

DEMO NOMINEE Amarillo DA Picked To Replace Rogers

Amarillo District Attorney, were nominated by the conven-Dee Miller, was named on the tion. fourth ballot, by the Democratic county chairman of the 18th Congressional District as the party's nominee for congress. replacing Congressman Walter Rogers, who announced his retirement last week.

Miller will oppose Republican Bob Price in the November 8 general election. Miller's nomination came on the fourth ballot when he picked up 17 votes on a roll call of county chairmen, but the choice became unanimous with a motion by Hartley County chairman J. R. (Dick) Brown, when he withdrew as a candidate. The meeting called in Amarillo, by Will D. Davis, Jr., chairman of the state Democratic Executive Committee, saw county chairmen nominating favorite sons prior to the nominating of Miller.

Glenn Batson, Lamb County Demo chairman and 30th District committeeman was named vice-chairman of the nominating convention.

Jack Young, of Muleshoe, District Attorney of the 154th District was nominated by the Bailey County representative, and State Senator Andy Rogers, of Childress was nominated by the Childress county chairman.

The nomination of Miller came as a surprise to many observers who felt that two announced candidates for the position, State Representative Walter Knapp, of Amarillo, and Tom Upchurch, of Amarillo, along with Rogers, were the front run-ners in the quest for the nominers in the quest for the nomin-tion.

PHYSICALS COMPLETED Shoes Issued To Wildcats, **Practice Starts Monday**

Shoes were issued Wednesday to some 35 Littlefield Wildcat Varsity hopefuls, signaling the official start of the 1966 football season. Coach George Kirk, in his first year at the helm of the Wildcats said the boys had completed their phy-sicals, and had gotten their shoes, and appeared to be in high spirits as they rapidly ap-proached the beginning of the practice sessions Monday at 8

Kirk said he expected to have about 35 boys out for the varsity practice, and about an equal number out for junior varsity practice which also starts Monday at 11 a.m.

Coach Kirk said he plans to have his entire coaching staff work with both groups of players, hence the reason for the separate workout time schedules. The varsity will work out from 8 to 10 in the mornings and from 5 to 7 in the afternoons, unless a lighted field is available, then the afternoon time will be changed to 7 to

The Wildcats are expected to start off the practice session with a rush as both players get acquainted situation, each being new to the other.

This year's version of the Wildcats will be some what different than the past years, as the local forces will lean more toward the power and air game than speed, which for the past three years has been a Wild-cat trademark. The graduation of Larry Schovajsa, saw the Wildcats lose a great break away threat, yet the 1966 'Cats will not be without speed, as Richard Wright and Denny Walker join with Nevil Manning and Kenneth Horn to provide dependable speed.

Coach Kirk said no one player has any position nailed down, and probably will not have until the first game. "We will have to take some time to get acquainted with the boys, and have them know us. This is the first year for me as well as the entire staff, and anytime you have a complete turn over it takes the coaches and players a little longer to get acquainted. We have some fine material, returning and coming up from the junior varsity. We plan to try several boys in several positions and when we find where a boy is best fitted, chances are that is where we will play him," Kirk said.

The head coach said he was favorably impressed with the boys who have turned out to vie for a position in the life. Led by all-district center, Mack Mangum, the line of the Wild-cats will include five lettermen from lastyears' squad, and sev-eral standouts moving up from the junior varsity. At the start of practice the Wildcats appear to be three deep in almost every position except center and full-back which could prove the difference as the season gets un-

12 Cases Filed In County Court

Business of county Judge J. B. Davis picked up considerably this past week as County attorney Curtis Wilkerson filed 12 cases in the County Criminal

Court. In all, the cases filed, include five for Liquor Law Violation, five worthless check charges and one charge of carrying a pistol.

In the liquor law violations Jessie Mae Collins, Velma Mc-Cleandon and Simon Rameriz pleaded not guilty to the charge, making it necessary to have a trial by jury.
Two days later Rameriz a-

gain appeared before the judge and pleaded guilty to another charge of liquor law violation, and was fined \$100 and court Also pleading guilty to a char-

ge of liquor law violation was Bobby Lee Shaw, who waived trial by jury and was assessed a \$250 plus cost fine, with judgment deferred until December

Amos Jefferson, pleaded guilty to carrying a pistol and was fined \$100 and cost by Judge Davis who heard the case, like Shaw and Rameriz, Jefferson waived a jury trial.

Since the first of the month five other persons have appear-ed before Judge Davis who plea-ded not guilty to violation of the check law. Those entering not guilty pleas, and requesting a trial include Finis Jordan, Mrs.







AMENDMENT NO. 1 Provides that all land owned by natural persons and designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

AMENDMENT NO. 2 Would authorize creation airport authorities composed of one or more counties.

AMENDMENT NO. 3 Would withdraw State College from participating in the Permanent University

Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validating present statutory terms of office for such offic-AMENDMENT NO. 5

Would authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for county officials and employees and others. AMENDMENT NO. 6 Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law en-

forcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections and fullpaid firemen. AMENDMENT NO. 7

Would repeal the Constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters. AMENDMENT NO. 8





Bobby Rogers Elected TSRA President

Bobby G. Rogers of Little-field has been elected Presi-dent of the Texas Shorthand Reporters Association, it was announced today. Mr. Rogers has been Official Court Reporter of the 154th Judicial District serving Lamb, Bailey and Parmer Counties since the District was created in 1957. Prfor to that time, he was official court reporter for the 64th Judicial District which served these counties along with Castro, Hale and Swisher Coun-

Walter Waldie, III, of Dallas was elected Vice-president, Carl Black, also of Dallas, was elected Secretary-Treasurer, Fred P. Swanson, Official Court Reporter at Andrews was elected to the Office of President Elect, and Mrs. Thelma Burrow, Official Court Reporter of Lubbock was elected to the Office of Director for this area.

The Texas Association has been in existence for 46 years, and has members from almost every county of the state. Its members are professional court, hearing and general shorthand reporters who make verbatim reports of proceedings, using both pen and machine shorthand to record what is said at the speed of speech.

Rogers stated that the state association is seeking Certified Shorthand Reporter Legislation which will require the examination and licensing of shorthand reporters, "Especially in the courts, where the public's property rights, personal liberty, and even life itself are involved, an accurate record is of utmost importance, for appeals are based, and decided, upon the stenographic record. Certification would assure the public of the continuing competency of the court reporter," Rogers

Mr. Rogers also said that the Texas Association would continue to work with the National Shorthand Reporters' Associstion in a national effort to interest others in the field of shorthand reporting. A career often overlooked by young peo-ple is that of the "silent" man or woman of the courtroom - the career of shorthand reporting. Yet the life of a court reporter affords interesting mental activity, never-ending variety, and substantial financial rewards. High School Seniors can learn more about it from their guidance counselors, or from any local court reporter. Rogers stated "This area is extremely fortunate in that there is a National Shorthand Reporter Approved College in Plainview,

Southwest Businesss College, and that high school seniors, as well as others who might be interested in shorthand reporting as a profession could obtain information brochures from the College."

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

Whitman, an ex-Marine and honor student. He further directed a study of Whitman's brain by a conference of medical experts at M. C. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute of Hou-

Connally said he does not believe the August 1 tragedies, which "could have occurred in any city of the world," will reflect on Texas or Austin.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith promptly directed the Texas Legislative Council to study the feasibility of enacting mandatory life imprisonment provisions for accused killers pleading in-

LAWMAKERS DECLINE NO-MINATIONS-Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa and State Rep. Bill Satterwhite of Ennis served official notice they are declining Democratic nominations for re-election.

Rogers' completely unexpected decision to return to private law practice leaves the job of naming his successor to Democratic county chairmen in the Panhandle counties he long represented. Satterwhite accepted a job with the Lone Star Gas Company in Dallas.

Republicans say the bow-out of Rogers will improve chances of their congressional nominee, Bob Price of Pampa, who ran strong in 1964.

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

Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. If the foregoing Amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the Amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Sections, as amended herein and as amended by any other proposed Amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legis-lature and which has been duly adopted prior to such

proclamation. Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
