Lamb County cotton farmers have survived the acreage cutting pencils of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation officials with the smallest cut of 16 counties in ASC District 2.

The county lost 3,330.4 acres of cotton for 1960 or 1.81 percent off the 1959 acreage. The new acre age will be 180,738.7 as compared to 184,069.1 in 1959.

The allotment was announced Tuesday by ASC Office Manager L. D. Aten.

Individual farmers' allotments were mailed Tuesday by the Lamb County ASC office, according to Aten.

The cut for Lamb County was determined by history of acreage planted in the county for the five years beginning in 1954 through 1959. Since the history is determined by dropping a year to figure next year's acreage, the last unalloted year, 1953, was dropped from the average.

Farmers will vote Dec. 15 whether marketing quotas and the two choice 'A' and 'B' plans will remain in effect. If the marketing quotas do not carry, farmers will have no choice between 'A' and 'B' plans. Allotments will be in effect regardless of the referen-

dum's results. However the price would be only 50 per cent of par-

Under plan 'B', a farmer can plant 40 per cent more acres than he could under his regain
