### GRAND JURY ADJOURNS LATE WEDNESDAY

Final Report Is Made To Judge; Court Will End Saturday

The Lamb county grand jury adjourned for this term of court Wednesday afternoon at 6:30 after returning a total of 8 felony and 6 misdemeanor indictments during their 11-day session.

District court will adjourn Saturday.

The Leader received the jury's final report to District Judge R. C. Joiner late Wednesday night from District Clerk, I. B. Holt by long distance telephone.

The report follows: To Hon. R. C. Joiner, District Judge, Lamb County:

We, your grand jury duly empaneled and organized for said term of court, hereby respectfully submit our final report.

We have been in session 11 days. We have examined more than 200 witnesses; we have returned a total of eight felonies and six misdemeanor indictments; we have been unable to complete part of our labors and are passing the results of our work to the next grand jury.

We wish to thank the court for his thorough assistance and cooperation. We also wish to thank the district and county attorneys, the sheriff and his department for their efficient services.

We wish to thank our good citizens.

### Large Attendance Reported At C. of C. Meeting Tuesday

### Salvation Army Seek To Establish Littlefield Office

The Littlefield Salvation Army advisory board met with Captain Churchill of Lubbock in the office of Dr. Ira E. Woods Monday morning to map out plans for raising funds to establish a permanent Salvation Army office here.

In a statement to a Leader representative, A. C. Bowley, Salvation Army field worker, said that to set up the work and handle emergency relief in Littlefield it will be necessary that the local pledges amount to at least \$100 per month. So far \$31.50 has been subscribed by 30 Littlefield people.

Captain Eula Trummell, who was recently transferred to Lubbock from Austin where she was in charge of a heavy relief program, will have charge of the work in Littlefield, Mr. Bowley said.

In seeking the cooperation of the local citizens in raising the funds for the organization, Mr. Bowley stressed that the Salvation Army planned a permanent set up to serve Littlefield.

Dr. Ira E. Woods is president of the local advisory board; Pat Boone, vice president; and Mrs. F. O. Boles, secretary.

Other members of the local board are: L. R. Crockett, A. B. Sanders, W. D. T. Storey, and Mrs. W. H. Garner.

### LOCAL OFFICE FORCE WORKING ON MANY MORE

350 Applications Being Considered In Lamb and Bailey Counties

With over \$6,000 already received by Lamb and Bailey County farmers through the Resettlement administration, a total of 175 more applications from these two counties are in the Amarillo office awaiting final approval, P. L. Payne, rural supervisor for Lamb and Bailey counties with offices in Littlefield, announced late Wednesday.

The local office is also working on approximately 350 additional loans from these two counties. Seven people are employed in the Littlefield office.

Mrs. Mary Watson Jones, of Plains has accepted the position as home supervisor for the administration in Lamb and Bailey counties. Mrs. Jones moved to Littlefield Monday to take up her new work.

### Work On Hart Road Now Underway; To Be Hardsurfaced

Work on the road from Olton to Hart started last Thursday morning. The road will be straightened and hardsurfaced and will extend from the Castro county line south through Olton.

Machinery for the project south of Sudan, which has been stopped because of right-of-way difficulties, has been taken to Olton and will be used on the Olton project.

This machinery consists of several caterpillar tractors, elevators, graders, etc., and will require the employment of several men.

## EVIDENCE OF RECOVERY

The best index of the state of business confidence at any time is the values which are placed upon stocks and bonds by the buyers and sellers on the New York Stock Exchange. That is not to say that the prices at which stocks sell always reflect the actual values behind them. A fair percentage of stock trading is done by speculators, but the vast majority of these transactions are purchases by investors of dividend-paying securities, which enable them to earn more than bank interest on their surplus funds. They buy stocks and bonds rather than real estate because of the existence of the stock exchanges, providing an open market in which any listed security can always be sold immediately at a price.

Lubbock, Texas, March 12.—Annual judging contests for West Texas High school students taking courses in vocational agriculture will be held for the eleventh time at Texas Tech college March 30, the first day of the Lubbock Quality Meat Show. The contests will begin at 8:30 a. m. and continue throughout the day. Tech agricultural division facilities will be used, and the agricultural faculty will direct the meet and act as judges. Ray C. Mowery, acting head of the animal husbandry department, is in charge.

High schools may enter teams of three members each in any three of the following contests: dairy cattle judging, farm shop, plant production and grain judging, livestock judging, and poultry judging. No student may compete in more than one contest.

Ranches from all over the State will send their top hands to the Reunion and rodeo to match their skill and the speed of their horses in roping and tying calves and milking

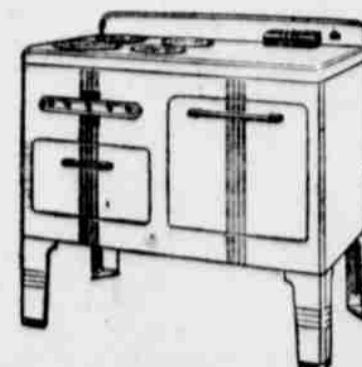

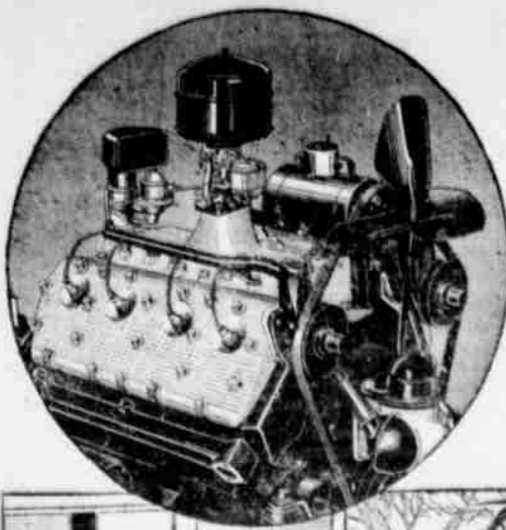

Do not set roots in mud, as it causes the earth to pack to tight close around the roots. There should be a few inches of loose soil below and all around the roots, preferably the top soil. Then firm the soil and leave loose layer on top with plenty of depression around base of tree to allow thorough watering every ten days or two weeks, is lots better than a small amount applied each day, as surface watering will cause only top root growth, which would not withstand dry weather, or make as substantial a growth of bottom roots or top growth to tree. In setting the tree place the side which shows the heaviest limb growth to the south west leaning it slightly in that direction as most of our wind comes from that direction.

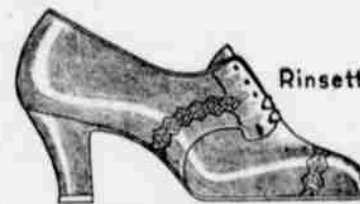
