Farley said the project had met with far greater success than was ever hoped for at first. The ex-baseball player and ex-wrestler related how he first got the idea for the ranch when he saw so many boys who should have been in school hanging around ball parks and wrestling arenas.

"Watching those lads who didn't have much family life and no way to get food but steal it made me realize they needed help in the worst way," he said.

Early in 1934 the Maverick club for boys was started in Amarillo with Farley as head. Before long, however, Farley said he began to realize the boys who belonged to a regular boy's club were not the ones who really needed help.

"It was the kids who were ducking school and running with the wrong type of companions we wanted to help," he recalled. "And it was the boy who was continually in trouble with the law that we wanted most to aid in some way."

Set Up Boy's Ranch
So Farley, with the help of Amarillo citizens who were also interested in the project, started Boy's Ranch at Tascosa, about 40 miles northwest of the Panhandle city.

Since then it has been recognized throughout the country as a haven for orphan boys and boys who were verging onto the brink

of becoming professional gangsters. The ranch is constantly expanding. At present, Farley said, plans are being made for a new vocational school unit. A group of senior architect students from Texas A and M college will make a visit to the ranch to lay out the blueprints. One of the most remarkable achievements by the ranch is the fact that it feeds a boy three meals a day for an approximate cost of 14 cents per boy.
