Officials connected with the proposed Migrant Health Care program, announced this past week that an application for a Littlefield-Lamb County unit had been placed in the mails.

### Membership Campaign Launched

The membership committee of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce this week launched an all out campaign to gain members and to increase the income by a needed \$4,000.

Lee said members of the committee, along with the committee chairman, Don Avery, and prospective members would meet at 10 a.m., each Tuesday morning in the Council Room of City Hall for coffee and a brief resume of the activity of the Chamber and its functions. The first meeting would be held next Tuesday.

Lee and the directors, as well as Executive Vice-President Leon Slaughter, said workers as well as money are needed if Littlefield is to continue to move forward. "Right now we stand at the crossroads of progress, we can continue to be an active progressive community by all joining in the battle, or we can become a small town," one member of the board stated.

If the various committees of the Chamber are allowed to continue their activity, an additional \$4,000 is needed to complete the year. The projects undertaken by the Chamber, in addition to an active industrial development committee, span a gap from tourist development to city beautification, but if these and other programs are to be completed, new members are needed.

Leon Slaughter, the manager of the Chamber, said the Tuesday meetings were open to anyone who is interested in the development of Littlefield and that no invitation is necessary. "We are inviting everyone and anyone interested in the growth of Littlefield," Slaughter said.

migrant laborers. Dr. Bernard Pearlman has agreed to be administrator for the program if the application is accepted. The local workers in the program said they did not know if the application by the city would be accepted, but if it were then work could begin in setting up programs to provide any type of health care and educational program, for which there seems to be a need.

The application submitted by the local organization calls for a first year budget of approximately \$164,000 for health and educational services.

If approved the Littlefield-Lamb County Migrant Health Program would provide basic health services, public health nurses, dental care, both preventative and curative, and would provide sanitation education program for migrants. In patient and out-patient services would be performed on a fee basis, educational services would be performed at no cost to the migrants involved.

This program differs from the indigent care program now conducted by the County, in that it provides for migrant workers who have not been in the county sufficient time to qualify for the county program. Under the County program (See MIGRANT, Page 5)

### James Howard Receives National Foundation Scholarship

James Dale Howard, son of Mrs. J.E. Chisholm, and the late Marshall Howard, of Littlefield, has been named the recipient of the March of Dimes Health Careers Award for 1966. This is the first time these awards have been presented in Lamb County.

Howard is presently attending the Southwestern Medical School in Dallas.

In January of this year the Chapter set aside \$1,000 to be given in scholarships; and county schools were provided with application forms and material relative to these scholarships in the following health fields: Nursing, Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Medicine and Medical Social Work.

Students planning to enter or already starting their college work in these fields submitted applications to the Lamb County Chapter. A Selection Board, composed of a medical doctor, a registered nurse and a school counselor, none of which are members of the County Chapter Board of Directors - reviewed applications and selected winners and set the amount to be awarded each student.

Funds for these scholarships are made up entirely of donations in Lamb County to the March of Dimes Campaign. This means that every person who has given dimes and dollars to the March of Dimes has had a part in helping to promote the education of health personnel at this time when there is such a severe shortage of qualified people in these fields.

### Travel Center Opens Friday

A two day celebration, Friday and Saturday, will officially open the new Wylie Travel Center of Littlefield, managed by Mr. and Mrs. Pete Shipley.

The new automotive service center will be complete in every aspect and will be manned by a crew of experienced people headed by Shipley who began his work in service stations in 1927 and went into business for himself in 1955.

The station, located at 137 Marshall Howard Blvd., will be the ninth in a chain of travel centers across West Texas and New Mexico.

A.L. Wylie who heads the travel center operation began in the butane business in Floydada, and later went into the gasoline business. He is now president of the Wylie petroleum company, with headquarters in Floydada.

The new Littlefield station will sell Deep Rock products, and will be open from 5 a.m. to midnight daily. Shipley said the station would honor all approved credit cards. "We have been in the process of issuing Deep Rock cards to a number of our customers and former customers, but realize that we still have a number to get out, but we will honor all credit cards even after the Deep Rock cards have been distributed. Deep Rock products, are refined and manufactured by the Kerr-McGee Oil Company of Oklahoma.

The sparkling all steel 40 x 82 foot building is positioned on the 200 foot lot in a manner which will allow ample parking for vehicles. It and an adjacent cafe was built by local contractors including Harry Woody, Toby Walker, concrete, Campbell plumbing and Brown-Ray electric.

### Sheriff Posse Parade Set For Sunday

Members of the Lamb County Sheriff's Posse, along with riding groups from 26 other area communities will participate in a big one-hour parade Sunday beginning at 2 p.m. down Phelps Avenue.

Barton Spencer, president of the local group, said invitations had been issued to other riding groups in the area, and acceptances had been received, however he said he did not know how many would show up for the district meeting.

Other officers in the Lamb County organization include Don Hatley, vice president; Mrs. Mary Ellen Stone, secretary; and Gay Nickle, queen. The Lamb County Sheriff's Posse rode in a parade in Hereford Saturday, July 30, along with about 14 other clubs from this part of Texas. Third place in the parade went to Hale Co. Sheriff's Posse, second place went to Randall Co. Sheriff's and Lamb Co. Sheriff's Posse brought home the first place trophy. Lamb Co. now has 3 second place trophies and one first in National standing.

The parade will form up and move out from the north end of Phelps and proceed south to the courthouse. Spencer said trophies will be presented to winners in each division.

Congressman Walter Rogers of Texas' 18th Congressional District caught even his friends by complete surprise when he officially announced his retirement from Congress at the end of his present term. Congressman Rogers had already won his party's nomination for re-election to his ninth term in the national law-making body.

Lamb County was included in the 18th district in the recent congressional re-districting act and, in a wire to the Lamb County Leader and the County Wide News, Congressman Rogers stated:

"With deep regret and after exhaustive and careful consideration of all factors, I have decided to decline the nomination to appear on the ballot in the general election in November. It is my intention to re-enter the private practice of law at the end of this term of Congress. The great wealth of able and qualified individuals of the true American tradition in the Panhandle of Texas should enable the Democratic Party to choose another nominee for this position in accordance with the law and ample time for such nominee to conduct a highly successful campaign."

In the beginning, there were three individuals who announced they were actively seeking this nomination. They were State Representative Walter Knapp of Amarillo, unopposed in his quest for re-election to the State House of Representatives; Andy Rogers of Childress, the present State Senator of Texas' 30th Senatorial District who was defeated in his bid for re-election in the recent Democratic Primary and Wales Madden, Amarillo attorney who announced that he had the backing of the state Democratic machinery. However, on Tuesday night Madden announced withdrawal from the race and this further confused the issue.

In accordance with state election law, after a party's nominee has been named in a primary election and he withdraws or dies, the county chairman within his district will meet and name another nominee for the party involved. It is understood by the County Wide News and the Lamb County Leader that most County Democratic chairmen are withholding making a commitment on the issue pending word from Governor Connally and the State Democratic Organization. However, the withdrawal of Madden leaves Andy Rogers of Childress as the lead runner at this time since he is the only candidate for the nomination with any semblance of a multi-county organization in the 18th Congressional District. Lamb County is in the 30th State Senatorial District which had the Wichita Falls area added to its makeup in the last state redistricting legislation. State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon defeated Andy Rogers (no kin to Congressman Rogers) and Jim Ray for the democratic nomination as senator from the new 30th district.

The Amarillo newspaper in a recent editorial stated that, because Amarillo was the population center of the 18th Congressional District and provided most of the campaign money, Amarillo deserved to have the new democratic nominee named from that city. However, it is understood that each County Democratic Chairman will have an equal vote in the matter. Glenn Batson, Lamb County Democratic Chairman, stated that the county chairmen of this congressional district will meet this weekend or the first part of next week to select a nominee but did not indicate that he had made this choice of a candidate to support for the nomination at this time. It can be assumed, however, that Amarillo will make a determined effort to have the state democratic machinery to support a candidate from that city.

Though Congressman Rogers gave no indication of his future plans, except that he will re-enter the private practice of law, there has been considerable speculation about his future. Well informed sources in Washington seem to think that he will (See CONGRESSMAN, Page 5)

### Area Swelters Showers Brings Relief

The Littlefield Lamb County area sweated out Monday in the grip of a heat wave that sent the mercury climbing to 108 degrees, and above in several areas which reported readings.

Downtown Littlefield reported only a high of 104 degrees, but some of the adjoining area said it reached 108 and more. Prior to the torrid temperatures however, the area received some much needed rain with Enochs measuring two inches and the Goodland-Maples area recording one and a-half inches.

Monday night the showers returned to the area, as Olton, Springlake and Earth, as well as other areas in the northern part of the county reported up to 1 1/2 inches.

Hart reported some hail, with an inch to inch and a-half rains. The Pep, Bula, Oklahoma Flats area reported some good rains, but growers in that area say they still need much more.

The 108 degree reading recorded was a record high for the date and was the highest in many years for the area.

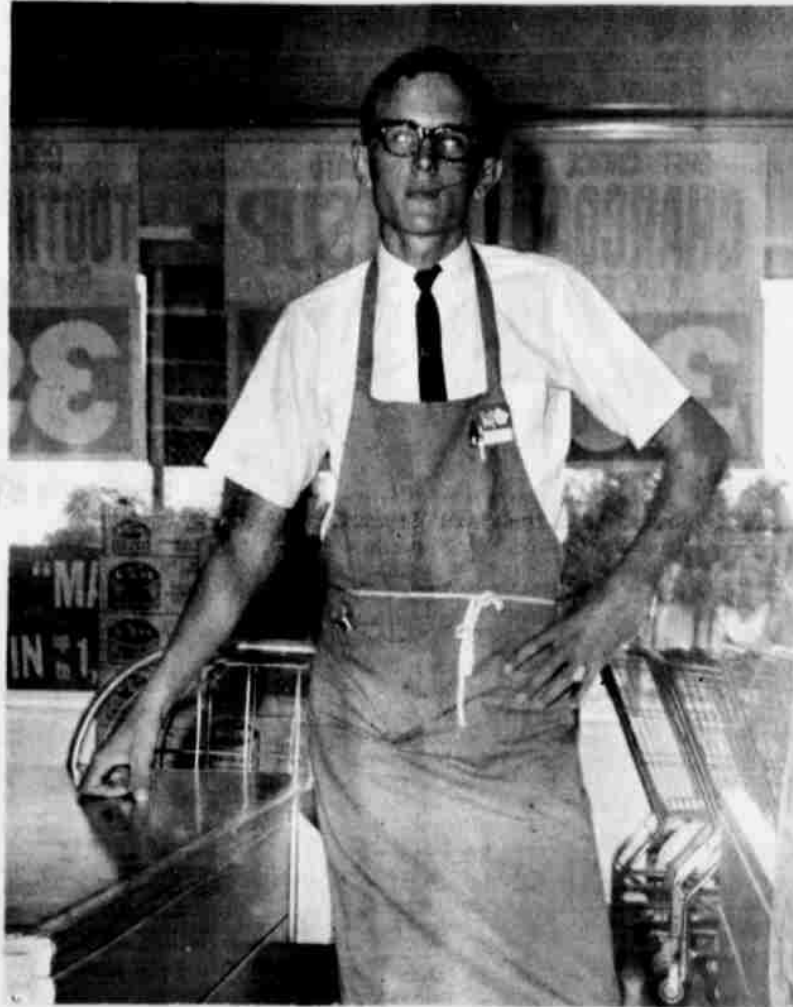

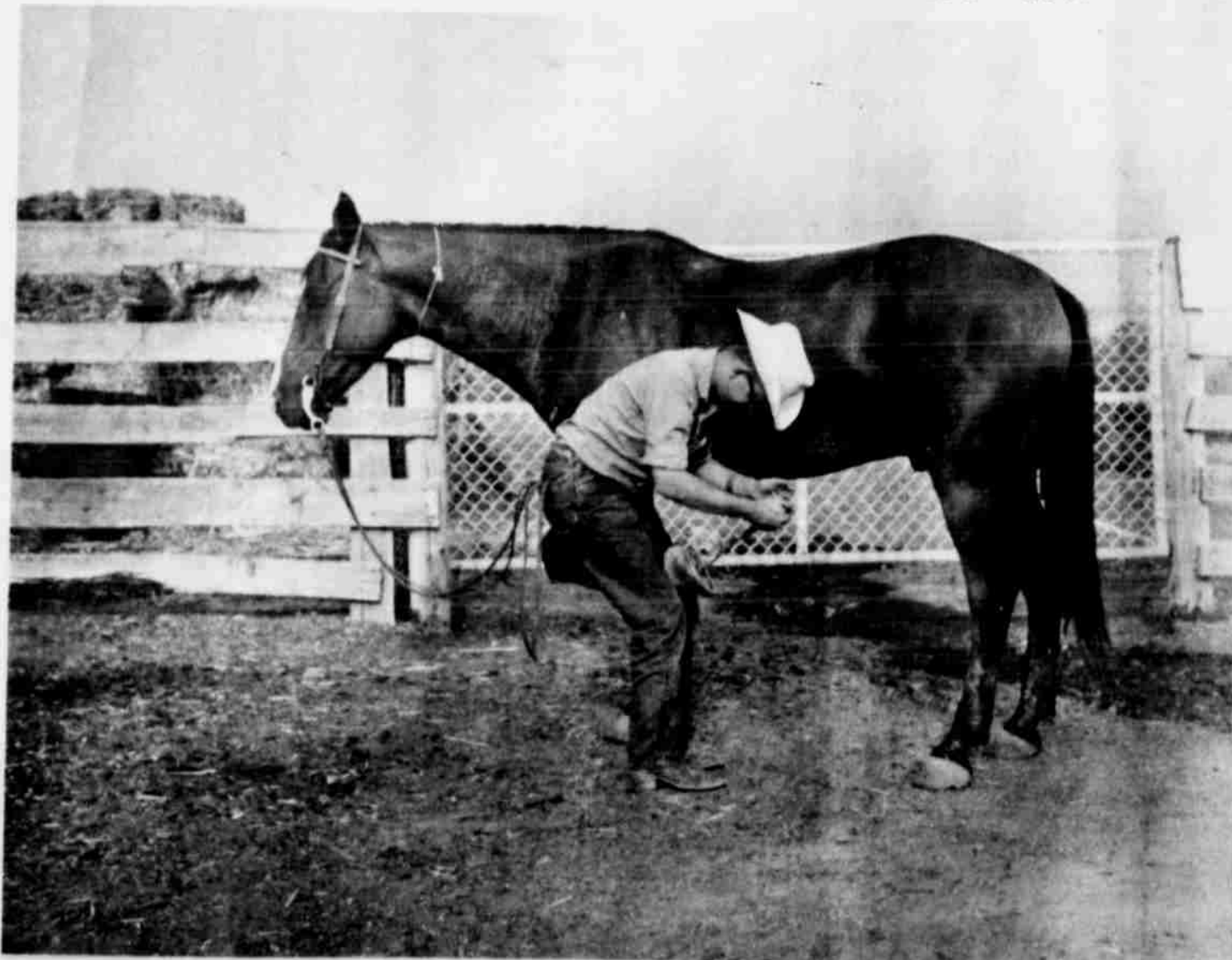

# New Automobile Insurance Ratings Explained

A year from August 1, Texas motorists who keep out of accidents and are not convicted of speeding or of major traffic law violations will begin paying less than careless drivers for their auto insurance, according to an announcement made today by Wm. Hunter McLean, Chairman, State Board of Insurance.

"We are advising all Texas motorists that how they drive after August 1, 1966 will be reflected in August 1, 1967 insurance rates," Mr. McLean said. "Penalty points will be charged for accidents, speeding and major violations occurring after midnight of last Sunday. One penalty point will increase a motorist's premium for auto liability, medical payments and collision insurance by 15%. Two points will mean an increase of 35%, three points, 60% and four points of 90%. These penalties will apply on insurance written after August 1, 1967."

"Many Texas drivers have complained about the fact our present system makes safe drivers pay for the accidents of unsafe motorists. The State Board, in response to many requests of this nature, has devised this program that we call the 'Texas Driving Insurance Plan,'" Mr. McLean stated.

"Because the Plan is not retroactive, it will require time to take full effect. Texas motorists and law enforcement officers should not expect early results.

replace Judge Joseph Dooley as the federal judge for this district. Whether or not Judge Dooley has actually resigned is not known at this time. It is known that Congressman Rogers had a brilliant future in Congress and there must be something big in the offing for him to resign after he had won his party's nomination to a ninth term.

Walter Rogers is the second ranking member of the powerful House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce and he is Chairman of its sub-committee on communications and power. He is chairman of another subcommittee investigating electric power failures. Congressman Rogers is the third ranking member of the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs and Chairman of its subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation. In addition, he is member of its sub-committees on Mines and Mining and Territory and Insular Affairs.

Undoubtedly, the time would come when Congressman Rogers would become Chairman of the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce. This would give West Texas the chairmanships of two of the four most powerful committees in Congress. Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock is chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

Lamb County will have a great interest in the naming of a new nominee as the democratic party's candidate for congressman of Texas' 18th district. The many decisions that must yet be made on the acquisition of water for this whole West Texas area are critical to the South Plains of Texas.

A -- Unfortunately, your friend has given you incorrect information. It is true that if a woman is receiving social security benefits when the divorce takes place she can continue to receive benefits on his account, but only if she and her former husband had been married at least 20 years.

person must be declared indigent, and must have resided in the county for six months prior to applying for help from the County.

The program as outlined by members of the Public Health Service, to the City Council several weeks ago, would provide aid for those who have not been in the county sufficient time to request and receive County Welfare or assistance. It would include almost every area of health and sanitation services and would fill a need, which heretofore has not been filled due to a limitation of funds.

Still another aspect of the program is to analyze the program with a view toward developing and studying the program.

Patience, firm law enforcement and other measures designed to promote traffic safety will be needed for meaningful results," McLean added.

**POINT SYSTEM EXPLAINED**  
Under the new Plan, one point is assigned for each automobile accident resulting in bodily injury, death or property damage in excess of \$50.

There are twelve exceptions to this rule. The exceptions include accidents in which the driver is not at fault.

Speeding penalties begin with the second conviction within the latest 12 months period prior to policy date or the third conviction within 36 months prior to policy date. One point is assigned beginning with the second or third conviction.

No more than four points will be assigned for all causes. Penalty point assignments for speeding, in effect, allow drivers either one or two penalty free convictions, depending upon elapsed time between the convictions, and stop short of the seven convictions which cause action to suspend driver's licenses by the Department of Public Safety.

Three points will be assigned for conviction of:

- (a) driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs; or
- (b) failure to stop, render aid, or disclose identity when involved in an accident; or
- (c) negligent homicide, murder by driving while intoxicated or aggravated assault arising out of the operation of a motor vehicle; or
- (d) any offense punishable as a felony under the motor vehicle laws of this State.

Two points will be assigned for conviction of:

- (a) Driving while license suspended or driving without a valid driver's or operator's license in force and effect; or
- (b) any other moving traffic violation as a result of which an operator's or driver's license was suspended or revoked.

The Driving Insurance Plan is not retroactive as only accidents and convictions occurring after August 1, 1966 will be considered when the Plan becomes effective August 1, 1967.

Eventually, a 36 months driv-

ing record will be considered but this will not occur until 1969.

**SAFETY IMPLICATIONS**  
"During the past few months many editorials, numerous civic leaders and police chiefs have urged that something be done about our State's escalating accident record. The Driver Insurance Plan can assist in putting the brakes on our State's disgraceful traffic toll," Chairman McLean said.

Noting that convictions of the major traffic offenses are the only violations that will earn penalty points, Chairman McLean emphasized that 29% of the fatal traffic accidents in Texas last year involved drivers who had been drinking and that 42% of the fatal traffic accidents involved speed too fast for conditions. Eleven per cent of all fatal traffic accidents involved drivers who did not have a valid driver's license. Conviction of these violations, after August 1, will earn penalty points for the guilty motorists.

## MAKE OWN RATES

There are 26 automobile liability, medical payments and collision rating territories in Texas. Sixteen of those territories are individual counties. Drivers living in each territory make their own rates for this type of insurance.

Increased insurance premiums caused by the assessment of penalty points within a territory will be credited to reduce premiums in that territory. In this way, drivers paying the penalties will help to reduce the premiums paid by drivers with clean records.

"The degree of uniformity of law enforcement within a territory under this Plan is a matter for local determination. Good or poor enforcement in one territory will have no effect on rates in other territories," McLean concluded.

## TEXAS DRIVING INSURANCE PLAN

### A. Mandatory

The provisions of this Plan shall be mandatory as to automobile bodily injury liability, property damage liability, medical payments, and collision insurance, for all eligible risks and shall be used by all companies licensed to write auto-

mobile insurance in Texas in accordance with Subchapter A, Chapter 5, Texas Insurance Code of 1951, as amended.

### B. Eligibility

1. The Plan shall be applied in the rating of all eligible automobiles.

2. An automobile eligible for rating under the Plan is one owned by an individual or owned jointly by two or more relatives who are resident in the same household provided such automobile (1) has four wheels and is classified and rated as a private passenger automobile, or (2) is a farmer's truck with a load capacity of 1,500 pounds or less rated as a private passenger automobile.

Exception: The Plan shall not be applied to an automobile that is (1) a part of a fleet written under the Fleet Plan Rule, (2) subject to experience rating, (3) used in the business of driver training, or (4) written in the Texas Motor Vehicle Assigned Risk Plan.

### C. Definitions

#### 1. Driving Record Points.

a. Convictions  
Points shall be assigned in accordance with the following for motor vehicle violations for which the applicant or any operator of the vehicle currently resident in the same household has been convicted during the experience period.

(1) Three points shall be assigned for conviction of:

- (a) Driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs; or
- (b) failure to stop, render aid, or disclose identity when involved in an accident; or
- (c) Negligent homicide, murder by driving while intoxicated or aggravated assault arising out of the operation of a motor vehicle; or
- (d) any offense punishable as a felony under the motor vehicle laws of this State.

(2) Two points shall be assigned for conviction of:

- (a) driving while license suspended or driving without a valid driver's or operator's license in force and effect; or
- (b) any other moving traffic violation as a result of which an operator's license was suspended or revoked.

(3) One point shall be assigned under either (a) or (b) (whichever produces the highest number) for conviction of each speeding violation, per operator

- (a) beginning with the second conviction within the latest twelve (12) consecutive months; or
- (b) beginning with the third such conviction within the latest thirty-six (36) consecutive months.

#### b. Accidents

One point shall be assigned for each automobile accident involving the applicant, or any operator of the automobile currently resident in the same household, while operating any private passenger type automobile, resulting in damage to any property, including his own, in excess of \$50.00, or in bodily injury or death.

Exceptions -- No points shall be assigned for accidents under the following circumstances:

- (a) Medical Payments; accidents involving medical payments coverage only; or
- (b) Legally Parked, Standing or Stopped; a motor vehicle of the applicant or any operator of

the automobile currently resident in the same household damaged while legally parked, standing or stopped; or

(c) Unattended Automobile; accidents involving an automobile of the applicant or any operator of the automobile currently resident in the same household while such automobile is unattended; or

(d) Reimbursement; applicant or any operator of the automobile currently resident in the same household, or owner of the automobile driven by applicant or any operator of the automobile currently resident in the same household, reimbursed by or on behalf of the person responsible for the accident or has judgment against such person; or upon applicant's showing that judgment was not sought for the reason that such person failed to prove financial responsibility under the Texas Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Act; or

(e) Governmental Immunity; accidents involving government-owned property or vehicles when governmental immunity solely prevents recovery from the government; or

(f) Rear-end Collision; automobile driven by applicant or any operator of the automobile currently resident in the same household struck in rear by another vehicle approaching from the rear, and the applicant or any operator of the automobile currently resident in the same household was not convicted of a moving traffic violation in connection with the accident; or

(g) Other Party Charged; operator of any other automobile involved in the accident charged with a moving traffic violation and the applicant or any opera-

tor of the automobile currently resident in the same household not convicted of a moving traffic violation in connection therewith; or

(h) Hit-and-Run; automobile operated by applicant or any operator currently resident in the same household damaged by "hit-and-run" driver, if appli-

cant or other resident operator reports the accident to proper authority within 24 hours; or

(i) Animals or Fowls; accidents involving damage by contact with animals or fowls; or

(j) Flying Gravel and Falling Missiles; accidents involving physical damage, limited to and caused by flying gravel, miss-

iles or falling objects

(k) Accidents on premises rented or leased to or any operator of the automobile currently resident in the same household; or

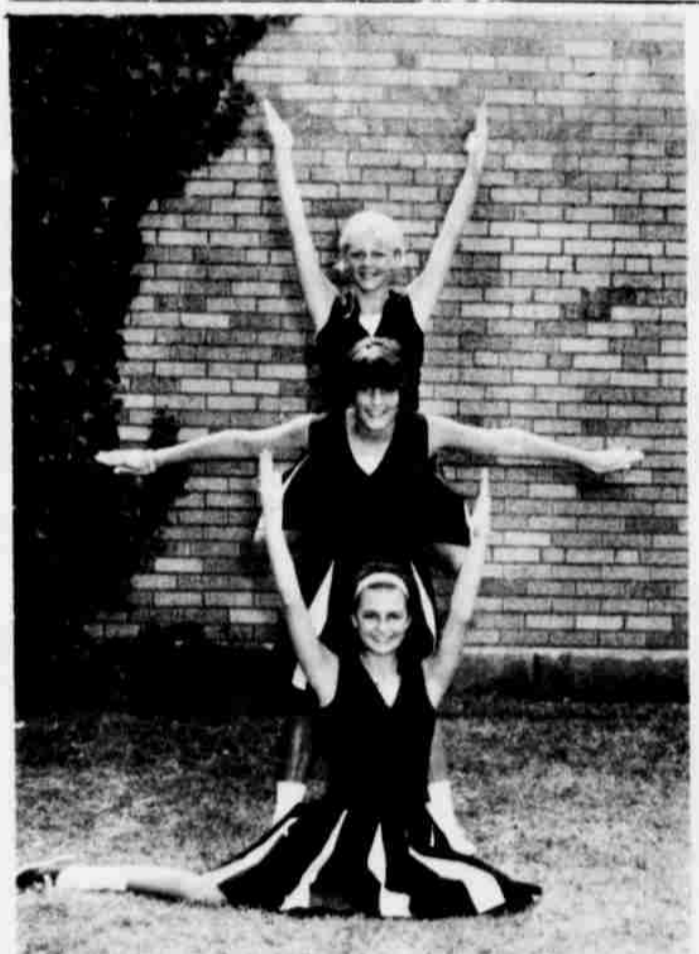
(l) No Fault; accidents in which the applicant or operator was not at fault.

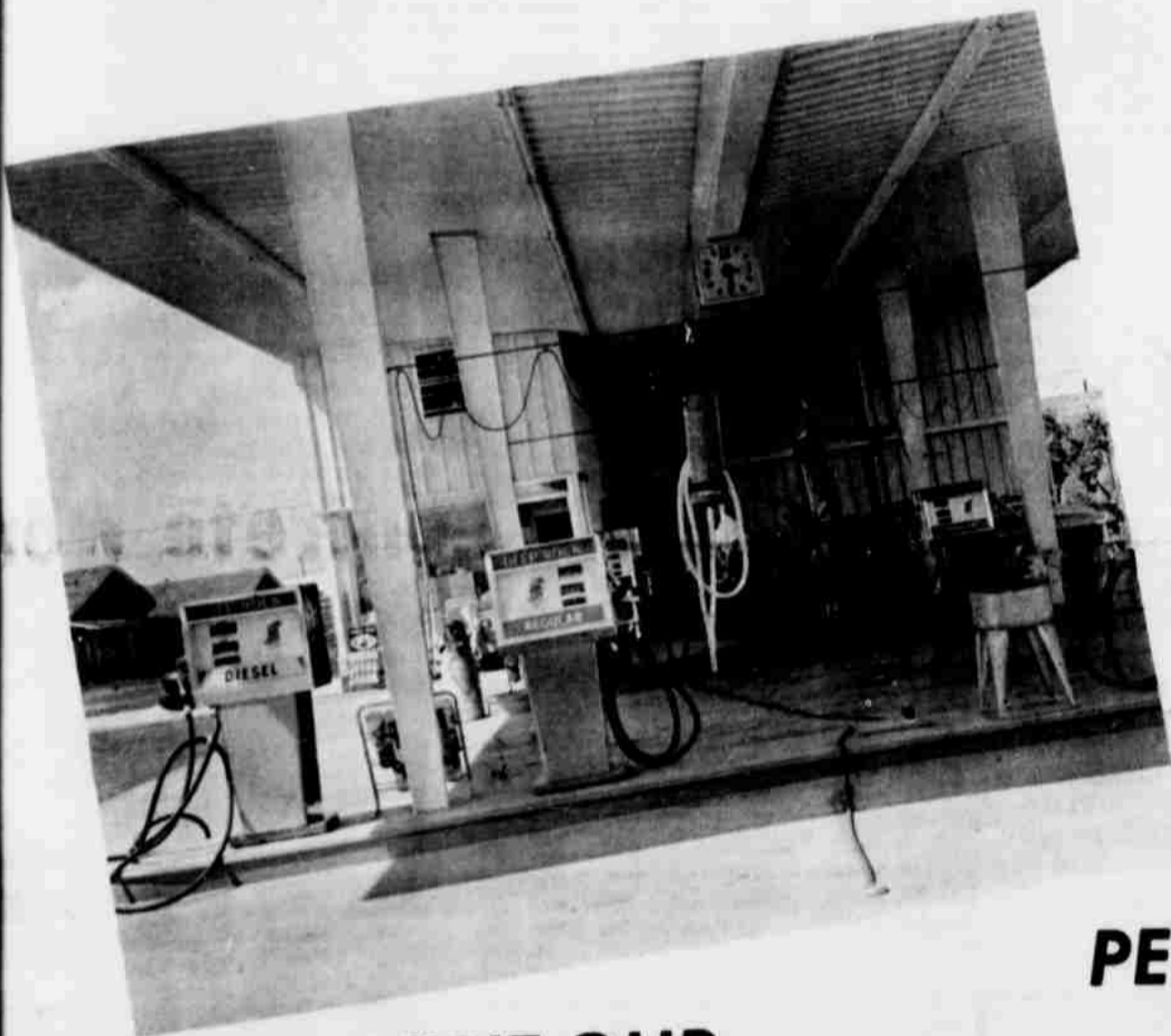

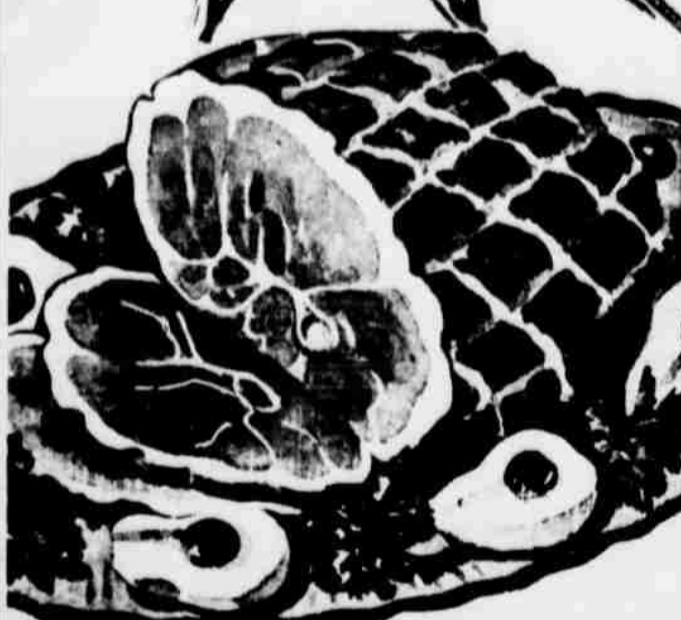

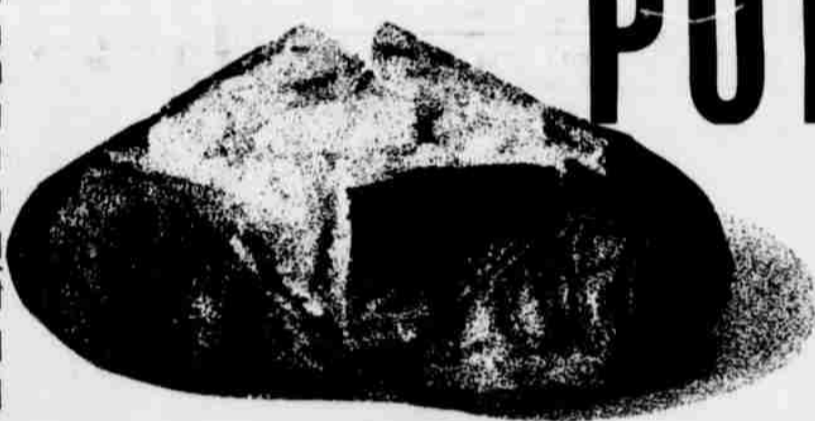

### Where Americans Segregate Themselves

We have a developing situation here in Chicago... (Now that is the most masterful understatement since Noah said, "It looks like rain...")

We have many "situations" partly because we have several cities within this megalopolis. One of them is a Puerto Rican community on the northwest side. That neighborhood, for one mile along Division Street, formerly was mostly Polish and Bohemian. Now 40,000 Puerto Ricans live there.

You drive down those streets and places of business are mostly identified by Puerto Rican names; advertising signs are in Spanish.

This is not a slum. The mostly two-story brick buildings are quite elegant compared to what's average in much of the world. Recently this area has been the scene of street rioting between residents and policemen, and the explanation or "excuse" for the rioting is called "lack of communication."

The "language barrier," we are told, has contributed to this smoldering enmity between Latin residents and English-speaking police.

Guess what "solution" is being urged upon the commissioner of police; That he should send his area policemen to Puerto Rico to learn to speak the language of this Chicago community.

No American is all-American. Even our early American Indians migrated from Asia. One of the wonderful things about our homogeneous society is that all Americans are "mostly something else."

It is as rude to reside in one country and retain the language of another as it would be to keep a picture of your first wife in your second wife's bedroom.

By an historical coincidence, Puerto Ricans are not "foreigners" in the strict sense that some of the 14 ethnic groups which surround that mile-square Puerto Rican community in Chicago are.

But for others, acceptance in our society, since it is their choice, should be their responsibility. Ironically, many have fled persecution to America -- yet brought with them some of the very "big government" philosophy which persecuted them. Chicago police who can speak Spanish have been transferred to

the troubled area; all police vehicles in the area have been integrated.

Meanwhile, 11,000 Puerto Rican children are being taught "English as a second language" in Chicago public schools.

But perhaps, instead of relaxing immigration barriers, it would be well to prescribe that those standing in line for admission to the United States should first prepare themselves to become comfortably assimilated...

Rather than to segregate themselves. (T-M, WRR Gen. Fea. Corp.)

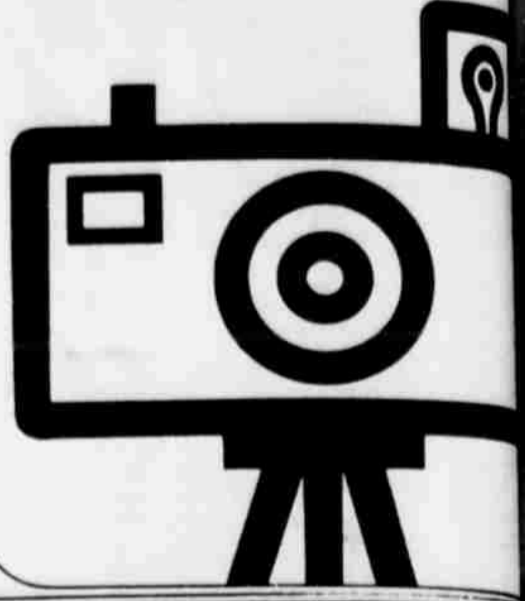
