

The auditorium, seating 1,000, is finished with natural brick walls; seats are of steel in robin egg blue, with red fabric upholstering: windows are draped with red velvet; red velvet drapes also are employed on the stage and at the exits; aisles are sound-proofed floor tile. Scenery has been provided, and lighting effects and acoustics are in keeping with modern trends.

The Gymnasium, emphasizes a superb lighting system; seating is at either side capable of accomodating 1,000; modern clock and electrical scoreboard are installed.
