Since October 8 last the Finance Committee, composed of Dr. C. E. Elms, J. T. Elms, J. E. Chisholm, O. Garlington, T. Wade Potter, O. Jones, G. H. Ligon, H. O. Kirk and Oren Kirk, have raised \$9,300, which paid the entire debt on the church, and balance on budget for this year. The money was paid over October 20.

The Church has made the outstanding record this year of raising on debt and annual budget \$17,342. The pastor will arrange for the dedication of the building while at conference at Sweetwater Nov. 8. Bishop C. C. Selectman will arrange the date at his convenience.

# Junior Red Cross Enrollment Campaign Gets Underway

With Mrs. A. B. Haynes as chairman, the Junior Red Cross Enrollment campaign got underway Wednesday, November 1. Two weeks will be given over to this intensive campaign, but many will have their enrollments made long before November 15, the deadline. The enrollment in 1944, according to Mrs. Haynes, chairman, was eighteen and a half million members. It is the hope and belief that every boy and girl in every school will be enrolled as a member of the Junior Red Cross, so as to make Lamb County 100 per cent in its effort.

This is an enrollment for service. A global program of war service production is being conducted in the schools of Lamb county. Girls are sewing and boys are making useful articles for hospitals, and other camps. The money received from this enrollment campaign will be used for materials that go into their making.

One hundred fifty gift boxes have been received and will be distributed within a week, so that every boy and girl in every school of Lamb county may have a share in making children in the war areas happy. Many heart rending stories have been told of how little children in these areas have suffered from hunger and want of bare necessities, and how the little cheer that can be given them through these gifts would warm the hearts of the givers if they could be permitted to see them open a box all their own.

Sign up today, or at your earliest opportunity, boys and girls, and wear the Junior Red Cross insignia. It is the amount of the gift, as much as that will help, but it is the spirit that thought that you give to the Junior Red Cross program that counts. Can we make every school 100 per cent?

Pfc. Nolan H. Harlan, 25, paratrooper, is a prisoner of the German government, according to a card he wrote his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Harlan of Bula. Previous to receipt of the card, which was dated Aug. 9, the parents thought he was wounded in France in August and was a hospital patient in England. This information was given to them by the paratrooper's captain. Mr. and Mrs. Harlan theorized that their son was confused with another soldier. The War Department has not officially notified the parents of the boy's imprisonment, but they are confident it is true since the card came directly from him. He had been in the service since August, 1942, and overseas since September 1943. He participated in the Normandy invasion.

His plane, riddled by flak, and out of control, was abandoned by the entire crew on the border of Yugoslavia and Bulgaria. He escaped from the prison camp, and returned to his squadron when the town in which he was imprisoned was liberated.

He was eight months in the Italian Theatre of operations, and arrived at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Friday.

He has to his credit 31 combat missions.

Lieut. Harry E. Woody returned to the States from England last week and is home on a 30 day furlough visiting his parents at Spade. He landed in England August 22, 1943, and made 17 missions over enemy territory on a B-24 Navigator on a B-24. He was awarded the Air Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Flying Cross with one bar for his missions, he served as a pathfinder and later flew solo over France. He will report to Miami Beach, Fla., November 24 for a new assignment.

# Wildcats To Clash With Whitefaces Here Friday Night

Should Prove To Be Toughest Competition So Far This Season

The Wildcats run smack into one of the classiest and most powerful Class A teams in the Panhandle this week when they clash with Hereford Whitefaces here this Friday night in Seely Stadium at 8:30. The Whitefaces are virtual District champs themselves, having won all their conference games and with only one more to play. They have won five games, losing two to strong outside competition. They are fresh from two top-sided victories. They won from Dimmitt 75 to 6 and from Dalhart 57 to 6 on the last two successive week ends. They hold a 19-0 win over Olton and a 27 to 6 win over Dumas. Even though this is a non-conference affair, it will be called a bi-district game.

Tickets will be on sale at Brittain Pharmacy Thursday. Those expecting to see the game are urged to get tickets early in order to be assured of a good seat. A sizeable block of tickets is being sent to Hereford and a large crowd is expected from that neighboring city. Gates will be open one hour and a half before game time to allow plenty of time to avoid congestion at the gate.

Mrs. Rosa Lee Turner, formerly of Littlefield, but now of Cooper, Texas, was notified by telegram from the War Department Friday that her son, Pvt. William D. (Douglas) Turner, Paratrooper, was missing in action since September 19 over Holland, and that when further details or other information was received, she would be promptly notified.

Since Mrs. Turner had moved to Cooper, some difficulty was experienced in delivering the telegram, and Mrs. Turner was located by the local Red Cross office.

The serviceman's father, William Paul Turner, passed away at Floy, Arizona, where he had gone for his health, in March of last year, following which Mrs. Turner returned to Littlefield, and after spending several months here, went to Cooper to make her home.

Mrs. Turner has another son in the service, Sgt. Ralph W. Turner; and two daughters, Aneta and Paula, and a son, Willard, also at home.

Pvt. Turner attended Littlefield High School.

He is reported missing the same day as Sgt. V. G. Pierce, also a Paratrooper, and a former Littlefield man, was reported killed in action over Holland.

# Military Funeral For Pfc. Zimmerman

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Assembly of God Church here, with the Pastor officiating, for Pfc. Harry Bill Zimmerman, 21, who passed away at Trimmer Springs Hospital, Calif., Sunday, October 22, at 12:10 noon, as the result of injuries sustained in a truck accident the day previous.

Following the church services the South Plains Army Airfield were in charge of the military service at the grave in the Littlefield cemetery.

The remains were brought to Littlefield by Santa Fe train arriving here Thursday, with Cpl. Donald P. Stuck as escort.

Zimmerman his life that he was on an army truck carrying out telephone wire to be strung for use on maneuvers, and that in going around a curve, in some way, the trailer whipped the truck over the mountain, causing several service men to be injured, including the local man, who passed away Sunday. The accident occurred Saturday, Oct. 21, at Trimmer Springs, Calif. Pfc. Zimmerman was taken to Trimmer Springs Hospital, and passed away the next day.

Pfc. Zimmerman is survived by his mother, Mrs. Stella Zimmerman of Littlefield; two brothers, Pvt. John Paul Zimmerman, stationed at Camp Croft, S. Carolina, who arrived home Tuesday of last week; and Pfc. Virgil Zimmerman, with the Air Corps, stationed in India; a half brother, Stanley Masters, S. I. C., stationed at Atlantic City, N. J.; and three sisters, Mrs. B. C. Woodruff of Newcastle, Texas, and Mrs. Martha Osborne and Mrs. Grace Bannister of San Diego, Cal.

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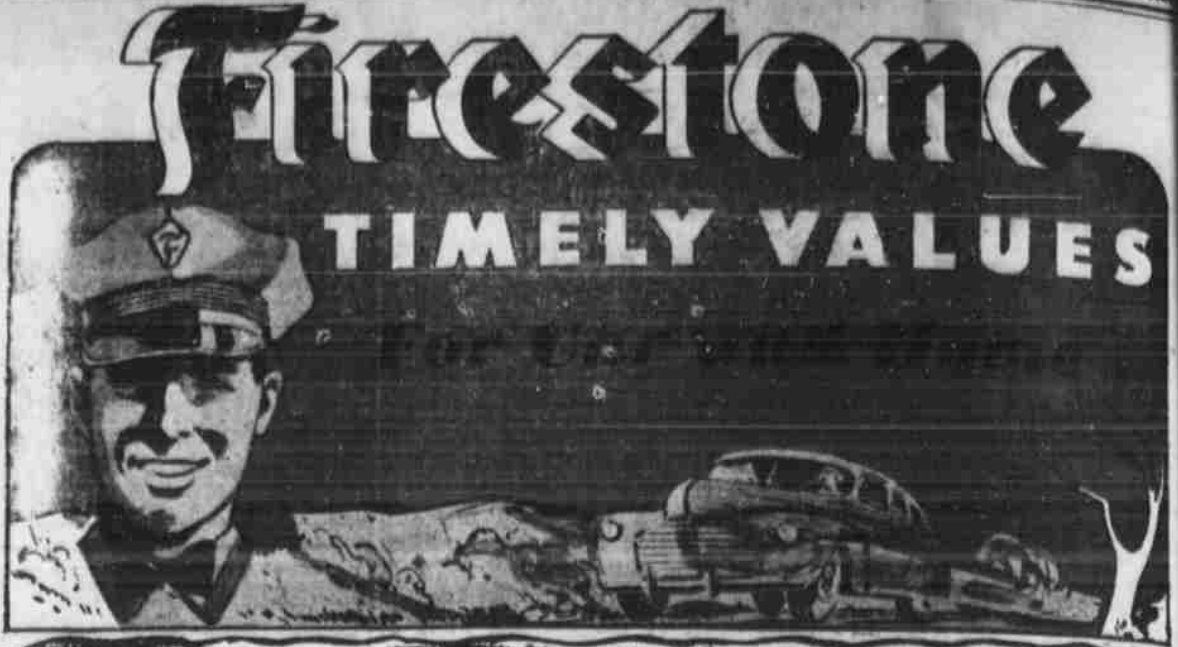

Sugar: Stamps No. 30, 31, 32 and 33, Book IV, good for 5 lbs. indefinitely. Stamp No. 40, Book IV, good for 5 lbs. sugar for 1944 home canning.

Meats and Fats: Book IV, red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through K5 valid indefinitely, good for 10 points each. L5 through P5 valid October 29, 1944.

Processed Foods: Book IV, blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through R5 good for 10 points each, valid indefinitely. S5 through W5 valid November 1, 1944.

Shoes: Book III, stamps one and two with airplane pictures, each good for one pair indefinitely. Airplane stamp three, Book III, becomes valid November 1.

Gasoline: (Coupons must be endorsed on front) "A" coupons, 4 gal. each with No. 13 expiring December 21. In B-4, B-5, and C-5 rations, the coupons nationally have a value of 5 gal. each. "R-1" and "R-2," 5 gal. (valid for bulk delivery only); "T" coupons designated "Fourth Quarter," 5 gal.; "D" one and one-half gal.; and "E-1" and "E-2" one gal. each.

**Farmers Of Lamb Defoliate Cotton**  
 The following Lamb County farmers have defoliated some of their cotton by dusting with a chemical manufactured for this purpose: W. H. Cunningham, Charles Hauk, A. E. Foyler, Littlefield, and A. I. Fowler, Anton.  
 The supply of this chemical is limited, but this will give farmers of Lamb county a chance to see how it works. Some varieties of cotton are easier to defoliate than others and farmers should secure information about their variety before starting to dust.  
 Mr. Hauk, who lives two miles west of Littlefield, has treated the following varieties of cotton: Locket 140, Macha (storm proof), Hybrid, and Lone Star. The cost per acre is \$1.25 and the cotton must be dusted instead of sprayed.

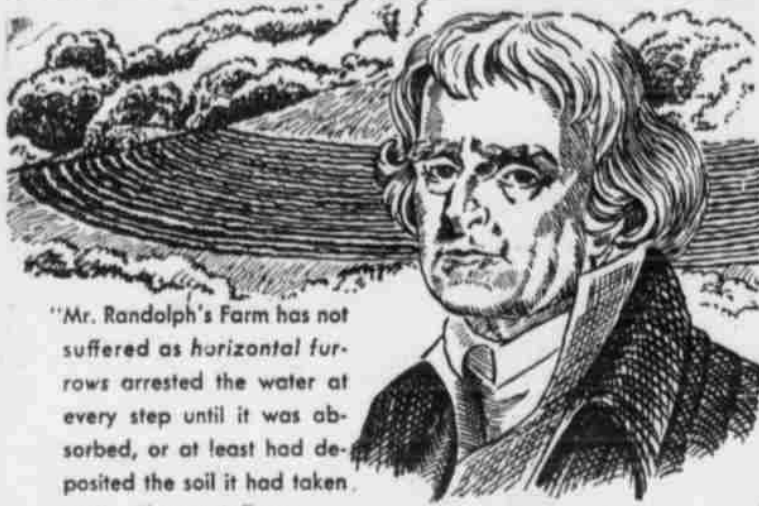

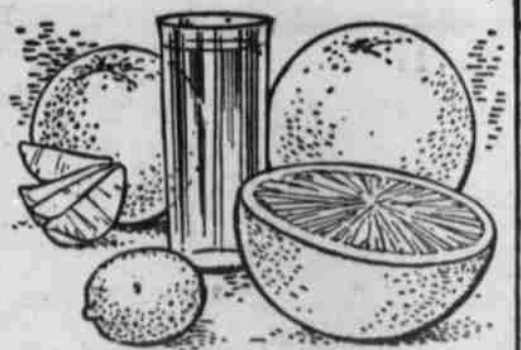

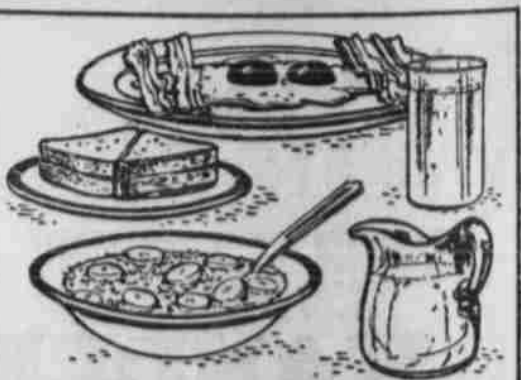
