CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS: In this forthcoming election, will you contribute a dollar to the candidate of your choice? Have you ever contributed a single dollar to a political party? Most of us have not. Where then do politicians get the money to run their offices? Largely from industrialists, labor unions, corporations and other business groups. Do these contributions compromise them? Honest men no. But even so incorruptible a senator as Paul Douglas has said that this method of campaign financing is "Corrupting in a subconscious way the candidate turns to his donors and supporters as flow-ers turn towards the sun."

Suggested solutions to the problem: (1) Allow income tax deductions for campaign contributions. (2) Have the federal government defray all campaign costs. (3) Educate the citizenry to contribute willingly. As in Great Britain, pass laws requiring the radio and newspapers to contribute freely to candidates since TV has lately become one of the heaviest of all campaign expenses.

showed building continuing at a record rate and surpassed the record set in 1960, with two months remaining in this year. Through October the total for building permits issued in 1962 is \$1,232,942 compared to the entire 1960 total of \$1,155,444. This figure also represents almost a million dollar increase over last year's building activity which through October totaled \$312,440. The total for October this year was \$136,425, compared to \$14,750 for the same month in 1961 and \$58,350 in 1960. Several new residences and one new business building were counted among permits issued during October. Building con-

tinues strong both in Crescent Park and Cannon Terrace additions. Local building contractors could give no definite reason for the boom but none seemed disappointed. One commented the boom was spontaneous, adding that it started early this year and just seemed to continue as persons who were thinking about building, went ahead with their plans and built new homes. Permits issued during October include: Earl Williams, a house moved in on Central Street valued at \$600. Guy Hawkins, addition of a room to a home valued at \$150. (See Building on Page 9)

### Sudan Men Injured In Lubbock Wreck

Four Sudan men were injured in a head-on auto accident at the outskirts of Lubbock Tuesday evening about 6 on the Littlefield Highway. Injured were James P. Arnold, W. E. Handcock, Nolan Parrish and R. P. Markham. The four men were enroute to the annual inter-city Rotary Club meeting. Driver of the other auto involved was George Quirk of Floydada. Arnold was driving the Sudan auto. None of the four men was seriously hurt according to a report Wednesday morning. Parrish, manager of a tire shop, was the more seriously injured. His head went through the front windshield of the auto and required several stitches. He was in the emergency three hours. Handcock, superintendent of schools, received a cracked rib and facial injuries. Markham, lumberyard manager, was

badly bruised. Both men were riding in the back seat. Arnold, vice-president of the bank, received a cut on his lower lip and a broken rib. Investigating officers said the car driven by Quirk went out of control as he headed west. The right front of Quirk's car struck the right front of Arnold's vehicle, headed east, in the south lane of the roadway, which is under construction. The vehicles swerved slightly after colliding and came to rest: headed south, with the front of Quirk's auto nosed off the highway, which drops about a foot from the pavement to a gravel base. Both vehicles were heavily damaged.

### Area Schools Battle Friday

Both the Wildcats and Demons scored strong wins last Friday night and some sports experts consider this the game to decide District 1-AAA. Littlefield upset the Perryton Rangers 33-0 while Dumas poured it on Levelland, 34-0 as expected. Dumas is the defending District and State champion and sport several stars from last year's team.

"We know that Dumas has a powerful team," John Howle, head LHS coach, said, "and they have beaten a lot of fine clubs this year." "They have practically the same line from last season," the coach continued, "with an average of about 210 pounds per man." The Wildcat line averages about 190. He explained that most of the starters are seniors have much experience. "We are going to try and make a good showing against the Demons," he stated, "and just hope we have the same team effort we had last Friday." "I really don't know where to start in naming the Demons' outstanding players," Howle said, "they all play good ball, and none of them can be discounted."

Some of the Dumas stars are Kelly Baker, 215 - pound all-state end; Lyle Peiffer, 205-pound center; Jerry Glover, 198 pound lineman; Donnie Schumann, 210-pound tackle; Kenneth Williams, 210 - pound tackle and captain; Leon Kirkpatrick, 230 - pound middle guard; Joe Parsons, offensive quarterback; Doug Holtzman, backfield with a lot of speed and good pass; Dubian Miller, fast back, runs at half back; Joe Casos, good running back; Paul Jones, 210 pound fullback. Howle said he would start about the same team he did against Perryton, speaking about the Perryton contest, he said the victory was a "great team effort with every player ready to play."

"We hope everyone will make the trip to Dumas," he continued, "and back the Wildcats as they have early this season." (See Grid on Page 8)

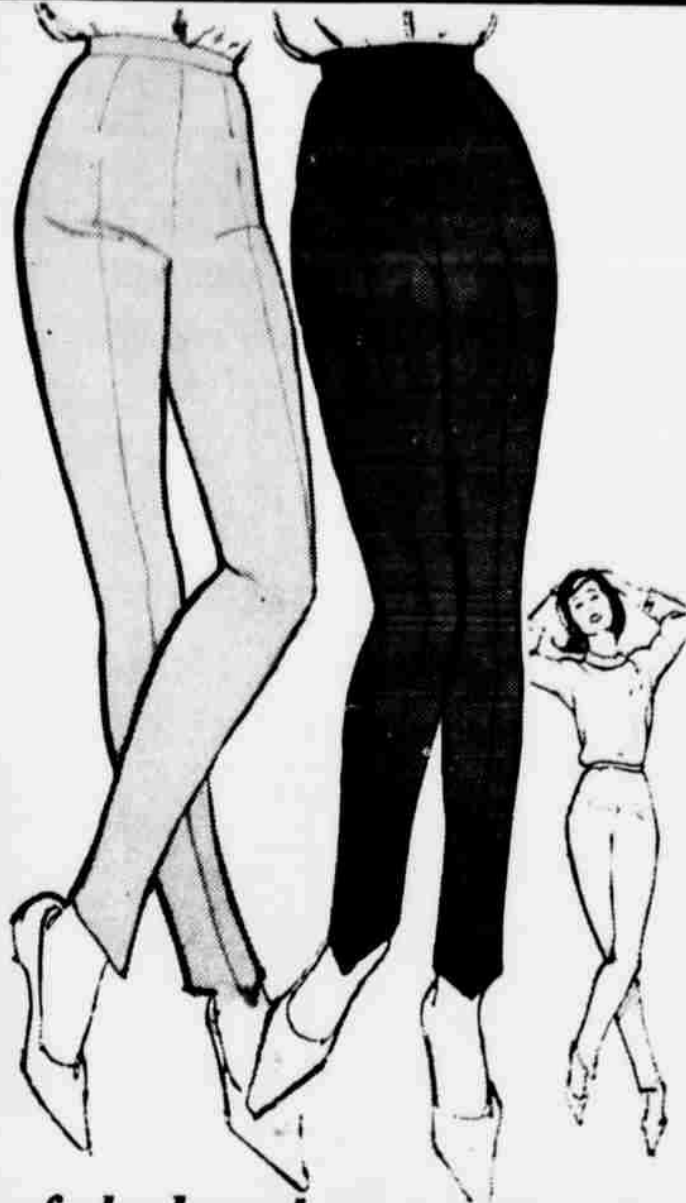

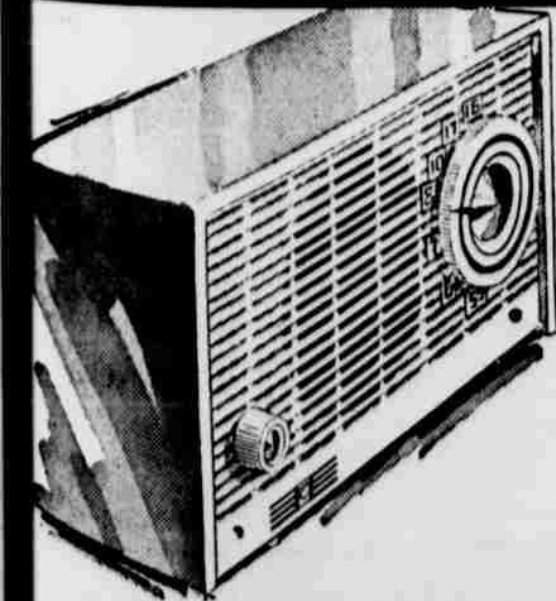

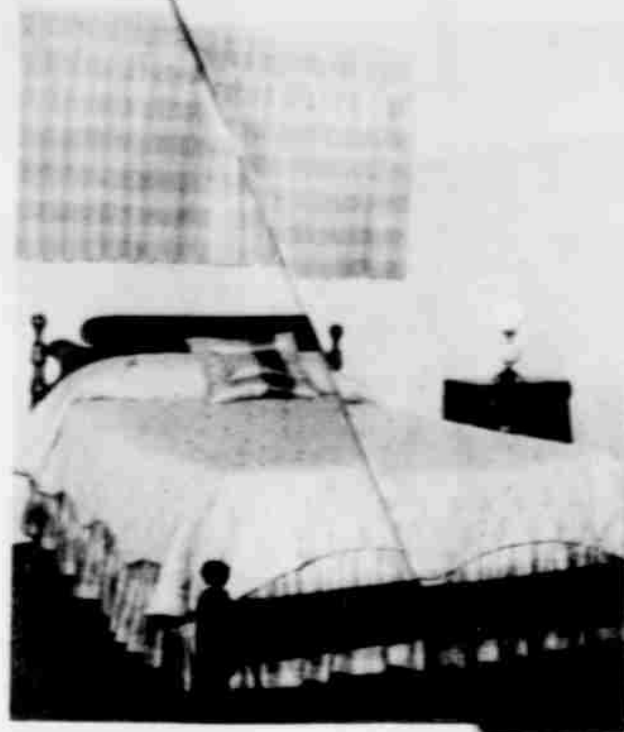

## Early American Decor Used In Glover Home

"This will be our home from now on," Mrs. Cephus Glover emphasized as she described the "tender loving care" that had gone into the planning of their new home at 101 E. 21st Street.

The Glovers moved in two months ago, since 1955 they have lived on their farm 4 1/2 miles northeast of Littlefield.

Four shades of brick, varying from natural to pink, were used in building the 1700 square — foot house. The double — bay garage is in the rear of the house with the driveway entering from a side street.

A Spanish L — shaped entrance hall connects the front door with every room in the living area of the house. It is floored with quarry tile.

The Glovers elected to put all of their emphasis on a den, "since there are only the two of us, we would never use a formal living room," Mrs. Glover pointed out.

The 15 by 24 foot room is furnished with Early American furniture, including a high — backed maple rocker.

Centering the outside wall of the den is a 12 — foot fireplace built of the same brick as the exterior. Doors in the rear of the mantle enable wood to be placed inside and ashes to be removed without entering the house.

One of the outstanding features of the den is a built — in barbecue oven at one end. Coals can be lifted from the fireplace directly into the oven which will enable the "chef" to combine the comforts of a centrally air conditioned and heated house with the pleasures of outdoor cooking. A door opens onto a back yard terrace.

The den is paneled in natural — finished birch. All — wood carpeting in "frosted cocoa" gives warmth to the room.

A large opening at one end of the den leads to the kitchen — dining area. Matching birch cabinets and paneling are used in this area.

Floors and counters are covered in gold — speckled vinyl. A dining bar separates the kitchen from the dining area which also features Early American decor.

A General Electric refrigerator,

an oversized oven and the double sink are all finished in wood in brown. Provincial print curtains hang over the small window overlooking the front yard.

Just off the dining area is a utility room where a large "farm — size" home freeter has been installed. Space was also left for a washer and dryer.

Opening off the utility room is the garage and a full bath with a shower.

"Since we're farmers, Cephus needs a place to shower and change his muddy clothes before coming into the rest of the house," Mrs. Glover explained. The bath is finished in natural ceramic tile.

In the garage are two storage closets, one cedar — lined for out-of-season clothes.

Two bedrooms and a large bath make up the other end of the house.

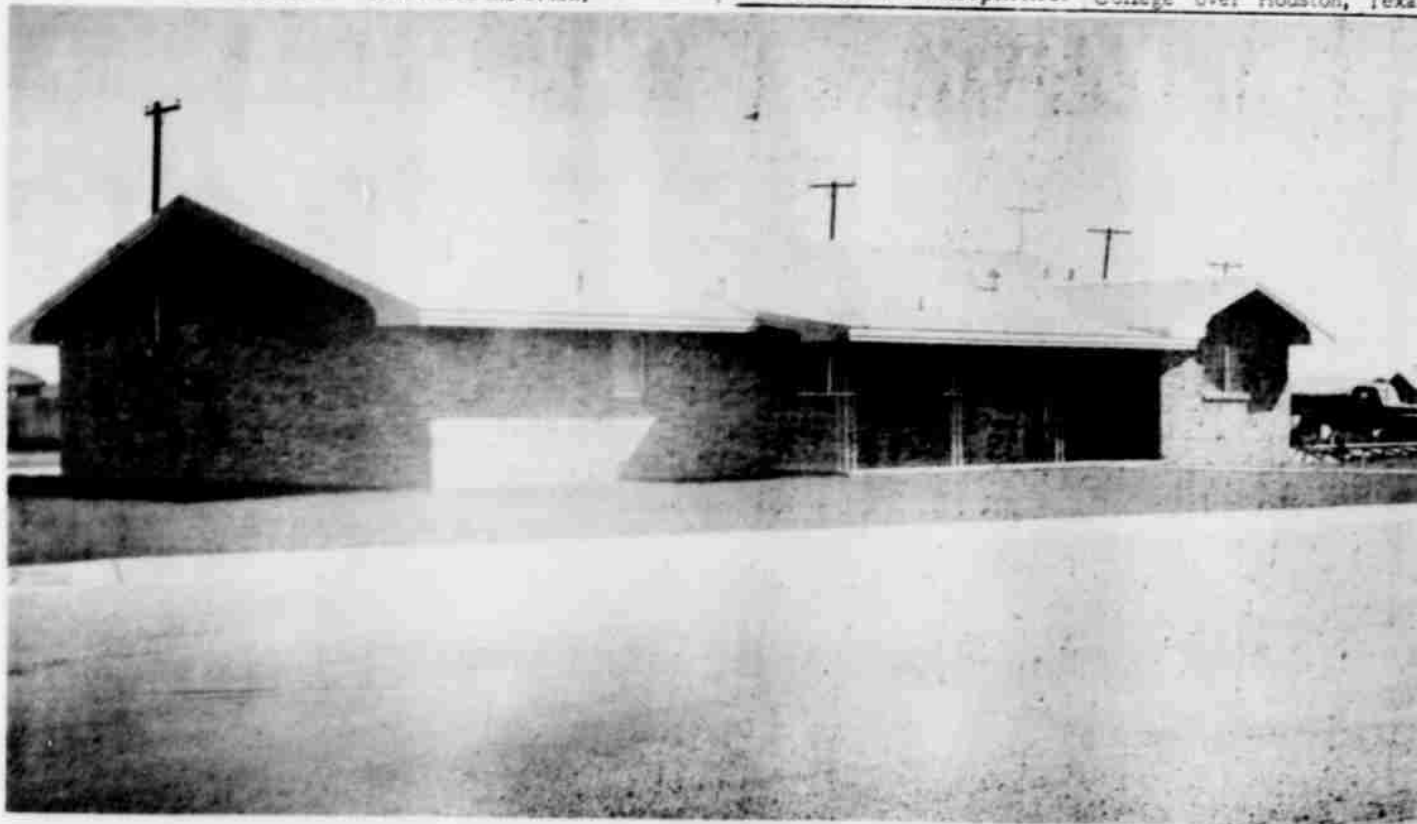
Shades of brown and violet are used to decorate the guest bedroom which features French Provincial furniture. All of the walls in this area are off — white.

"Frosted cocoa" carpeting is continued throughout the bedroom wing. The only exception is in the over — sized bath which is completely covered with shantung — colored carpeting.

The orchid shades are also used in the bath and blue and greens are introduced as accent tones in the color scheme.

Early American furniture is used in the large master bedroom. Bedspreads and drapes are done in shades of gold and yellow. Opening off the master bedroom is a large, room — size walk — in closet.

Wilson — Crump Lumber Company was the general contractor. Mac Humphreys, who is associated with the firm, drew the plans. Painting and tile work was done by Leon Stansell. Bob Cox was the plumbing contractor, and Howard Burke did the electrical work and James Bales laid the brick.



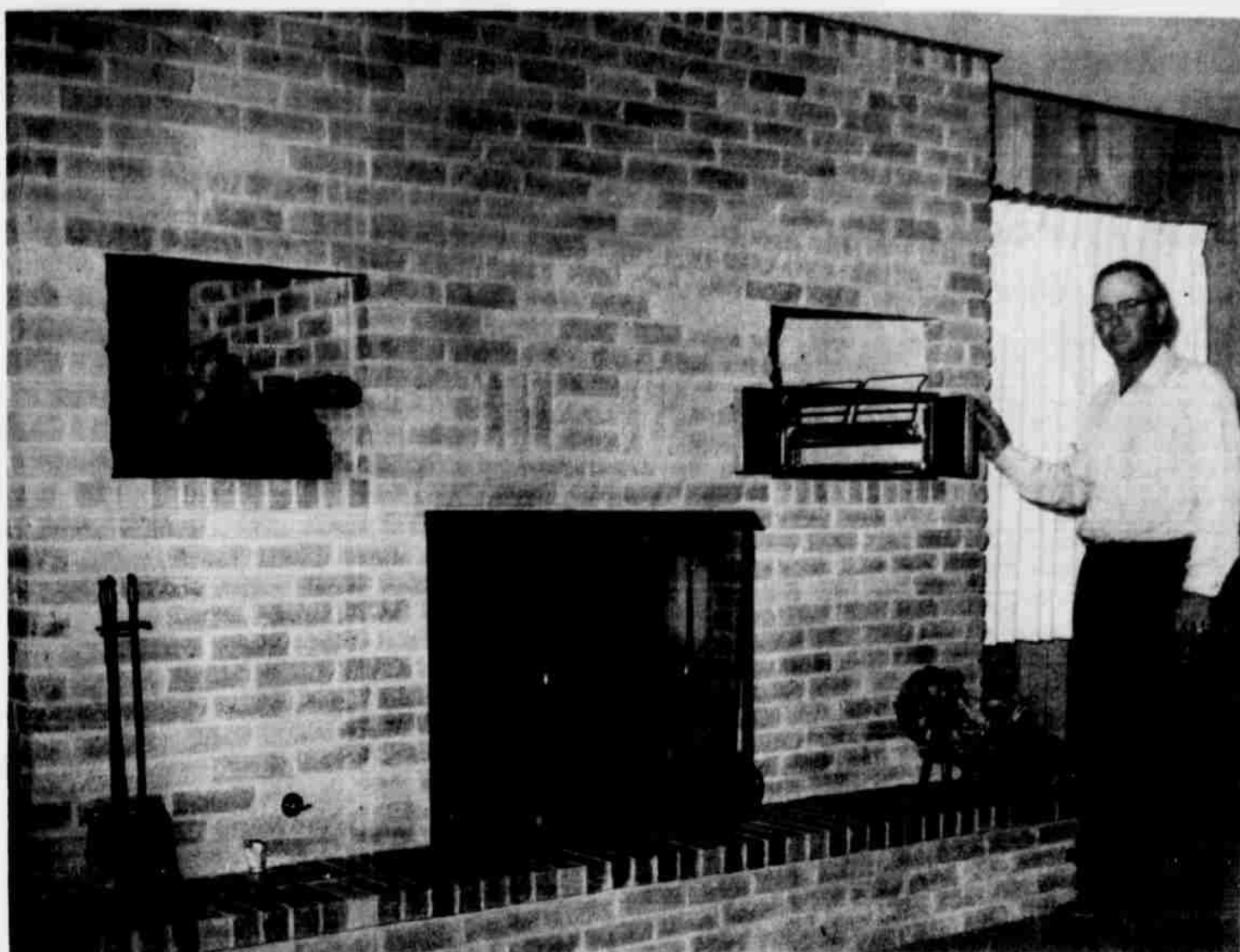

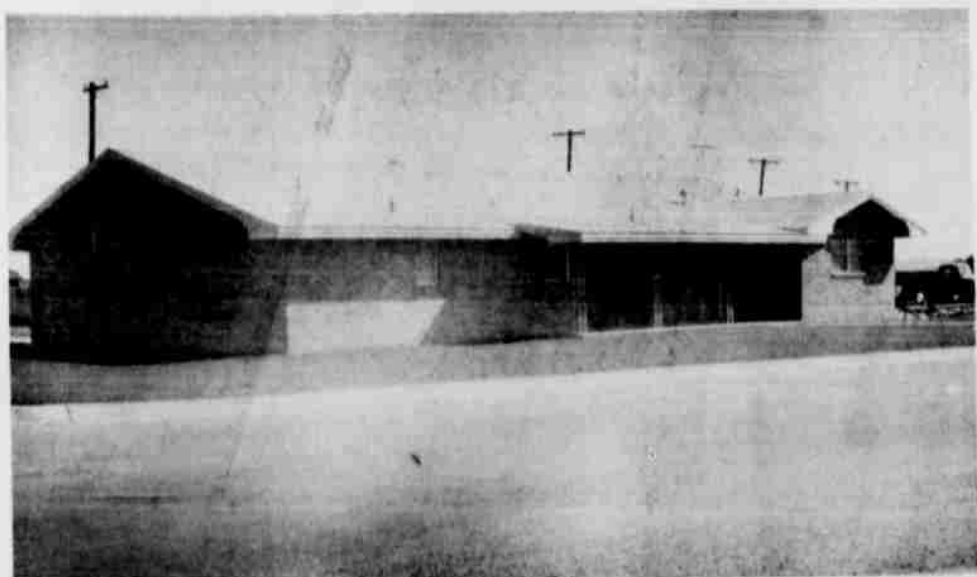
