## **Amherst District Tax Would Go Up Slightly**

A note to taxpayers in Lamb County road districts -A (Littlefield area) and 4 (Sudan area):

You can let down your guard.

Approval of the U.S. Highway 84 right-of-way bond elections isn't expected to sock either district with

Road district 3 (Amherst area) taxpayers won't have to be overly cautious, either. No knock-out punch is headed their way.

Amherst Up 71/2 Per Cent

The tax levy in the Amherst district, according to the best estimate available now, will be increased 71/2 per cent if the district votes its bond issue.

This combined tax announcement—no tax increases in district 1-A and 4 and only a small hike in district 3 -came Monday from the county commissioners' court.

The court added that these plans are based on current valuations in the three road districts.

Commissioners made their announcement after studying bond schedules prepared free-of-charge by a recognized bonding company.

Three Elections Slated

The three bond elections call for a \$239,000 issue in the Littlefield district; \$65,000 in the Sudan area; and \$39,500 in the Amherst district. Approval of the issues by voters would set up right-of-way funds for four-laning the road across the entire county.





#### Threats From The Soviets:

"Has the balance of the power in today's world shifted to Soviet Russia and away from the U. S.? Would Russia win and the U.S. and her Allies lose if war should break out now or in the foreseeable?"

- These enormous questions, which are being asked throughout the world, lead off a U.S. News and World Report article entitled: "Soviet Threats Power or Bluff?" In seeking answwers the magazine went to military and diplomatic leaders both here at home and in key capitals overseas. Here are its findings.

First, we are still ahead of the Russians in the ability to wage total war --- that is, nuclear war in which the ultimate weapons would be employed to bring absolute destruction to an enemy. We would, however, sustain devastating damage on our own side even in victory.

Second, the Russians have an overwhelming edge in the ability to wage non-nuclear wars-that is socalled limited wars in which conventional weapons and only the small tactical atomic weapons would be employed. Her armies are far larger than those of ourselves and our Allies and are powerful supported with air

Our mlitary leaders think it will be some time before Russia will have enough long-range ballistic missiles to cancel out present superiority in intercontinental manned bombers. It quotes a top-level general as saying that about all-out war: "Assuming exhaustion of nuclear stockpiles in the early exchange, both U. S. and Soviet Russia would lose their major population centers and the bases needed for support of large-scale military forces operating beyond their borders. If, under those circumstances, the concept of 'residual superority' can be entertained, the margin plobably would lie with the United States because of its greater and more efficient industrial transportation system.
