## Lamb County Over Top In Victory Bond Drive

Overall Sales Are \$844,100; 'E' Bond Sales \$188,000

### Drive Chairman Expresses Thanks to All Who Assisted

Lamb County is over the top in a big way on the Victory Bond Drive just completed, according to figures released Monday by C. O. Stone, Co-Chairman, with Pat Boone on the drive.

The overall bond sale in the County totaled \$844,100.00 as against the quota of \$470,000.00. "E" bond sales totaled, up to December 31, \$188,000 as against the county's quota of \$185,000. This total, according to Mr. Stone, included "E" bonds in the amount of \$10,500 purchased by dealers in the service.

Mr. Stone, on behalf of himself and Mr. Boone, in reporting the drive so successfully concluded, said: "We are happy to report the County has again exceeded its quota in purchase of war bonds."

"It has been pleasant working with such fine people as we have in Lamb County. Credits due all the people who bought war bonds to help win the war, as well as those who worked for the organization assisting in putting over the bond drives. It is just as important to win and preserve peace as it was to win the war, and each one who has contributed in any way to the bond drives has contributed a great part to the success of our country."

"Permit us to extend our sincere thanks to everyone who helped in any way to put over the various bond drives, which were so necessary to win the war and take care of our returning servicemen and their families."

She had been wheel-chair invalid from arthritis for the past eight years. About two weeks previous to her death she was stricken with pneumonia and also suffered from a heart condition, from which she seemingly recovered but grew gradually weaker until she died.

## Garbage Collection Plan Starts

### New Locker Plant Is Being Built

Construction is underway in the erection of a frozen food locker plant on East Ninth street, and just east of Highway 51.

The new building will be one story, 10 by 80 feet, and of frame and stucco construction. James A. Garrett and Virrel E. Roberts are owners of the project and will be the owners and operators of the locker plant.

C. C. Self is the general contractor. Plans provide for the opening of the plant in April. Applications for lockers are now being received by Mr. Garrett at Boston's Grocery & Market.

The locker plant property is on a corner immediately at the rear of the Highway Department Warehouse and extends 150 feet east along Ninth street. The initial structure in the development will be built on the corner lot, and the balance of the land reserved for additional development.

The new locker plant will have 600 lockers at the outset, and it will be sufficient space for the installation of additional lockers.

The new locker plant will provide all the facilities of a modern establishment of the kind. There will be a chilling room, a curing room, and all cutting up and processing of meats will be carried out for locker patrons.

### Asks Election As County Attorney

Robert Kirk, Lamb County Attorney, who has been in the service 3 1/2 years, as a pilot on a B-24 and C-54, and overseas nine months, arrived home recently on a 30-day furlough, following which he will go to San Antonio, where he expects to receive a discharge.

Kirk was a visitor at the Leader office Saturday and instructed this newspaper to publish his formal statement announcing he will be a candidate for the office of County Attorney. His announcement follows: "To the Voters of Lamb County: "Although still in the army, I am offering myself as a candidate for the office of County Attorney of Lamb County. I have been back in the States for just three weeks, and expect to be released from the army soon, and will make every effort to see all of you personally."

"Since I gave up my law practice in Lamb County in July, 1942, and enlisted in the army, I have been connected with the Army Air Forces and the Air Transport Command in the United States and India, instructing flying cadets, ferrying planes, and flying gasoline over 'The Hump' into China.

"I know Lamb County, its people and its problems, and am fully qualified for this job, having continued to keep up with the laws and court decisions while in the army."

"Lamb County is my home. I want to come back and help other returning service men find their place again in civil life."

### To Haul Off Trash From Residences Once Each Week

### Cooperation of All Residents Is Urged in City Cleanup

According to W. G. Street, City Secretary, arrangements have been made for garbage to be collected at all residences once each week beginning January 1, 1946, unless some emergency should arise which is beyond the control of the collector. This service includes the hauling off of all kinds of trash and garbage with the exception of wet garbage, grass, tree and shrubbery cuttings and trimmings, automobile bodies or parts, and any and all material left from repairing, improving or erecting new buildings. Such rubbish as this the city contends, should be hauled away by the owner or resident of the property.

Every resident is urged to have his trash and garbage in a container in the alley immediately behind his home, or if it is impossible to secure a container, to have the garbage raked up in a pile in the alley. Should the property be located where there is no alley it is urged that the garbage be placed at some convenient place on the street where it will be accessible to the collector.

The cooperation of all citizens is earnestly solicited in this matter, and it is hoped that all residents will work together for a better and cleaner Littlefield.

**Flying V.I.P.'s Job Of Major Dryer**

WASHINGTON—The airplanes and the pilots of tomorrow are to be found at the National Airport here, just a few hundred yards north of the main civilian terminal building. The post-war nucleus of the commercial air transport business is typified by the headquarters of the Army Air Forces Air Transport Command, where ships that will soon be carrying ordinary citizens and cargo have been doing their war job in carrying emergency loads to the far corners of the earth. And there too are many former airline pilots who plan to go back to their old jobs as soon as the redeployment aftermath of the war is a thing of the past.



Characteristic of these fliers is Maj. Ernest E. Dryer of Cleveland, who won fame recently by hopping back from Moscow in two-days' flying time. The Douglas Sky-master, a four-engine transport plane, took off from the Russian capital on a Thursday morning and brought its passengers back to Washington in time for an early lunch on Saturday.  
 For the past year Maj. Dryer has been one of the two dozen former commercial airline pilots who fly for the Brass Hat Squadron, officially known as the Army Air Forces 503d Base Unit of the Air Transport Command. Their chief job is to fly V.I.P.'s, or "very important persons" in the G.I. vocabulary, on special mission to any part of the world. Prior to that assignment Dryer ferried one of the first Flying Fortresses to Australia and transported munitions to the Allies in the crucial days at El Alamein in 1942.  
 "The airlines and their crews have done a tremendous war job, side by side with the A.T.C.," Maj. Dryer said. "At the same time, they've got the airplanes of the future all laid out and ready to operate in civilian life, years before they otherwise would have been."

## HAMMONS TO OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY

### Considerable Improvements Carried Out Addition Is Built to Structure; Pavement Is Extended

Mr. Hammons, Jr., after spending over two years in the south Pacific as a paratrooper, and returning home, attended the Landig College of Mortuary Science, Houston, graduating from same on May 18 last, and receiving his funeral director's license at Austin on May 22, 1945. He is now serving his two years' apprenticeship in embalming on the completion of which he expects to get his license.

Mr. Smith has been connected with the Hammons organization for the past 12 years. He has held a funeral director and embalmer license since October, 1937.

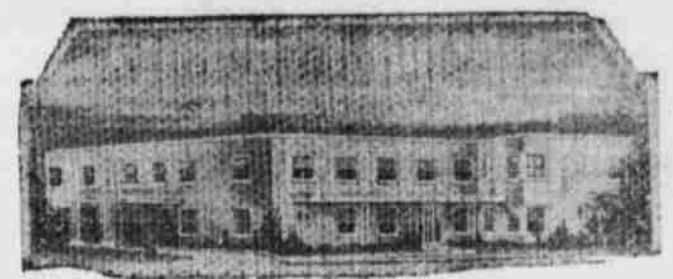

### Japan Finished As World Power

**PAUL MANNING** (standing before the Imperial Palace, Tokio in above photo), widely-known commentator and magazine writer, and the only correspondent to witness and broadcast both the German and Japanese surrender ceremonies, declares in the current issue of the internationally-circulated "Sperry-Scope" magazine, that the kind of peace administered by General of the Army Douglas MacArthur is a guarantee that Japan will "never again be a world power."

Manning, whose human interest broadcasts from Europe and the Pacific over a nation-wide network gained him a large following, during the last five years, predicted Tojo's suicide attempt ten days before the event.

In the "Sperry-Scope" article, Manning quoted from an interview with Gen. Yoshijiro Umezaki, chief of the Japanese Imperial Staff, that the Japanese "could have continued to fight" with 9,000 Kamikaze pilots and 2,500,000 soldiers in the home islands. "I believed the General," Manning says, "when I traveled through Japan. Civilian economy had been virtually paralyzed but the Japanese army was sufficiently well equipped for at least another year of war."

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return

### Clothing Campaign To Get Underway

Soon after post offices are cleared of the last Christmas packages, they will begin to receive clothing gifts from the American people to the suffering people in bombed-out lands, according to an order of Postmaster General Robert E. Hannegan which was made public recently.

Henry J. Kaiser, national chairman of the Victory Clothing Collection, declared that the order to all postmasters authorized and directed them to permit local committees of the nation-wide clothing drive to place boxes in post office lobbies to receive clothing donations.

Mr. Kaiser also announced that Nelson A. Rockefeller, former Assistant Secretary of State, will serve as the New York City chairman of the collection.

Mr. Kaiser also announced that 9607 communities throughout America are organized to conduct clothing drives under the local chairmanship of 4313 men and women, many of whom will direct county-wide drives.

The Victory Clothing Collection, scheduled from Jan. 7-31, seeks 100,000,000 used garments, in addition to shoes and bedding. Each contributor is invited to attach good-will messages to clothing gifts.

**SWING OF THE SOUTHWEST MARKETS**

Cold wintry weather added its quieting effect to the seasonally dull market situation on southwest farm products during the week before Christmas, but price held up well, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration. Trade was limited largely by reduced offerings since demand generally continued very good.

Wheat and sorghum grains continued to sell at the ceiling plus all permitted markups. Most of the southwest peanut crop is already in the hands of shellers, who report difficulty in filling the demand for finished goods. Rice activity is now centered mostly at milling plants, with farmers already preparing their land for next year's production.

Cotton reached another new 20-year high early in the week, but then sagged a little as spot market activity decreased. Sales in the ten markets amounted to only 158,400 bales compared with 190,000 in the preceding week.

Holiday demand for poultry was quite active. Young hen turkeys and light weight toms were in good request, but the heavier birds continued to move rather slowly. Offerings in the Southwest were reported adequate for trade needs but did not appear to be burdensome, and prices held firm throughout the week. A few dull easy spots prevailed on other poultry, including a slow demand at Denver and slight easiness on light weight and leghorn fowl along with young chickens at New Orleans early in the week.

Cold weather held down any appreciable increase in egg receipts, and demand was sufficient to maintain a firm trend on all offerings. Price reductions were limited to the required adjustment to lower OPA ceiling levels on some grades.

Supplies of vegetables for the holidays was reduced by the recent freezing weather which extended into south Texas areas and brought a sharp decrease in movement of tender items. Another limiting factor was the car shortage which restricted movement of sweet potatoes from

Louisiana and of Irish potatoes and onions from Colorado. Hardy vegetables from the lower Rio Grande Valley moved fairly well, though unfavorable weather conditions tended to hold down the volume. Some of these items, like cabbage and carrots, are selling in competition with supplies from other sections of the country so that demand is not too keen.

Cattle markets featured light receipts, with cold rainy weather in the South and snow and ice further north the principal restraining factors. The quality of offerings was only fair at most markets. Southwest sellers found the light supply an inducement to ask higher prices and a generally strong market prevailed, especially in Texas, where demand was active. Some markets further north reported a seasonally slow demand and uneven price trends. Nearly all grades at Chicago closed the week 50 cents to a dollar under the recent high time.

Hogs sold at the ceiling except for a dull easy trend on feeder pigs at several points. Sheep and lambs were irregular.

San Antonio was mostly steady. Fort Worth was strong on feeders but steady to weak on killing classes. Most markets further north closed the week steady under clean-up trading.

Protecting summer fallowed acreage. 8. Contour listing or furrowing of

- cropland or land planted to crops in 1946. 9. Contour farming intertilled crops. 10. Seeding drilled crops on the contour. 11. Leaving on the land as a protection against wind erosion the stalks or stubble of sorghums or millet. 12. Seeding perennial pasture grasses. 13. Seeding adapted pasture grasses, pasture legumes, or mixtures of grasses and legumes. 14. Plowing fireguards on noncrop open pasture and range land.

- 15. Harvesting legume and grass seed. 16. Establishing a satisfactory cover of winter legumes seeded in the fall of 1945. 17. Growing green manure or cover crops. 18. Application of phosphate other than raw rock phosphate.
