The murderer thinks Lloyd has betrayed him and vows revenge. <br> Merchants get your pin tickets at the Leader office. | State Sets Out Requirements of the Election Law <br> The Lamb County Leader is in receipt of the following letter from the Secretary of State, Austin: <br> "In an effort to forestall the repetition of the disgraceful wholesale violation of the ballot in the coming primary, we are asking the Press to cooperate in giving publicity to the requirements of the Election Law for the selection of supervisors of the election. We enclose a memorandum of these requirements, and we will appreciate it if you will bear down on this point from now until the electien on August 27, so that proper persons representing the opposing sides can be selected for this important post of inspecting the polls." <br> The following is the memorandum from the Secretary of State: <br> The Election Law (Article 2942) authorizes "any one-fifth of the candidates whose names appear on the official ballot," on or before the day preceding the election, to agree in writing signed by them upon two supervisors of election. The two persons so selected are required to take the oath as election officers, along with the presiding judge of elections before the opening of the polls. They must be qualified voters of the coun- | fice of profit or trust under the United States or this State, or in any city or town in Texas (except a notary public), nor have held such an office within the last thirty days; <br> 2. Must not be a candidate for office. <br> 3. Must have paid poll tax. <br> While the election is being held they are required to remain in view of the ballot boxes until the count is concluded. When any voter permanently disabled from marking his own ballot is assisted by the presiding judge of election, they are required to be present to see that the ballot is marked in accordance with the wishes of the voter, but such supervisor must remain silent except in cases of irregularity or violation of the law while so in attendance.
