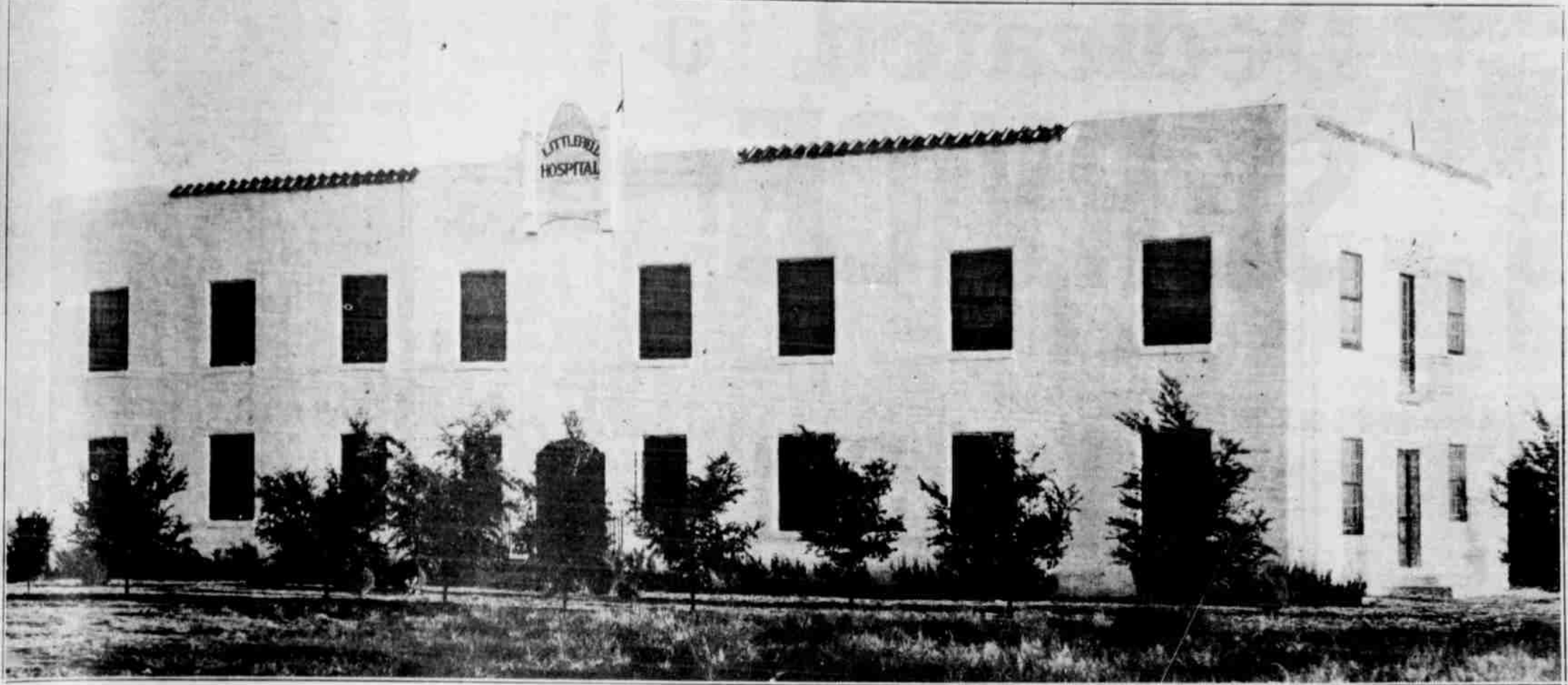

# FORMAL OPENING OF HOSPITAL ANNOUNCED

## Oxygen Tent Is Purchased By Littlefield Hospital

ESPECIALLY GOOD IN CASES OF PNEUMONIA

Superintendent Coffman Tells How Equipment Operates

An order has been placed by the Littlefield Hospital with the Heid Company of Minneapolis, Minn., for an Aero (oxygen) tent, according to Floyd Coffman, Superintendent. It is expected this will be received before December 1st, when the season, during which pneumonia is more prevalent, starts.

This new equipment which, will include a tank and supplies, will represent an investment of between four and five hundred dollars. It will be especially beneficial to pneumonia cases, said Mr. Coffman, who added "The lung consolidates and fills up, starting at the bottom, and the capacity of the lung is filled with fluid, preventing breathing. The tent will allow the patient to consume the needed amount of oxygen, even though the lung is impaired. It makes breathing easier. It filters the air as it comes in, so the patient gets pure oxygen."

Whatever is the patient's oxygen requirement, it is delivered evenly under automatic regulation at any desired rate between 1 and 15 liters per minute. If the operator wishes to quickly build up the oxygen concentration, a self-closing flush valve provides for it.

If the patient's oxygen supply should be increased or decreased, the Aero-tent provides for such adjustment without affecting either the circulation, cooling or humidity. This independent control of the oxygen

The Mexicans were very kind and patient and anxious to help us learn their language. No matter how much repeating was necessary. They were very pleased that we wanted to learn. In conversation with a number of Mexicans I found that they think what we of the U. S. and Mexico's most need is to learn each others language, hence bring about a more complete understanding in spirit and friendship.

The scenes along the railroad gave us an insight into the life of the peons, their homes and modes of dress and living. They live in huts of mud and grass and some, very few, of lumber. They farm with oxen in many parts. However, in some parts they used machinery.

Their principal crop is corn and beans, and the soil is very rich.

Tunas are also a common food, the fruit from catuses.

Another scene along the railroad was the woman washing. They take their clothes down to the stream, wash them on a stone washboard and spread them on the grass and weeds to dry.

On several occasions I have noticed women and children bathing in the streams.

Before going to Mexico City we went to Guadalupe, a city that has kept its colonial atmosphere.

supply is one of the Aero-tent's outstanding features.

Cooling and proper relative humidity are automatically maintained. Once the patient is tucked in and the oxygen-meter is set, an even flow of oxygen and all the circulating air pass through the ice chamber, and are delivered to the tent hood properly dried and reduced in temperature. Over twenty degrees of cooling is obtainable—sufficient for any case.

The carbon dioxide content of the patient's air is controlled by the simple expedient of inserting or removing soda lime from the circulation. A removable basket holds the soda lime and provides for easy cleaning and refilling. The basket holds sufficient soda lime for from 15 to 20 hours of operation.
