Spring Round-Up Planned At

Dillman Elementary

Friday, May 11, Dillman Elementary will pre-register students who are eligible for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten for the 1990-91 school year. Registration will take place in the Dillman Gym from 8 a.m.- 4

To be eligible for kindergarten, children must be five years old by September 1, 1990. To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be four years old by September 1, 1990 and must also meet one of the following requirements:

(1) have limited knowledge of and comprehension of the English language, or (2) are from a family who is eligible to receive free or reduced price lunches.

Pre-kindergarten students who are already attending school do not need to register for kindergarten.

Muleshoe State Bank Continuing Program

For the past several years, the Muleshoe State Bank has been cooperating with Muleshoe High School in a supplementary education program designed to meet a need in the curriculum of high schools throughout the United States. The program features an updated teaching method utilizing an audio-visual introductory approach, and a learn-by-doing workbook that each student retains after classroom study. Gail Gladden, Cochran County Extension Agent, will be here to critique the presentations. Awards for County Contest are presented at the Achievement banquet held each


Everyone is reminded that applications for the Bailey County 4-H scholarship are due in the Extension office by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, May 15.

Texas Senate Week In Review

The focus of public school finance reform shifts this week (April 16-20) to a 10-member joint panel charged with resolving the differences between the \$1.3 billion Senate bill and the \$500 million House measure.

The conference committee, composed of five Senate members and five House members, began negotiations last week after the Senate declined to accept the more-modest spending plan passed by the House last Monday.

Committee work was to resume Monday (April 16) and continue through much of the week. Meanwhile, the House Appropriations Committee will continue this week to scour the state budget for funds that can be

shifted to finance the compromise school spending plan.

A combination of fee increases and fund shuffling is expected to emerge as the most workable plan for financing the measure although a tax bill has not been ruled out. Lawmakers are reluctant to propose a tax bill, however, in view of Gov. Bill Clements' opposition to raising taxes for schools.

The Legislature is operating under a May 1 Supreme Court deadline to equalize funding between rich and poor school districts or face a cutoff of education dollars.

The court was asked last week by legislators to extend the deadline to August 1 to prevent the possible school closings, but by week's end, no response to that request had been received.

Significant differences separate the two proposed school funding bills. The cost of the House bill increased from \$450 million to just over \$500 million due to amendments added when

Designate 'Contractors'

Withholding income taxes for agricultural employees is mandatory, but farmers and ranchers should be cautious before they claim their workers as "independent contractors," according to Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

If producers do claim farm or ranch laborers as "independent contractors," the IRS could try to reclassify them as "employees" and charge the producer for unpaid employment taxes. Thus, it is useful to know the criteria the IRS uses to make the distinction between "employee" and "independent contractor."

Hayenga offers several tests that are used to tell if a farmer or rancher is an employer. If the farmer/rancher instructs the worker when, where and how the work is to be performed, or trains the worker for the job, then the producer is probably an employer.

Also, if the producer pays the worker by the hour, week or and ask to discuss a situation as month, and the worker cannot compared to Revenue Ruling delegate tasks or hire others to 87-41 and Circular 530.

do the work, then the worker is considered an employee.

If the worker is furnished equipment or tools, is employed full time and doesn't work for others, the worker is an employee.

But if the employer has the right to control only the result of the work, not the way the work is done, and the worker is free to take jobs from other businesses, then the worker is probably an independent contractor.

If workers do not meet the criteria to show they are independents, they may still be classified as independent contractors if it can be demonstrated that it is a long-standing custom within a particular industry to hire independent contractors.

If the situation involving workers is still questionable, Hayenga suggests that producers should seek the help of a competent tax lawyer or certified public accountant (CPA) the bill passed last week.

The Senate bill, calling for \$1.3 billion in 1990-91 spending, establishes specific goals for public education, student achievement and performance, while the House measure leaves that responsibility with the State Board of Education.

The House bill calls for the appointment by the Governor of the commissioner of education. The Senate version would leave the commissioner's appointment to the state board. Both versions would give more authority to the commissioner, however.

The Senate bill would make it state policy to include programs for disadvantaged three-yearolds, while the House measure leaves that provision as an optional authority for the state

The Senate bill also allots \$9 million to establish an alcohol and drug abuse intervention program at each public school. The House bill does not address that

AUSTIN - The eyes of Texas, particularly the innocent pupils in public schools, focused on the Capitol this week where Republican Gov. Bill Clements is engaged in a chin-to-chin faceoff with majority Democrats on the Texas Supreme Court.

Will schoolchildren be allowed to finish the few days left in the school year, or will they be unnecessary hostages of Texas political power players?

Clements' vow to veto a new sales tax and school finance plan ran smack afoul of Democrats on the High Court, who warned public schools would close this week.

Justice Oscar Mauzy, a former state senator who chaired many education reforms, said the Legislature had "run out of soap" and that school fundings would stop Tuesday. No extensions.

Other Strategies

If Mauzy and Clements were poised in the street like two gunfighters last week, several strategies to avoid the fight hung in the balance:

The House held out slim hope of mustering the two-thirds needed to override the veto.

■ The Senate was to consider a House-approved plan to allow prepayment of state funds to school districts for the May and summer months. Slim hope here, too.

Those options failing, State District Judge Scott McCown could grant an extension before the issue reached the Supreme Court.

Attorney General Jim Mattox' office would seek to stop schools from closing.

■ The Legislature was set to convene immediately in another special session to equalize school

Meanwhile, the poor school districts' coalition was expected to appeal any extension to the Supreme Court, where Mauzy

Judicial Elections

Ironically, the Mauzy-Clements clash over school finance will likely be replayed when the Legislature attempts court-ordered reform of the Texas system for selecting judges.

Clements is an ardent foe of federal judges who force state legislatures to spend great sums of tax dollars, which results in new

Clements seeks a plan whereby Texas judges would first be appointed from a list compiled by top jurists and then seek additional terms at the ballot box.

Unabashed Liberal

Mauzy, by the way, is running for chief justice against Republican Tom Phillips, who was first appointed by Clements.

In the Senate, Mauzy was an unabashed liberal who shirked not from a fight.

Today, as he runs for election by virtually promising to close public schools some two weeks before semester's end, his lion heart has not deserted him, though some wonder if his reason has.

"I have every reason to believe lying.

the trial court (McCown) will handle it in an expeditious way," Mauzy said, but he noted an extension could be appealed to the * Supreme Court.

There, six Democrats outnumber three Republicans.

Mauzy expected the Senate to derail the pre-payment bill and ripped Clements for lack of leadership.

"I can't believe the attorney general can go in there (Mc-Cown's courtroom) with a straight face and make that argument" (for extension).

In the face of his statements, what other conclusions can voters draw except that Mauzy wanted to close schools to force new taxes for public school revenues?





Chemical Waste Disposal Needs Care

Disposal of unused crop and livestock protection chemicals is often expensive and time con-

In addition to the expense incurred in the purchase of product that is not used, there are costs associated with transportation to a disposal site and disposal. Disposal at an authorized site includes the completion of a manifest, a permanent record of the disposal. Estimates of the cost of disposal range into the hundreds of dollars for a 5-gallon container of liquid product.

Storing unused crop and livestock protection chemicals on the farm for extended periods of time may create problems. A product may deteriorate over time, leading to poor results when the product is used later. A product may become obsolete as a result of regulatory actions, or market- or pest-related developments. Containers may deteriorate and leak, leading to such severe consequences as illness and injury.

Contamination of water, soil, the storage area and livestock feeds or commodities also may result. Time and effort will be required to clean up the spilled material.

Clearly it makes good sense economically and environmentally to avoid the accumulation of unused crop and livestock protection chemicals. Here are some suggestions for minimizing this problem:

· Carefully plan farm chemical needs to the extent possible, purchasing only the amount required for one growing season. Take the time to calculate exactly your anticipated chemical needs.

• Triple-rinse empty containers, returning the rinsate to the spray tank prior to completing the mixing and loading opera-

According to the National Agricultural Chemicals Association, an average of two to four ounces of product may be left in a container during normal emptying. If a product costs \$20 per gallon, four ounces left in a container has a value of 60 cents per gallon container.

It takes only a few minutes or less to properly rinse a container; with pressure rinsing it takes less than one minute. At that rate, your time is worth \$36 per hour for the time it takes to rinse the containers. Sixty dolproduct is wasted in 100 unrinsed 1-gallon containers. Product remaining in unrinsed containers represents a hazard and may cause environmental problems.

Estate Tax Needs Study

Texas farmers and ranchersinterested in avoiding high estate taxes can find help at seminars offered in May by the Texas Agricultural Extension

The two-day seminars are designed to help producers learn how to reduce taxable estates and learn new methods for passing their operation to the next generation without tax and administrative burdens.

"Of major importance is how every farm estate will be affected after the recent estate tax law changes," said Dr. Wayne Hayenga, Extension Service economist. "The best tax worst under the new law."

The locations and dates of the seminars are San Angelo, May 8-9; Waco, May 15-16; and Harlingen, May 22-23.

Each seminar will present estate planning devices in depth, including such topics as wills, by-pass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles.

Relating estate plans to income tax savings can be advantageous. In face, sometimes income tax savings can even be greater than estate tax savings for people with commercial farms and ranches.

One part of the program will discuss treating beneficiaries fairly. This segment could be most valuable in cases where not all heirs want to continue


