United States Must Strengthen Heritage To Preserve It, Judge Bills Asserts

ericans must improve their democracy and the American way of life in order to preserve them, Judge E. A. Bills told some 250 members of the Lamb County Teachers Association and their guests at a meeting Monday night at the Littlefield high school auditorium.

Judge Bills characterized the eachers present and others of this generation as trustees of the heritage of liberty and the freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, with responsibilities simin estates which they were legally and morally bound to preserve and protect.

"In order to preserve and protect the estate if often become necessary to improve it," he asserted. "That is the position that we in America is life tenants of our heritages find ourselves to-

He described the church, the schools and the courts as the bulwarks of American democracy and praised the part played by the teachers in the preservation and perpetuation of the American ideal.

Communism, he warned would destroy the American estate the schools and the courts. Should the Communists ever succeed in this the American way of life is doomed, he said.

He urged the study of United States history and civics be made required four-year courses in all high schools in order that the students have a better knowledge of the price paid for the freedoms which so many now take for granted.
