## **Cover Crop Important** In Fighting Erosion

### Recipe for Bread and **Butter Pickles**

Many requests have come into the extension service office for pickling. Miss Dian McClurkin, assistant county home demonstration agent-in-trining gives the following

Look and see what per cent of acid is in the vinegar. If it is over 6 percent acid it will have to be diluted. A vinegar that is too high a percent in acid makes pickles dark, soft, or shriveled. Spices should be used in small

amounts. Tie the spices in a thin cloth bag then they can be taken out when the pickles the flavored enough. Loose spices make pickles dark. If you boil the spices with the vinegar too long, it will make the pickles taste bitter; long boiling spoils the flavor of vinegar,

Glass jars with glass lids are best for use in canning pickles. The vinegar or salt solution may corrode metal lids and when a zinc lid is badly corroded, there is danger of sine poisoning.

Here is a recipe for a quick but good pickle: Bread and Butter Pickles

24 medium to large cucumbers. 3 tablespoons salt. 10 onions.

2 cups sugar. 3 cups vinegar.

About 1 teaspoon each of these spices:

Ginger Tumeric Celery seed Mustard seed




