liberated from a Jap prison camp and

Japs when the Houston went down.
His family received a card from him
last Christmas, which was written
in May, 1944. He had been trans-
ferred from the camp at Thailand
to one near Tokyo.

GAME WARDEN OUTLINES HUNTING LAWS; LITTLEFIELD MAN PAYS FINE OF \$51
Captain Roscoe Parks, state game
warden, with headquarters at Lub-
bock, was in Littlefield Tuesday in
connection with the enforcement of
hunting regulations.

Mr. Parks said that a Littlefield
citizen had just paid a fine in coun-
ty court at Olton amounting to \$51
for hunting doves with an unplugged
gun and shooting from a public road.

The game warden pointed out that
hunting violations include these prac-
tices:
—Shooting with an unplugged gun;
shooting from an automobile, and
shooting from a public road.

The dove season opened Sept. 1
and will continue through Oct. 30.
The bag limit is 10 per day and the
possession limit is 10 doves.

The next season will be duck and
geese, which will open Nov. 2 and
continue through Jan. 20. The bag
limit is 10 in aggregate per day
and possession limit two days kill.

The shooting hours for ducks,
geese and doves are one-half hour
before sunrise and to sunset.

The deer season will open Nov. 16
and will continue through Dec. 31.
The quail season will open Dec. 1
and continue through Jan. 16. The
bag limit is 12 per day and posses-
sion limit is 36 in a three-day hunt.

It is against the law to shoot any
migratory bird with a rifle. Migrat-
ory birds include ducks, geese,
brant and doves. It is a violation
of state and federal laws to shoot a
crane at any time.

The O. K. Garage Club of Lub-
bock will play the Littlefield Cats of
1930 Sunday, September 23, at 3:00
o'clock in the afternoon.

Inquiries are coming in from all

teams will play a benefit contest in
Littlefield. Since this is the only
combination of its kind to be pro-
posed for the baseball fans in this
country, and that it will have a var-
ied assortment of everything in-

bock has been a very outstanding
baseball aggregation this summer,
playing something like 30 contests

mer as a pitcher, both in amateur
circles and with the Lubbock Amer-
ican Legion team which played in the
final at Austin for state champions

Moore will get the call, and will en-
deavor to display some of his for-
mer skill as a baseball chucker. Dick
Ratliff will handle the catching du-
ties and neither will need introduc-
tion to the old timers to be sure. As
for Ratliff, he is still able to go in
any class "D" circuit.

This game is being staged under
the sponsorship of the local Amer-
ican Legion and tickets will be
sold in advance at a fee which every-
one can afford. All proceeds will
be given to the local City Park As-
sociation for the improvement of the
same. That is, all above the net
cost of staging this game.

USS Idaho Steams Into Tokyo Bay With Littlefield Sailor Aboard



The majestic USS Idaho, one of
the powerful units of the Pacific
Fleet's battle line, which is now
engaged, along with 11 other bat-
tleships, in the initial stages of
the occupation of Japan. The 26-
year-old battleship fought at Okin-
awa and was in seven other Pac-
ific engagements.

Donald M. Vaughn, 20, seaman,
first class, Littlefield, Tex., is
serving on this battleship, which is
part of the powerful Pacific
Fleet completing the first stages
of the occupation of Japan.

Under the operation control of
Admiral William F. Halsey, USN,
the Idaho, with 11 other battle-
ships, 17 aircraft carriers, six ex-
cort carriers, 20 cruisers and more
than 290 other U. S. ships, is help-
ing take over control of the Japs'
big naval bases.

The 26-year-old Idaho took part
in the invasion of Okinawa. She
is a veteran of seven other Pacific
operations.

Johnnie Lippard Is Safe, Liberated From Jap Prison

Pfc. Johnnie Lippard has been
liberated from the Osaka Prison
Camp, near Osaka, Japan, according
to a telegram received by Mr. and
Mrs. J. H. Lippard, Tuesday. The
telegram reads as follows:

"Pleased to inform you of the
liberation from Japanese custody
of your son, Private First Class
John Bryan Lippard, USMC. He
is reported to be on board an
American vessel Sept. 8, 1945.
Further details will be furnished
you promptly when received. You
may send Marine Corps head-
quarters a twenty-five word mes-
sage for him. Every effort will
be made to deliver this message
before his return to the United
States.

HOME ON FURLOUGH
Pfc. Lippard has been a prisoner
of the Japs 3 1/2 years and in the
service six years. He was taken
prisoner in the fall of Corregidor
May 6, 1942, since which time the
family has received five typewrit-
ten form cards.

It is understood that the group of
liberated prisoners, with whom Pfc.
Lippard is, will be taken to Manila
and be transferred to the United
States from that port.

LIBERATED FROM JAP PRISON CAMP
Sgt. Pryor attended Whitharral
schools. He enlisted in the Marines
January 11, 1939, at the age of 18,
for the purpose of receiving school-
ing in accounting and law. He was
on the Houston when the war broke
out and when it went down on
February 28, 1942.

His parents did not hear from
their son until August 24, 1944,
when they received a printed form
card from him at Camp No. 3 at
Nike, Thailand. The second time
they hear from him was on Janu-
ary 23, 1945, which card was dated
June 30, 1944. He was in the same
camp on June 30 as Tommie Mc-
Farland—at Nike, but later he was
moved to Honshu Island, Japanese
mainland.

Mr. Pryor stated in an interview
with a Leader reporter Friday that
in the summer of 1941 Sgt. Pryor
wrote his father telling him that he
had met Tommie McFarland from
Littlefield on the Houston and speak-
ing in very complimentary terms
about McFarland and suggesting that
his father "go and see the McFar-
land family."

Sgt. Pryor Liberated From Jap Prison Camp

Mr. and Mrs. Charlie L. Pryor,
of Whitharral received a tele-
gram Thursday morning to the ef-
fect that their son, Sgt. Charlie
Pryor, Jr., USMC, had been
liberated from a Jap prison camp.
The telegram, which was sent Sat-
urday to the address of the service-
uncle, Joe Pryor, at Rich-
land, Calif., was mailed to Mr. and
Mrs. Pryor at Whitharral and re-
ceived Thursday morning.

The message read as follows:
"Pleased to inform you of the
liberation from Japanese custody
of your son, Sergeant Charley
Pryor, Jr., USMC. He ar-
rived in India August 30, 1945,
and is reported to be in good phy-
sical condition. Further details
will be furnished you promptly
when received. You may send
Marine Corps headquarters a 25-
word message for him. Every ef-
fort will be made to deliver this
message before his return to the
United States.

University Training

Servicemen who plan to enter the University of Texas are most interested in three fields of training: engineering, business, and arts and sciences.

Questionnaires on their likes and interests returned by 424 servicemen to the University Veterans Advisory Service indicated that 152 favored the study of engineering (which includes architecture and planning), 79 favored branches of study in arts and sciences (history, economics, journalism, etc.), and 73 favored business. Other professions received from two to 33 favorable votes.

Those favoring fewer required courses totaled 105, and 33 wanted more required courses; 129 wanted more electives, and 15 wanted fewer electives; 115 wanted emphasis on special fields, and 61 wanted general cultural and survey courses.

The report may be far from correct insofar as all ex-servicemen are concerned, Walter T. Rolfe, coordinator, said, but judging by the returned questionnaires, the preferences are strongly outlined.

School buses may be used again this winter for transporting football teams, pep squads, bands, and school kids to inter-school football games and meetings, Roy Bedichek, director of the University of Texas Interscholastic League, has announced.

After checking with officials of the ODT, Mr. Bedichek was assured that the war-time restrictions on school transportation have now been lifted, and school buses may be used in accordance with policies approved by the state, county, or local school authorities.

"This lifting of restrictions will help our small schools tremendously," Rodney Kidd, athletic director for the league, said. "Those schools who have been dependent upon the use of school buses to transport teams will now be able to resume their football and basketball activities."

Sugar Stamp No. 38 in Book IV is now good for the purchase of five pounds of sugar, according to OPA Rationing Executive Wm. G. Williams.

The current sugar stamp, No. 36, expired August 31.

Continuing the ration rate of five pounds of sugar every four months, the new sugar stamp, No. 38, will be good through December.

Sugar stamp No. 38 is being validated instead of No. 37 because so many home canners by mistake last year mailed sugar stamp No. 37 to their local War Price and Rationing Board to obtain special canning allowances, instead of spare stamp 37 requested by OPA.

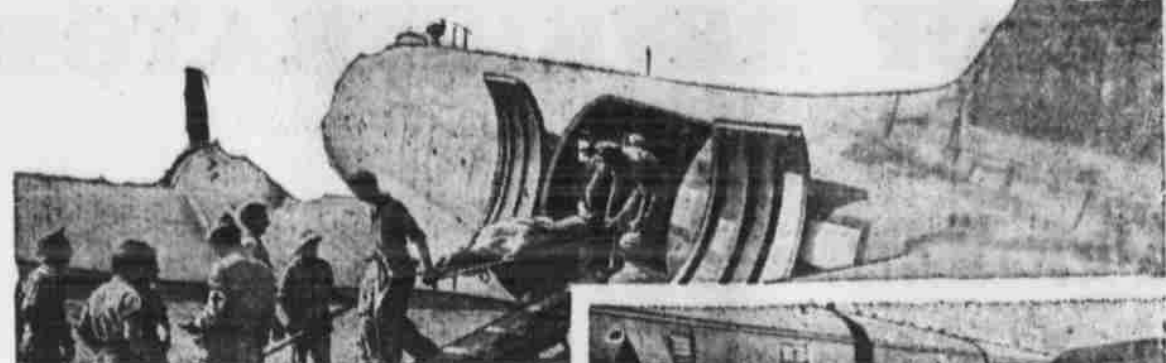

Pfc. Clifford Kenyon Returns Wounded; At Brooke Hospital

After spending six months in the Asiatic Pacific with the 40th Infantry Division, Pfc. Clifford W. Kenyon of Baileyboro, is back in Texas as a patient at Brooke Hospital center, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

Pfc. Kenyon went overseas in January, 1945, and returned to the states June 23, 1945. He saw action at Leyte and Mindanao.

"When we landed in Leyte," he said, "a beachhead already had been established by the division that preceded us. It was our job to relieve this division while they went to a rest camp. When we landed, we didn't meet with much opposition but as we came closer to the division's position, things began to get rough. The Japs fired mortars, artillery, machine guns and everything they could find at us.

"We stayed there for about two months, then we went to Mindanao where we established a beachhead. But we didn't meet with much resistance because the Japs took to the hills the moment they saw us coming. They would stay in their caves all day long, but at night they would pull their 'banzai' charges."

"I'll never forget the first time they tried one of these charges. I was sleeping, when suddenly my buddy awakened me. 'The Japs are out there yelling banzai,' he said. I woke with a start, and I was scared so bad I didn't know what to do. In the distance I could hear shouting and the firing of guns, but that's all. I couldn't see a thing, it was so dark. That night we had to depend on our ears. Whenever we would hear a sound, we would toss a grenade in the direction from where we thought the sound came. We would usually get some Jap."

"Well, the fighting went on and then the Japs withdrew. We killed a lot of them and wounded many. When the 'banzai' charge ended I just sat down in my foxhole and heaved a sigh of relief and it was a long one, believe me. I didn't get any more sleep that night. We just lay awake and listened. We were too scared to sleep.

"A short time later my squad and I were trying to get two tanks down a hill so that they could knock out a Japanese half track when a mortar shell landed squarely in front of me. I was wounded by the shrapnel. About five minutes afterwards, just when I was trying to crawl over to a little bank on the side of the road, the Japs got me with a machine gun.

"I was sent to a hospital in Leyte where I stayed for six weeks and then I was flown back to the states. It certainly felt good getting back to Brooke in Texas."

Private Kenyon holds the following decorations: Asiatic Pacific, Philippine Liberation, Purple Heart, Combat Infantryman Badge and Good Conduct Medal.

His mother, with whom he lives in Baileyboro, Texas, recently visited him at Brooke Hospital.
