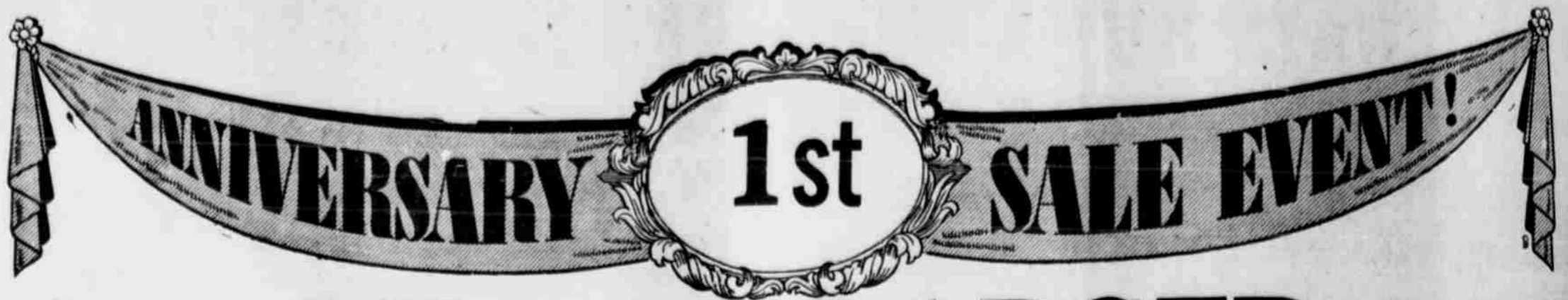

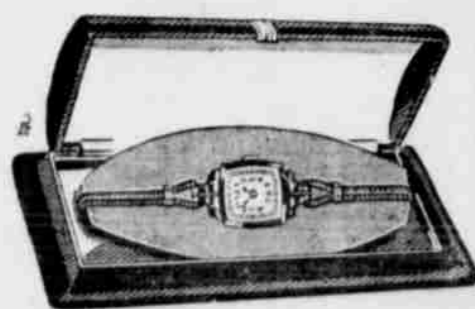

### Openings Now In Various Branches Of U. S. Army

Education fitting them for positions as commercial airline pilots at salaries averaging \$600. per month await young single men who can qualify as Flying Cadets.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 45** proposing an amendment to Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 9-A; providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, shall have the authority to levy a tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of the County by the issuance of bonds under the provisions of the General Laws regulating the refunding of outstanding debts of the County; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication and election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another Section to be known as Section 9-A, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9-A. Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein so authorizing, the Commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas, may levy an annual tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding all the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County and issue bonds under the provisions of the General Law regulating the issuance of bonds to refund said indebtedness.

"At such election, the Commissioners Court shall submit for adoption the proposition of whether such outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County shall be refunded in bonds, the amount of special tax to be levied and the number of years said tax is to be levied. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters.

"The provisions of this Section 9-A shall apply only to Red River County; and the provisions hereof shall be self-enacting without the necessity of an enabling act of the Legislature of the State of Texas, but shall become effective immediately after the official canvass of the result has been made and it is determined that this Amendment has been adopted by a majority of the voters of the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County may, upon a vote of the qualified electors therein, levy a tax and issue bonds to refund the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election, which shall be refunded to the State of Texas by Red River County out of its General Fund or any other available fund. Provided that no election shall be held until Red River County shall first deposit with the State Treasurer the sum of Five Thousand

Dollars (\$5,000) with which to pay such expense of said election.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 4** proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature authority to provide for appeal direct to the Supreme Court in cases involving injunctions granted or denied on the grounds of constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute or on validity or invalidity of administrative orders; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expenses of publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 3-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 3-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law, for an appeal direct to the Supreme Court of this State from an order of any trial court granting or denying an interlocutory or permanent injunction on the grounds of the constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute of this State or on the validity or invalidity of any administrative order issued by any state agency under any statute of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 6** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Section 26 of Article IV so as to provide that Notaries Public be appointed by the Secretary of State of the State of Texas; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray expenses for the submission of this amendment.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 26 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 26. (a) The Secretary of State shall appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for each county who shall perform such duties as now are or may be prescribed by law. The qualifications of Notaries Public shall be prescribed by law.

(b) Nothing herein shall affect the terms of office of Notaries Public who have qualified for the present term prior to the taking effect of this amendment.

(c) Should the Legislature enact an enabling law hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be sub-

mitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 30b of Article 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years, shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot.

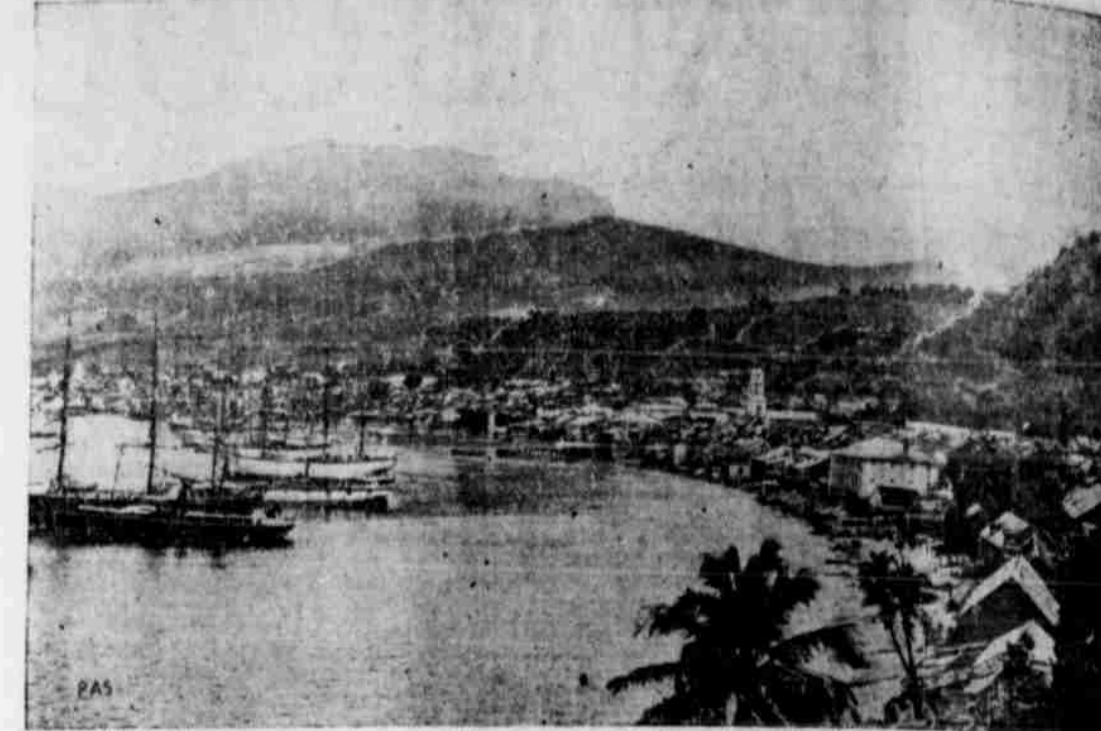
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows:

"Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of Statute or charter provisions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing from such offices, the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law or charter provisions applicable thereto."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at

the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that Article 16, Section 30, of the Constitution shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipality placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published, as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

## Primary Need Of Texas Farmers Is Larger Farm Income

The primary need of Texas farmers is larger farm income. This applies especially to cotton farmers. Dairymen, producers of pork, wool, and mohair, truck and fruit growers and cattlemen are in relatively good shape. Not as good as they might be, but better than the cotton farmer.

The immediate outlook for the cotton producer is bluntly put by H. H. Williamson, director of the Texas A. and M. Extension Service, as "anything but encouraging."

"All of our foreign markets for cotton are rapidly being destroyed or nullified," he said. "Foreign demand will surely be even less by fall. The surplus will be tremendously increased, even under the restricted production program. No

one knows how much cotton we may be able to sell.

"If the price of cotton is low, the price of foodstuffs is relatively high. In the face of this situation, the farmer who makes his farm as nearly self-sustaining as possible will not only be doing himself a good turn but will do much to fit in with plans for national defense."

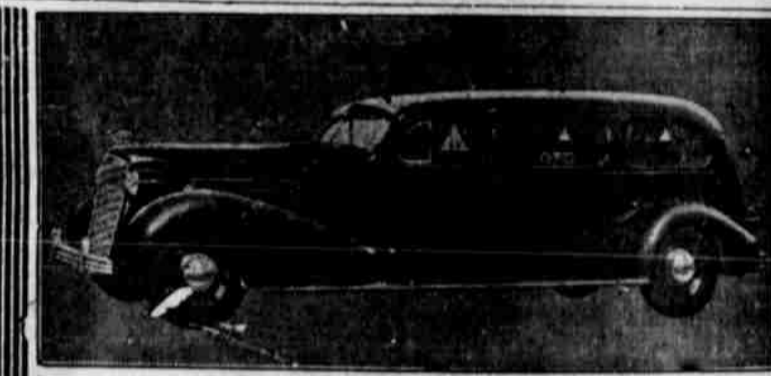

Japanese earlier had expressed objections to the British blockade of Europe which now extends from the Arctic to North Africa.

Britain's arrest of the Japanese brought a swift reaction.

The Japanese ambassador, Namoru Shigemitsu, went to the very top — to Foreign Minister Lord Halifax himself — to make a "strong protest" and in a 20-minute interview he was reported to have made an outright demand that the internees, Saoru Makihara and Shunsukei Tanabe, be released forthwith.

Makihara and Tanabe, agents of the fabulously wealthy Mitsubishi and Mitsui families—members of a small group of such families which controls nearly all Japanese interest and finance—were arrested quietly during the night and other reports indicated that arrest of other Japanese were going forward all over the British empire.

Nothing was said officially by the British but unofficially it was declared that the arrests were made on the ground of "national security" under the act of regulating aliens.

1940 because the regulations require that all buyers keep a record of the marketing card serial number on all cotton bought. This is the printed number on the marketing card—not the typed number. This ruling serves as an additional protection to buyers, since there can be no doubt that the cotton has been identified by a white card if the buyer has a record of the marketing card serial number.

"In order that all buyers may be in a position to protect themselves, through a thorough knowledge of the regulations, we are anxious to distribute copies of the ginner's and buyer's summaries. For this reason, we request that all buyers send us their name and address so that we may mail them a copy of this summary as soon as it arrives.

"We shall be very glad to discuss any phase of the Marketing Quota Program with ginner's and buyers, since a close cooperation is necessary between ginner's, buyers, and the County Office if the provisions of the Marketing Quota Program are to be carried out successfully.

"As requested above, all buyers and ginner's should submit to the A. A. Office at Amherst, Texas their correct address for 1940.

## Buick Bug Racer Is Reconditioned

FLINT, Mich., Aug. 4 — The pages of automotive history were turned back 30 years today when Buick engineers under the direction of Charles A. Chayne, completed reconditioning of the famous Buick Bug Racer with which Bob Burman, idol of the sports world in his day, and Louis Chevrolet, an equally brilliant automobile name, rode to fame in the early racing days of the industry.

The veteran car, still capable of 90 miles an hour, and generating 144 horsepower from its oversized, barrel-like cylinders, has been resurrected to play an important role in the annual motor festival at Flint, and later to be displayed in a special exhibit at the New York automobile show in October.

A masterpiece of automotive design in its day, the Bug still functions with the powerful efficiency that drove it to victories in half the road races of the country back in 1910. Its performance was brought up to par by careful refinishing of pistons, installation of rings, and a general overhauling of both the mammoth engine and the

chassis, together with a few modern touches such as a self-starter, a fan and chrome wheel trim rings and steering gear.

Mr. Chayne, chief engineer and A. E. De Waters, Buick chief engineer at the time the Bug was built, supervised the tuning of the big engine and gave it its first warm-up in nearly 30 years in the engineering laboratories at the Buick factory.

## Japs Object to Embargo on Gas

Japanese Ambassador Kensuke Horinouchi Saturday handed Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles a note which expressed official Japanese objections to the embargo on shipments of American aviation gasoline outside the Western Hemisphere.

Horinouchi declined to tell newspapermen the nature of the communication, beyond the fact that it dealt with a commercial matter. But informed sources made it clear that it was devoted to the embargo of aviation gasoline, of which Japan has been a heavy purchaser for her warfare in China.

It was said that the communication did not mention scrap iron and other raw materials which may be exported only by license from the United States.

## Civil Service Exams Announced

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations for the positions listed below. Applications must be on file with the Commission's Washington office not later than the closing dates mentioned in each case. For two of the examinations, two closing dates are given—the first date governs receipt of applications from states east of Colorado; the second from Colorado and states westward. The salaries given in each case are subject to a retirement deduction of 3 1/2 percent.

Junior graduate nurse, \$1,620 a year, U. S. Public Health Service, Federal Security Agency, and Veterans Administration. High school study and completion of a certified training course in a recognized school of nursing are required, except that applications may be accepted, under certain conditions, from persons now in attendance in their final year of training. Because of the demand for eligibles, the minimum height requirement has been reduced to 60 inches. Applicants must not have passed their thirty-fifth birthday. For this examination applications will be rated as received until further notice.

Senior medical officer, \$4,600 a year; medical officer, \$3,800 a year; associate medical officer, \$3,200 a year; various optional branches. The places of employment are: Public Health Service, Food and Drug Administration, Veterans Administration, Civil Aeronautics Authority, and Indian Service. Applicants must have been graduated with an M. D. degree from a recognized medical school, and must have had professional experience in a special branch of medicine. For the associate grade applicants must not have passed their fortieth birthday, and for the other grades they must not have passed their fifty-third birthday. For this examination applications will be rated as received until further notice.

### City of Versailles May Soon be Site of French Government

France's authoritarian government may move soon to the site of her absolute monarchy—the palace of Versailles, where the Bourbon kings ruled with elaborate pomp from 1627 to 1799.

Negotiations with the Germans are now in progress to make the beautiful traditional national capital an open city, and Senator Henri Haye, newly-appointed ambassador to the United States, has reported the government might move there before he takes up his post in September. He is mayor of the city which has a population of 60,000.

Haye said that Marshal Henri Philippe Petain, chief of state, might be installed in one wing of the palace along with the army, navy and air ministries and the foreign office. The diplomatic Parisians probably would live in the vicinity. All other ministries would be located in Paris. Haye said that the government expected to learn soon whether the Germans (Continued On Page 2)

### BRITAIN'S HOME GUARD PLAY IMPORTANT PART IN DEFENSE

Minute men of 1940, some 1,250,000 Home guard volunteers, stand today behind Britain's seasoned first line troops, ready, their officers say, to "put their ammunition on the dining room table and fight from there."

Few of these volunteers had military training before the war, and many never touched a rifle until a month ago, but they are now an integral part of Britain's elaborate defense system.

"Give them a position to hold," said one veteran staff officer confidently, "and they'll hold it until the regulars can come up and hit the Boche."

Most of the volunteers do their soldiering in addition to putting in eight hours of work at their regular jobs.

Fishermen, farmers, factory employees, hotel waiters, shopkeepers, and bank clerks, they rise before dawn or sacrifice their lunch hours to take part in daily drills. Many drill at night.

Armed with rifles and "uniformed" in overalls, the home guards are regarded by the general staff as indispensable for observation purposes and secondary fixed defense.

The home guard units are commanded for the most part by retired army officers, and they maintain close contact with the regular army brigade staffs in their districts.

One factor which will work in the home guards' favor in event of invasion is their knowledge of the local countryside, now denuded of signposts and every indication which might help an enemy force to orient itself.

One job for which the home guard is regarded as vital is the destruction of small parachute groups bent on demolition.

The army has prepared machine-gun and artillery positions which it hopes will hold airmen and other important points against parachutists. But against small bodies of parachutists, landing in desolate country, the home guard will be the first line of defense.

Along the coast, home guards maintain a constant patrol in motorboats and dinghys, or scan the sea from cliff tops.

Their morale appears to be high. Typical of their attitude was the remark of one older, a veteran of the half-forgotten Matabeleland campaign in South Africa in 1893, who stood on a bank and hurled grenades at a mock German tank.

"I don't want any Germans muckin' about in my garden," he declared.

The Grand Jury will convene the last week of Court, which will open Sept. 2. Criminal cases have been set down for hearing the week of August 19.

A number of important cases are included on the criminal docket, including a statutory charge in which a resident of the southeast section of the county has been indicted.

### Next Outstanding Project In City's Development

#### Engineers Are Studying City's Drainage Problems Mayor Hall Reports

A system of surface drainage for Littlefield will be the next outstanding project in the development of the city, according to Mayor Homer Hall.

Engineers have been employed by the City of Littlefield and a complete survey and study of the drainage needs of the city is being made.

Highway 7 Needs Drainage Probably the greatest problem confronting the city commission, and others interested, is the drainage of Highway 7 from a short distance west of Phelps avenue east to the East Side Tourist Camp, owned and operated by Jack Sparks. How to solve this situation has been under consideration for several years, but no solution has been reached. Whenever a heavy rain occurs this section of Highway 7 is flooded to a considerable depth, sometimes making it almost impossible for cars and trucks to come through. Business is virtually at a standstill until the water finally recedes.

Paving a number of the streets in the residential section of the city has increased the general drainage problem, because of the water flowing off the pavement into other streets.

All Plains cities have drainage problems, which the city executives solve in various ways. Storm sewers are the most efficient way, it is declared, but is so expensive as to be virtually prohibitive for most cities.

Mayor Hall said that definite action on the city's drainage problems would be taken as soon as the report of the engineers was received either wholly or in part.
