Flying V.I.P.'s Job Of Major Dryer

WASHINGTON - The airplaner and the pilots of tomorrow are to be found at the National Airport here, just a few hundred yards north of the main civilian terminal building. The post-war nucleus of the commercial air transport business is typified by the headquarters

of the Army Air Forces Air Transport Command, where ships that will soon be carrying ordinary citizens and cargo have been doing their war job in carrying emergency loads to the far corners of the

earth. And there too are many former airline pilots who plan to go back to their old jobs as soon as the redeployment aftermath of the war is a thing of the past.

Characteristic of these fliers is Maj. Ernest E. Dryer of Cleveland, who won fame recently by hopping back from Moscow in two-days flying time. The Douglas Skymaster, a four-engine transport plane, took off from the Russian capital on a Thursday morning and brought its passengers back to Washington in time for an early lunch on Saturday.

For the past year Maj. Dryer has been one of the two dozen former commercial airline pilots who fly for the Brass Hat Squadron, officially known as the Army Air Forces 503d Base Unit of the Air Transport Command. Their chief job is to fly V.I.P.'s, or "very important persons" in the G.I. vocabulary, on special mission to any part of the world. Prior to that assignment Dryer ferried one of the first Flying Fortresses to Australia and transported munitions to the Allies in the crucial days at EL Alamein in 1942.

"The airlines and their crews have done a tremendous war job, side by side with the A.T.C.," Maj. Dryer said. "At the same time, they've got the airlanes of the future all laid out and ready to operate in civilian life, years before-they otherwise would have been."



Japan Finished As World Power



DAUL MANNING (standing before the Imperial Palace, Tokio in above photo), widely-known commentator and magazine writer, and the only correspondent to witness and broadcast both the German and Japanese surrender ceremonies, de-ciares in the current issue of the internationally-circulated "Sperry-Ptope" magazine, that the kind of peace administered by General of the Army Douglas MacArthur is a murantee that Japan will "never again be a ald power."

Manning, whose human interest broadcasts from Europe and the Pacific over a nation-wide network gained him a large following, dur-Japanese surrender ceremonies, de

gained him a large following, dur-ing the last five years, predicted Tojo's suicide attempt ten days before the event.

In the "Sperlyscope" Manning quoted from an interview with Gen. Yoshijiro Umezo, chief of the Japanese Imperial Staff, that the Nipponese "could have contin-ued to fight" with 9,000 Kamikaze pilots and 2,500,000 soldiers in the home islands. "I believed the General," Manning says, "when I traveled through Japan. Civillan economy had been virtually paralyzed but the Japanese army was sufficiently well equipped for at least another year of war."




