ShepHerds Hear Angels The infant, born to Mary, a Jewish girl from Nazareth, who is the wife of Joseph, a corpenter, was first discovered by a group of shepherds who received the news of His birth from a band of angels while they were tending their flocks in the lowying hills just outside the city.

Descending in a blaze of heav-enly glory that prostrated the little group of men and boys with amazement, the divine visitors told them not to be afraid but to go to a stable in Bethlehem, where they would find the Christ in swaddling clothes and lying

in a manger, This the shepherds did, being guided all the way by an angel. There they found the child, but recently born, with his parents and stable animals So deep was sage upon them, that they immediately a cepted him as the promised Saviour, and fell upon their knees and worshipped him.

Magi Follow Too Following in quick succession the visit of the shepherds, a caravan of wise men, or Magi, from the Orient, also came to the humble birthplace bearing jewels and precius gifts. To them too, this was a longawaited event, since they are close students of astronomy, and were watching for the star. When it appeared they regarded it as the sign that the child had been born which the prophet Isalah

While the largest part of the population here is talking of the event in tones of unsuppressed awe, and plainly regard it as a means by which they will be delivered from their Roman pressor, there are many who are frankly skeptical. They feel that the future Christ will come from a more significant source.

Everyone Excited
The whole atmosphere here has been one of unusual excitement for the past few days, since that was the time decreed by Augustus Caesar for all tax-payers in Judea to be registered. Mary and Joseph, being of the house of David, were required to come to Bethlehem; and although Mary was an expectant mother, and the 50-mile journey from Nazareth in Galilee was extremely arduous for her, the urgency of the order was such that they dare not stay.



It's the Law How To Make A Lady Happy In Texas

hristmas gifts to stores for exhange is now upon us. Most jusiness establishments are as ooperative as possible about als annual American pastime, out before getting into any arguments with a reluctant clerk or manager, better take a look it the legal situation involved. You may find that persuasion is more in order than demands for idjustment.

Department stores are under no legal obligation to take back a purchase and refund your money or deliver other goods in exchange just because you changed your mind. Most stores do make refunds and exchanges, but that is because it is their policy to do so-not because they are required to.

However, a promise to refund or exchange merchandise made by the store or salesman should be honored. Similarly, if a store misrepresents the quality of certain goods or if the goods are defective, you are justified in expecting a satisfactory adjustnent. But you have no more legal right to expect a store to refund or exchange because you lange your mind about a purchase than the store has to ask ou to give back the goods that vere sold to you because it lidn't want to sell them after

Suppose you buy a coat in one store and find that another company has it on sale for five dollars less. Must the store where you bought it take back the coat and give you a refund, or refund the difference in price? The seller is under no obligation to refund the diference, any more than he could make you pay the

> When one selects, orders, and deposits money on the purchase of an article, the store is under obligation to deliver the article in accordance with the terms of the sale. If the buyer refuses to accept the article or pay the remain

der of the purchase price, the seller can take legal action against him, according to the terms of the contract.

With the end of the second World War, they were asked to provide the commodities required in the rehabilitation of Europe and other sections of the earth. Then came the Korean War, with new and heavy demands for farm goods of all kinds.

Suddenly this situation was radically altered. World food production had been climbing since 1946. By 1952 this was exerting strong pressure in the market places. Our wheat exports dropped one-third in a single year, cotton by even more. Not only had importing nations increased their own production, but they found that they could supply their reduced needs at lower prices from exporting countries which had no farm price support programs.

Just as many American consumers have turned from butter to less expensive spreads, so have other nations sought cheaper wheat, cotton and other products.





But Bevo Grabs Spotlight

Hall College quintet of South Orange, N. J., was the nation's No. 1 team, based on the annual Associated Press poll.

The Pirates, led by 6-11 Walter Dukes, won the National In-vitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden, beating St. John's of Brooklyn, 58-46. Dukes scored 21 points.

Indiana won its second NCAA championship. The Big Ten champions, paced by Don Schlundt's 30 points, turned back Kansas, Big Seven's repeat champion, 69-68, at Kansas City. A foul shot in the last 27 seconds by Bob Leonard decided the thriller. Ten times the score was tied.

Bevo Was Rage

The big rage on the courts was Clarence (Bevo) Francis of little Rio Grande College in Ohio. He scored 1954 points as his team won all 39 games played. His tally was by far the most ever recorded in one season. However, the National Collegiate Athletic Associaten stripped Francis of his records.

The NCAA rules committee adopted a recommendation by the National Association of Basketball Coaches that official records should include only games piayed by varsity teams of fouryear, degree-giving colleges.

Bevo averaged 50.1 points per game but his team played only 12 times against senior colleges. In the professional game, the

Minneapolis Lakers, paced by big George Mikan, retained the National Basketball Association title, beating the New York Knickerbockers, four games to one, in the playoffs. Neil John-ston of Philadelphia's Warriors led the scorers.




