

G. F. Muller Visits Copenhagen, Denmark

G. F. Muller, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Muller of Fieldton, who has been overseas for the past two years and has been stationed in France and Luxembourg, Belgium, is the first enlisted man in the American Army to visit Denmark. He spent two days in Copenhagen, Denmark, recently, and wrote a very interesting letter regarding this trip.

Cpl. Muller has been in the service for three years. He and Mrs. Muller have had at least three sons in the service, two of whom have been discharged. He also has a daughter in the service.

The letter from Cpl. Muller to his mother, written from Copenhagen, Luxembourg, Saturday night, May 12, 1945, reads in part:

"How is my darling tonight? Fine, I am getting along just fine. I just got back from Copenhagen, Denmark. I stayed up there two and two nights. Copenhagen is the most modern city that I have ever seen on this side of the water. The people here were great, so nice to me that I think that I was the first enlisted man in the American Army to visit Denmark, and there were only a few American officers there besides us. We had a guide to take us around the city. He had a 37 model car. He carried us all over the city free of charge. We had breakfast with him yesterday morning. The food was delicious, and of course anything else would do him so we went back and had dinner with him at 6:30 p. m. I can truthfully say that it was one of the best meals I ever had. His wife couldn't speak much English but she sure was a swell hostess and was very glad to have us in her home. This side of ours worked for the Danish underground all the time that the Germans were there. Yesterday afternoon he took me down to the prison. (Continued on Back Page)

Lawrence H Martens Wears Five Stars

Lawrence H. Martens, Boatwain 2-c, of the navy, and son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Martens of Littlefield, formerly of Olton, in service two years, and overseas 21 months, received home Sunday from the South Pacific, wearing five bronze stars, representing that many major battles which took place on Tarawa, the Marshall Islands, Saipan, Guam and Leyte in the Philippines.

He also wears the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal.

Lawrence Martens was on duty on the Personnel Attack Transport USS Sheridan, arriving in San Francisco March 2.

He sustained injury to one of his legs when he was lured against the side of the boat. An access formed on the hip, and he was a patient in a New Guinea hospital five months. He was in a stretcher three months, since his arrival at San Francisco, Calif., March 21 he has been confined in the San Leandro, California Naval hospital.

Lawrence Martens was graduated from the Olton High School with the class of 1941.

He is home for 30 days, following which he will report to New Orleans for re-assignment.

Mr. and Mrs. Martens have another son in the service Pfc Freeman Martens, with the 7th Army and the Infantry, now stationed at Paris, France.

He landed in North Africa, went through combat duty in Sicily, Italy and then into Southern France.

Later he was sent to Germany, and then back to France.

He has been in the service three years and overseas 26 months, he has written his parents that he has 84 points.

First Baptist Will Construct New Church Auditorium

Plans are underway by the First Baptist church of this city to erect in the near future an auditorium with seating capacity of about 1000, on the property owned by the Church just east of the present building, which, on completion of the new structure, will be used as an educational building.

A program has been underway sometime for the securing of funds with which to build and the offering each first Sunday in the month unless otherwise designated is being set aside towards the building fund. The amount of \$1100 was contributed last Sunday to the project. A total sum of \$15,000 is reported to be on hand for this purpose.

The structure will be of red brick of the very latest architecture.

It will be equipped with a new system of air conditioning with automatic control, which means the same temperature will be maintained in the building summer and winter.

Another special feature planned for the new building is indirect lighting.

There will be no windows in the building.

Glass brick will be featured where the windows would ordinarily be installed.

In order to get ideas, which might be incorporated into the new Baptist auditorium, Rev. Lee Hemphill and nine deacons of the church made a tour Tuesday and visited a number of church auditoriums.

It is expected that the new structure when completed, including the new system of air-conditioning, lighting and seating etc., will cost approximately \$50,000.

In an interview with Pryor Hammons, Treasurer for the First Baptist Church, he said that the money would first be obtained before the structure was built.

Restores B-29 Marauder To Service For 3rd Time

S-Sgt. Eugene C. Rader, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Rader, formerly of 13 miles northeast of Littlefield, but now of Carlsbad, N. M. now stationed in France was highly complimented in a letter from his commanding officer to his parents recently. S-Sgt. Rader is a sheet metal worker with the ground crew of the 9th Airforce; has been in service 3 years, and overseas 20 months.

In part the letter from S-Sgt. Rader's General was as follows:

S-Sgt. Eugene C. Rader, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Rader, Carlsbad N. M., has had a part in restoring a B-26 Marauder to service for the third time. Sgt. Rader is a sheet metal worker stationed in France. The plane called "The Nose" was condemned to salvage in pre-invasion days when it was involved in a freak landing with another ship called the "Goatee Hell". Both planes were severed in the middle, and combined into a first class medium bomber.

"The Nose" received wide publicity for being the only plane ever flown with more missions on its tail than its nose.

"Again, the plane, now called "Half and Half", flew 134 more missions and was washed up. This time Sgt. Rader and his co-workers combined the tail of a ship called "Weary Willie", with "The Nose" and created a plane with the staggering



total of 344 missions to its credit. How long the much operated "Nose" will continue operation this time, no one knows. But Sgt. Rader and his crew feel confident that it still has a bright future."

In a letter received recently by the parents from their son he said he was still working hard, and didn't know whether or not he would be sent to the Pacific. He said he would have enough points to discharge him, unless he is held as essential.

Half Of Quota In Bonds Sold

2 New Wells, 200,000 Gal. Reservoir To Be Ready For Use In 30 Days

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It has been necessary that the water be turned off a number of times recently, due to shortage.

The new wells which are under construction by the City, are expected to be completed within 30 days, depending on arrival of materials necessary according to the city secretary, who added that, conservatively speaking, these wells ought to produce 1200 gallons a minute; and that straining them they would do better.

The city's water improvements also include a 200,000 gal concrete reservoir under construction which also will be operating in about 30 days.

State To Stand Cost With Right-Of-Way Exception

All Roads Designated Expected to be built Within Next 3 Years

After considerable effort on the part of Commissioner's Court, Lamb County has been designated by the State certain Farm to Market Paved Roads, which will be built by the State, with the county furnishing only the right of way.

This information was contained in a letter received by Judge I. B. Holt Friday last, which gave the farm to market roads as designated, with the mileage, as follows:

Spring Lake school to United States highway No 70—2 miles; From Beck community to Sudan—3 miles; From Hart Camp to Spade—7 miles; and from Olton north to Castro county line 8.5 miles.

Judge Holt also announced Wednesday that the state has also designated a farm to market paved road to be built from the end of the pavement at the west line of Lamb County on the East-West highway to Enochs which will intersect the Muleshoe-Morton highway also from the east line of Lamb county at Abernathy, which intersects the Lubbock-Plainview highway.

The letter from the State Highway Department, also set out the following:

These designations are made contingent on your Court entering into an agreement with Highway Department, in which your county agrees to retain full responsibility for all prevailing indebtedness against each road and to furnish such right of way as may be required. State maintenance will not be assumed until such time as sufficient improvements has been made to justify adequate maintenance.

"Agreement forms will be furnished you by our District Engineer, which, when properly signed, will be returned to the District Engineer, for further handling. It is desirable that these agreements be executed as expeditiously as possible."

It is expected that all blue printing, surveying and right of way work will be done this year, and that the above roads will be built within the next three years.

TAKE NOTICE THAT AN ELECTION will be held on the 20th day of June, 1945, within said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, to determine if said Road District shall issue bonds, and if an annual ad valorem tax shall be levied annually on all taxable property within said District sufficient to pay the annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity, in pursuance of an ELECTION ORDER made and entered by the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas, on the 19th day of May, 1945, and which order is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

ORDER OF THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT ORDERING BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD IN ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS.

BE IT REMEMBERED that on this the 19th day of May, 1945, the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas, convened in special session, held at the Courthouse in the City of Olton, Texas, and being the regular meeting place for said Court, there were present and in attendance the following members, namely:

- I. B. HOLT, COUNTY JUDGE, presiding; and H. A. HYSINGER, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1; SAM CEARLEY, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2; E. C. ROSS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3; E. L. YARBROUGH, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4; and, among other proceedings had, were the following:

There came on to be heard and considered the petition of J. R. Dean and seventy-six other persons, as resident property taxing voters of ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4 OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, praying this Court for an order for an election to determine the following proposition:

WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of the said Road District Number 4, shall be issued in the principal sum of TWO HUNDRED FORTY-EIGHT THOUSAND (\$248,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding Four Per Centum (4%) per annum, and are to be issued in such denomination and payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient, by the Commissioners' Court, but not exceeding twenty-five (25) years from the date thereof; and that at such election there shall also be submitted to the qualified property taxing voters of the said Road District Number 4, the question as to whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within the said Road District Number 4, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption or payment thereof at maturity.

AND IT APPEARING to the Court that said petition was presented to this Court, and filed with this Court on the 3rd day of May, 1945, and that it is duly signed by more than fifty (50) resident qualified property taxing voters of said Road District Number 4, of Lamb County, Texas; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court, from the evidence submitted, that notice of this hearing was thereupon given by the County Clerk in the time and in the manner required by law, and which notice informed all persons concerned of the time and place of such hearing, and of their right to appear at such hearing and contend for or protest the ordering of such bond election, and further, that the aforesaid notice also stated the amount of the bonds proposed to be issued, and described the boundaries of said Road District, as such boundaries are described and defined in House Bill No. 708, passed by the Forty-seventh Legislature at its Regular Session in 1941, and filed in the office of the Secretary of State on the 25th day of March, 1941; and further, that the aforesaid notice also designated the roads to be constructed and improved; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the Court, and the Court so finds from the evidence submitted, that the Clerk of this Court, pursuant to the order setting said petition down for hearing, posted and published the notices of such hearing in the time and manner required by law; that is to say:

(a) The County Clerk and Ex-Officio Clerk of the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas, executed said notice by posting true copies thereof in the following three public places within ROAD DISTRICT

TRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, to-wit:

ONE COPY on the Bulletin Board in the City Hall at Sudan, Texas; ONE COPY at Ted Walker's Store located in the Beck Gin Community about seven miles south of Sudan, Texas;

ONE COPY at O. W. Testerman's Store in the Friendship Community about five miles south and three miles west of Sudan, Texas. (b) That the said County Clerk also posted a true copy of such notice at the door of the County Courthouse of Lamb County, in the City of Olton, Texas.

(c) That each and all of the three copies of the notice of this hearing were posted by the County Clerk at the three public places in said Road District, above described, on the 7th day of May, 1945; that each of said places was a public place in said Road District; that each of the notices posted at said places was posted in a conspicuous position; that each of said places was accessible to the public; and that each of said notices so posted at each of said places was posted so as to be easily visible to the public.

(d) That the copy of the notice of this hearing, posted by the County Clerk at the Courthouse door, as aforesaid, was posted on the 7th day of May, 1945, and that such notice was posted at said place so as to be easily visible to the public; and

(e) That the said County Clerk also caused said notice of this hearing to be published in the Lamb County Leader, which is a newspaper of general circulation in the said County, and which said notice was published in said newspaper on the 10th day of May, 1945, which date was at least five days prior to the hearing set for the consideration of such petition; it appearing to the Court from the evidence submitted herein that no newspaper of general circulation is published in the said Road District Number 4, of Lamb County, Texas.

AND WHEREAS, on this the 19th day of May, 1945, and being the date fixed for hearing said petition, the same came on to be heard in due and regular order; and

WHEREAS, it appearing to the Court at this hearing that the following roads are to be constructed and improved with the money to be received from the sale of such bonds, if voted; that is to say:

A road beginning at the Northeast Corner of Labor No. 22, in League No. 222, of the Collingsworth County School Land; thence south to a point of intersection of the east line of Labor No. 19, in League No. 223, of the Collingsworth County School Land and the extension of North Main Street of the city of Sudan, Texas; thence southwest along North Main Street of the city of Sudan, Texas, across railroad to State Highway No. 84.

A road beginning at the Southwest Corner of Labor No. 20, in League No. 224, of the Collingsworth County School Land; thence due north to State Highway No. 84.

A road beginning at the Northwest Corner of Labor No. 15, in League No. 222, of the Collingsworth County School Land; thence South along the west lines of Labors Nos. 15, 16 and 25, in League No. 222, of the Collingsworth County School Land; and continuing South along the west lines of Labors Nos. 5 and 6, in League No. 223, of the Collingsworth County School Land, to a point intersecting State Highway No. 84.

Said roads being in all a distance of approximately thirty-five (35) miles.

AND NOW, THEREFORE, on this the 19th day of May, 1945, the Commissioners' Court of Lamb County, Texas, by reason of investigations carefully made, and from all facts found and evidence submitted at this hearing, finds, AND IT IS THE ORDER AND JUDGMENT OF THIS COURT:

(1) That the petition for said bond election is signed by more than fifty (50) of the resident qualified property taxing voters of ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, and who had duly rendered their property for taxation.

(2) That due notice of the hearing had on such petition has been issued, made and given in the time and form and manner required by law.

(3) That the proposed improvements will be for the benefit of all taxable property situated within the boundaries of said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS.

IT IS, THEREFORE, FURTHER CONSIDERED AND FOUND AND ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election shall be, and it hereby ordered to be held within ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, on the 20th day of June, 1945, and which date is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of said Road District Number 4, shall be issued in the principal sum of TWO HUNDRED FORTY-EIGHT THOUSAND (\$248,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding Four Per Centum (4%) per annum, and are to be issued in such denomination and payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court, but not exceeding twenty-five (25) years from the date thereof; and that at such election there shall also be submitted to the qualified property taxing voters of the said Road District Number 4, the question as to whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within the said Road District Number 4, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption or payment thereof at maturity."

The roads to be constructed and maintained with the proceeds of the sale of said bonds are hereinabove described.

II. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that said election shall be held under the provisions of the laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapter 16, of the General Laws of the State of Texas, passed by the Thirty-ninth Legislature, at its First Called Session in 1926.

III. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that all persons who are legally qualified voters of this State, and of this County, and who are resident property taxing voters in ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4 OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

And, those opposed, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD

VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

IV. The polling places and the Presiding Officers of said election shall be, respectively, as follows:

At the City Hall in the City of Sudan, in Lamb County, Texas; and Clyde W. Robertson, Presiding Judge, and W. W. Carpenter and W. E. Love, assistants.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, that the manner of holding such election and canvassing and making returns thereof, shall be governed by the General Laws of this State, when not in conflict with the provisions of Chapter 16, of the General Laws of the Thirty-ninth Legislature, at its Called Session in 1926.

VI. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in the LAMB COUNTY LEADER, a newspaper published in Lamb County, Texas, for three successive weeks before the date of the said election, and, in addition thereto, there shall be posted other copies of this order at three public places in said ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4, and also at the door of the County Court House, in the City of Olton, Texas, and all of which notices shall be posted for three successive weeks prior to said election.

The County Clerk is hereby authorized, ordered and directed to post and publish notices of said election as hereinabove directed, and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officers and received by this Court. The duties herein imposed upon the Clerk may be performed by said Clerk or by Deputy, as provided by law for other similar duties.

The above order having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner Sam Cearley and seconded by Commissioner E. C. Ross that it be passed. Whereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted "AYE": Commissioners Hysinger, Cearley, Ross and Yarbrough; and the following voted "NO": None.

S. J. R. No. 8 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Article 5, Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be

elected and qualified."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members";

and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

H. J. R. No. 11 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting, and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

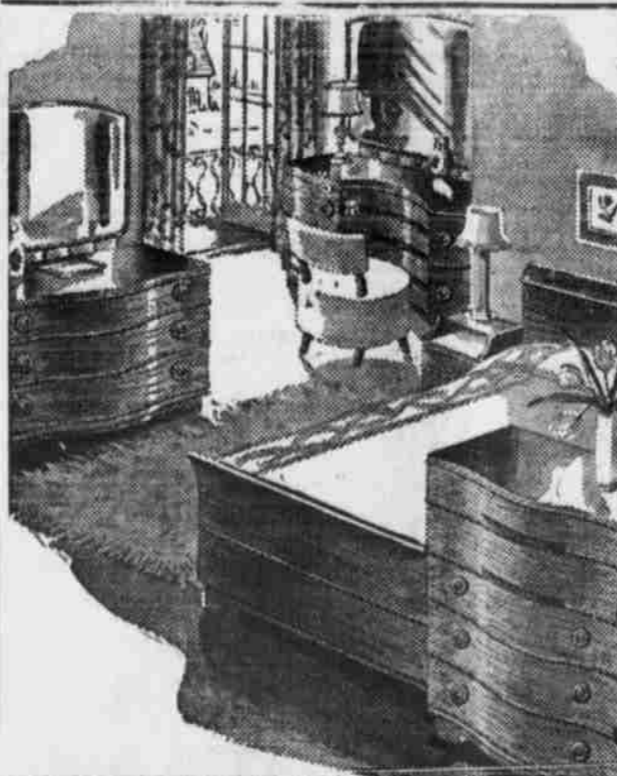

CIVILIANS AT WAR
The Government needs and asks its citizens in the 181st week of the war against Japan to:

1. Enlist your dog for scout duty with Pacific Combat troops. The army needs 500 large dogs immediately and 16000 before August. Write the quartermaster general, at Washington, D. C.

2. Plan to can your surplus early vegetables and fruits. Present high blue point values indicate how necessary home-canned foods will be next year.

3. Insulate your hose now to keep it cool during summer, as well as to save fuel which will continue to be scarce next winter.

REMINDERS
Meats, Fats — Red Stamps Y5, Z5, and A2 through D2 good until June 2. Red stamps E2 through J2 good until June 30. Red stamps K2 through P2 good until July 31.

Processed Foods — Blue stamps H 2 through M2 good until June 2. Blue stamps N2 through S2 good until June 30. Blue stamps T2 through X2 good until July 31. Blue stamps Y2, Z2, A1, B1, C1 good until August 31.

Sugar Stamps — 35 good until June 2. Stamp 36 good until August 31.

Fuel Oil — Period 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 coupons, good for ten gallons per unit, continue valid throughout the country for the rest of the heating year.

Shoes — Airplane Stamps Nos. 1, 2, 3, in book three continue valid indefinitely.

FOODS IN PLENTIFUL SUPPLY DURING JUNE LISTED

Carrots, cabbage, potatoes, tomatoes and onions are expected to be in good supply throughout the greater

part of the United States during June, the war food administration says. Also readily available will be dry-mix soups, dry edible peas, wheat flour and bread, macaroni, spaghetti, noodles, oatmeal, and soya flour, grit continue in good supply. Due to military demands or transportation problems, some temporary local shortages may occur even in these plentiful foods. It is expected that an abundance of Georgia and Carolina peaches will be found in most eastern and mid-western markets after June, and that substantial supplies of locally produced fresh vegetables will be available in all of the leading markets.

Specific limits have been set on the hours of labor that automobile repair establishments may charge for in computing prices for 56 common passenger car repair jobs, the office of price administration announced. This action, effective June 14, 1945, is taken to check a practice in some repair shops of charging customers for more hours of labor than were actually required to do the particular repair job. The repair jobs covered range all the way from a minor brake adjustment to the complicated job of installing the crank shaft bearings. All shops are required to supply sales slips or receipts to customers for any of the 56 listed operations, regardless of whether or not requested by the customer. The slip or receipt must describe briefly the service, cite its number in the new regulation, the shop's hourly rate, the number of hours charged for, the prices charged for parts and material and the total charge. Automobile repair services not among the 56 listed continue to be priced as formerly under the services regulation.

MORE WAR PRISONERS TO BE USED IN AGRICULTURE

The war food administration announced that it has been assured by the war department that increased numbers of prisoners of war will be available this year for agricultural work. The WFA office of labor reported that a peak total of 85,000 war prisoners will be used in agricultural work in the period through July as agricultural laborers. Last year approximately 65,000 prisoners of war were available. The men will be assigned through the nine service command areas of the Army. The type of farm work they engage in will be determined by the directors of state extension services. The WFA will request an even larger number of POW's for farm work in the peak of the fall harvesting season.

CLOCKS NOT LIKELY SOON

Limitation Order L-275, issued April 14, 1944, to control production and distribution of spring-driven and electric alarm clocks, has been revoked to permit manufacturers to increase production whenever the large military contracts they now hold are reduced and materials and skilled labor become available, WPB announced. It said, however, that it foresaw no sharp increase in the number of alarm clocks available to civilians in the immediate future. Production currently is at about one-third of the prewar rate, estimated at 12,500,000 alarm clocks per year.

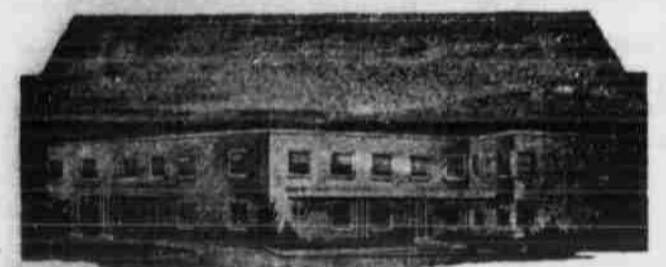

The end of the war in Europe was no surprise to Pfc. Clay Melver of Winters, Texas. In a long-range prediction, he hit V-E Day right on the nose!

In March of 1943, the Texan made his prediction, and wrote it in a book in a London service club. More than 2,000 other soldiers also wrote their prediction, but Melver was the only one to ring the bell.

And another Texan has predicted that the war with the Japs will not end until the fall 1946. He is a man who knows a lot about the Nips, too, for he spent three years in a Philippine prison camp before being freed after the American liberation of Luzon.

Capt. Jerry Steward, USNR, whose home is Fairfield, Texas, also holds the distinction of being one of the most decorated men in service holding the navy cross, purple heart with three gold stars, the army distinguished unit badge with oak leaf cluster, American defense service medal, Asiatic - Pacific campaign medal, Philippine Defense ribbon with star, Philippine liberation rib-

bon with star, naval reserve medal with star, the Mexican service medal the Victory medal and the navy good conduct ribbon with star.

He predicts that the Japs will fight to the last soldier and last civilian, and does not expect final victory before the fall of 1946.

News that the little yellow men now are bombing the United States with balloon-carried bombs was another recent reminder that we still have a long hard war to fight in the Pacific. The Nips are overlooking nothing in their vicious fight. Their tenacity and fanaticism should be a warning to all Americans . . . for only by matching the efforts of the enemy can we hope for speedy victor.

This means all-out support of all home-front programs. It means buying more war bonds. It means generous contributions to the National war fund and spirited support of local war chest drives by thousands of volunteer workers.

Such solid efforts on the home-front can help shorten the war and save lives of American boys abroad. See your county war chest chairman now, and volunteer to help with the October campaign "For Our Own Allies."

And stop for a moment to honor the memory of a great brave Texan . . . Truman Kimbro of Madisonville . . . who died in the battle of the Bulge so that other Americans might live.

Kimbro, a quiet farm lad, braved enemy fire to plant mines that would stop the German advance. Despite wounds, he continued at the job and held up Nazi tanks long enough to allow an important American evacuation and save the lives of hundreds of his buddies.

His bravery was recognized this week when the nation's highest medal . . . the Congressional medal of honor . . . was presented to his mother, Mrs. Marjorie Kimbro, who now lives in Houston.

Texans at home aren't called on to make the supreme sacrifice, as Kimbro did. But they can honor his memory and also help save American lives by supporting the National War

Fund, which serves all American service men on fronts around the world.

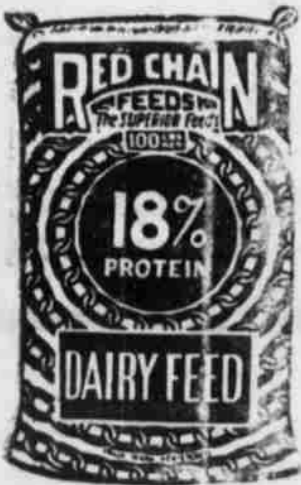

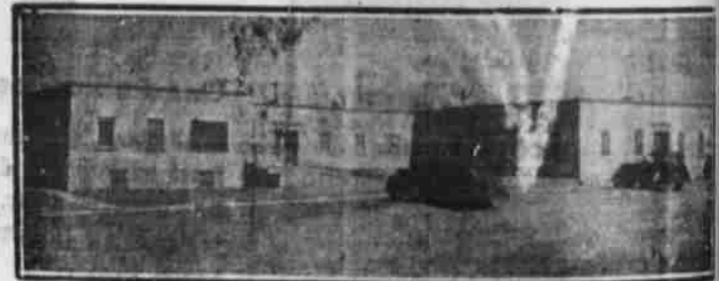

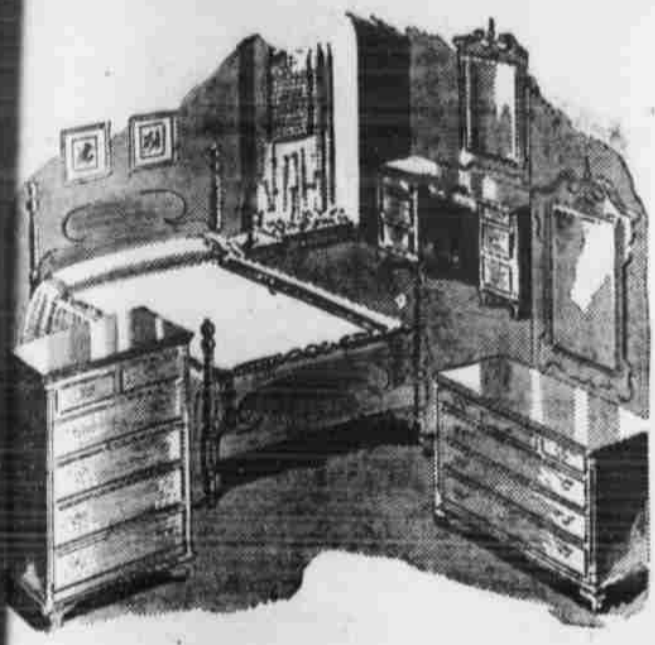

The Water Situation

No doubt almost every water consumer in Littlefield is familiar with the fact that the water supply is very limited, and unless we all work together during the hot dry weather that we are having this condition can become very serious. There is plenty of water for necessary household and business uses, but very little for irrigation and watering gardens, lawns, etc. Two additional wells have been completed but due to slow deliveries of necessary equipment for connecting them with the water works system they will not be in service for another thirty days. In the meantime every water user is urged to be as economical as possible in the use of water, in order that the available supply may be a dequate for necessary home and business purposes.

When the water supply is getting low FIVE or SIX short blasts will be blown on the fire siren and when this happens every water consumer is urged to discontinue use of water for yards and gardens for at least twenty four hours. If we will all co-operate in this way there will be plenty of water for all essential purposes, and it will not be necessary for the City Commission to pass and enforce ordinances regulating the use of water.

O. Dooley of Anton, uncle of the serviceman, to friends here.

Dooley was taken a German prisoner soon after he arrived overseas.

Farm-To-Market Roads

A \$60,000,000 postwar construction and maintenance program for 7,205 miles of farm-to-market roads which will not require counties to furnish any funds has been announced by the Texas Highway Department.

Half of the funds will be from current operating income of the Highway Department, while the Federal Government will match the State's portion. The program is for three years immediately following end of the war.

Approval of the plan to aid Texas' agricultural interest means that the State will surface and maintain 5,830 miles of farm road. Presently, counties are having to pay upkeep on these roads. Also, the new program includes maintenance of an additional 1,375 miles of surfaced farm roads which the State previously constructed and now maintains.

"By transferring this tremendous financial burden from the county governments to the state government, counties will be able to concentrate their local funds on roads remaining under county control," the commission said. "This should enable counties to make tremendous strides in improving other farm roads."

The commission said that while the present program includes a relatively small portion of the total mileage of farm-to-market roads in the state, the plan is the maximum for which the state could obligate itself for three years immediately after the war on the basis of estimated receipts.

After the three-year period, more funds are received from State sources and the Federal government, it is possible that additional feeder or farm to market roads may be taken over by

the State and new ones constructed, the commission explained.

Though small in comparison with the total farm-to-market road mileage in Texas, the commission pointed out that the 7,205 miles assumed in the new program will benefit the most dense agricultural areas.

Selection of these 7,205 miles was made after detailed study and research of the entire 170,000 miles of county roads in the state.

Of the 170,000 miles, only approximately 26,000 have a traffic load of 100 motor vehicles a day. This number is the necessary minimum research has determined, to justify surfacing a road, based upon retiring the cost of construction and maintenance over a 15-year period.

By its action, the Texas commission has assumed obligation of 29 percent of the 26,000 miles of the principal farm roads. Surveys also have determined that after a road is surfaced the traffic count on it practically doubles.

How agricultural interests and other interests will benefit from the expanded farm-to-market road program is shown by research and by commission engineers. According to accurate records kept on average automobiles which traveled more than 3,000,000 miles, the operating cost per vehicle on dirt roads was 7.8 cents per mile. On paved road the cost was 3.8 cents per mile.

For these days of gasoline rationing the research project also proved that the average automobile gets two miles less per gallon of gasoline on unpaved road than on paved road.

WHIRLWIND BREAKS PLATE GLASS IN EUBANKS WINDOW

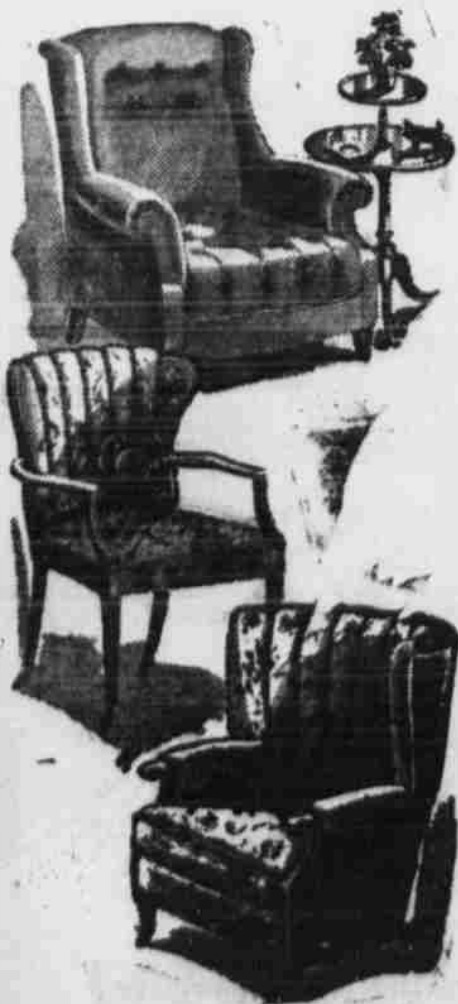
A strange whirlwind Friday about noon caused the front screen door of Eubanks Tire & Supply to slam against and break the front plate

ENDING OF TIRE RECORDS
 The new requirements will help OPA enforcement agents uncover illegal transfers of tires, the agency said. Recently, OPA has experienced great difficulty in obtaining records which show the number of tires and replacement certificates some dealers have on hand because it has been forced to depend upon dealers inventories as of December 1, 1941. In many cases, these records are no longer available.
 The new record-keeping requirements are designed to limit book-keeping to the minimum necessary to assure proper compliance, OPA said.
 The new bookkeeping and inventory forms, together with detailed instructions on their preparation will be mailed soon to all tire dealers, copies will be supplied tire manufacturers, dealers association, and

dealers are required as of June 1, 1945, to maintain records and to take a momentary to establish account-keeping for tire and tire certificates. In addition, the recent cancellation of tire certificate date beginning December 1, 1944, and a requirement that tire manufacturers certify certificates monthly to OPA action centers for screening the action completes a comprehensive program to stop illegal

right. He also took me in to see the main chief of the quailings, criminals, which was in another building surrounded with armed guards. He took me right up in front of him, and told me of the crime he had done. They really handle these prisoners rough, but they deserve it. Oh, yes, honey, I really did feel important. All the people there wanted my autograph. I think I signed my name three hundred times. Today's Stars and Stripes has an item in it about the Danish Capitol. I will send it to you. I was there at the time.

They have lifted the blackout of the censorship of our mail, so I'll tell you of a few things of the past. Well, it was the sad day of June 30, 1943, when I left my POE, which was Camp Shanks, N. Y. We got on the Queen Elizabeth in N. Y. Harbor, and the next morning we set sail, not knowing where we were going to, unescorted we were off to sea. The fourth night out the rumor was that there were subs in our path ahead and we detoured for some time, but nothing happened. On July 6th, about 4 p. m. we anchored in the Firth of Clyde, near Glasgow, Scotland, Boy, were we proud to see land once again. On the 7th we went to Stone, England, to the replacement center. I was there for a week and was sent down to our airbase near Staines, Middlesex. It was a swell field in the Windsor Park, an it was only four miles to the Windsor Castle. I stayed

at that place all the time until I came to France. Oh, yes, you used to ask me all the time about the Robot buss bomb. Well we were near enough to London to get every alert that was sounded and we had our part of the bomb's asso.

We never did get too close a hit, but many a time we had the hell jolted out of us by a near miss. Oh, yes, the first time I went to see Buck; after we spent the first part of the night drinking beer and Scotch, we went back to his room and went to bed. Before we went to sleep we lay down and counted the bombs that were falling near us which were eight of them in ten minutes time. Brother, take it from me you have to be drunk to do that—ha.

For the first year in England we had a lot of air raids. At one time we were raided for twelve nights

straight, but the air raids never did bother me very much. It was a lot of fun to watch the ack ack guns go blazing away at them.

I am still crew chief an engineer. I do quite a bit of flying at times, which I like very much to do. I have been on flying status for a year now. You get fifty percent more for flying, so that is how I get the dough to send home. You must have thought that I was a very lucky gambler, ha—

Well, dear, it is getting rather late so I must stop this and go to bed for I have to work tomorrow, even though it is Sunday. Just little things like that makes me want to be a civilian again. Tell all the folks "Hello" for me.

Goodnight dear all my love and kisses for you.

Love forever, Fred"

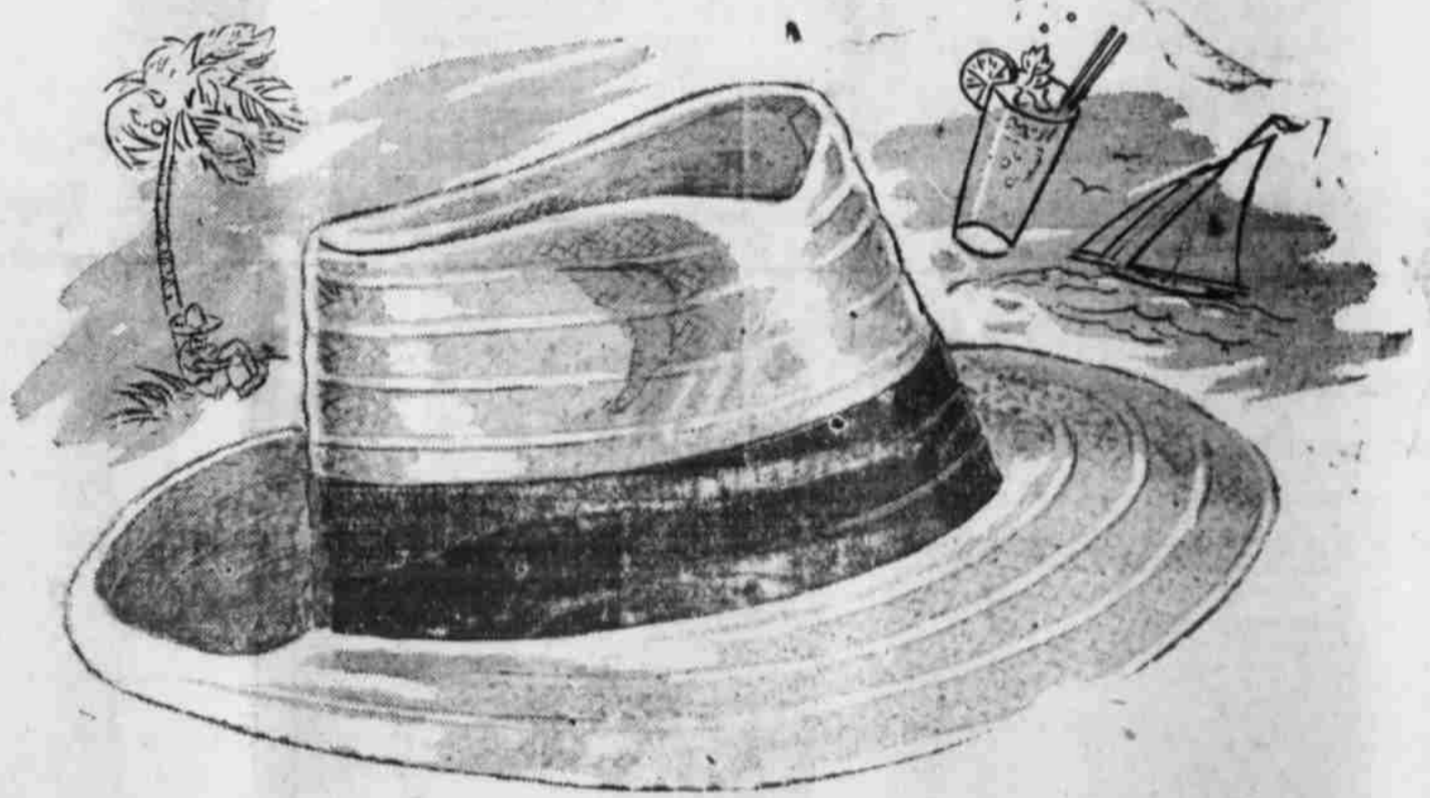
