

AGRICULTURE FOURTH DEA ROBBING IN LOCAL FAIR

The State Board of Education does not approve the report of the Texas legislative committee on efficiency and economy, which proposes a drastic curtailment in the educational system of Texas, including the removal of all technical courses from Texas Tech.

Members of the board have expressed dissatisfaction that the economy committee should have trespassed upon the field of education. All this is good news.

Why should the committee on efficiency and economy be permitted to wreck our educational system, that has cost millions of dollars to create, just to save a few dollars. There would be just as much wisdom in that as in buying a new automobile, costing several hundred dollars, and then re-fusing to spend from \$1 to \$1.50 in buying oil.

Do not misunderstand us. We practice economy in the conducting of our business and personal affairs, and we believe in strict economy in city, county, state and national government.

We who live in this section of the state are particularly interested in Texps Tech. Abolish the technical courses at Texas Tech and the progress of West Texas will receive a staggering blow.

of West Texas will receive a staggering blow. This is an agricultural and ranching section and in order that the peo-ple of this section may make the most of their opportunity there must be technical education, adapted to this particular section of the state, avail-able to the farming population, particularly the young folks of the farm. Remember, the future progress of West Texas rests with the young people. A high percentage of these young people want to stay on the farm; they want to study; they want and should have educational opportunities. Why should any group make recommendations of such a drastic nature as will rob the young people of their right to education close at hand; why should any group rob your children of obtaining an education near home? 

## **CITY SECRETARY'S REPORT SHOWS** DECREASE IN BIRTHS AND DEATHS FOR YEAR 1932 OVER PREVIOUS YEAR Saturday to attend the regular ses-

One of the first cases in the court of the justice of peace, precinct No. 4, since B. L. Cogdill and Sam Hutson took office as justice of the peace and constable, respectively, was that of the alleged theft of a windmill from C. C. Tremain's farm, located two miles northeast of town.

The theft was reported Tuesday afternoon and a short time afterward Constable Sam Hutson and City Officer John Blair, arrested Irving Cunningham, who resides south and east of the city.

Officers reported that the windmill was recovered at the same time Cunningham was arrested. Cunningham told officers he purchased the mill from a stranger. Cunningham, charged with theft,

was given a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace Cogdill Wednesday morning, and he bound over to the grand jury. His bond was set at \$1,000.

According to the report of City Secretary W. G. Street, there was a Theft of Windmill considerable decrease in births in Littlefield in 1932 over the previous

year. Ninety-two births were filed in the secretary's office for 1931, while only sixty-nine were reported for 1932, or a decrease of twenty-three, of the term.

The secretary's report also shows a decrease in deaths which actually took place in the city for 1932 over over the figure for 1931. Twenty-twe deaths were reported as taking place in Littlefield during the year 1931, 1832.

Two hundred and six women and 130 4-H club members assisted in getting the poultry records on 23,308 hens for one year, or an ave-rage of 70 hens per flock. A total of 31,758 chickens were

raised. The total feed cost was \$9,366.10 or an average of \$.28 per flock. The low feed cost was due to use of home grown feed which were lower in price than usual. ## FOOD OF GREATER VARIETY IN 1933

College Station-Texas farm pantries this year may contain no more food than in 1932 but it will be betning and storing food by budgets that gave health and plenty," she exhelped in doing this.

"This year home demonstration Ten women and one 4-H girl at-tended the annual Farmers Short increased stress on better production course at A. & M. College. and preservation methods to give food of improved quality and of wider variety. The famous '4-H Pantry Demonstration which stands for well planned living at home is to be called in 1933 the 'Farm Ranch Food Supply Demonstration'.

> "As in 1932, a family of five can provide its yearly food with the expenditure of less than \$100 in cash if demonstration methods are followed," declares Miss Blair. "This requires two dairy cows, a half-acre garden, a half-acre fruit plot, 40

"Yearly food requirements for such a family consist of 264 gallons of milk; about 3000 pounds of vegetables equally divided between leafy starchy, other vegetables (potatoes, corn, etc.,) and garden fruits (tomatoes, melons, etc.;) at least 1000 pounds of fruit; 1086 pounds of cereals; 234 pounds of fats ;and 334 pounds of sweets.
