It's the Law In Texas

The season for returning Christmas gifts to stores for exchange is now upon us. Most business establishments are as cooperative as possible about their annual American pastime, but before getting into any arguments with a reluctant clerk or manager, better take a look at the legal situation involved. You may find that persuasion is more in order than demands for adjustment.

Department stores are under no legal obligation to take back a purchase and refund your money or deliver other goods in exchange just because you changed your mind. Most stores do make refunds and exchanges, but that is because it is their policy to do so—not because they are required to.

However, a promise to refund or exchange merchandise made by the store or salesman should be honored. Similarly, if a store misrepresents the quality of certain goods or if the goods are defective, you are justified in expecting a satisfactory adjustment. But you have no more legal right to expect a store to refund or exchange because you change your mind about a purchase than the store has to ask you to give back the goods that were sold to you because it didn't want to sell them after all.

Suppose you buy a coat in one store and find that another company has it on sale for five dollars less. Must the store where you bought it take back the coat and give you a refund, or refund the difference in price? The seller is under no obligation to refund the difference, any more than he could make you pay the

difference if he discovered that a competitor offered the same coat at a higher price than he had charged for it.

Much the same rules apply to the refund of deposits. Unless it is the policy of a store to refund deposits on articles, or at least apply the amount on the purchase of some other item, the buyer is obligated to go

through the terms of the contract, even though he has changed his mind about the purchase.

When one selects, orders, and deposits money on the purchase of an article, the store is under obligation to deliver the article in accordance with the terms of the sale. If the buyer refuses to accept the article or pay the remain-

der of the purchase price, the seller can take legal action against him, according to the terms of the contract.

The same principles apply to a trade-in allowance on used merchandise towards the purchase of a new article. Such a trade-in allowance is considered a deposit.

Farm Prices Remain Firm

Texas farm prices remained firm in November, halting a downturn which dropped average income 20 percent under the postwar record high, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

The November price index exactly equalled that of October and was 14 percent under the November, 1952, level. Prices for livestock and livestock products were up 3 percent; fruit, 4 percent; and oil-bearing crops 2 percent, offsetting declines in potatoes and sweet potatoes (11 percent) and truck crops (8 percent).

Now They Say Santa Claus Is A Yankee

NEW YORK (AP)—St. Nicholas and Knickerbocker sound as

though they had a lot in common. They do, too, as we are reminded at this season when Santa Claus comes climbing down Father Knickerbocker's chimneys. You have only to reread, for the fun of it if nothing more, Washington Irving's make-believe "Knickerbocker History of New York," and you will find a great deal about Santa, beginning at what is practically the

beginning of the country—the Battery. On the lower tip of the island of Manhattan, the Dutch settlers threw up earworks, and within them built a chapel to St. Nicholas. In the chapel, says Irving, putting the words in Knickerbocker's mouth, was originated the custom of hanging up the stockings at Christmas time. Right there was started in effect, all celebration going on right now in Father Knickerbocker's art gallery and concert hall and up and down his brightly lighted streets and avenues. A Cornell professor, Dr. Charles W. Jones, speaking at the New York Historical Society's Christmas festival, said: "Without Irving there would be no Santa Claus. The (Knickerbocker) History contains no less than 25 allusions to him—

Here is a description of Santa Claus bringing gifts to the children—parking his horse and wagon on the roof while he slides down the chimney." Other New Yorkers credited by Dr. Jones with helping to develop the Santa story are Clement C. Moore, author of "A Visit from St. Nicholas," and the cartoonist, Thomas Nast, who pictured Santa as the jolly fat figure we all know.

He's out in the streets now in his bright red costume ringing the bell for the Salvation Army. He's at store doors welcoming the children, or waiting inside at the tree for them. He is attending other events, at least in spirit. The huge tree is in place in Rockefeller Plaza.

Texas Manufacturing Heads See Good Business In 1954

In the eyes of chief executives of Texas' manufacturing firms, 1954 will be a good to fair year for Texas business, unless major problems facing all business upset the economic apperart. These findings were revealed in a poll of 60 directors of the Texas manufacturing Association and were announced by Ed C. Burrus of Houston, TMA's executive vice president.

Strong reassurance toward a favorable business outlook is the prevailing tone of the TMA year-end business survey, as executives were almost evenly divided in their opinions on the outlook for Texas business generally—29 for a good year to 31 for fair. They voted 28 "good," 29 "fair" and three "poor" for their own businesses. Executives feel that adjust-

ment to the buyers' market is the biggest problem confronting business, with labor and anti-business taxes second and third in the parade of problems. Any of the three could shake the economic balance because the line between profits and losses is being drawn more finely.

Business has to forget about the order-taking year and get down to selling, the executives pointed out, while any unreasonable demands from labor, because of economic reasons, might be met with opposition. "Labor must recognize that business cannot continue wage raises and benefits; labor must level off demands to match normal conditions," one executive said. The possibility of higher business taxes always is a serious problem and will continue to

be, another added. 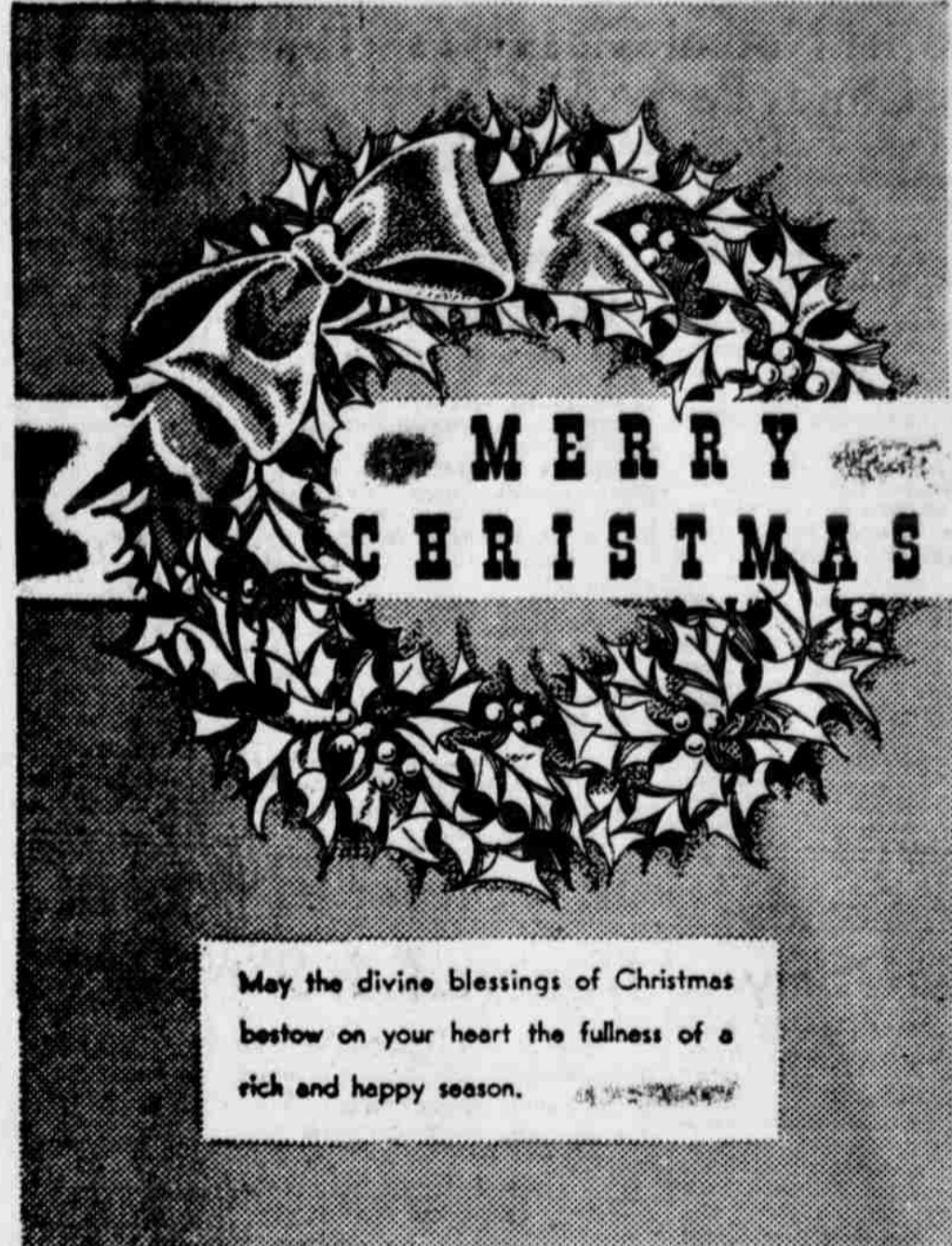

Benson Says Farm Problem Is 'Everybody's Problem'

This nation has a serious farm problem.

It does not affect agriculture alone. It is everybody's problem. Today your government has approximately \$5 billions of your money invested in farm commodities.

You own outright more than \$2.5 billions worth of wheat, corn, cotton and other surplus farm products. You have outstanding loans on agricultural commodities totaling about the same amount. This figure is growing daily.

You are paying more than \$14 millions each month just to store these surpluses. This bill is growing, too, as additional inventories are accumulated by your government.

The losses which your government sustained in disposing of just a small portion of your holdings during the first three months of this fiscal year amounted to \$47 millions.

But, you ask, don't we have a farm program designed to insure agricultural prosperity and pre-

vent the very situation we find ourselves in today?

The answer is that we are operating under the same farm program we had last year and for several previous years. Actually we have strengthened it in several important respects to permit farmers to take broader advantage of its provisions. Existing legislation binds us to a continuation of price supports at 90 per cent of parity on basic commodities through the 1954 crop year.

Nevertheless, farm prices have declined steadily from the record peaks established under the impetus of the Korean war in February, 1951. During the 12 months immediately before I became Secretary of Agriculture, the farm price parity ration slid from 113 to 95 per cent. Since February of this year, prices have been more stable than in 1952, averaging about 93 per cent of parity.

This story of declining farm income and mounting agricultural surpluses is the best evidence that our present program is not functioning effectively.

For more than a decade, our

farmers have been producing under pressure. To meet the wartime needs of ourselves and our allies, they turned out record amounts of food and fiber between 1941 and 1946. With the end of the second World War, they were asked to provide the commodities required in the rehabilitation of Europe and other sections of the earth. Then came the Korean War, with new and heavy demands for farm goods of all kinds.

Suddenly this situation was radically altered. World food production had been climbing since 1946. By 1952 this was exerting strong pressure in the market places. Our wheat exports dropped one-third in a single year, cotton by even more. Not only had importing nations increased their own production, but they found that they could supply their reduced needs at lower prices from exporting countries which had no farm price support programs.

Just as many American consumers have turned from butter to less expensive spreads, so have other nations sought cheaper wheat, cotton and other products.

We have learned through sometimes bitter experience that when the farmer is in trouble, there is likely to be trouble ahead for everybody. This year, net farm income is expected to be nearly \$1 billion less than it was in 1952.

A suburb of Montreal was troubled for a while by a Peeping Tom who rode to his peeping places on horseback, planted a ladder, and climbed aloft for his observations. Was he crazy?

Well, in Oklahoma, a county court had been depending on a psychiatrist for years for advice in sanity cases. But last March a jury found him mentally incompetent.

Still, men kept trying to stick sanely to their jobs. In Ohio a gasoline delivery truck driver delivered \$1,700 worth of fuel to a station—then discovered he had stuck his hose nozzle in a sewage drain by mistake.

In Missouri an eager workman sawed and sawed at what he thought was a tree root—until he cut through a cable and killed service on 1,000 telephones. In Oklahoma another eager workman sat on a tree limb and sawed it off.

Some men tried to blame their troubles on women as the battle of the sexes surged ahead. Police in Ashland, Ohio, broke open a car trunk when they heard cries for help. Out crawled a woman who said she had hidden there to check up on her husband.

In Perth Amboy, N. J., a 67-year-old fellow was standing on a corner when a beautiful woman stopped and asked directions. Suddenly she began hugging and kissing him. "I was so excited and she was so nice," he sighed later—until he discovered his wallet and \$450 were missing.

Various couples were divorced for various reasons, including: a husband who would buy

only ham, a husband who insisted on giving his wife weekly intelligence tests, a husband who tied his wife in the cellar and poured water over her to "cool her off."

Then there was the wife who insisted on taking her first husband along whenever her second husband took her out to dinner. The second husband won a divorce, complaining he always got stuck with the check.

It was a great year for the young in spirit—of all ages. A

man in Lyons, N. J., who was warned of a weak lung in 1861, celebrated his 104th birthday. In Laingsburg, Mich., a man warned of a weak heart 50 years ago celebrated his 100th birthday.

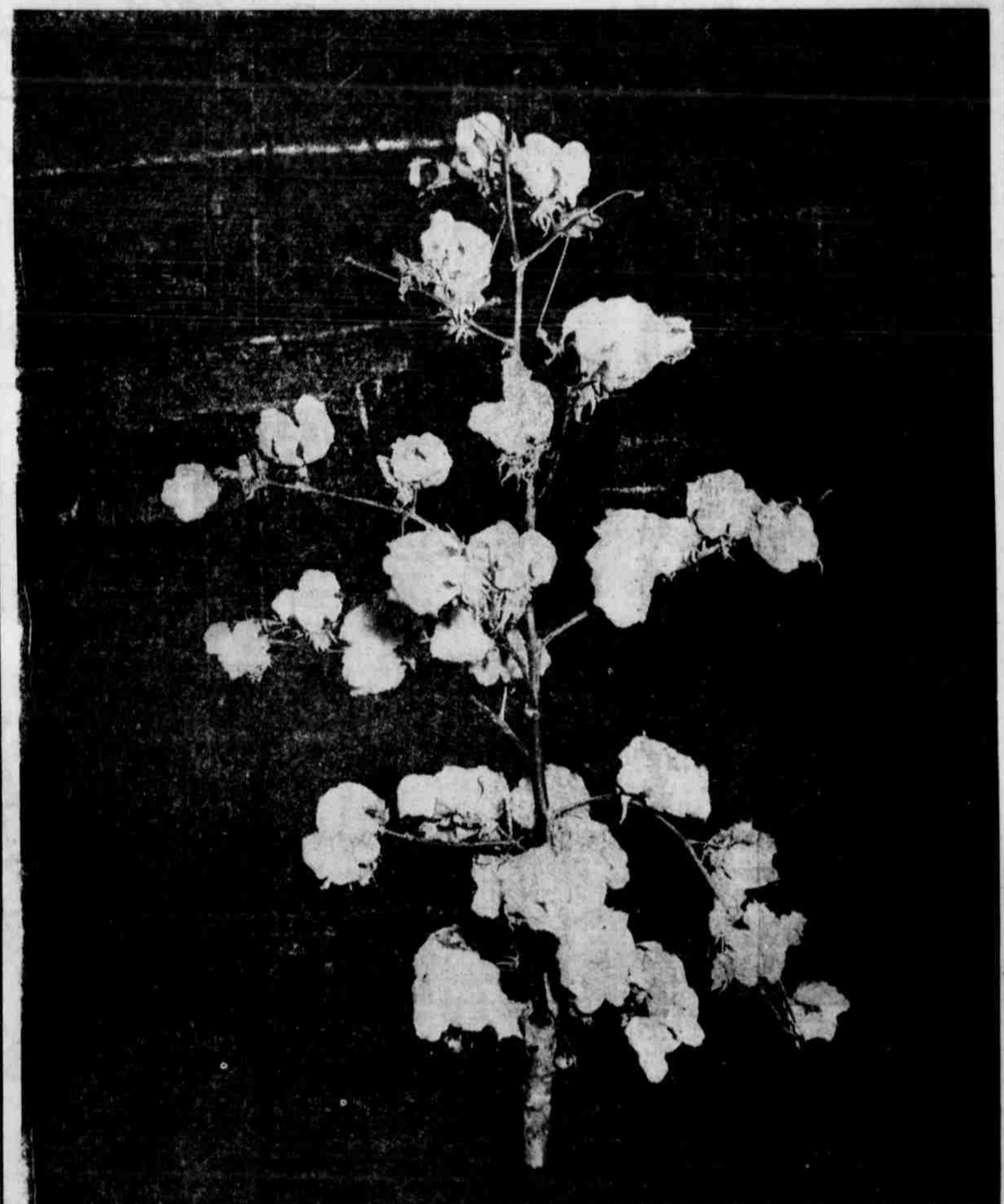
In the general mood of exhilaration people picked up

Questions And Answers

Q—I am a woman veteran, and I'm eligible for training under the Korean GI Bill. Mal I count my husband as a dependent, for purposes of the monthly GI allowances, even though he's supporting me?

A—The husband of a woman veteran-trainee may be classed as a dependent, for GI allowance purposes, only if he is in fact dependent upon her.

Q—I am a Korean veteran, and I'm still under 21 years of age. Would it be possible for me to get a GI business loan if I meet all the qualifications of the law, even though I'm under age?

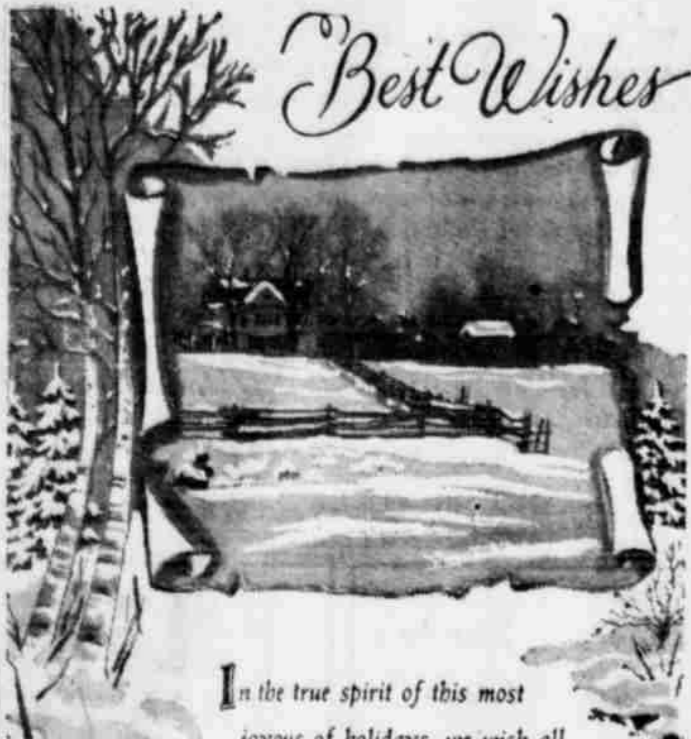
A—Yes, it would be possible, provided the loan is valid under your state's laws governing

such transactions by me with a service-connected disability. Would that not entitle me to vocational rehabilitation training under Public Law 16?

A—Not necessarily. The eligibility requirements of the law is that you must be in need of vocational rehabilitation in order to overcome the disability of your service-connected disability.

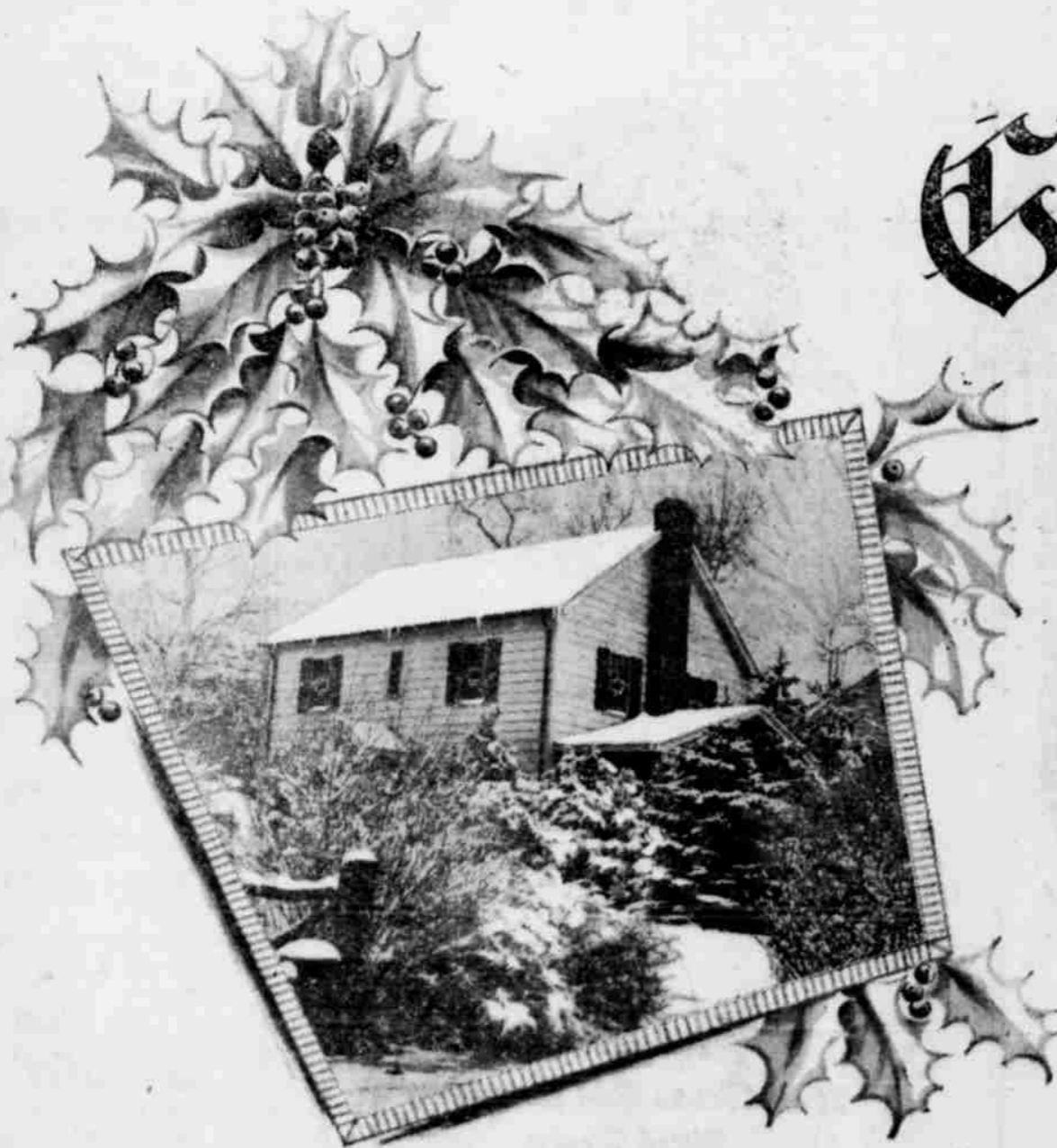

Seton Hall Leads Nation But Bevo Grabs Spotlight

NEW YORK — The notable thing about basketball during the year is that it appeared to me free of scandal for the first time since 1949.

Coach Honey Russell's Seton Hall College quintet of South Orange, N. J., was the nation's No. 1 team, based on the annual Associated Press poll.

The Pirates, led by 6-11 Walter Dukes, won the National Invitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden, beating St. John's of Brooklyn, 58-46. Dukes scored 21 points.

Indiana won its second NCAA championship. The Big Ten champions, paced by Don Schlundt's 30 points, turned back Kansas, Big Seven's repeat champion, 69-68, at Kansas City. A foul shot in the last 27 seconds by Bob Leonard decided the thriller. Ten times the score was tied.

Bevo Was Rage
The big rage on the courts was Clarence (Bevo) Francis of little Rio Grande College in Ohio. He scored 1954 points as his team won all 39 games played. His tally was by far the most ever recorded in one season. However, the National Collegiate Athletic Association stripped Francis of his records.

The NCAA rules committee adopted a recommendation by the National Association of Basketball Coaches that official records should include only games played by varsity teams of four-year, degree-giving colleges. Bevo averaged 50.1 points per game but his team played only 12 times against senior colleges. In the professional game, the

Minneapolis Lakers, paced by big George Mikan, retained the National Basketball Association title, beating the New York Knickerbockers, four games to one, in the playoffs. Neil Johnston of Philadelphia's Warriors led the scorers.

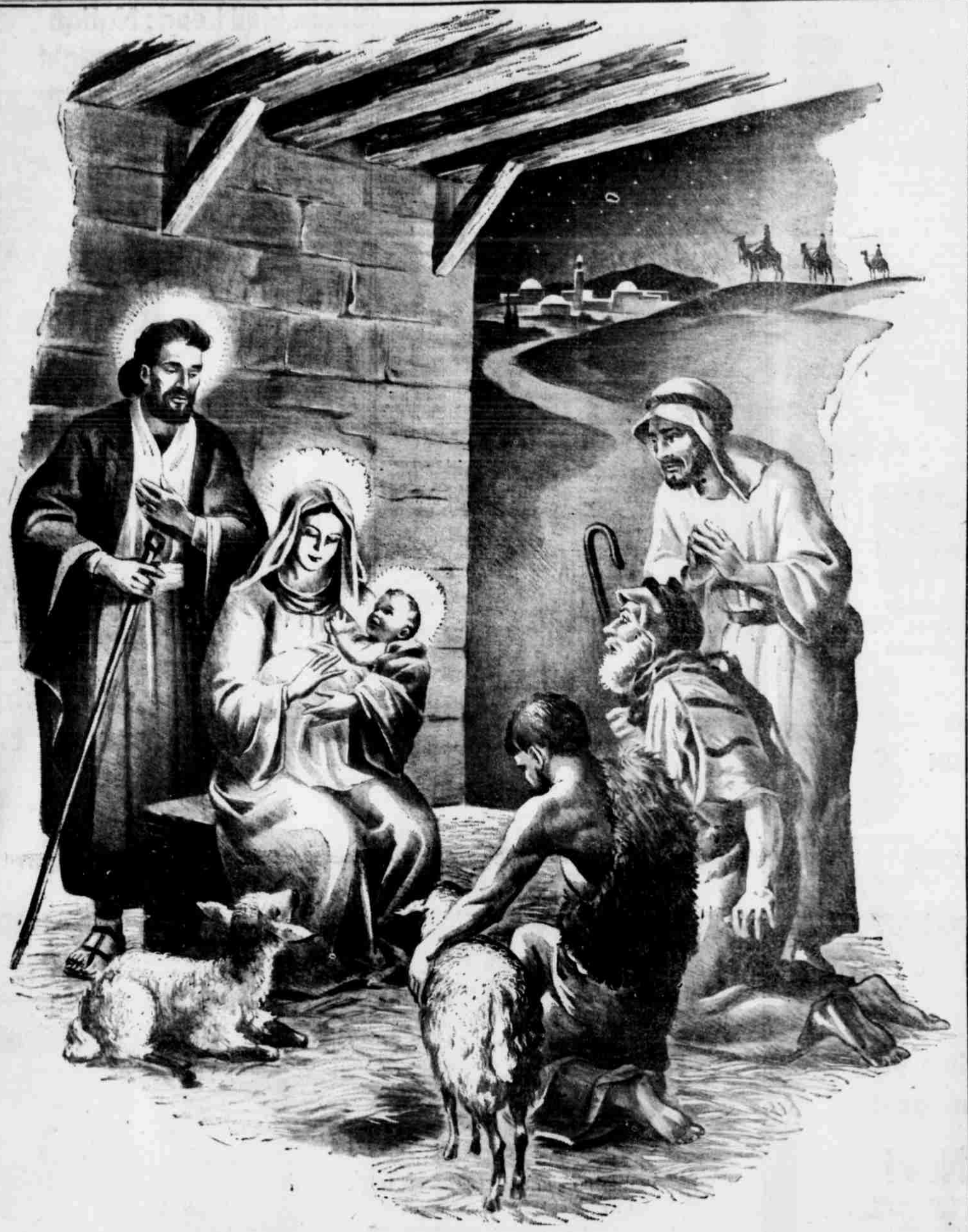

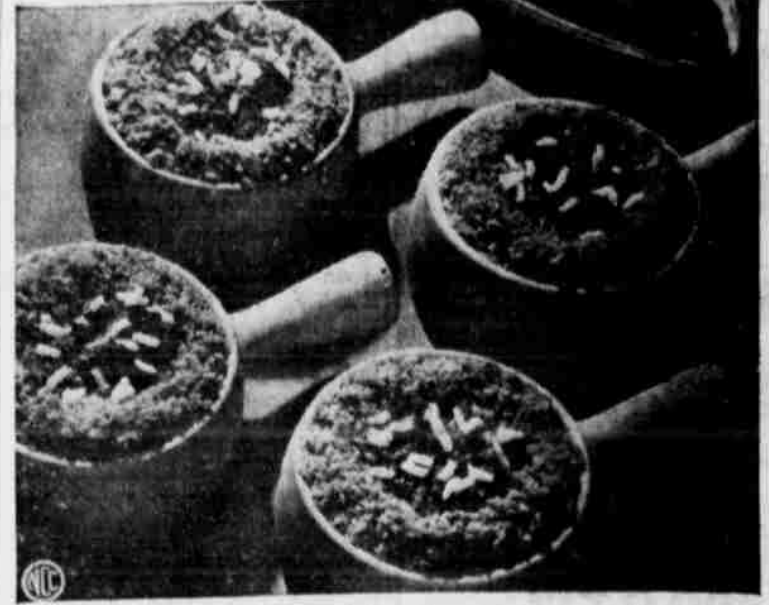

CHIPPED BEEF, RICE MAKE TASTY CASSEROLE



An economical and appetizing dinner menu can be planned around a casserole dish which combines baked chipped beef and rice. Although chipped beef is one of the cheaper meats, it is an excellent source of protein. Use individual casseroles for serving this tasty, inexpensive main dish.

3 cups hot cooked rice
4 ounces dried beef
2 cups medium white sauce (omit salt)

2 tablespoons margarine
1 tablespoon grated onion
1/2 cup bread crumbs

Separate dried beef into chips. Melt margarine in a skillet over low heat. Add chipped beef and cook in margarine until the edges curl and beef is slightly browned. Add chipped beef to white sauce, and then taste for seasoning. Adjust seasoning, adding a small amount of salt, if needed. Place alternate layers of cooked rice and chipped beef sauce in six margarine individual 8 or 10-ounce casseroles (an 8x8x2" baking dish may be used.) Melt margarine in a skillet over low heat. Add the onion and cook lightly. Add bread crumbs. Stir to coat crumbs. Sprinkle crumbs over top of casseroles. Bake in a 400 degree oven until crumbs are slightly browned (about 20 minutes.) This recipe makes six servings.

Serving Tomato Salad
Old fashioned tomato salad still tastes good. Wash, scald and peel firm ripe tomatoes and cut them into slices or sections—whichever your family prefers. Arrange on lettuce or other greens and garnish with celery hearts. (Use the outside stalks of the celery for some other dish.) Serve the salad with old-time boiled dressing.
