

# Littlefield Youth Is Instantly Killed In Car-Truck Collision

## Wade Luke, 17, Also Seriously Injured Mishap Saturday

### Accident Happened About Two Miles West Of Roundup

Wade Luke, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Sanders of Littlefield, was instantly killed about 8:30 p. m. Saturday about two miles west of Roundup, when the car in which he was riding, and a truck said to have been driven by a Sudan youth, and a Sudan gin, collided as the vehicles passed at above point. Luke is suffering from severe head injury, and is a patient at Littlefield Hospital. He is owner of the automobile at the time of the accident. The car was badly damaged.

Wade and Sanders' body were taken up by Mrs. W. R. Alexander, north of town, who was enroute from Lubbock, and was flagged down by the injured youth. Sanders' body was taken to the Hamden Funeral Home, and Luke to Littlefield Hospital, where he is expected to be resting fairly well.

# R. C. Dennington Shot To Death

R. C. Dennington, 40, was reported shot to death about noon Monday in front of a cafe in Bula, in Bailey County.

Dennington's father-in-law, J. W. Parkman, about 60, is said to have surrendered to Muleshoe officers. A charge alleging murder has been filed against Parkman, as announced by County Attorney Pat Bobo of Bailey County.

Dennington is said to have been shot with a pistol.

Dennington and Parkman are farmers in the Bula community.

Parkman posted \$5,000 bond. Bobo said Mrs. Dennington had filed suit for divorce in early November.

Parkman waived preliminary hearing and Peace Justice R. J. Klump bound him over to action of the grand jury under \$5,000 bond.

The charge was prepared by Bobo and filed in Klump's court. The Bailey county grand jury is to meet early in December.

# Destroys 9 Enemy Planes In Combat; Is Decorated

When an Eighth Air Force fighter group, England, comes the fact that Capt. Gerald E. Montgomery, 23 year old P-51 Mustang pilot, son of C. P. Montgomery of Littlefield, is among those honored by a Presidential citation for the 4th Fighter Group of the Eighth Air Force, as public evidence of deserved honor and distinction.

The fighter group commanded by Col. Don Blakeslee, of Fairport Harbor, Ohio, was praised by the War Department for "its extraordinary gallantry, determination and esprit de corps" during the period from March 5 to April 24, 1944, when its P-51 Mustang pilots destroyed 323 German planes, 189 in aerial combat and 134 by strafing.

Tulia's Team Heaviest Wildcats Have Met; Averages Over 170 Lbs.

The Tulia giant killers will be in town Friday night to try to knock the Wildcats from their unbeaten, untied perch. Football fans hereabouts were amazed to learn that the Tulia boys had knocked off the powerful Hereford Whitefaces in a 19 to 0 whitewash last Friday night. They were further alarmed to learn that Tulia will probably be the heaviest team the Wildcats have met—they have three boys who tip the scales at over 200 pounds. One, a tackle, weighs 250. The team, when all the big boys are in, averages over 170 pounds. The Wildcats average 156. The Tulia boys feature a pair of "touchdown twins" in Don Davis and Winford Carlile.

## Cpl. Brock Explains Holland Invasion

Cpl. Richard S. Brock, of the Headquarters Company of the First Battalion, Paratrooper with the Infantry, wrote his mother, Mrs. Lula Brock, of Spring Lake, Texas, a very interesting letter, reporting their invasion into Holland. The letter follows:

"As I have a little time and more writing paper than usual I thought I would tell you a little something about our trip over here. We took off from an airport in England on Sunday morning, Sept. 17, at (Cut out of letter) immediately climbed through the clouds into a beautiful sunlight and then we cruised around for a time so that all the planes could get into formation. Being in a lead plane as usual because I am a machine gunner I could look down and see the planes rising after us like a great circular staircase. Once into formation we weren't long in heading over the channel once more only this time it was in daytime, and I had a much greater feeling of confidence.

"I knew we wouldn't have so much trouble with anti-aircraft and another thing the bomber and fighter squadrons were going on ahead of us to take care of most of the batteries. Once across the channel over Holland and then a few batteries opened up on us, but not for long because the fighter planes were now swarming all around us. They were all our planes of course, and showing a magnificent job of knocking out the flak batteries. I was sweating some by that time because the old familiar scream of those 88 mm. shells isn't a bit pleasant, especially when you know what they can do for you. However, there wasn't much of it, as I told you already what happened to most of them. We were then flying over great scopes of flooded farm lands, such a rich looking land, too. That was another dirty trick of the Germans, breaking the dikes in Western Holland, and ruining the farms

Guest speaker for the evening was C. M. Smith, Plainview, Regional Manager of the Sixth War Loan Drive, who was introduced by Mr. Boone.



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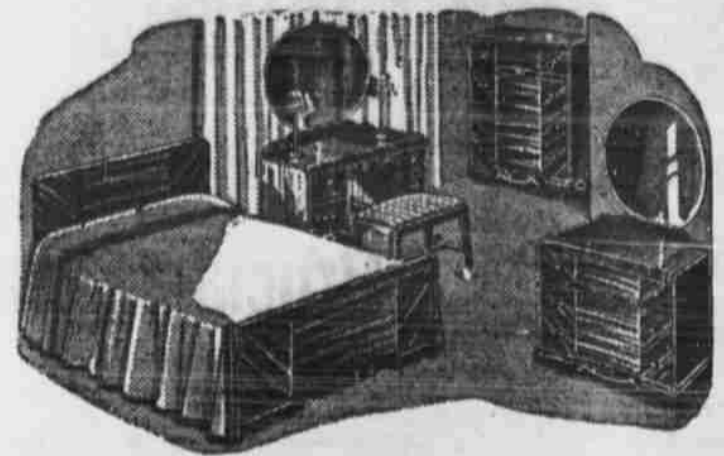

## With South Plains Men In the Armed Forces

Mrs. Bertha Westmoreland of seven miles south and one-half west of Littlefield, received the following interesting letter from her son, Cpl. John V. Westmoreland, who is a teletypist attached to a bomb squadron in the Air Corps, and is in service somewhere in southern Italy. He has been in Italy since November of last year. His letter, in part, follows:

"Well, I finally got to go to Rome on a three day pass. Had to hitch hike up there and back. Was supposed to get to fly, but the weather was too bad. Stayed in Rome for seven days waiting for a plane to take us back, but it kept raining, so that the planes were unable to take off. Our money began to get low, so we decided to catch a ride back. Stayed the first night on the way back at Naples, then next at Foggia. Got into Uensa about 11 o'clock the next morning. We were gone 10 days in all. Quite a vacation. As our orders read to fly back, the first sergeant didn't do anything to us.

"While I was there I took the Red Cross sight seeing tour around Rome. We saw the old colosseum, you know the place where the Romans had their chariot races, beast and gladiator fights and where the Christians were thrown to the wild beasts. It really is a large piece of construction. Part of the walls have crumbled down about half way, but part of it is still as high as ever. From there, went to see the catacombs. That is those tunnels underground where the Christian people buried their dead. We didn't go down but about two floors, but they say that there are about eight miles of tunnels there. Saw some of their bones, rocks with their names, and about half of one of the arrows that killed the founder of the Christian religion. From there we went to another larger church, St. Paul's Cathedral, really nice, but St. Peter's Cathedral is the largest church in the world. It is six hundred feet long and about four hundred feet high.

"The ceiling is all inlaid with Mogay. Looks like highly colored glass, just like looking up toward the skies. Except it is a lot more beautiful. There are some wonderful statues of marble, and bronze, and I mean they are the work of perfection. You just have to see it to enjoy its vast size and beauty.

After we came out of there it was time for chow, so we all went to a G.I. Restaurant, and that ended the tour. But there was a lot more to be seen, that was wonderful, yet not quite so historic, such as the air force rest camp. It looks like a small palace, all marble. Then there was the Red Cross building, winding streets, with statues on every square corner, on buildings, and even some on the side of the streets. Oh, I saw the square and the balcony where Mussolini made most of his speeches. But the best part of the trip was to be away from camp and do just

what I wanted to. The girls up there are really nice and there are a lot of them. The only trouble is that I don't talk their language very well. Of course, I made a few of them understand just what I wanted to say, though.

"Well, here I am back at the same old job. Guess that I can be satisfied for a while at least until I catch up with my pay. Rome is so expensive. I am about \$120 wiser after the trip. I wouldn't take a thousand for it though."

Mrs. Westmoreland has another son in the service. Pfc. Melvin Westmoreland, who has been in the service two years, and overseas since April, is with the Headquarters Detachment and drives his commanding officer'. Col. Jenning's, car.

Navy, who has just finished boot camp, spent his leave with home folks, and left Wednesday night of last week for San Diego, where he will be assigned to some duty in the Navy. His wife, who has been with Lewis, returned home, and will make her home with her parents.

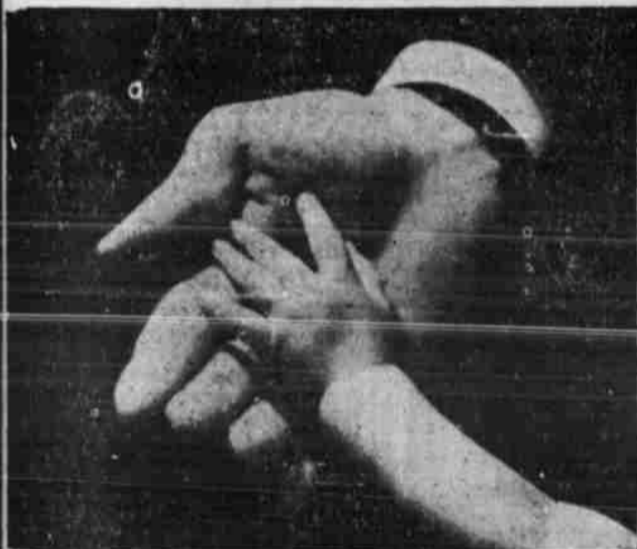

### Texas 4-H'ers Show Importance Of Organic Matter in the Soil

A PROGRESSIVE move made by 4-H Clubs to prevent soil erosion and improve crop yields in Eastland county, Texas, promises to become a statewide practice.

Three trained teams of 4-H boys recently demonstrated the importance of organic matter in soils before meetings of farmers, agricultural workers and businessmen in the county, as well as at the District Encampment and Achievement Night. Samples of the county's blow sand and clay soils were used in the demonstrations.

The demonstrations served to show that when barnyard manure, weeds and decaying plants are added to soils low in organic matter, much more water from rain-falls is retained for crops, and erosion from blowing and run-offs is appreciably reduced. The necessity for strip cropping peanuts with crotalaria, cow peas and sorghum along with the use of cover crops, to maintain the organic content of the soil to increase yields and to control wind and water erosion was stressed by the youthful demonstrators. They also pointed out that organic matter in soils provides a haven for highly essential worms and bacteria that act upon and decay the residue, which produces a storehouse of nitrogen, available phosphate, potash and other plant foods.

The teams comprised Doyle Lee Jobe and Lane Dixon (above), William Clements and Clayton Lee Henderson, and Alonzo Prickett and Loyd Simpson, of the Gorman, Morton Valley and Nimrod 4-H Clubs, respectively. The boys are enrolled in the 1944 Firestone 4-H Soil Conservation Activity conducted by the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating, which is designed to interest rural young people in the farm family program of preventing soil wastage and deterioration by practicing approved conservation methods.

Vocational agricultural teachers, Soil Conservation Service, AAA and the Farm Security Administration cooperated with the 4-H Clubs in the program. As a result, it is estimated two carloads of Austrian winter peas and hairy vetch will be sown this year. In addition, rye seed will be sown on at least 20,000 acres of peanut land.

for years to come. After that we began passing over towns and I could see people out in the streets waving to us as we went over, it seemed as if they knew all about what was going to take place, anyway I felt a lot better after that.

"We were to jump at (Cut out by censor) and the Jumpmaster who was my platoon leader, kept glancing at his watch from time to time and telling how much longer it would be, an hour, thirty minutes, would the time never come, minutes dragged, finally ten more minutes and the order to examine your equipment! A final check finds everything OK; rifle loaded, and locked on safely. My automatic pistol within easy reach, snap fasteners securely in place, chin straps buckled down tight, a glance around shows a row of unsmiling determined faces on each side of the plane, and your confidence grows because they're the guys that will go anywhere with you.

"A red light flashed on next to the door—that's the signal for only four more minutes, and then the command to stand up and hook up. It's one row of men now extending back as far as the pilots' cabin.

"I was number two man and could see out over the Jumpmaster's shoulder.

"Gradually the terrain took the shape of the country we had studied on maps and sand tables. There was the canal that bordered one side of our jump field, only a matter of seconds now. Now the motors of the plane are being slowed down, that familiar sh, sh, sh, as the props are feathered, the tail of the plane is being lifted, and the plane itself being steadied. Now the green light, that's the signal to go, and the Jumpmaster bellows: 'Let's Go.' We went and I was so close behind him that when our chutes opened up I was walking around on top of his chute, but I soon got out of that by climbing my risers and slipping away from his canopy. There was some anti-aircraft guns firing at us from about a mile away, but they never hit any men or planes either. After about thirty seconds I landed in a nice soft field, and pulling out my automatic I looked around for some enemy, but there was none, so I watched the rest of the guys jumping for a few minutes. The air was full of parachutes, and men, and that has never ceased to be a beautiful sight to me or any other parachutist for that matter, even if it was in enemy territory, but this was more like a training jump for we had completely taken them by surprise this time.

"There were a few Germans on the field, but it didn't take them long to throw down their guns and throw up their hands.

"It was a very peaceful afternoon and we took our time in re-organizing for our mission. As one guy said to me, 'You wouldn't think

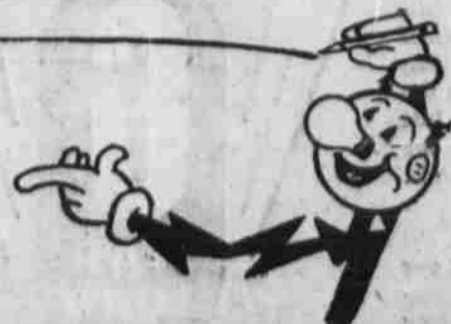
