Recipe of the week:

- TUNA or CHICKEN STARS**
- 1 can Tuna or 6 or 7 oz. chicken
 - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 - 2 hard boiled eggs, chopped
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped green pepper
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped sweet pickle
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped apple
 - 2 tablespoons diced pimiento
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - dash of pepper
 - 1/3 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
 - 4 medium large tomatoes.
- Combine all ingredients for tuna salad. Turn tomato stems end down; cut (not quite through) in six sections and spread apart. Fill with prepared tuna salad.

Top with a carrot curl or radish rose, after sprinkling with paprika. Serves 4.

Three Schools In Seminar

A seminar for the able and gifted youth in smaller high schools will begin at South Plains College Oct. 9.

South Plains College is one of five colleges in the state participating in the small schools project. Other colleges are Cisco Junior College, Henderson County Junior College, Hillsboro Junior College, and Sam Houston State Teachers College.

John P. Yates, South Plains College counselor, has been designated as the coordinator for the project. Other SPC instructors will be utilized in the seminar.
