Olton Stock Show To Open Friday

Olton 19th annual Junior Livestock Show gets underway today with livestock being entered and sifted, but the grand opening occurs Friday with swine judging starting at 1 p.m.

The show is open only to FFA, 4-H and FHA members residing in the Olton school district. Sheep judging follows the hog show, with the lambs taking the spotlight at 4 p.m. Friday. Steer judging is set for 1 p.m. Saturday and will be followed by an auction.

W. T. Hall is president of the stock show organization. Judges for the show include Dixon Hubbard of Lubbock, steers; Larry Tackett of Happy, hogs; and Gregg of Plainview, sheep.

In the steer show, champion Angus, Shorthorn and Hereford will compete for the grand champion. Reserve champion in the winning breed will then move up and compete with the other two breed champions for reserve grand champion.

Grand champion will be awarded a trophy and reserve grand, a banner. First five place in lightweight and heavyweight steers will get a ribbon and cash award. First places will receive \$5; seconds, \$4; thirds, \$3; fourths, \$2; and fifths, \$1.

In the swine show, champions breed will get a rosette and trophy. First through eight places in all classes will receive ribbons and cash awards. First places will get \$3; second, \$2; third, \$2; and fourth through eighth, \$1.

In the junior gilt show, all first place gilts will compete for grand champion.

All first place lambs will compete for the grand champion, which will be awarded a trophy and banner. Reserve grand will receive a banner. First through fifth places will get a ribbon and cash award. First places will get \$3; seconds, \$2; and third through fifth places, \$1.

Trophies for champion lambs will be donated by Olton Sheep Breeders Assn., and trophies for champion swine by Olton Swine Breeders Assn.

Champion steer trophies will be donated by individuals.

Farm Bureau and Farmers Union will donate grand champion and reserve grand champion trophies.

RASH OF TRAFFIC CRASHES IN COUNTY

Woman Killed Near Olton

A rash of Lamb County highway mishaps over the weekend and Monday have left one woman dead and seven persons injured.

Killed was Mrs. Lewis B. Hammond, 69-year-old resident of the Halfway community. Her husband and another man were injured in a near head-on crash 5 miles west of Olton on US-70 Monday evening.

Harold Smotherman of Littlefield was hospitalized south of Plant X. The car rolled over once after Smotherman failed to negotiate a curve 6.8 miles north of Amherst.

Two teenage girls were injured in a pickup-car crash

south of Amherst on US-84 Sunday at 3 p.m. Victoria Serna and Kathy Serna, both about 15, were hospitalized at Amherst, and Kathy was later transferred to a Lubbock hospital.

Another man was injured in a two-car crash near Olton Saturday, and a Spade woman was hurt in a one-car mishap Friday night near Fieldton.

The fatality occurred about 6:20 p.m. Monday. Mrs. Hammond was riding in a car driven by her husband, and the impact of the collision threw her into the windshield. Driver of the other car was Albert A. Escobedo, 48, of Olton.

Texas Highway Patrolman

Bill Angel said the Escobedo vehicle apparently pulled onto US-70 in front of Hammond, who was driving east. The cars hit almost head-on in Hammon's lane of traffic.

Hammond was brought to Littlefield Hospital where his condition was reported as fair Tuesday night. Escobedo was taken to Olton Clinic and his condition was listed as fair Monday night.

Funeral arrangements for Mrs. Hammonds were pending at Parsons Funeral Home, Olton, Wednesday morning. She and Hammonds were married May 16, 1953. The couple moved to Halfway recently from the

Earth area in Lamb County.

Survivors include her husband; three sons, Everett Barrett of Albuquerque, Cecil Barrett of Farmington, N.M., and Ben Barrett of Seattle, Wash.; seven daughters, Mrs. Blanche Allen and Mrs. Glynas Pillow, both of Plainview, Mrs. Opal Lowe of Earth, Mrs. Ruby Presley of San Clemente, Calif., Mrs. Ruth Landers of Los Angeles, Mrs. Martha Allen of Oklahoma City, and Mrs. Betty Brooks of Dimmitt; a step-son, Buddy Hammond of Los Angeles; two step-daughters, Mrs. Christine McNamara of Springlake; and 21 grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren.

The two teenage girls injured in the crash near Amherst Sunday afternoon were passengers in a car driven by John Hernandez, 16, of Littlefield. Driver of the pickup was Charles A. Shafer of Big Lake.

The Hernandez car, Patrolman Angel reported, pulled onto US-84 in the path of the approaching Shafer vehicle. The Hernandez car was hit almost broadside, and Kathy Serna was knocked about 30 feet from the vehicle. Neither driver was hospitalized.

Willis C. White, 74, of Springlake was hospitalized at Olton Clinic following a two-car crash

on the west edge of Olton at 11:45 p.m. Saturday. White's vehicle was in collision with one driven by Howard G. McCaleb of Olton.

Angel reported McCaleb's vehicle was on the shoulder of US-70 headed west, and the driver attempted a U-turn when the collision occurred. White was also headed west.

Mrs. J.S. Brown was seriously injured in the accident near Fieldton Friday night. Her car crashed into a highline pole where FM-37 intersects with FM-1072. She was hospitalized at Littlefield Hospital with a broken leg and head injuries.

Jail Escapee Behind Bars Again

City, School Candidates Shy In County

Activity is slow on the political fronts in city and school trustee elections over Lamb County.

Three men have filed for the two positions open in the Littlefield School District trustee election in April. These are incumbent Jack Barton and new candidates Pat Downs and Ray McKinney.

At Springlake, incumbents James Busby and Roger Haber are seeking reelection, but no other candidates have filed. The term of Leon Dent also expires along with those of Busby and Haber, but Dent has established residence in Austin.

No one filed at Springlake or Earth last week in city elections. Mayor Marcus Messer and councilmen E.C. Kelly, Wendell Clayton and Thurman Lewis have terms expiring at Earth.

The terms of Mayor Floyd Crawford and councilmen Jim Stephens, Howard McClure and Bill Perkins expire at Springlake. There are also two vacancies due to councilmen moving.

Deadline for filing is 30 days prior to the April 4 trustee elections and April 7 city elections. No terms are expiring in the Littlefield City Council this year.

County Column

Olton's plan to widen Highway 70 was stalled last week with word that the state will ask 100 feet of right-of-way along the highway. The Olton council had sought a commitment on the basis of 90 feet of right-of-way. The Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture committee plans to meet with District Engineer O. L. Crain of Lubbock soon to discuss the project.

The Littlefield choir has been invited to sing for the annual convention of the Texas State Teachers in Lubbock March 6. An estimated three thousand teachers and school officers are expected to attend this meet which will be held at Texas Tech this year.

Land Case Trial Slated; Court Hears Guilty Pleas

A Lamb County Court jury was called for 10 a.m. today by Judge J.B. Davis, with a civil suit set for retrial.

The jury was called, then dismissed Tuesday for action on several criminal cases. Pleas of guilty were heard on all but one of the cases, and the plea is set for Friday.

The civil suit set today is a forcible entry and detainer case which was tried here last month and ended with a hung jury. The suit is styled "Ruth Kirkpatrick vs. Lowell Walden." The plaintiff seeks possession of a farm in the north

part of Lamb County on which Walden is the present tenant. Sentences assessed by Judge Davis in the guilty pleas Tuesday: George Cook, liquor law violation, fined \$100 each on two counts plus court costs; Love Hambrick, driving while intoxicated, \$100 and 5 days in jail; James Hooper, liquor law violation, \$100 plus costs; J.T. Carr, driving while intoxicated, \$100 plus costs; Bobby Wynn, check law violation, \$35 plus costs.

Jaybird Johnson, charged with a liquor law violation, is scheduled to appear before the judge Friday.

Raymond Torres Delgado, 28-year-old convicted robber and escapee from the Lamb County jail, was behind bars again here Wednesday with another armed robbery charge and thefts of a car and pickup added to his record.

Littlefield Highway Patrolman Bill Angel arrested Delgado about 3 a.m. Sunday in his flight from the scene of an armed robbery at Abernathy, Delgado, an Olton resident, was charged with hijacking an Abernathy service station attendant of about \$78.

Angel spotted Delgado heading towards Littlefield, about 4 miles east on FM-54. When he turned quickly to pursue the suspect, Delgado turned off the highway but the stolen pickup stalled in a field.

Delgado surrendered to the patrolman almost immediately, offering no resistance. Angel found a .32 automatic pistol in the seat of the pickup. Littlefield City Patrolman Troy Coons and Bill Austin also arrived at the scene after hearing Angel's report on police radio. They assisted in returning Delgado to the county jail.

Following Delgado at the time of his arrest was Jack Connell, a County Line farmer who owned the stolen pickup. Delgado had taken the pickup after a stolen car he was driving stuck in a narrow ditch near Connell's farm.

Sheriff Dick Dyer said Delgado refused to sign a statement admitting the Abernathy robbery and the vehicle thefts. However, the station attendant--Trigg Upchurch--came to Littlefield Sunday and identified Delgado as the man who held him up at gunpoint.

Delgado, sentenced to 17 years for armed robbery, was awaiting transfer to prison when he escaped the Lamb jail Feb. 17. A girl friend reportedly slipped Delgado a sawblade. He cut through a substitute bar near an outside window and greased himself with lard and

squeezed through a small opening to make his escape.

Delgado had pleaded guilty to an armed robbery charge, taking about \$890 from John Boyles, Spade grocer, on Sept. 29. He was captured at Olton about four hours later. He was sentenced in district court Feb. 10.

Sheriff Dyer said Hale County is expected to place a "hold" warrant on Delgado in connection with the Abernathy robbery. Meanwhile, the sheriff is investigating Delgado's story about the person who slipped him a sawblade to aid in his escape here. If the story checks out, charges will be filled in connection with that violation.

According to officers, Delgado had hidden in Lubbock most of the week and began drinking Saturday night. He took a car belonging to Catalino M. Rodriguez of Lubbock early Sunday morning. The Abernathy station attendant said Delgado bought \$2 worth of gasoline about 1:25 a.m. Sunday, then returned on foot about

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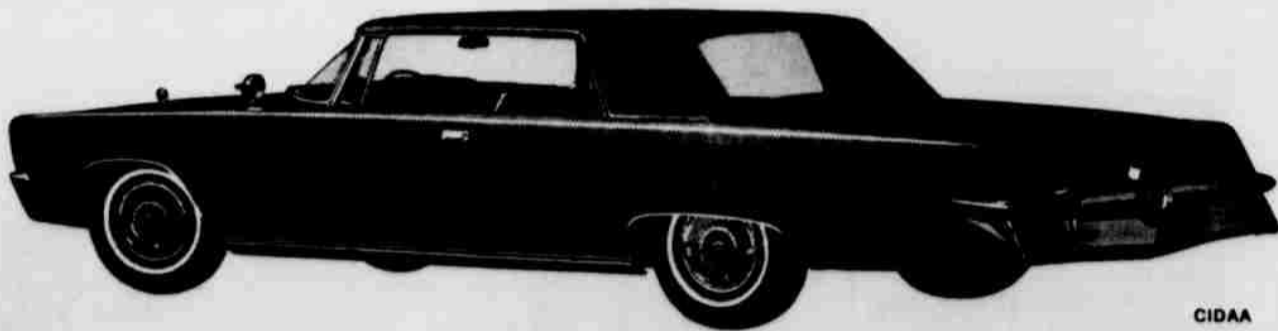

The judges will rate according to five divisions, ranges from Division I-superior to division V-very poor.

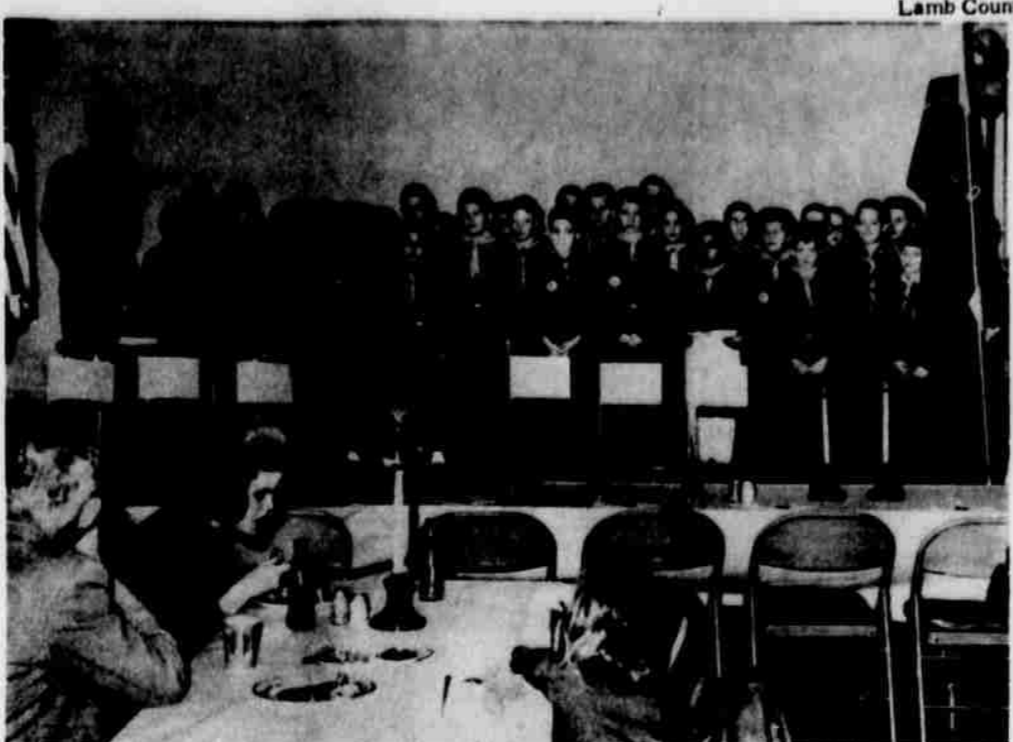

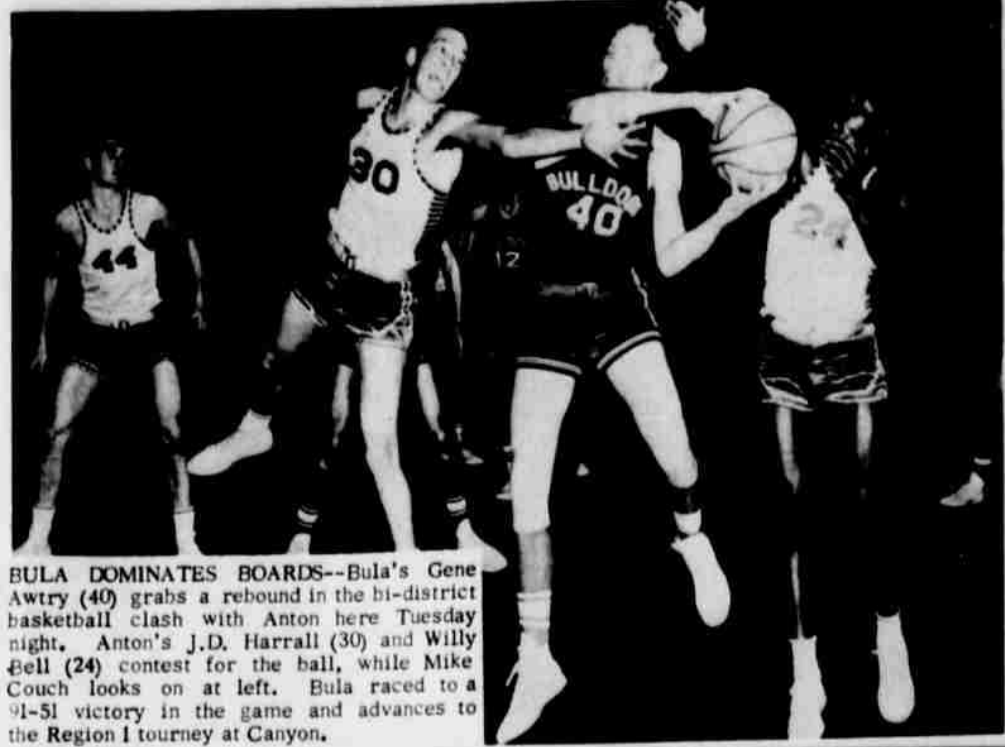

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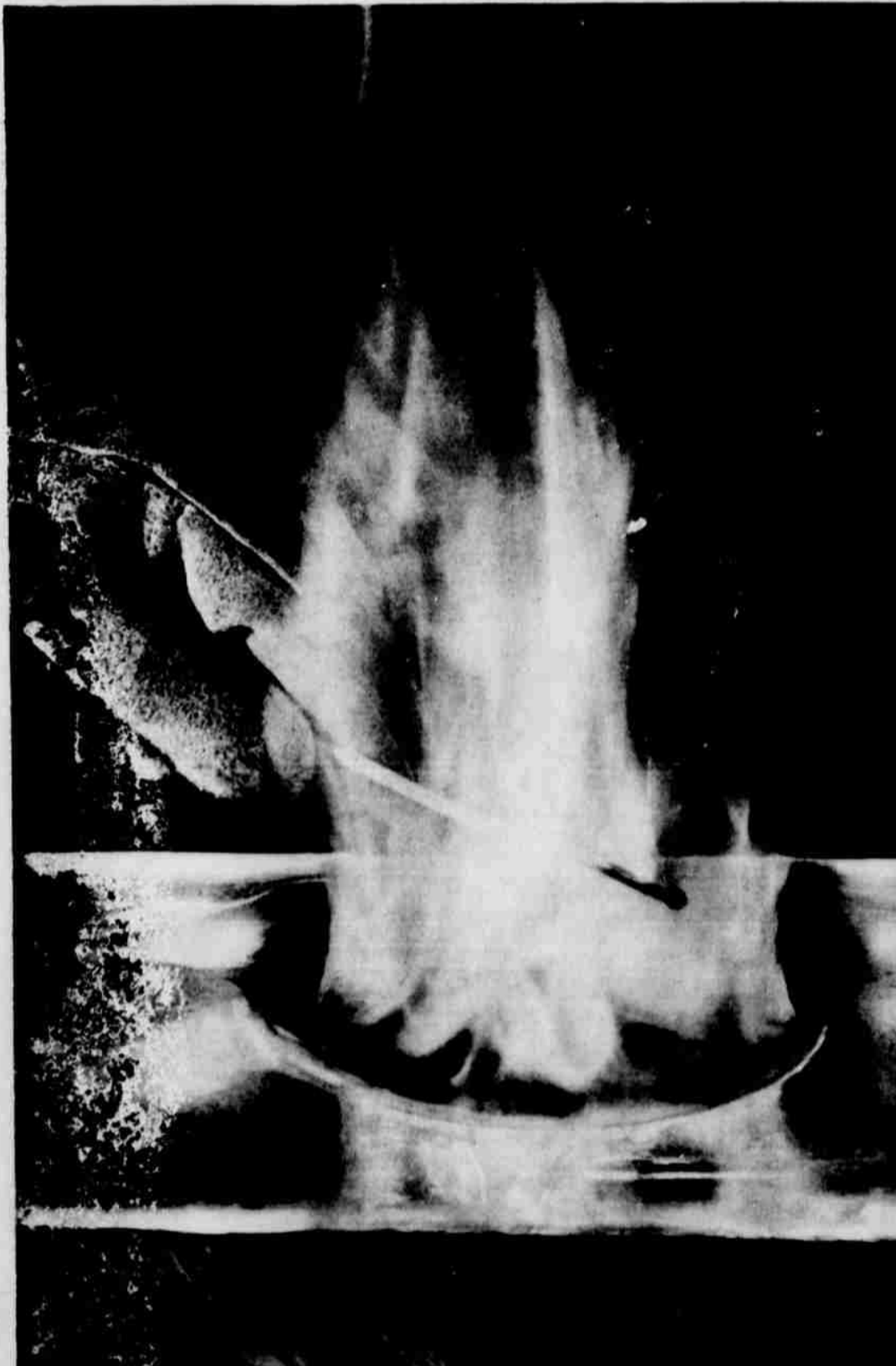

Don't Forget Gasoline Tax

When you start adding up the deductions on page 2 of your 1964 federal income tax form, don't forget state gasoline taxes. Do a little adding up and you'll be surprised at how much you paid during the past year.

State gasoline taxes range from 5 cents a gallon in Texas, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois and Hawaii up to 8 cents in Alaska. These, of course, are added on to the 4-cents-a-gallon federal tax which is not deductible.

A motorist who drives 10,000 miles in a year and who gets 15 miles to the gallon on his car, pays between \$60 to \$80 in gasoline taxes. More than half of this is paid in state taxes which are deductible. As long as you pay them, you might as well deduct them.
