Students, Faculty Getting Settled In New Building

Littlefield high school students, faculty and equipment moved into and occupied the beautiful new high school building over the weekend, and classes were held in the new building starting last Monday morning.

After months of vexatious de- lays, Mancil Hall, school board president, announced Friday after- noon, that agreement on some legal and technical issues had been reached with the contractors, the Gildstrap Construction Company, of Lubbock, which for the past several weeks had delayed permis- sion to occupy the building, ac- cording to reports, with only minor finishing touches to be added.

Two or three meetings were held in the past few weeks, and agree- ment was finally reached Friday, an agreement which Mr. Hall in- timated was entirely satisfactory to the board. "The settlement didn't cost us a cent," said Mr. Hall, and "we feel that we have been very fortunate in the contractor's prices paid, and that as a result "the fine new cafeteria didn't cost the school district a cent."

To finance the new building, which adjoins three other school buildings on the campus, \$500,000 in bonds was voted in the fall of 1949, and contracts were let on January 24, 1950. He pointed out that this is the first time in the history of the country that the government has renounced provisions of a treaty. When Texas entered the Union it was a provision of the treaty that it should retain title to those lands. It is Daniel's opinion that Congress will vote to restore the lands to Texas because Congress- men are afraid that the govern- ment, which now owns 24 percent of the land in the continental United States, may take over lands and resources in all states of the Union.

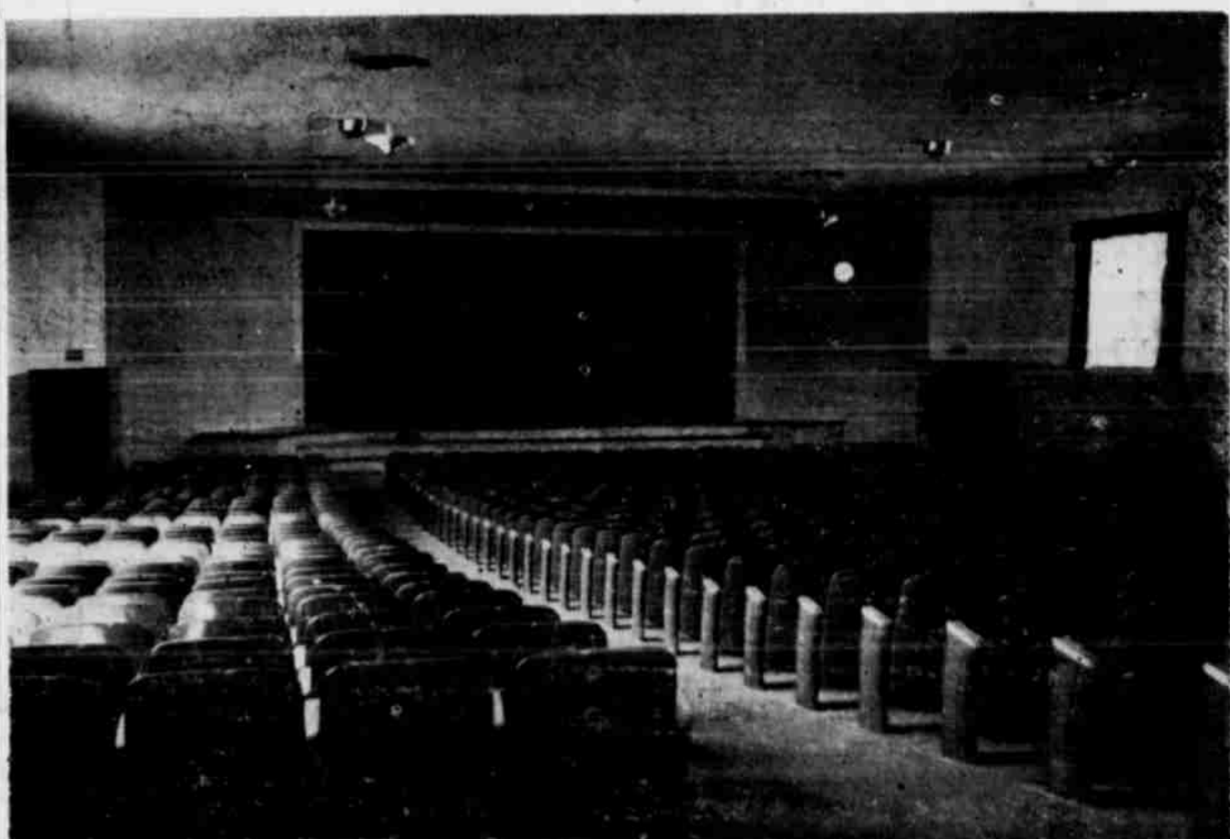

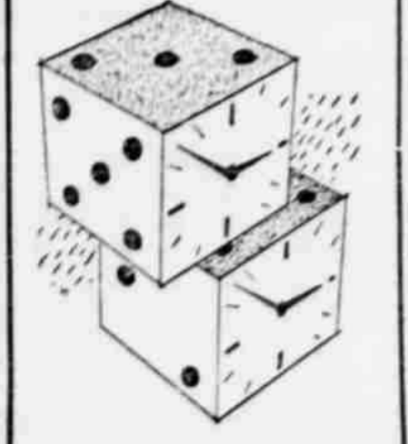

In addition to the building contract, several other contracts were let. The following held and completed contracts on the new building.

Gilstrap Construction Co., of Lubbock, base bid \$324,346.87. Heating—Liles Sheet Metal Works of Slaton, \$29,509. Plumbing—Ragsdale Plumbing Co., of Pampa, \$21,795. Electrical—Nelson Electrical Co., Lubbock, \$21,668. Total of the four contracts let Tuesday, January 24, 1950, \$388,318.87.

Various reasons for the delay in completion were given, but two which predominated were shortages of steel, due to the defense effort, and labor difficulties encountered.

When the contract was let, it was hoped, or thought possible that the building could be completed in time for the opening of the school term in September 1950. When this was proven to be impossible, the tentative date was set for mid-term of that year, and as construction still moved slowly, the date was again advanced to September of 1951. Even this date proved entirely too optimistic, and school opened under overcrowded conditions this fall, and under those overcrowded conditions has operated for the past six weeks.

School officials are planning a formal opening and dedication for the new school, as soon as everything is in place and order—"probably will be held during National Education Week, the second week in November," said Supt. Joe Hutchinson.

In the meantime, scores of local folks have and are visiting the new building, and are emphatic and loud in their praise of the buildings, and their beauty—feel that only a higher grade of education can result from study under such ideal physical plant conditions.

The new building, designed by architects Atkinson and Atchison, Lubbock, we believe warrants their praise.

In addition to the main building, there is also a separate cafeteria building, and also a separate vocational ag buildings—the latter two standing in the angular shape of the "L" shaped main building.

The main building contains a total of 13 class rooms, a 1,000 seat gymnasium, 1,000 seat auditorium, library, book room, storage rooms, administrative offices, band hall, lockers in halls, four rest rooms, teachers lounge, public address system inter-connecting into all rooms, with facilities to tune in outside programs or school programs within the building.

A breakdown of the building, in word descriptive form follows: The library is finished in grey, with walls on two sides of glass for better lighting; bookshelves are generously provided, with library tables of natural oak finish. An office is provided for the librarian, Mrs. Floyd Blackwell.

The auditorium, seating 1,000, is finished with natural brick walls; seats are of steel in robin egg blue, with red fabric upholstery; windows are draped with red velvet; red velvet drapes also are employed on the stage and at the exits; aisles are sound-proofed floor tile. Scenery has been provided, and lighting effects and acoustics are in keeping with modern trends.

The Gymnasium, emphasizes a superb lighting system; seating is at either side capable of accommodating 1,000; modern clock and electrical scoreboard are installed. Equipment is provided for all indoor sports, and dressing rooms, showers, and other conveniences are provided. Blower type heating and cooling equipment is provided.

Description of the cafeteria is omitted, as it has been in use since the opening of school this year.

The band hall, which will be the practice home of the 80-piece high school band, as well as the beginners band, has been aptly arranged, and has been sound-proofed, so as to least disturb other classes, during practice.

Nine of the thirteen class rooms, distributed over the two floors are specially equipped. These include: three rooms allocated to home making; these include a kitchen where food preparation is taught, a sewing room, and a connecting dining room. The equipment in-

cludes 4 gas stoves with broilers, 1 electric range, refrigerator, washing machine, double sinks, many numerous small equipment, tables, machines (to be filing cabinets, etc. room has not yet been furnished.

The two science rooms laboratory with five positions, with gas jets, cold water, cabinet space necessary equipment, room is for class work.

The journalism room to handle the "Star" publication and also the annual preparation. Being revived in the building.

The two commercial equipped for teaching writing, shorthand, keeping.

The woodworking the arts and crafts are well equipped.

The specially equipped Vocational AE room, elements the old AE on the campus, which will be used, and the W. W. Hall, is the FFA and Vocational Ag with much new equipment, A new Ford truck in the new equipment, ed with the lettering Chapter FFA, Vocational and Hall Motor Company.

Other rooms, not described include: a room of mathematics, 2 rooms for English, and a study hall.
