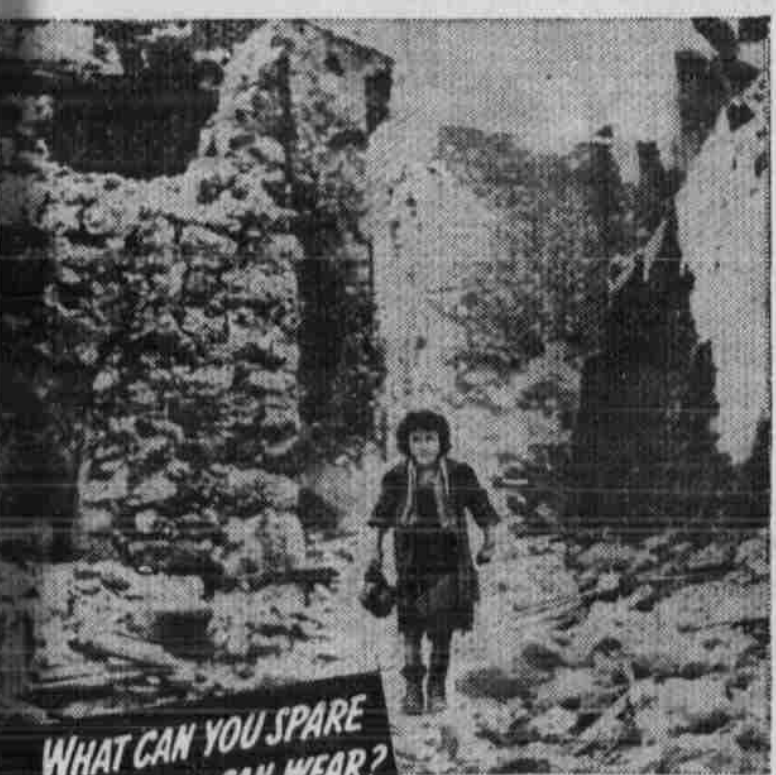

Attending from Littlefield were: Mrs. Eugene Latimer and son, Buford Ray.

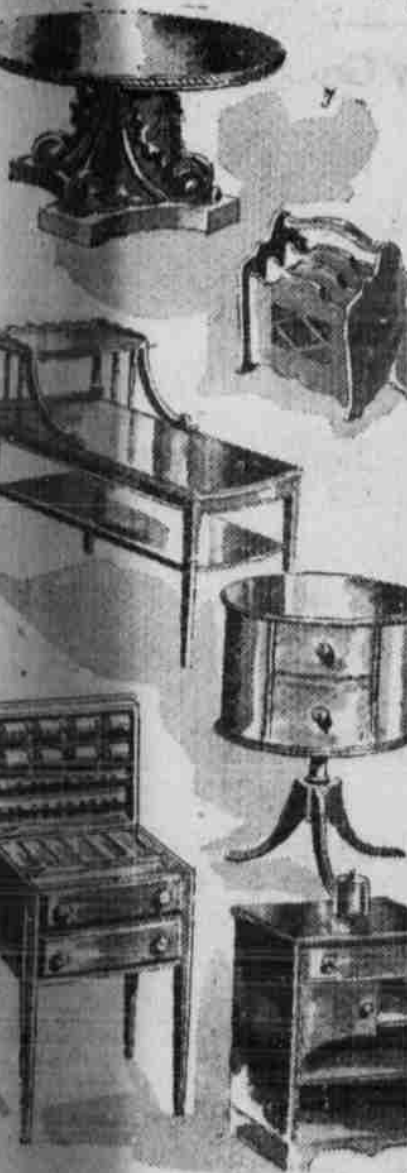

## THE ATTENTION OF ALL DRIVERS OF AUTOMOBILES Is Called To The Following:

Section 1 of Ordinance 3 reads in part as follows: No person shall operate or drive any vehicle within this city other than on the right side of the street or alley upon which such vehicle is being used; NO PERSON SHALL TURN ANY VEHICLE ON ANY STREET OR ALLEY WITHIN THE CITY EXCEPT AT THE INTERSECTION OF TWO STREETS.

Section 2 of Ordinance 3 reads in part as follows: No person shall park any vehicle except on the right side of the street and against the curb, and in LEAVING THE PARKING POSITION SHALL ONLY BACK SUCH VEHICLE FAR ENOUGH TO CLEAR SUCH OTHER VEHICLE AS MAY BE STOPPED OR PARKED, AND IMMEDIATELY PROCEED ON THE RIGHT SIDE OF THE STREET.

Section 2 of Ordinance 35 reads in part as follows: It shall be unlawful for any automobile or other vehicle to be operated on the streets or ways of the City of Littlefield at a greater speed than 20 miles per hour.

Section 3 (b) of Ordinance 35 reads in part as follows: It shall be unlawful for vehicles to be driven or stopped abreast.

Section 3 (h) of Ordinance 35 reads in part as follows: Unless in an emergency or to allow another vehicle or a pedestrian to cross its path, no vehicle shall stop or stand in any public street or way in the City of Littlefield, except when parked at the curb as above described, nor shall any vehicle stop so as to obstruct a crossing or a sidewalk, nor within 10 feet of a fire hydrant.

The penalty for violation of any of these regulations is a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00 and the Police Department has been instructed to see that all these regulations are enforced.

## THE ATTENTION OF ALL CITIZENS IS CALLED TO THE FOLLOWING:

Section 4 of Ordinance 13 reads in part as follows: That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, persons, firm, corporation, or association of persons to burn or cause to be burned any trash, scrap or waste lumber, boxes, paper, shavings, rubbish or any other matter or substance of any kind, in or upon any lot, tract, block, or parcel of ground within the business portions of the City within 25 feet of any building, and not then without having same confined within a wire screen or metal container or within some similar and safe basket, container or enclosure.

The penalty for violation of this ordinance is a fine not to exceed \$100, and the Police Department has been instructed to see that it is complied with.

### Necessary for Mail Delivery States Postmaster City Numbered About One-fourth Houses Last Summer

In connection with the application by the local post office for city delivery of mail, the city has a program underway for the numbering of all houses, which is a requirement by the Postal Department before this more convenient method of mail delivery may be carried out. The city numbered about one-fourth of the houses in the city last summer, when it ran out of numbers and was unable to get more.

According to W. G. Street, city secretary, the city will resume the numbering of the houses as soon as more figures can be secured.

Sunday afternoon, January 20, Governor Coke R. Stevenson will dedicate the 36th Division State Park at nearby Lake Brownwood. Major General Fred L. Walker, wartime commander of the 36th, will accept the park on behalf of division veterans.

### TAX QUIZ By W. A. THOMAS Collector Internal Revenue

1. What Federal tax form must be filed by January 15? Your 1945 declaration of Estimated Tax (or an amendment of your 1945 declaration).

2. Does everyone have to file a declaration? No. This filing should not be confused with the regular time for filing annual income tax returns, which must be filed not later than March 15.

3. Who does have to file January 15? Three groups as follows: (a) farmers, (b) persons who filed a 1945 declaration of estimated tax, but wish to change their estimates, (c) persons who should have filed a 1945 declaration but have failed to do so.

4. Did everybody have to file a 1945 declaration? No, only single persons whose last year's wages exceeded \$5000 and married couples whose wages exceeded \$10,000, plus \$500 for every exemption except their own and persons who had over \$100 income outside of wages from which tax was withheld (assuming their overall income was at least \$500 for single persons, \$1000 for married couples). The above applies only to residents of community property law states.

5. What are some examples? A wageearner with a wife and one child has one exemption besides their own, and if his wages exceeded \$10,500 (\$10,000 plus \$500), he had to file a 1945 declaration. Also required to file were merchants, landlords, lawyers, doctors, and others who received income from which tax was not withheld.

6. Why is January 15 a special date for farmers?—Other taxpayers were

required to file declarations last March, but the law specifically permitted farmers to wait until the next January 15.

Next week—How to file new or amended estimate.

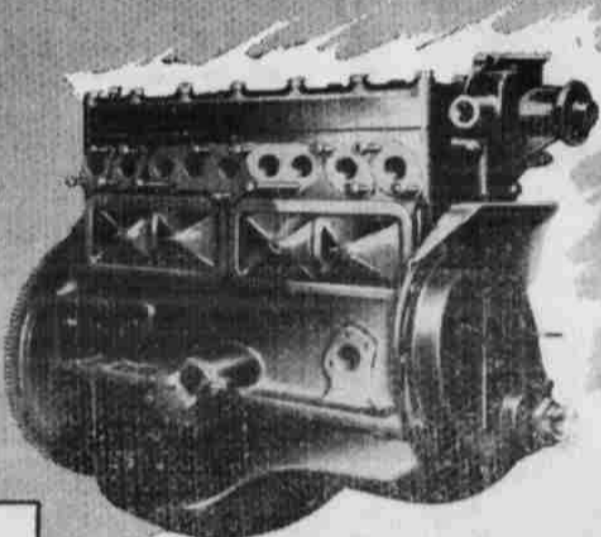

### Promotion Policy For Officers Announced

Qualified officers who have served for long periods in the same grade will be promoted on the first day of their terminal leave period under a policy announced today by the War Department. This policy will benefit many officers who have been unable to secure promotion because of lack of authorized position vacancies.

The ruling applies to first and second lieutenants who have served in one grade 18 months, captains and majors who have been in grade 24 months, and lieutenant colonels in grade 30 months. In computing the necessary service, 50 per cent additional credit is given for time served overseas in grade.

In order to qualify for the promotion, officers must have an efficiency index of 40 or higher. This is an average of ratings given by commanding officers, a rating of superior having a numerical value of 50, excellent 40, very satisfactory 30, and satisfactory 20.

Officers who already have reverted to inactive status and who are eligible under the provisions will be promoted in the Officers Reserve Corps or the Army of the United States, or in the case of National Guard officers, they will be given the option of commission in the ORC or the AUS. National Guard officers will be informed that a selection of commission in the ORC will provide for automatic termination of commission in the National Guard; should they select commission in the AUS, they will be notified that such commission is temporary and terminates automatically at the end of the emergency plus six months and will not affect National Guard status. Officers presently on terminal leave will be promoted quickly as promotions can be processed before reverting to inactive status.

All officers now on terminal leave and others who believe themselves eligible for promotion under the above provisions can contact local Army Recruiting Stations for additional information.

**SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON**

By CONG. GEO. MAHON

Congress is in recess until January 14, and I am glad to be back in the District. During this time, I expect to get about over the District as much as possible. On account of the shortness of the recess I will not undertake to open an office, and regular mail should still be addressed to me in Washington.

I think the following notes on the changes which Congress has recently made in the GI Bill of Rights will be of interest.

Heretofore, a veteran has been allowed \$50 per month living allowances for educational purposes and \$75 if he has dependents. Under the new law, \$65 will be allowed for single veterans and \$90 for those with dependents.

Previously, veterans were presumed to have had their education interrupted only if they were under 25 years of age when they entered the service. The new bill removes that limit, so that now any veteran, regardless of age, can get a year's training plus as many years as he was in service, with a maximum of four years.

Short, intense courses are also approved in the new amendment, as are recognized correspondence courses—cost not to exceed \$500.

Heretofore, the veteran was required to start to school within two years after discharge or the end of the war, whichever is later. This is changed to four years, and instead of being compelled to complete his course of study in seven years, this has been extended to nine years after the end of the war.

Considerable change is made in the loan provisions of the GI Bill.

The maximum guarantee on real estate loans is raised from \$2000 to \$4000. However, guarantees are still limited to 50 per cent of loan, and guarantees on non-real estate remain at \$2000. Maturity of all non-real estate loans is set at 10 years. The amortization period on real estate loans is fixed at 25 years unless the real estate is a farm, in which case the period of amortization can be as long as 40 years.

The term "reasonable normal value" has been a confusing and difficult requirement in making appraisals of the value of property. Under the new law, the term "reasonable value" is substituted, which will liberalize the act.

All of the final details for the tournament have not been completed, Jennings said, but the dates have been set, and details worked out for the holding of the meet.

The Golden Gloves events have been the highlight of the mid-winter sports program in Lubbock for a number of years, and this year, the

first peace time Golden Gloves show since 1941, should be bigger and better than ever before.

Jennings said Saturday night that many fighters and clubs have been asking about dates for the Golden Gloves, and many of them have already started training.

Several pre-war Golden Gloves fighters are coming back home from the armed services, and have expressed a desire to get back into the ring again.

### To Place Price Curbs on 1946 Cotton Crop

The 1946 cotton crop will be brought under price control in an effort to stabilize textile and clothing prices, OPA Administrator Chester Bowles has announced. Heretofore, raw cotton has been exempt from price ceilings.

Bowles said OPA would issue soon an advance notice under terms of the price control act, of ceilings to be imposed on this year's crop.

Bowles disclosed OPA's plans in a statement in which he commended the Commodity Credit Corporation for making available additional stocks of cotton as a "help measure in stabilizing textile and clothing prices."

Textiles and clothing are basic elements in the cost of living," Bowles said, "and the OPA intends to do everything in its power to avoid the necessity of raising the prices of these important commodities."

Bowles said OPA has been "increasingly disturbed" over recent advances in raw cotton prices "because of their possible effect on fabric and yarn ceilings."

"A large element in the rise in the market seems to have been speculative in nature, due to traders, who are betting on inflation," the OPA chief declared.

He added that with additional supplies to become available through CCC offerings, "I believe cotton prices will be steadied at a level which should permit textile ceilings to be held without change."

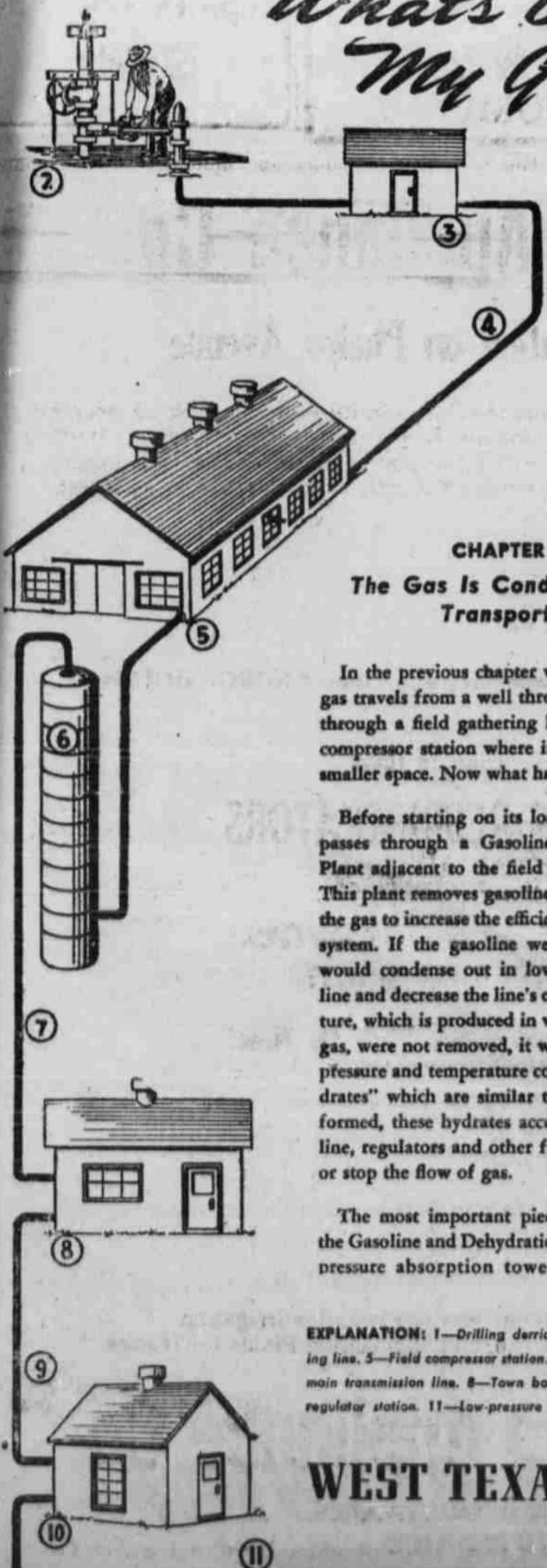

weighing 123,000 pounds, which is used in our sketch to represent the plant. Actually, the plant consists of several buildings, steam boilers, heat exchangers, stabilizers, dephlegmators, generating plant, compressors, many pumps, and other auxiliary equipment, all quite complicated and scientific. Another advantage gained by drying or "dehydrating" the gas is that internal corrosion of the pipe line is held to a minimum, thereby reducing the roughening of pipe walls and the formation of scale and dust.

After passing through the Gasoline and Dehydration Plant, the gas flows into the high-pressure pipe line. This is the main transmission line which brings the gas across the country to your city and other cities, passing through one or more additional compressor stations on its way.

West Texas Gas Company owns and operates five compressor stations; one at the gas field, called the Turkey Creek Station, the McSpadden Station near Canyon, and the Plainview, Tahoka and Littlefield Stations. McSpadden Station is now being enlarged, and when this work is completed we will have in service 20 compressor units with a total rating of 4540 Brake Horse Power.

## Salvation Army Performs Outstanding War Service

Salvation Army clubs, hostels and mobile units gave services to approximately 225 million service men and women in all theatres of war during World War II, according to a report released today by Commissioner Ernest I. Pugmire, Commander of the Salvation Army in the United States.

These services were made not only to our own Armed Forces, but to the fighting forces of all our Allies.

The figure includes aid to 11,760,605 individuals who took advantage of social and recreational facilities offered in this country by USO-Salvation Army Clubs. An estimated 110 million meals or snacks were served to men and women of the Armed Forces by Red Shield clubs, operated solely by the Salvation Army, and by Salvation Army mobile units.

During the six years of war, Salvation Army's international organization carried on its religious and social program in 97 countries and territories, taking its diversified activities to 26 fighting fronts.

Religious work by officers of the Salvation Army has been an important part of this wartime program, although it has been subordinated to work of immediate war urgency, Commissioner Pugmire said. Salvation Army chaplains have served with all armies of the Allied Nations, on all fronts.

In the forefront of the Salvation Army's services for the Armed Forces were those given by its 3,000 Red Shield Clubs, often improvised huts set up on beachheads, in jungles and in desert outposts; and those given by 1,000 Salvation Army mobile canteens which, from the time of Pearl Harbor until May of this year, accompanied the armed forces on hazardous fighting fronts.

Most of these are still in operation, serving troops still stationed in the occupied countries.

### Invasion Canteens

Major Allied amphibious landings, Salvation Army mobile units—"invasion canteens"—rolled down the ramps of LST's along with jeeps, trucks and tanks. Upon landing they set up shop on main roads leading to the front and they advanced with the invasion armies. In France alone, 23 Salvation Army mobile units were attached to the invasion army.

Salvation Army mobile caravans have to date traveled a distance equivalent to four times around the world, the units accompanying, a.d. in some instances preceding, the Allied fighting forces. Many of these mobile

canteens went into the field equipped with library, radio set, a film projector and film, and a record-player, and had facilities for serving 4,600 men on a single trip. With curtains drawn, these canteens offered a place for meditation or for religious services.

### Red Shield Huts

Another outstanding war service by the Salvation Army was given by its Red Shield Huts, or canteens. During six years, 3,000 of these operated from a variety of locations, ranging from snow-covered mountains in Syria, to caves in Sicily and tents in Iraq.

Plans for the Red Shield canteens were started in the fall of 1939, and the first Red Shield huts entered the field almost with the first armies.

Red Shield canteens set to the continent took part in the famed retreat to Dunkirk, serving the retreating armies on the way. Only two of the score of Red Shield canteens returned from Dunkirk to England, and it was there that the Salvation Army had its first war casualties.

When the Red Shield huts returned to the field they were streamlined to the conditions of modern, mobile fighting. Throughout the war, the canteens often operated no more than a few hundred yards from the actual

fighting, and were seldom more than ten-to's suspended between trees. They were established on practically every desert isle, in every jungle wilderness and in every other place where troops were fighting or stationed.

### With Invasion Troops

During the epic Allied assaults on the island stepping-stones to Japan, the Salvation Army landed workers with the leading elements of the first assault waves. These set up makeshift coffee-bars and were open for business while the first troops were storming ashore.

In the invasion of Labuan Island, for example, four Salvation Army canteen operators went ashore with invasion troops and had established their Red Shield unit in a Japanese hut within a half-hour after hitting the beach.

These beachheads Salvationists—both men and women—were termed by the soldiers "strictly first-line operators."

A particular instance is given of two tented Salvation Army canteens which started operations on Iraq desert in a sandstorm. In less than two hours, the canteen had cooked 400 eggs and had made 500 sandwiches to serve men who had just completed a 380-mile trek through the desert.

An auxiliary service to the land Red Shield canteens was provided in Australia by a motor launch, which visited remote outposts on the island rivers, and which met sea and land convoys.

### Other War Services

War services given to men and women of the armed forces by Salvation Army clubs, canteens and mobile units varied from the gift of stamped postcards and envelopes to sleeping accommodations and legal aid. A variety of "personal and accommodation services" including mending, wrapping and mailing of packages, checking of valuables, financial aid and emergency transportation.

In the U. S. alone, approximately 1,598,100 service men were provided with sleeping accommodations during leaves or furloughs at Salvation Army Clubs, some operated in conjunction with the U. S. O. At these centers, 50,613,894 stamped postcards and envelopes were given out. Under "personal and accommodation services" were listed 21,936,529 instances of aid.

At these centers alone, the Salvation Army individually coquetted al-

most one million soldiers. Voice recordings were made for more than 260,000 soldiers, not including those made in hospitals. Approximately 595,000 wounded and sick servicemen were visited in hospitals by Salvationists in these operations.

Counted in its war services was the Salvation Army's "home hospitality" given in this country to 235,610 servicemen and their families.

### Varied Activities

Other varied war-related services by the Salvation Army during World War II have included a home in France for children returned from Germany, who are now being cared for until their parents can be found; a refugee boys' home and a "warphanage" in China; soldiers' and sailors' rest homes in South America and the Middle East; homes for evacuees, demolition crews and moving units in England after bombings; grocery stores in Canada for stranded families in war boom-towns; dining rooms

that served noonday meals to children of war workers; restaurants in Belgium for child and adult refugees and hostess houses, throughout the United States, for families of friends of enlisted men.

### Evangelical Work

In its evangelical work on fighting fronts, religious observances have been adapted to circumstances and location, according to Commissioner Pugmire. Red Shield Clubs and even "invasion canteens" served as chapels for thousands of church services, and other hands have been held impromptu, in deserts and on beachheads. Religious guidance and consolation have been given to all individuals requesting the same, regardless of creed, race, or color.

The strains of "Onward, Christian Soldiers" have greeted many soldiers and marines storming ashore on many fronts, for a record-player has been part of the equipment of every Salvation Army unit.

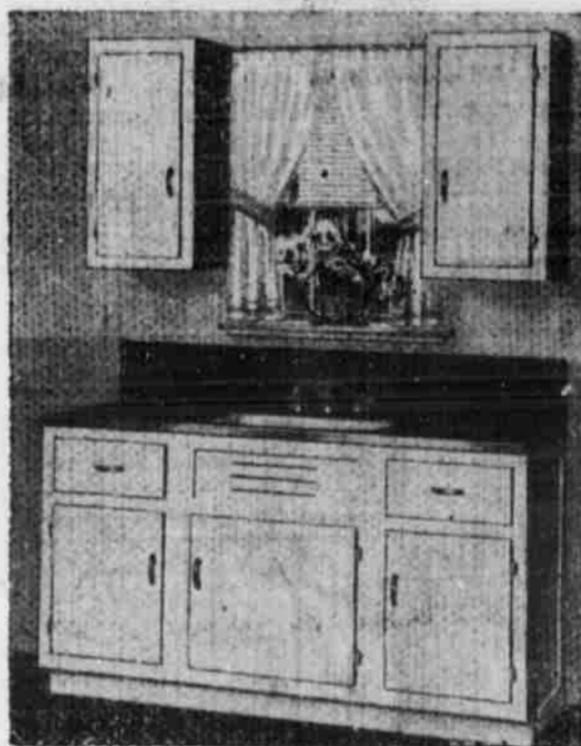

Delbert Mouser Awarded Air Medal

CALCUTTA — Second Lt. Delbert R. Mouser, pilot, Route 2, Littlefield, has been awarded the Air Medal, it has been announced by Brig. Gen. Charles W. Lawrence, commanding general of the India China Division Air Transport Command.

The India China Division is completing, by homeward movements of freight and personnel, its war mission of trans-India, India-China and intra-China transport. It has made air history by flying cargo and passengers in regularly scheduled day-and-night transit over routes once virtually unuseable, primarily the famed Hump. Its war contributor, say aviation leaders, has provided far-reaching portents for the future of air transport on a world-wide scale. July, 1945, saw 71,000 tons cross the Hump, while at the moment of Jap surrender the rate was nearly two tons a minute.

"From a small monthly tonnage at the outset," said General Lawrence in a war's-end statement to his troops, "cargo to China has increased until it has been proved that whole armies could be supplied by air in China—and they were, to the distress and destruction of our enemies."

Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, commander of all U. S. Forces in China, has said, "Through enemy fire and through all sorts of weather, over oceans, mountains, desert and jungle, those planes came, never failing. Upon their cargoes battles have been fought and victories won. Upon their cargoes China survived when there was no other contact with the world. Your fliers made the Hump the most famous mountain range in the world."

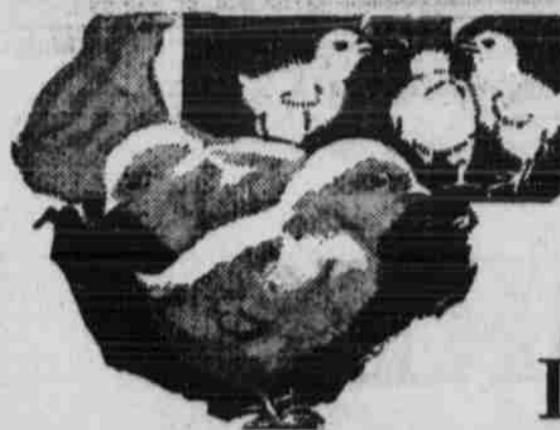
