MOISTURE IS GREATER IN NORTHERN THAN IN SOUTHERN PART OF COUNTY

The South Plains, including Lamb county and the Littlefield area, has had just about a little bit of everything that the weatherman has in his bag of tricks this week and which includes unseasonable extreme high temperatures, unseasonable low temperatures, and finally a drought breaking rain Friday which measured .28 inches at 10 a. m. at the weather station at the local oil mill, and with showers continuing for a couple of hours afterward, probably has given a third of an inch of moisture. Some few snow flakes fluttered through the slow-falling rain.

Moisture Low

Moisture for the year here is still highly deficient, totaling only 1.08 for the first hundred days of this year. This includes snow on January 1, 2 and 3, measuring .65; slight rain, February 11 bringing .15 inches of moisture, and Friday's .28 inches.

Sunday and Monday brought unusually high temperatures for April, when the recording gauge at West Texas Gas Company here recorded 88 on Sunday and 92 degrees at mid-afternoon Monday. Tuesday afternoon, it really warmed up, reaching a high 92 degrees. Thirty-six hours later, the gauge completed its downward plunge of 56 degrees, and registered a freezing 26 degrees early Thursday morning.

Telephone Company Announces Plan To Change Name To General Telephone Co.

The name of Southwestern Associated Telephone Company will soon be changed to General Telephone Company of the Southwest, Roy Autry, president, announced recently. Mr. Autry said that the name was being changed along with those of all of the other major subsidiaries of General Telephone Corporation. He added that this involved no change in the management or operations of Southwestern Associated.

The name changes will affect 12 subsidiary operating companies of the General Telephone System serving more than 1,435,000 telephones in 1600 communities from coast to coast. In each case, the

new name will include the word "General."

In an announcement made in New York at the same time, Donald C. Power, president of General Telephone Corporation, explained that the purpose of the changes was to achieve uniformity and to make General Telephone System better known to the investing public. Mr. Power pointed out that, although the System is one of the nation's larger public utilities, with plant in operation of about a third of a billion dollars, the name "General Telephone" is known to relatively few people other than the parent company's 25,000 stockhold-

ers. "Our subsidiaries, comprising the largest independent (non-Bell) telephone organization in the United States, operate in 19 states and serve areas with an estimated population of more than 5,500,000," Mr. Power said. "These companies are well known in their respective territories and it is hoped that, by identifying them with General Telephone, this recognition will benefit the System as a whole."

"This added recognition is important to us, particularly now that we are in the midst of a heavy construction program. Since World War II, System companies have added 732,000 telephones through internal growth and acquisition, an increase of 165 per cent. This has required new capital in excess of \$175,000,000. In 1951 alone, the parent company and its subsidiaries sold a total of over \$60,000,000 in new securities and similar yearly construction and financing programs will be required for years to come in order to meet the continuing demand for telephone service."

"General Telephone has always been successful in selling its securities," Mr. Power said. "However, it is generally accepted as a fact that well-known companies are able to attract new capital more readily and at a lower cost than companies which are little known."

"I would like to point out again that in no way will our name change to General Telephone Company of the Southwest affect any of our present plans," said Mr. Autry. "Since the war we have expanded our operation rapidly and there seems to be no let up in this development. A large number of our telephone exchanges have been converted to dial operation and we are continually moving ahead to meet the growing demand for telephone service. During 1952, our construction budget has been planned for an estimated \$7,000,000 program."

Army officers, warrant officers, and enlisted personnel who have served in Korea for any period since June 24, 1950, and who have been returned to the United States as a result of current rotation policies, will be released three months in advance of the expiration of their tour of duty or extended enlistment, unless they volunteer to remain on active duty.

Occupational Therapy courses for women college graduates, leading to a commission as Second Lieutenant in the Women's Medical Specialist Corps, have been announced by the Army Medical Service. The courses are designed to meet a growing deficit of qualified occupational therapists needed for treatment and rehabilitation of wounded or disabled service men.

Annual classes beginning in the fall, consisting of academic and clinical practice phases, will conform to standards established by the American Medical Association's Council on Medical Education and Hospitals. Applications for the fall courses may now be made by graduates of prospective graduates over twenty-one years of age, who are not yet 26. Full information may be obtained by writing to the Surgeon General, Department of the Army, Washington 25, D.C., Attention: Personnel Division.

Veterans of the U.S. Fifth Army are being invited to join a month-long reunion pilgrimage next fall to the scene of their victories in North Africa and Italy. Any soldier, officer or veteran who served with the Fifth Army is eligible to make the trip. A special cruise ship will leave New York, September 12, for Casablanca, Oran, Algiers and Palermo, finally docking at Naples. The tourists will follow the Army's battle line through Italy until October 19, at which time the return to the United States is scheduled. Special rates have been arranged. For complete details, write Reunion Committee, Fifth Army Pilgrimage, 35, East 57th Street, New York, N.Y.

Approximately 2,000 ROTC Field Artillery cadets, from six continental armies, will enter summer training, between June 21 and August 1, at Fort Sill Artillery Center. The organization calls for 20 cadet training batteries of 100 cadets. Each training battery will have four officers and will be equipped with howitzers, prime movers, fire control and communication equipment to assure progressive training from duties of cannonniers through battery firing problems. The cadets will be rotated daily through all operational positions of the firing battery.

The United States Air Force

needs applicants for aviation cadet training. Here is the opportunity for qualified young men to become commissioned officers in the Air Force. An applicant for aviation cadet training must possess the following qualifications: be single, male citizen of the United States. Have at least two years training at an accredited college. (High school graduates are also eligible after enlistment.) The age limit is 19 to 26½ years. He must possess the highest physical and moral standards and have an aptitude for flying. The training period is approximately 12 months. Complete details on this program can be obtained here in Littlefield at 110 W. 5th Street.

Military personnel that have not received payment for their second dividend on their National Service Life Insurance policies (NSLI) can expect to receive same before August 1, 1952, according to the Department of Defense. Coupled with the announcement was the strongest plea to date that military persons abstain from writing in, at least until after July 31.

A big backlog of AF applicants on the waiting list at the Amarillo main recruiting station prevents any more enlistments from the Littlefield area until after May 1. However, applications for enlistment in the AF after May 1 will be accepted now and be put on the waiting list.

Letters of Gratitude

Business Worries

He figured that if a mustard seed proved an inspiration for him it might help others.

After further experimentation, Flint and his wife finally decided on the plastic ball design. At first they did the work themselves in their basement, but as the demand grew from stores and church organizations, they had to hire help, set up an assembly line and obtain larger quarters.

The ballot must be marked by the voter in the presence of a notary public or other person qualified under the law to take acknowledgements, and the affidavit on the ballot envelope must be filled out, signed, and sworn to by the voter and certified by the officer.

Many people regard rules of legal procedure as mere tools of delay, of concern only to lawyers and judges. Far from this, they are instruments of justice, and of real significance to all of us. Procedure is the machinery which makes the machinery of uniform justice run smoothly. The law is composed of two parts—the substantive and the adjective law. The substantive law defines rights, duties and remedies; it enforces contracts and rights wrongs; it describes crimes and sets up penalties. People can usually see the value of substantive law. Adjective law deals with legal procedure and describes the steps a person must take to invoke the substantive law. Some of our most important rights are to be found in the body of procedural law. For example, as a people who want justice to prevail, we like to think that every man, rich or poor, shall have his day in court. This is an important right, for a day in court implies more than merely the right to have your say before a judge and jury. Your day in court implies that you have the right to be properly represented, to have your cases presented before an impartial jury and an unbiased judge, and to have a reasonable time to prepare for the trial. It holds that you shall have proper notice of the action against you; that the complaint or indictment shall state a clear cause of action. It means that you shall be confronted by your accusers; that you shall have the right to cross-examine them; that you shall be able to present evidence in your own behalf. Finally, the law governing procedure tells you how you may appeal your case to higher courts when you feel that you have not had a fair trial or that a prejudicial error has been committed in the trial court. Much of our procedural law comes down from centuries of experience in the courts of other lands. It was inevitable that through the centuries some of the procedure would become cumbersome, obsolete and difficult. For this reason the history of procedure has been characterized by great periods of reform. In America we have experienced many advantageous changes in our laws governing the procedure of courts and administrative agencies. There is a growing custom in the United States of giving the courts the power to revise their rules in certain fields. Our Texas rules of civil procedure are made by our state Supreme Court. The Court is constantly striving, with the recommendations of the practicing lawyer, to improve these rules. The aim of the Supreme Court is to provide a uniform and relatively simple set of rules for dispensing justice with a minimum of delay. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform—not to advise. No persons should ever apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who knows the facts, because the facts may change the application of the law.)
