# TWO LITTLEFIELD MEN DROWN ON FISHING TRIP IN MEXICO TUESDAY

Funeral Rites For Cpl. Henry Chapman Set For Sunday

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at the Church of Christ, Five for Cpl. John Henry Chapman remains are scheduled to Saturday morning at Lubbock, to be returned to Littlefield by the funeral home.

Services will be conducted by Bro. Kirby, former Littlefield minister, assisted by Bro. H. A. Colliard, Church of Christ pastor, at 10 o'clock Sunday.

In the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall at the grave, the deceased will be buried with full military honors.

Bearers will be Overton Phillips, Wood Yantis, Billy Holder, Ted Robinson, G. W. Gilder, Roy Beckner.

The firing squad will be Darrell Pete Harrell, Odell Matthews and Carter.

Bearers will be Jimmy Saland, C. M. Lance; color guards, Watson and Calvin Lippard; bugler, Leo Koontz; chaplain, Leo J. J.; junior vice-commander, Kirk; senior vice-commander, Chisholm.

Chapman, a navigator on a transport, in the course of his duty was wounded from the battle and killed on Vella La Vella, one of the British Solomon Islands, when his plane crashed against the side of a mountain in a storm on October 7, 1944.

He was stationed at Noumea, New Caledonia.

On February 1, 1925, at May- Ellis county, Cpl. Chapman was the third son of Mr. (Mrs. Chapman), and was graduated from the Littlefield High school in the class of 1942. He lettered in both 1941 and 1942.

He volunteered for service in the U. S. Army on July 6, 1942; took training at San Diego, California, and graduated from Navigation school at Noumea, New Caledonia.

Chapman was a navigator on a transport at the time of his death.

Local post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars was named in honor of Chapman.

Survivors of the deceased are his father, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Chapman, and two sisters.

Brothers are T/Sgt. Loyd Chapman of First Division, Tsingao, Cpl. Charles Chapman of the 4th Marine Division, Camp Pendleton, Calif.; and G. W. and Jimmie Chapman of Littlefield. The sisters are Frank Allverson, Littlefield, and Dan Kiker of Crowley.

Chapman also survived by his maternal grandmother, Mrs. J.B. Wilson of Littlefield, Okla., and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Pearl Chapman of Littlefield, Texas.

### Oil Interest Is Focused On Project Near Littlefield

Oil interest of Littlefield and Lamb county focused on No. 1 J. R. Jameson, Jr., about five miles southwest of Littlefield during the past week. The well was reported down to 3,580 feet Tuesday, lacking only a little over 500 feet of reaching the 4,100 feet depth at which the Humble well drilled one mile east of the present location in 1945 reported a show.

Also of interest is the unofficial report that Pacific Western Oil Corporation is going to drill 15 miles west of Littlefield. The tentative location is in the northeast quarter of labor 5, league 213, Deaf Smith county land survey, one mile east of the Bailey county line. Confirmation of this venture has not been received and it must be considered a rumor for the present.

The No. 1 J.R. Jameson, Jr. location was staked by DeKalb Agricultural association, Inc., 660 feet from south and west lines of labor 22, league 674, Abner Taylor subdivision of State Capitol lands survey. The well is scheduled to go down to 4,500 feet. Combination rotary-cable tools are being used.

Anton-Irish fields activity during the past week included location for another exploration well by Anton Oil corporation of Fort Worth named 3-B Leftwich. The site is 660 feet from west and 860 feet from north lines of the southeast corner of section 32, block 1, R. M. Thompson survey in Southeast Lamb county. This is to be a 6,100 foot rotary project.

### Wind Whipped Waves Sink Boat In Huge Lake

G. W. Falls, 53, and Willard Hill, 30, Are Drowning Victims

Two Littlefield men, G. W. Falls, 53, and Willard Hill, 30, were drowned Tuesday morning when their boat sank in the Marte R. Gomez reservoir about 13 miles south of the U. S. border in Mexico.

J. Ernest Jones of Littlefield and Lamb county superintendent of schools, and a Mexican guide, who was with the fishing party, swam ashore.

Falls' body was recovered shortly after the accident and dragging operations were started immediately for Hill's body, which disappeared in about 30 feet of water.

Mr. Falls was operator of the Falls Grocery & Market here and Mr. Hill is a farmer of this area.

Two other members of the fishing party, which left Littlefield Friday about noon, L. E. White, dairyman, of Bula, and Virgil Grisham, farmer of Bull Lake, were not with Hill and Falls at the time of the accident.

Hammors Funeral Home left Wednesday morning for Rio Grande City to bring the Falls remains to Littlefield, and is expected to arrive back in this city today about noon.

Walter Hill, E. C. Hill and J. D. Kirkland left Tuesday afternoon for Roma, Texas, 18 miles from the scene of the tragedy.

Virgil Lott, U.S. Immigration service official at Roma, told the Lubbock Morning Avalanche Tuesday night that the four men had left Roma about sunrise to fish on the huge Mexican lake. He said that wind whipped waves, which were larger than usual, filled the boat with water about a mile or so from the lake shore about 9:30 A.M. and the boat sank.

Lott said the Mexican guide and Jones, who had a life preserver, were able to swim to shore and summon help, but that Falls and Hill either became exhausted while attempting to swim to shore and drowned or went down with the boat.

The government official reported searching parties recovered Falls' body within 20 minutes after the accident.

Burglars were busy in Littlefield last week.

Lyman's Food Store was broken into, and \$400 in cash and a .25 calibre pistol taken.

Entrance was gained by breaking a window at the rear of the building, and removing the inside bars. The safe which was not locked, was opened, and all papers removed and left on the floor. The cash register at the front of the building was also gone through. All change and "hot" checks are said to have been left in the store.

Piggly-Wiggly Grocery and Market was also entered the same night by forcing a lock on the rear door opening on XIT Drive. This door was barred and padlocked. The bar was removed and the door forced open.

The offenders, according to the Sheriff's Department, had attempted to open the safe, but were unable to do so.

Deputy Sheriff Wayne Waters and Deputy Sheriff Dick Dyer answered calls to the scenes of both robberies, and according to Sheriff Sid Hopping, an investigation is being made by the Sheriff's Department.

Only 79 voters expressed opinions in the election, the count was 54 to 25.

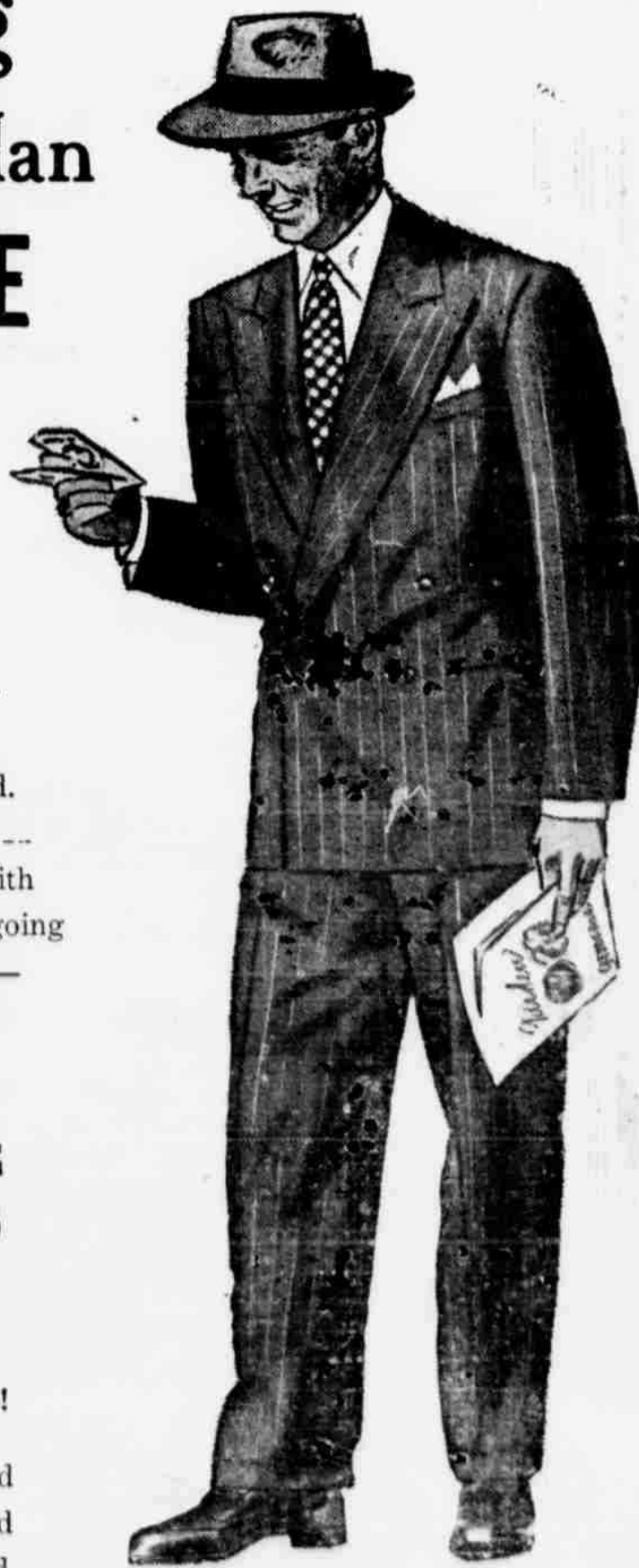

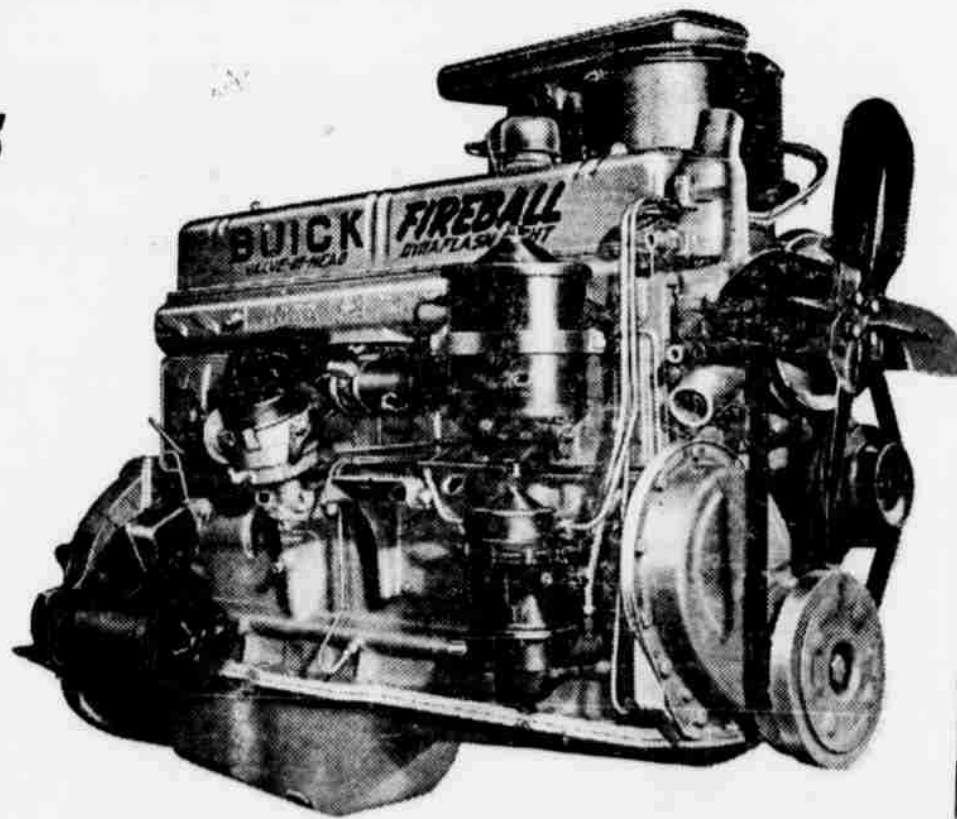

Dragging operations continued until a late hour Tuesday night for the body of Hill, but had to be discontinued due to the high winds and large waves, which made operations dangerous. Dragging of the lake, however, got underway again Wednesday, but up to a late hour Wednesday night no trace of the body was found.

The U.S. Immigration Officer Lott said he had been told that the two Littlefield men were probably the first ever to drown in the large lake. Gerald Sprague, Texas Tech graduate and presently press representative for the San Antonio Express here, told an Avalanche reporter, that the Mexican lake was several miles long and almost equally as wide, and more than 30 feet deep in its deepest portion.

Sprague said the reservoir was claimed to be the largest earthen dam reservoir in the North American continent, and was the choice fishing spot for southwestern U.S. and northern Mexico. He located the large body of water 13 miles south of Roma, or approximately 40 miles southwest of McAllen.

Falls was born in Erath county, Texas, July 20, 1895, and married Miss Pearl Riggles in 1917. He moved to Petersburg in 1920; and to Littlefield in 1926, where the Falls family have continued to make their home.

Mr. Falls operated a board twelve years, and for the past years has owned and operated Falls Grocery and Market. He is a member of the Church of Christ.

Falls is survived by his wife, a son, Delbert Falls of Santa Fe, four sisters, Mrs. Otis Cross, Okla., Mrs. Hugh Dixon, Mo., Teague, and Mrs. Ernest Myer, Lubbock, and a Brother, J.B. Lubbock.

Hill is survived by his parents and Mrs. H.B. Hill of Littlefield whom he made his home; two sons, Walker Hill, Littlefield, and Fred Hill, Hale Center; four daughters, Mrs. Erma Mae Hill, Mrs. Leola Lamp, and Mrs. Hilmar Braune, Littlefield, and Mrs. Henry Edow, Jr., Haskell.

stay dry.

Now you figure it from there. If he had stayed out we would have had a mild, early spring. If he sees his shadow and is scared back into his hole we would have six weeks more of winter, unpleasant weather. The way we see it is, he sent back in but not because he was scared, so that should leave us a little winter and a little spring mixed in the months to come.

One thing for sure by the West Texas Gas company temperature chart is that it got plenty cold around here Sunday morning about 3 a.m. They recorded 6 degrees downtown and 3 degrees at the station 3-miles south of town. Out at the station the temperature came back above freezing Tuesday afternoon for the first time in eight days. Downtown temperatures were above freezing last Thursday afternoon for 3 hours, the mercury then plunged again, reaching 8 degrees which is 24 degrees below freezing, at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. After the 6 degrees low Sunday it barely climbed to 32 degrees for a few hours Monday afternoon and then Tuesday and Wednesday found temperatures around 40.

The moisture gauge at Western Cottonoil Co. froze up, but they still reported .17 inches of rain since presstime last week. This brings the 1949 total up to 3.03 inches.

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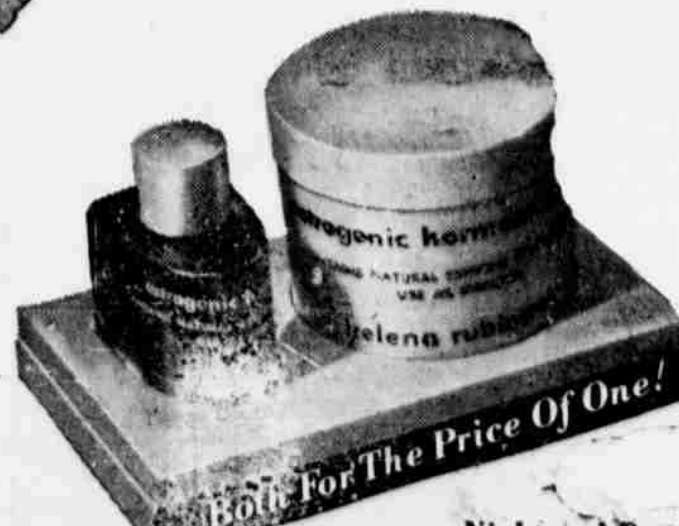

I borrowed a copy of a newspaper out of my neighbor's mail box Monday morning and am almost ashamed of it due to the fact there wasn't enough news in it to justify making my neighbor mad if he finds out I took it, although the way I see it he's already mad at me any way and a few more degrees one way or the other won't make no difference, but since there wasn't anything else much in it to read I went ahead and read the latest poll Dr. Gallup has taken.

I notice now that Dr. Gallup is taking polls on subject considerably safer than elections, for example, he has recently taken a poll to find out who the ten most popular men in the United States are, and since this ain't subject to votin on, it's a entirely safe sense enough to know a smart poll subject. 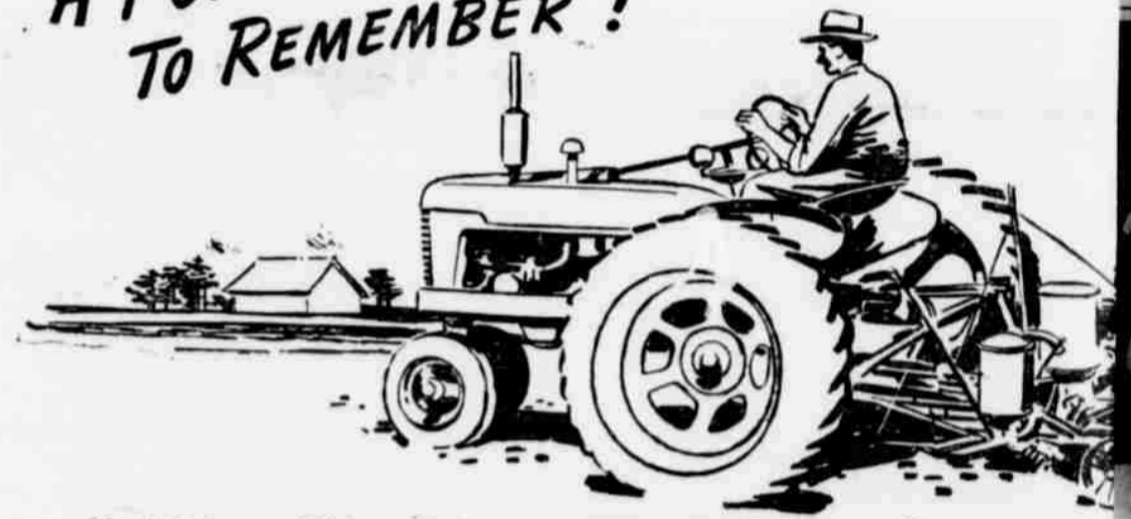

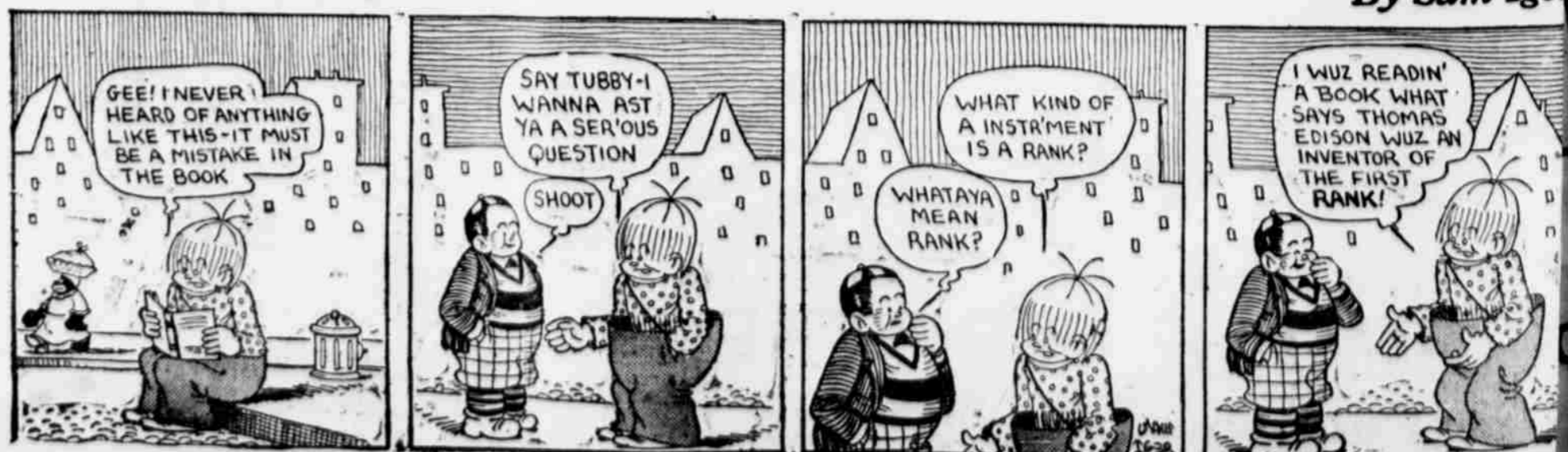

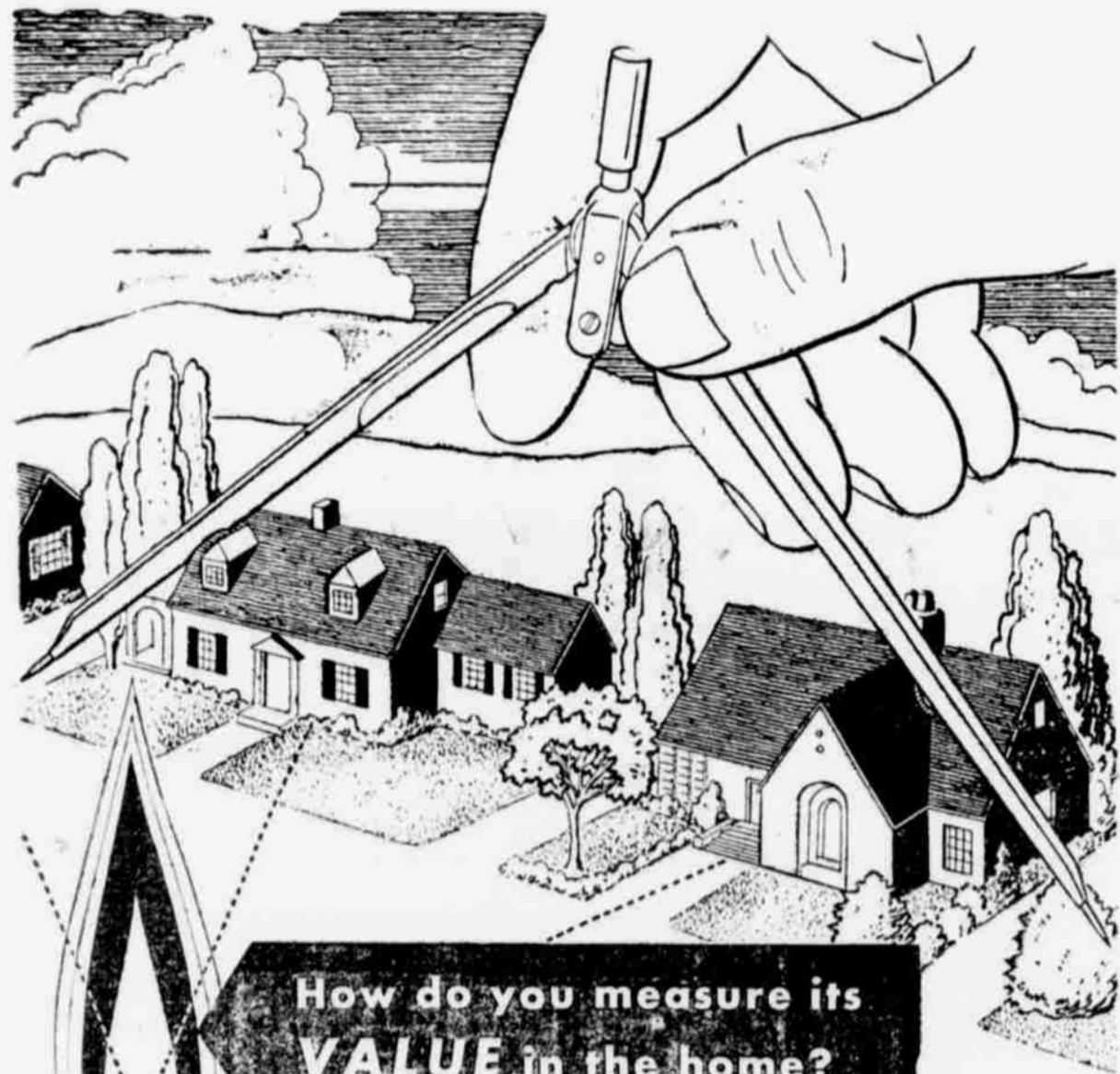

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# Proposed Groundwater Bill To Be Submitted To Legislature Soon Is Outlined

The Leader received a letter from State Representative L.B. Holt last week in which he enclosed a copy of the proposed Groundwater bill which is to be submitted in the Fifty-first Legislature. Representative Holt asked that it be published for the benefit of his constituents and that they send their reactions and suggestions on this matter, as well as others which confront them, to him.

The bill provides that ownership of underground waters will remain in the landowner. It also assures local control of these waters by providing if any control is ever attempted, it will be by local districts. No district can exist without vote of local resident property owning taxpayers. On voting whether to create a district, cities vote separately from rural areas, so that a city vote cannot force a district on an unwilling rural area.

One principal feature of the bill is the provision that a district can undertake to put more water underground.

The bill provides for the right of the fee title owner to withdraw and

use the ground water encountered in drilling on his own land, subject to reasonable regulations. It is provided that the priorities, regulations and provisions of law in regard to surface waters shall not apply to these reasonable use and withdrawal of ground waters.

The State Board of Water Engineers is to designate ground water basins and subdivisions as adequate factual data becomes available. And to alter these boundaries if data justifies.

**OUTLINE of DISTRICT POWERS**  
The water control and improvement district will have the following powers, privileges and functions in order to achieve their purpose and plans.

To develop, control, preserve, recharge and protect the underground waters within the boundaries of the district for all beneficial purposes and to construct and operate waterworks and to use, distribute and sell underground water for any such purpose or purposes.

To provide facilities, and approve the provisions of facilities, for the diversion of underground waters within the boundaries of the district, to provide or approve the provision of facilities and reasonable regulations for the diversion, delivery and control of such waters, to the end that the use thereof may be prudent and free from preventable waste; to preserve the purity and potability thereof and to prevent such waters from escaping to the surface of the earth in such manner as to injure lands or pollute surface streams.

To cause to be made by Registered Professional Engineers surveys of the underground waters within the boundaries of the district and the facilities for the development, diversion and use and whether improvements, developments and recharges are needed, and further to determine what improvements, developments and recharges, if any, are required.

In connection with the last provision districts may cooperate with other districts and agencies State and Federal, as well as any State or Federal institution.

The district will control within its boundaries, the location, method of drilling, casing and finishing of wells to the end that there may not be waste of underground waters and to require the return where feasible of excess unused water to the underground strata from which it is returned and further to prevent pollution or harmful alteration of the character of the water in one stratum of the earth by means of water or other deleterious

matter, which might be admitted from some other stratum or from the surface of the ground.

### SMALL WELLS EXEMPT

The district will also formulate rules and regulations for the development, conservation, regulation and the prevention of pollution and waste of underground waters within the boundaries of the district; to provide for the issuance of permits for the construction of wells when the issuance of such permits is necessary or incident to the enforcement of its rules, regulations, or orders for the purposes of the district. The provisions of this section shall not apply to wells with a capacity of not more than 30,000 gallons per day for domestic, gardening and stock-raising purposes.

It is also provided that in controlling the location of a well, practical spacing of wells shall be required to the end that the use of one well will interfere least with other wells and other potential well sites; provided, however that such controlling of spacing not be used to deny a landowner a permit to drill a well on his land under the conditions and regulations provided in this Act.

Other provisions provide for developing plans for the most efficient use of underground waters research project and experiments; to require records to be kept and reports made of the construction of wells and the taking and use of underground waters to require various safeguards against waste and will give the power to acquire lands for the erection of dams, draining lakes, draws and creeks for the purpose of recharging the underground water-bearing strata.

Provisions for selecting directors are made and the need for such a bill is stressed.

The District Groundwaters Bill was approved by the Water Laws Committee of the Texas Water Conservation association and is yet to be entitled
