





## **Proposed Constitutional Amendments**

A system of surface drainage for Littlefield will be the next outstanding project in the development of the city, according to Mayor Homer Hall.


Engineers have been employed by the City of Littlefield and a com-plete survey and study of the drainage needs of the city is being made.
