Feeding therefore becomes profitable from a ready cash stand point by supplying another cash crop for Lamb County farmers. Pages could be written on the advantages that this extra income would mean in the various development of the County, but I wish to discuss another advantage.

"Feeding livestock will increase home consumption of meat on Lamb County farms. There is estimated to be 127,000 farms in Texas without even a milch cow. Farmers should not have to buy meat products or dairy products. Animals fed and dressed under the farmers

supervision are best suited to his own needs. Home grown foods are more healthful than refined foods. "Feeding more livestock will encourage a centrally located refrigeration plant with aid of its advantages in preventing spoilage of meat. J. M. Jones of Texas A. & M. College says, "The average American consumes 150 pounds

meat annually. The Texans' average is far below this." At this rate, Lamb county citizens are ca. pable of consuming approximately d for the grain 1 five million pounds annually. One

in Lamb county will encourage cooperative marketing, and thus bring a better price for finished livestock as well as other advantages to such a system.

"The climate is well adapted for raising livestock. The stock may stay in the open a lot and escape the disease that exists where close housing in cold weather is a nesessity. Our county is seldom visited with the common disease that run rampant. We also are free from tick infestation.

"Livestock farming naturally goes hand in hand with other good farm practices including conservation, By this I mean conservation of water soil, and feed. Last fall my dad sold nearly three thousand dollars worth of cattle to a local market for slaughter. As the trucks rolled out our gate, my brother remarked, "There goes three thousand dollars worth of cattle with a total of only \$9.00 worth of soil fertility." think he meant that cattle returned 95 per cent of soil fertility to the land. in comparison to cotton, those cattle have a contrast along this line. In studying agriculture, we sense the idea that we have no right to mine our farms. In doing so we rob the coming generation who is going to live here. We as farmers just do the managing for the time we are on the land.

"Livestock farmers will call for highest production of land to meet any requirements of stock and therefore conservation in its every sense. Terracing and contour listing will become an important practice throughout the county, livertick will encourage conservation of identity use of trench silos, grinding and other conservation practices.
