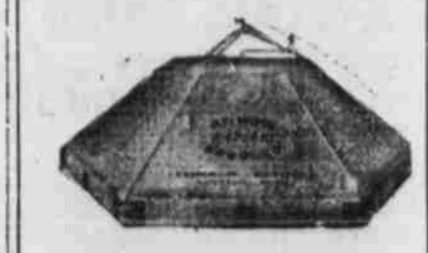

"I sure hope it ends before Wayne is old enough to fight.

"I got a letter from Aunt Bessie and Luther White today, too. Aunt Bessie said she had been operated on for something. I don't remember what. No, my job as Sgt. isn't any more dangerous than a Pvt. For when you are fighting rank don't mean much. Everyone has almost the same job to do, so don't worry about me.

"Well, I have a little work to do, so will sign off for now. Write real soon.

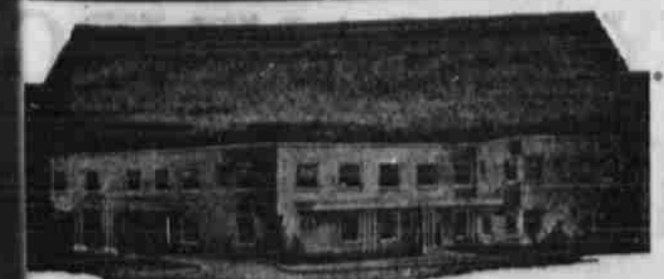
