## More \$\$ Whet Luxury Appetite; Expenses Rise To Meet Fatter Income

(Editors note: Most Americans are well aware that their cost of living has risen. But some price increases rife them more than others. Hortense Myers, an award-winning Indiana statehouse reporter and a housewife, reports in the second of a two-part series on how Americans feel about higher rents and paying more for a used car.)

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI) — The cost of a used car has gone up more, proportionately, than that of a pound of bacon. But most Americans are madder about the bacon.

United Press International reporters, in interviewing housewives, householders and merchants about the rising cost of living, found that most of the people they talked to were more concerned about the price of steaks, lettuce and other food items than a higher rent bill or a stiffer price at the car lot.

Labor Department's consumer price index shows the used car index went up 20 points in the past five years. That's much higher than the food cost index. In fact, a comparison of specific foods shows sev-

eral instances in which today's prices are not very much higher than 1961 or the base figure of 10 years ago.

### Food Versus Car

But families are reminded daily of food costs and infrequently of their car costs. Jack Cameron, a Dallas, Texas, car salesman, said people are thinking more about the safety aspects of cars than they are of the price.

"They want more comfort and more extras, too," he said. "They are definitely not haggling more. They seem easier."

On paper, at least, the new car cost index has gone down. But this is because of adjustments made to reflect what the Bureau of Labor Statistics calls "quality improvements."

### Better Products

At least one prominent Midwest economist thinks the revision was long overdue. Prof. Robert Turner of Indiana University said, "Paint on a car lasts five years now instead of three. Tires last longer and so does the upholstery. Americans may not realize that part of the higher price of living is going for a better product."

Turner thinks that because there were few big pattern-setting wage negotiations this year, wages have lagged behind price increases.

"I think we need to remember that every price is someone's income," Turner said. "The problem is that all incomes don't go up and we get inequitable treatment. At present the ones benefiting are the farmers."

"The corn-hog price cycle changed. The price of pork went up. The demand shifted and prices went up through beef and poultry. But such a situation is self-correcting. The price of pork already is going down. Level Off?"

"My suspicion is that prices are going to level out by the end of this year." Some of the businessmen and buyers interviewed thought people were not waiting for a leveling-off.

Richard Lombardi, a Springfield, Mass., store manager, said "there has been a big increase in business lately. The rise in the cost of living hasn't hurt that much."

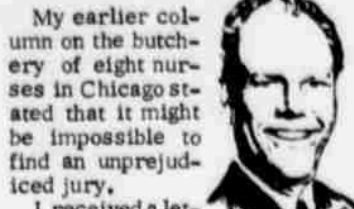

## Justice Must Be Served



My earlier column on the butchery of eight nurses in Chicago stated that it might be impossible to find an unprejudiced jury.

I received a letter from a 14-year-old girl, Nell Ann Carter, of Wichita Falls, Texas, Little Nell suggested: "If they can't find an impartial jury of humans, why not feed all the evidence into a computer and let the machine decide whether or how to punish that man...?"

Little Nell has -- as many of her generation have -- confounded me with her keen perception.

Our Constitution, fashioned after Britain's Magna Charta, intends that ours should be a "government of law, not of men."

Never again would men be subject to the whim of a king or the vindictiveness of a dictator. Ours, we decided, would be a "government of laws."

If this is so, then why in this enlightened age should we not consider accepting the objective

judgment of a computer? The reason why not, of course, is that the computer is no more fair and just than the evidence which is fed into it. And to whom do we entrust the selection of that evidence? Does this admitted inability to place justice in mechanical hands prove that we are yet, in fact, a government of men? Britain's House of Lords last month admitted as much.

The House of Lords is, as our own Supreme Court is, the "court of last resort" in Britain. And the Lords have decided that they will no longer consider "legal precedent" as the inflexible and unalterable basis for rendering judgment.

This legal bombshell, dropped into laps of Commonwealth courts, has shattered 68 years of tradition. In the United States, where English common law has been the basis for our legal system, this new "flexible law" could have staggering implications.

In lay language, American and British law students have schooled themselves in thousands of previous court contests, so that decrees in these cases might provide a "precedent" for pleading similar cases.

But in Britain precedent is no longer to be binding. The Lords reserve to themselves alone the right to depart from previous decisions "when it appears right to them to do so."

Thus, Britain admittedly becomes a "government of men" again.

The excuse cited by the House of Lords is "modernization," "to prevent English common law from becoming rigid, out of date and possibly unjust -- bringing it forward from the stagecoach era to the jet age."

I was anxious lest the recent trend of our own Supreme Court to interpret the law to suit itself should receive quasi-official blessing from this British reform...

Until I heard from a 14-year-old girl who, in clear-eyed innocence, showed me that we never were a "government of laws" after all. That the letter of the law will always have to be blended with human compassion before it comes out justice.

This realization makes the selection of the members of any nation's highest court terrifyingly important. Certainly it should never be a sanctuary for imprudent, improper, or irresponsible persons.

## Garland Named TADA Director

Appointment of E. D. Garland, Jr., Garland Motor Co., Littlefield as Area Director of Texas Automobile Dealers Association was announced today by HALL NALL of Plainview, who represents this area on the TADA Board of Directors.

Garland has been advised that his major responsibility as an Area Director will be to work at the grass roots with other officials of the statewide franchised new car dealers association to promote a high standard of integrity among the car dealers of the state and serve the motoring public better by making driving safer, more convenient and more economical.

"Automobile dealers were particularly concerned at this time", Garland said, "with highway and car safety, and stress will be placed on association programs in this area with this as the aim. He said TADA planned to work with Area Directors to expand the driver education program into more Texas schools. Dealers help sponsor this training by loaning automobiles to schools.

Garland will serve as an Area Director until the next TADA Convention in Houston, May 1967. The Association, with headquarters in Austin, represents 1,400 franchised dealers of new automobiles and trucks of the State.

## Boys Ranch Rodeo Set

The 346 boys now at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch will put on their 22nd annual Labor Day rodeo, Sunday, Sept. 4th and Monday, Sept. 5th.

Nearly 100 Ranchers will ride for awards and honors. The Brahmas and horses used in the bull-riding and bareback-riding events are professional rodeo stock. A special event will be the "stick-horse" race for the four to six year olds.

The boys who are learning meat-cutting and cooking as their future vocations will barbecue giant-size beef sandwiches for spectators and visitors who arrive early to picnic. Ranchers who do not ride will be working as ushers, in the parking area, at concession stands, or helping around the chutes. All of the boys will have a part in the rodeo.

The climax of the rodeo will be the naming of the Junior and Senior All-Round Cowboys, two of the highest honors that can be earned by the boys.

Performances will take place at 2:00 p.m. in the Ranch's arena. Tickets for either performance are available in advance from the Boys Ranch office, Box 1890, Amarillo. Reserved box seats are \$2.50, general admission is \$1.50, and children and servicemen's tickets are 75¢. All proceeds will be used for future expansion of the Ranch.

## Questions Answered

Q -- I was given an extension of time to file my tax return. Will I owe any interest on the unpaid balance?

A -- Yes you will. Even though you were granted an extension of time for filing, interest will be due on the unpaid balance at an annual rate of 6%. Interest should be computed from the due date of the return and paid with the tax when you file your return.

Q -- I am attending college now and receive student benefits. I have already accepted a job for this summer, but will return to college in the fall. Will my social security benefits be paid to me during the summer?

A -- Yes, provided your earnings for the year do not exceed \$1,500. If you earn over \$1,500, you may lose benefits for the months in which you earn more than \$125.

## Amendments In Brief

The following are amendments voters will voice their opinions on in the November 8 election.

AMENDMENT NO. 1 Provides that all land owned by natural persons and designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

AMENDMENT NO. 2 Would authorize creation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties.

AMENDMENT NO. 3 Would withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.

AMENDMENT NO. 4 Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validating present statutory terms of office for such officials.

AMENDMENT NO. 5 Would authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for county officials and employees and others.

AMENDMENT NO. 6 Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections and full-paid firemen.

AMENDMENT NO. 7 Would repeal the Constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters.

AMENDMENT NO. 8 Would authorize the Legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice president of the United States without having fulfilled residence requirements to vote for other officers, as well as laws permitting former residents of the state, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice president.

AMENDMENT NO. 9 Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and lengthens the term of that court.

AMENDMENT NO. 10 Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries.

Officials of the 49th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair have announced the selection of Dr. Melvin Bradley, extension livestock specialist with the Department of Animal Husbandry, University of Missouri, as judge of swine entries in the Sept. 26-Oct. 1 exposition here.

Dawson County extension agent Lee Roy Colgen, Lamesa, will again serve as superintendent of the show. He said all swine entries must be received by Sept. 12.

Bradley also is scheduled to judge the California, Missouri and Oklahoma State Fairs this year, in addition to the American Royal Livestock Show at Kansas City.

Reared on a livestock farm in central Missouri, Bradley served four years during World War II and attained BS and master's degrees from the University of Missouri. He received his doctorate from Oklahoma State University.

In 1949 he was hired to manage the UM animal husbandry department farms and also taught freshman livestock courses. Later he coached the university's livestock judging teams, two of which emerged as American Royal winners. He also was advisor and later national president of the Block and Bridle Club.

Since 1961 he has served as project leader in the university's animal husbandry extension service.

AMENDMENT NO. 11 Would authorize the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon two-thirds vote of the Legislature and expanding the uses to which money in the Texas Water Development Fund may be put.

AMENDMENT NO. 12 Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts.

AMENDMENT NO. 13 Would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government within a county having 1,200,000 or more inhabitants and to provide for intergovernmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county.

AMENDMENT NO. 14 Would allow members of the armed forces to vote in Texas upon satisfying the residence requirements applicable to Texans in general.

AMENDMENT NO. 15 Authorizes the channeling of funds from private and federal sources through the state for use by privately owned or local agencies in establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed.

AMENDMENT NO. 16 Establishes the date on which newly-elected members of the Legislature qualify and take office.

A career often overlooked by young people is that of the "silent" man or woman of the courtroom — the career of shorthand reporting. Yet the life of a court reporter affords interesting mental activity, never-ending variety, and substantial financial rewards. High School Seniors can learn more about it from their guidance counselors, or from any local court reporter. Rogers stated "This area is extremely fortunate in that there is a National Shorthand Reporter Approved College in Plainview, Southwest Business College, and that high school seniors, as well as others who might be interested in shorthand reporting as a profession could obtain information brochures from the College."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, including the requirement of a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful governmental purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the state; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide the terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded thereon. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued and incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred thereon. "Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

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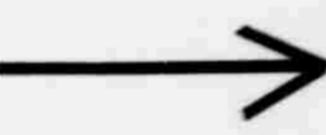

The recent delay in the U. S. Senate of a proposal to limit the credits any one grower could receive under current farm program was an important victory, not only for those engaged in agriculture, but for the nation as well.

The nation is dependent on agriculture for all of its food and much of its fiber. And the imposition of such limitations would do much to stymie the production of the food and fiber. It would restrict both the quality and quantity of production and at the same time raise its price to the ultimate consumer.

And the threat of limitation is constant. It will remain constant and become even more menacing as long as there are legislators on Capitol Hill who can pass a vote by attacking big business, of which agriculture is a part.

It is no secret that there are more such legislators in Washington now than ever before. They represent high density population centers where votes can be and are bought with promises of helping the "little people" by dragging down "big business."

The most recently defeated proposal came from Senator Dennis Brewster (D-Maryland), and it calls for a cut in the pas-

Paymaster needs, a division of Anderson Clayton's Company, has advised Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., that they will match a \$1,300 PGC research grant to Texas Technological College. Paymaster money for the grant will come from the Clayton Fund.

Both grants are to aid Dr. Harold Lewis' work on verticillium wilt in Texas Tech. Dr. Lewis is investigating very acid soil inhibitors of "wilt," which has become an increasing problem to High Plains farmers in recent years.

The funds granted by PGC are a part of \$30,250 allocated to various phases of cotton production research for the 1960-61 year. **Mahon Seeks Water Study Funds**

Representative George Mahon stated this week that he would seek funds for a preliminary investigation by the U. S. Department of Interior of ways and means of diverting surplus water from the Missouri River Basin and Mississippi River to West Texas.

The annual Public Works Appropriation Bill is now being whipped into shape by the Appropriations Committee for presentation to the House in late August. Mahon will seek to have the funds for the preliminary study included in the bill. He believes the prospects are good for success.

Mahon pointed out that the study would be preliminary in nature and that he would seek a detailed study if the preliminary findings were favorable for the project.

The proposed study would not be a substitute for the one proposed in the Lower Colorado River Basin bill which is pending before the House Committee on Interior and which calls for a study of the possibility of channeling water into West Texas from the Columbia River Basin and the Missouri and Mississippi

pple rivers. This measure contains many far-reaching provisions and the part relating to West Texas is only a minor portion of the bill.

Mahon pointed out that there was no certainty that the Lower Colorado River measure would become the law this year but that a Public Works Appropriation Bill was assured at this session, and that he felt inclusion of a preliminary study in the Public Works bill would be desirable. He said he would advocate an appropriation of \$200,000 for the preliminary investigation.

Fifteen years ago, Mahon had introduced a bill providing eight million dollars for an extensive survey of ways and means of bringing surplus water to West Texas from the Missouri River Basin. The proposal was rejected at that time. He pointed out, however, that the present attitude is much more favorable toward big and dramatic efforts to meet water needs in West Texas and elsewhere.
