According to figures released by area banks, both deposits and loans showed an increase for the past year.

Closing out March 1992, deposits totaled \$272,470,342, up \$12,588,347 from the \$259,882,000 at the same time last year.

Loans also showed an increase for the same period. Loans at the end of March 1991, were \$105,175,000 and were shown to be \$114,024,751 at the end of March 1992, showing an increase of \$8,849,751.

The two Muleshoe banks showed a decrease in both deposits and loans. Deposits at the two banks were \$76,809,000 down some \$3,033,000 from the \$79,842,000 on deposit at the end of March 1991.

Loans for the Muleshoe banks were \$39,876,000 at the end of March 1992, down some \$444,000 from the 1991, total of \$40,320,000.

The First Bank combined with First Bank of Bovina showed a decrease in both deposits and loans. At the end of March 1991, the First Bank's deposits were \$47,533,000 and at the end of March 1992, deposits were \$46,116,000 showing a decrease of \$1,417,000.

Loans at First Bank combined with the First Bank of Bovina at the end of March 1992, showed loans totaling \$22,923,000. Loans were down \$463,000 from the 1991, total of \$23,386,000.

Muleshoe State Bank combined with the bank at Farwell showed a decrease in deposits and an increase in loans at the end of March 1992. Deposits at the end of March 1992, were shown to be \$30,693,000 down

some \$1,616,000 from the total deposits of \$32,309,000 at the end of March 1991.

Loans at the Muleshoe State Bank increased by some \$19,000. At the end of March 1991, loans totaled \$16,934,000 and at the end of March 1992, loans totaled \$16,953,000.

Deposits at Friona State Bank were \$68,846,364 at the end of March this year and were \$65,052,000 at this same time last year, showing an increase of \$3,794,364.

Loans at Friona State Bank were \$37,936,836 closing out March 1992, down some \$2,373,164 from the \$40,310,000 at this same time in 1991.

First National bank of Sudan had deposits totaling \$10,569,654 at the end of March 1992, as compared to a total of \$8,828,000 closing out March 1991, up \$1,741,654.

Loans at the First National Bank of Sudan showed a decrease of \$522,088. Closing out March 1991, total loans were \$4,665,000 and at the end of March this year their loans totaled \$4,142,912.

The First Bank of Morton showed an increase in both deposits and loans this year. On March 30, 1991, deposits were \$45,717,000 and at the same time this year deposits totaled \$47,007,000, up some \$1,290,000.

At the end of March 1991, loans at the First Bank of Morton were \$11,673,000. Loans increased some \$3,463,000 bringing their total loans up to \$15,136,000 closing out March 1992.

The First State Bank of Earth also showed increases in both deposits and loans. At the end of March 1992, deposits at Earth First State Bank were \$18,256,396 up some \$4,196,396 from the \$14,080,000 at the end of March 1991.

Loans at the Earth bank increased \$1,454,988. At the end of March 1992, loans totaled \$6,117,988 and at the end of March 1991, loans were \$4,663,000.

Security Bank at Farwell also showed an increase in both deposits and loans. Deposits at the end of March 1992 were \$50,981,928 and at this same time in 1991, deposits were \$46,363,000 reflecting an increase of \$4,618,928.

Grocery Shopping Tips

*Explore the produce section. Be adventurous and try a new kind of fruit or vegetable. Try them one at a time, so they don't seem as threatening. Think of new ways to try produce, and remember that it is usually low in fat and high in fiber.

*Look for fresh herbs to season foods, instead of fats, sauces, and gravies.

*A variety of foods is important to healthy eating and will also keep shopping from seeming so routine.

*Read labels carefully. Ingredients are listed in order of quantity. Choose products that have no fats or oils or in which fats are listed last.

*Beware of so-called healthy or lite foods. Read the labels carefully for fat, fiber and vitamin content. Remember that you don't need to buy any special foods to improve your diet.

Color Research Aids Home Redecorating

Research on the effects of color on psychological and physical well-being has been done by biological institutes, paint companies, university metabolism laboratories and marketing experts. Some findings from these studies are worth considering when planning home redecorating.

Large areas of rose-pink, as on walls or in drapes, has demonstrated a quieting, soothing effect, reducing violent or aggressive behavior. Bright, warm colors--red, orange and yellow--tend to stimulate activity and action. Some reports suggest using red in the nursery because it may arouse more patterned thinking and brain development and using it in children's rooms to enhance self-esteem. Try shades of green for a soothing atmosphere--lime avocado, kelly, jade--almost any shade except pale, cool mint green.

Avoid neutral colors around the elderly or persons with chronic illnesses. Neutrals may contribute to depression. Flies don't like pale blue so that's a good color for porch ceilings. Some reports suggest that adding purple accents to the color schemes of eating areas aids appetite control.

Gray is recommended for office walls to create an atmosphere of calm efficiency. Gray can be tinted to hues which stimulate or depress, lift moods or tranquilize. Make color swatches to study. Add a bit of hot pink to gray or try a mite of orange or turquoise. Color does not affect everyone the same way--but color is worth considering, carefully.

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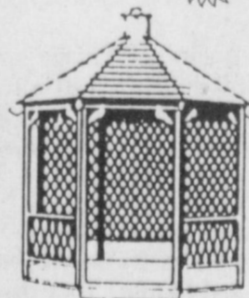
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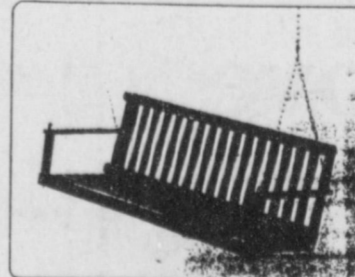
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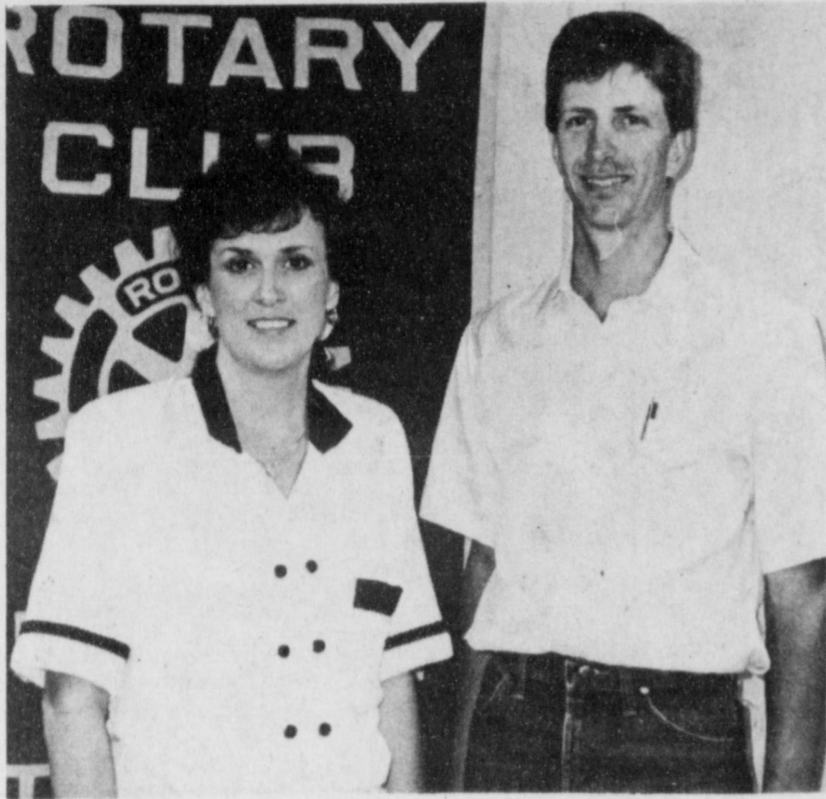

Rotary Hears Talk On Middle School Concept

The Muleshoe chapter of Rotary met Tuesday, April 28 in the Bailey County Civic Center with about 50 attending. Randy Field presided. He introduced six visitors.

Thurman Myers was in charge of the program. He introduced Doris Scoggin, Assistant Principal at Watson Jr. High, who spoke to the group regarding the new middle school concept being implemented at the school.

"We began studying the concept about a year and a half ago. We are hoping to improve upon the type of education we are offering," Scoggin notes.

"Students of this age wake up in a new world everyday. They are independent young people one day and those with childlike personalities the next," she says.

The adolescent needs security and a sense of belonging. He needs to know where he stands as well as being given a sense of responsibility, according to Scoggin.

As means of change were looked at, Scoggin says that teachers at Watson found they needed more time to work together discussing their mutual problems.

"We went to a number of other schools to study what they were doing. Then we formed a task force," says Scoggin.

New next year at Watson Junior High will be the academic teaming program and the use of an advisory period. "Core teachers will have a 45 minute period to plan instruction and co-ordinate efforts with other teachers," she says.

Using the new middle school

concept, teachers will intervene early to catch students' problems before they develop.

Lessons for Watson Jr. High students are being planned on how to relate to other people, both parents and peers, how to adjust to being in junior high, how to plan for high school, and how to plan for the future.

"As teachers share ideas, the climate for education will get better and the staff will improve," Scoggin says.

Scoggin reminded Rotary members of a program at Watson Jr. High May 12 to which parents and other interested individuals are invited.



MICROWAVE TIPS

Why doesn't chicken brown when microwaved?

Chicken cooks in a fraction of the conventional cooking time...so quickly it doesn't have time to crisp and brown.

VANILLA RASPBERRY SWIRL POUND CAKE

- 1 1/2 C. all -purpose flour (unsifted)
- 1/8 t. baking soda
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1/4 C. butter, softened
- 1 C. sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 C. dairy sour cream
- 3 T. raspberry preserves
- 1 1/2 t. water
- 2 t. pure vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour an 8-inch loaf pan; set aside. Combine flour, baking soda and salt; set aside. In a large bowl with electric mixer at high

speed cream butter until light. Add sugar and pure vanilla extract; beat until fluffy. Add eggs; mix well. With mixer at low speed, alternately blend in 1/2 flour mixture, sour cream and remaining flour mixture; beat only until smooth after each addition. Combine raspberry preserves with water. Spoon 1/3 batter into prepared pan; drizzle with half of the jam mixture; swirl with a knife. Repeat, ending with batter. Bake until a cake tester inserted into the center comes out clean, 45 to 50 minutes. Let stand for 5 minutes. Loosen edges with a metal spatula. Turn out onto a wire rack to cool. Yield: 1 loaf.

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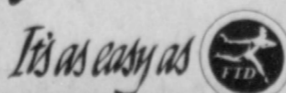

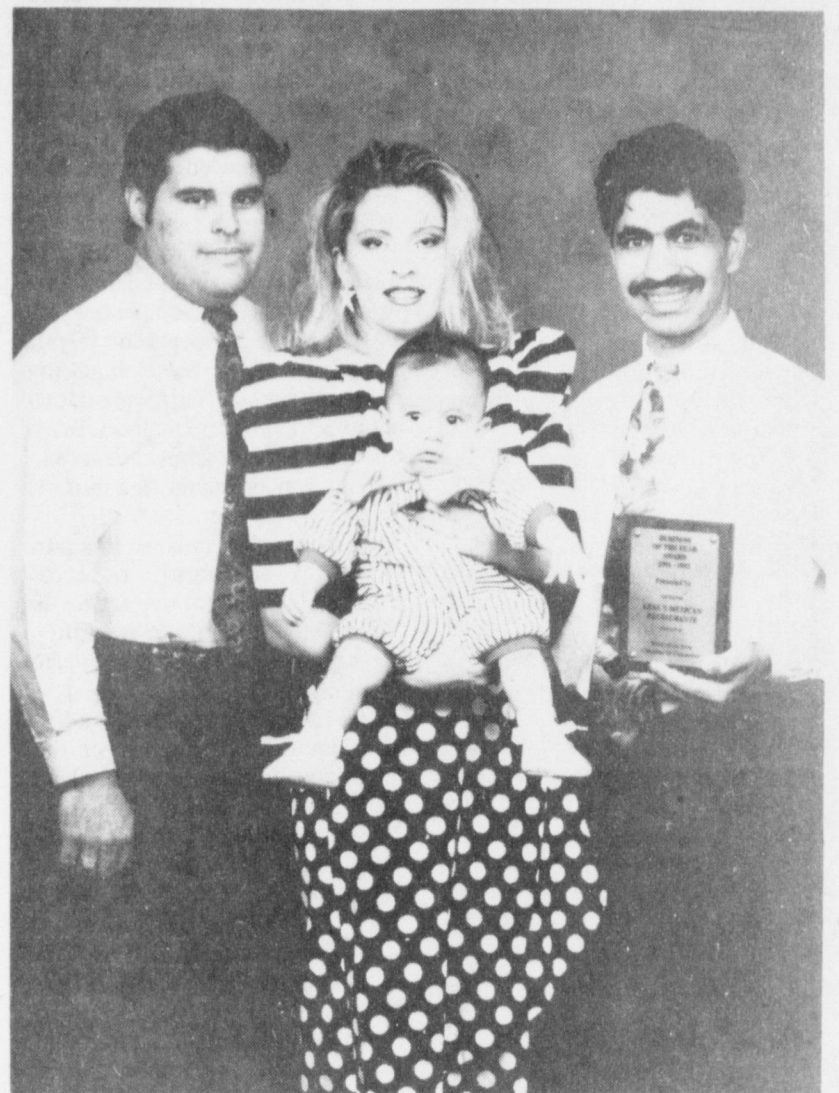

San Antonio Livestock Exposition Announces Major Changes

The San Antonio Livestock Exposition has announced the implementation of several major changes for the 1993 San Antonio Stock Show. The Exposition's primary goal is to further educate Texas youth in all aspects of agriculture. The Executive Committee and S.A.L.E. management feel that the enforcement of these new rules will provide better opportunities for exhibitors and their families to participate in the fitting and showing of 4-H and FFA animal projects while maintaining a safe atmosphere for all participants and spectators.

For the first time ever, it will be mandatory that all Junior Market Steers be shorn before entering the coliseum grounds. Hair must not exceed 1/4" on any location of the body excluding the tail switch. Junior Market Lambs will also be required to be shorn slick above the knee and hock joints with wool being of equal length on all parts of the body. Exhibitors will be able to enter 3 lambs with not more than 2 in any breed. All generators will be banned from the grounds and facilities. S.A.L.E. officials felt this new rule necessary to maintain the high safety standards integral to the show's long standing success.

A Junior Dairy Judging Contest has been added to the show's 1993 schedule. 4-H and FFA teams from all areas of Texas will compete in the contest February 21, 1993. Entry fees are \$10 per team and \$5 per individual and must be submitted by February 14, 1993. Late entries will be accepted until February 21 for an increased cost of \$20 per team and \$10 per individual.

The 1992 San Antonio Stock Show proved a rousing success with more than 635,000 visitors kicking up their heels during the 12-day celebration of cowboys, livestock and all things Texan. The junior livestock show broke previous records with 4,308 barrows, 3,113 lambs and 1,391 steer entries.

The 1992 San Antonio Stock Show recently released the results

of the Junior Livestock Show Carcass Contest. The event, in its second year emphasizes the production of quality meat as well as the judging of live animals.

Animals are judged using USDA standards for carcass weight, fat thickness, yield grade and quality grade. The contest is comprised of the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Barrow and Lamb along with the first and second place barrows and lambs from each weight class of each breed. The Contest also involves the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Steer and the Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion Steers from each breed.

The top five carcasses in the barrow, lamb and steer divisions each received a premium award for their accomplishment. The barrow contest was sponsored by Roegelein with 1st place going to Kristi Schmidt, Fayette County 4-H (La Grange), \$1200.00; 2nd place-Lacey Aston, Lockney FFA (Lockney), \$800.00; 3rd place-Casi Kaufmann, Levelland FFA (Levelland), \$450.00; 4th place-Shayne Griffiths, Whiteface FFA (Whiteface), \$350.00; 5th place-Luke Whitmire, Kerr County 4-H (Kerrville), \$250.00.

In the Lamb Carcass Contest sponsored by Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers, 1st place went to Kendall Schorsch, Jourdanton FFA (Jourdanton), \$1,000; 2nd place-Carla Hyde, Edwards County 4-H (Rocksprings), \$750.00; 3rd place-Heather Moore, Kingwood FFA

(Kingwood), \$400.00; 4th place-Randy Meyer, Judson FFA (Converse), \$300.00; 5th place-Justin Jonas, Canyon FFA (New Braunfels), \$200.00.

The Steer Carcass Contest sponsored by Finkel's Salad Bar & Grill was won by Jason Wootan, Llano County 4-H (Llano). He received \$2,000.00 for 1st place. 2nd place went to Brant Laster, Howard County 4-H (Big Spring), \$1,500.00; 3rd place- Clint Crow, Gaines County 4-H (Seminole), \$750.00; 4th place-Shane Kolle,

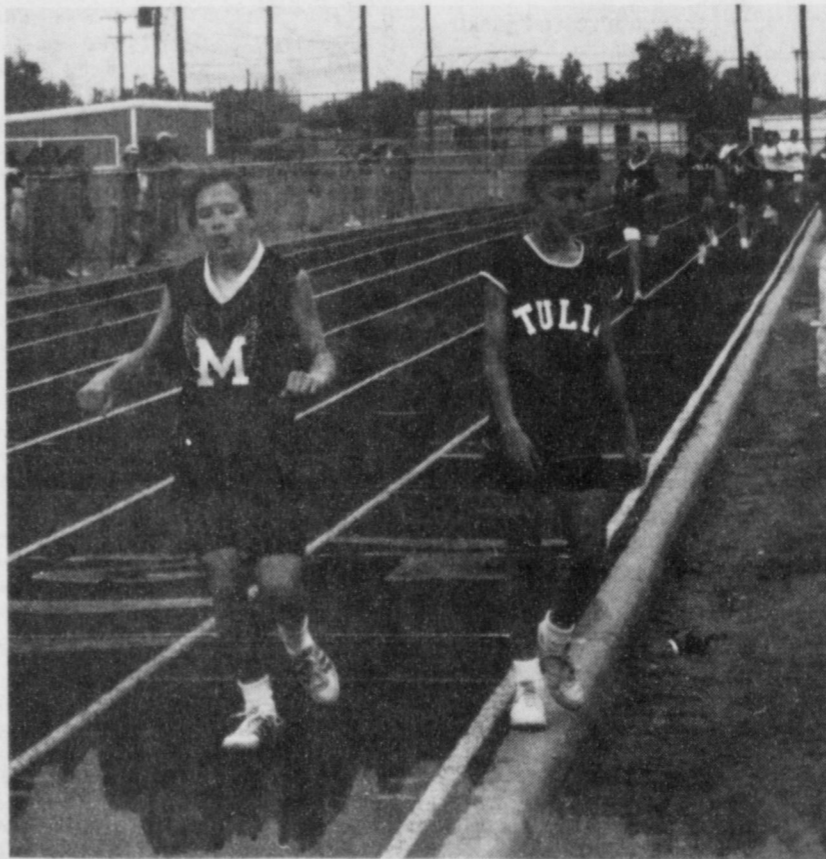

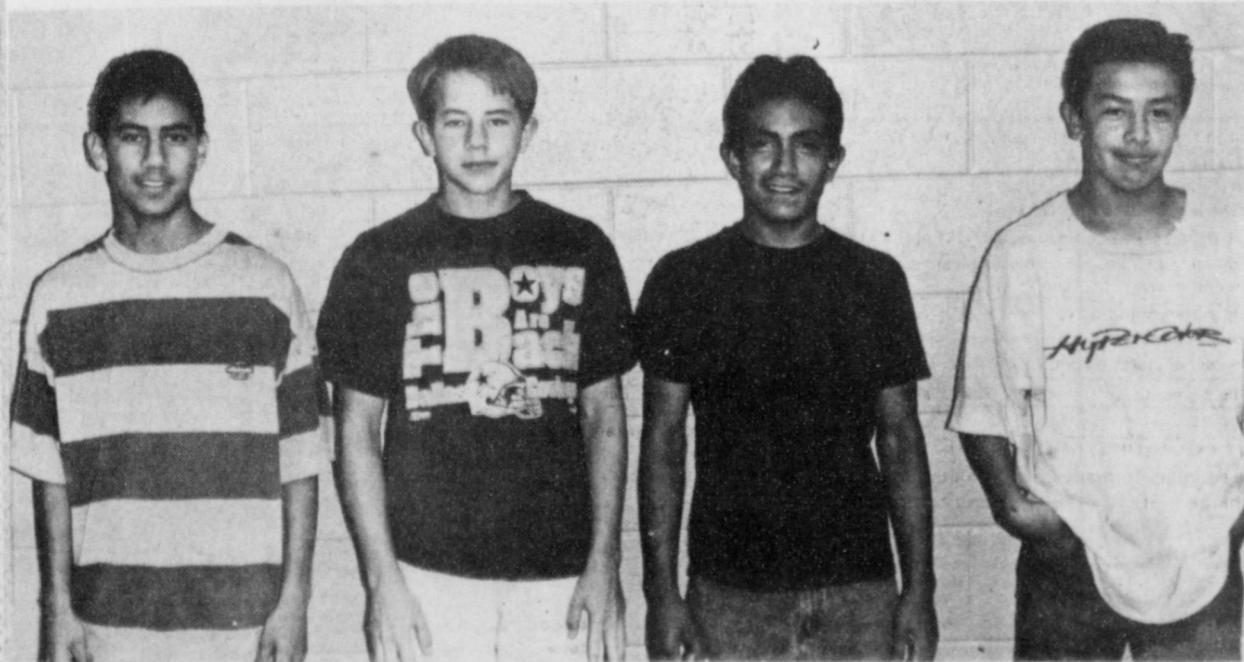

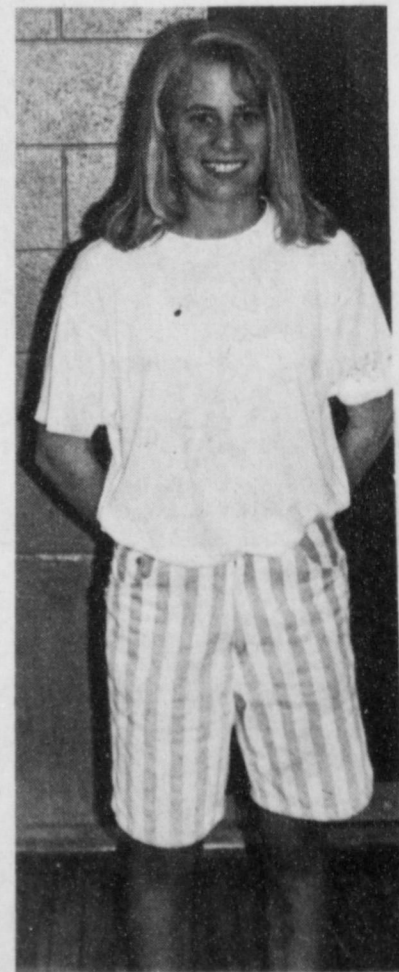

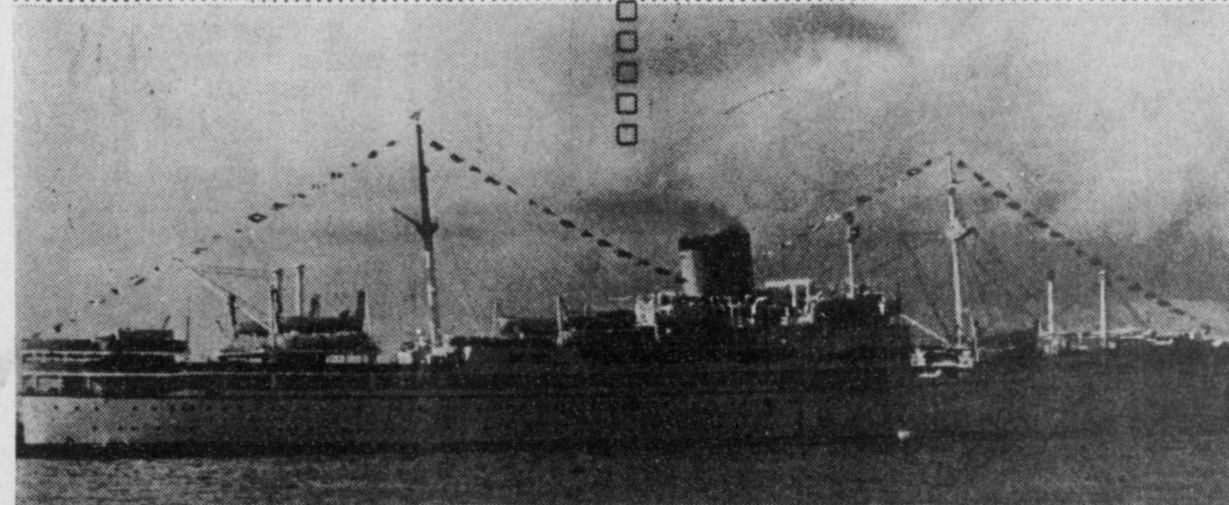
CRUISE IN THE OFF-SEASON

Money Talk

Editor's Note: Texas State
Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison
answers questions about personal
finance and state government.
These questions are compiled from
timely issues of concern facing
Texas and Texans. Answers,
however, are not intended to replace
the advice of reputable financial
advisors or other professional
counselors.

Q. Lately, I have been hearing a lot
about "mutual funds" as a good
way to invest in the stock market.
I am interested in investing some
of my savings and would like to
know more about them.

A. "Mutual funds" are one of the
most popular forms of investment
today. They are collections of
stocks, bonds, or other securities
purchased by groups of investors
and managed by investment
companies. Investors' money
flows into or out of a fund as they
buy or sell shares. Like
stockholders, investors in mutual
funds become part owners of them.
The net asset value, or "NAV," of a
fund's shares depends on the market
value of the fund's investment
portfolio of securities at any given
time. Most mutual funds are
defined as "open-end" funds because
an investment company deals
directly with its investors, and
because, by federal law, they must
always stand ready to buy or sell
their shares.

A mutual fund can be either a
"load fund" or a "no-load fund." If
you buy a "load fund," a sales
charge, or "load," is deducted from
your investment to compensate the
salesperson who sold you the
shares of the fund. A "no-load" fund
is bought directly from the
investment company and no fee is
charged. When redeeming shares in
a mutual fund, most redemptions
are made at current net asset value
per share, which means the actual
dollars and cents value of each
share. Be aware that some mutual
fund companies may charge deferred
sales charges, or "back-end loads,"
or redemption fees when you decide
to "cash in" your shares.
