#### Pfc. Clifford Kenyon Returns Wounded; At Brooke Hospital

After spending six months in the Asiatic Pacific with the 40th Infantry Division, Pfc. Clifford W. Kenyon of Baileyboro, is back in Texas as a patient at Brooke Hospital center, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

Pfc. Kenyon went overseas in January, 1945, and returned to the states June 23, 1945. He saw action at Leyte and Mindanao.

"When we landed in Leyte," he said, "a beachhead already had been established by the division that prece le uz. It was our job to relieve this ivision while they went to a rest camp. When we landed, we didn't meet with much opposition Roberson, commercial. but as we e me closer to the division's position, things began to get they could find at us.

"We stayed there for about two hills the moment they saw us com- year they will be just 20 cents. ing. They would stay in their caves all day long, but at night they would pull their 'banzai charges.

"I'll never forget the first time they tried one of these charges. I was sleeping, when suddenly my buddy awakened me. 'The Japs are out there yelling banzai,' he said. I woke with a start, and I was scared so bad I didn't know what to do. In the distance I could hear shouting and the firing of guns, but that's all. I couldn't see a thing, it was so dark. That night we had to depend on our cars. Whenever we would hear a sound, we would toss a grenade in the direction from where we thought the sound came We would usually get some Jap.

"Well, the fighting went on and then the Japs withdrew. We killed sa lot of them and wounded many When the 'banzai' charge ended just sat down in my foxhole and heaved a sigh of relief and it was a long one, believe me. I didn't get sury more sleep that night. We just lay awake and listened. were too scared to sleep.

"A short time inter my squad and I were trying to get two tanks down a hill so that they could knock out ze Japanese half track when a mortar shell landed squarely in front of me. I was wounded by the shrapael. About five minutes afterwards, just whan I was trying to crawl over to a little bank on the side of the road, the Japs got me with a maschine gun.

"I was sent to a hospital in Leyte where I stayed for six weeks and then I was flown back to the states. It certainly felt good getting back 20 Brooke in Texas.'

Private Kenyon holds the following decorations: Asiatic Pacific, Philappine Liberation, Purple Heart, Comtest Infantryman Badge and Good Confuct Medal.




