# Sewing Shortcuts

Your sewing basket have personality? Or do you get in a snarl of loose ends and binding every time you try to locate your tools?  
Sewing center experts come up with a series of suggestions on how to use tape to tidy up your kit, and to achieve some short-cuts in sewing as well.

3. Keep a orderly sewing basket by taping loose ends of binding, rick-rack or braid to the card.

4. Here's a tip for quick seaming. Fold the tape around the material every few inches. It's quicker and easier than basting. If you have trouble stitching a narrow seam, mark the line with tape and use the edges as your guide.

5. When sewing nylon, the needle frequently drops down too far in the throatplate hole and puckers the nylon. Remedy: Make a small square of brown wrapping paper to fit over the throatplate hole, and tape it to your machine. Your needle will just puncture the paper and offer less resistance to the fabric.

6. Transparent tape is indispensable in sewing on plastics. Pining and basting leave holes which may rip, but transparent tape holds the fabric in place. The needle sews right through it, and it may be ripped off easily.

7. To eliminate the jumble of a button box, try sandwiching odd buttons between strips of transparent tape. The entire length may be seen at a glance, and the buttons are snipped off as needed.

8. Rick-Rack and other narrow frims go on straight when they're taped in place. Stitch over the tape and rip it off.

9. When making bound button-holes, tape the facing to the button-hole area. Tape appliques and pockets in place, too, to prevent slipping.

You will be able to devise many other ways of using transparent tape in your sewing basket, and you'll soon wonder how you ever sewed without it.

## Milk Disguised

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — If you can't get children to drink milk, sometimes you can get them to eat it — or slip it to them in disguise. That's the word that comes from the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization in a new 129-page booklet titled "School Feeding — Its Contribution to Child Nutrition."

In Britain, the Ministry of Food fed 13,000 school children tablets of dried milk, with sugar or syrup added, and found them "slightly more popular than fresh fluid milk."

"No doubt," the book remarks, "the solid milk, which was in sees them. The movie interests, too, seem satisfied. In Copenhagen, for example, on a Saturday night it is impossible to get a movie ticket. The places are always packed.

Some countries of Europe have extra problems to surmount. Norway, for instance, is so mountainous that it is sometimes impossible to transmit to half the population of a single city. Switzerland, too, has these problems.

TV in Europe, with just a few exceptions, is government owned and operated. Advertising is not permitted. Expense money comes from yearly tax that is levied on owners of radio and TV sets. If a private citizen wishes to set up a TV transmitter, in most countries he would not be granted permission. Communications of this sort are generally a government monopoly.

When one looks at the radio industry of Europe, it is easy to understand why TV is still so novel. Phonograph records of 78 rpm are still the biggest sellers. A very high percentage of the phonographs that are sold do not have any record changing attachment. Europe's capital cities usually have only two radio transmitters, and operating at limited times. What do they think of color TV? Let's talk about moon travel instead.

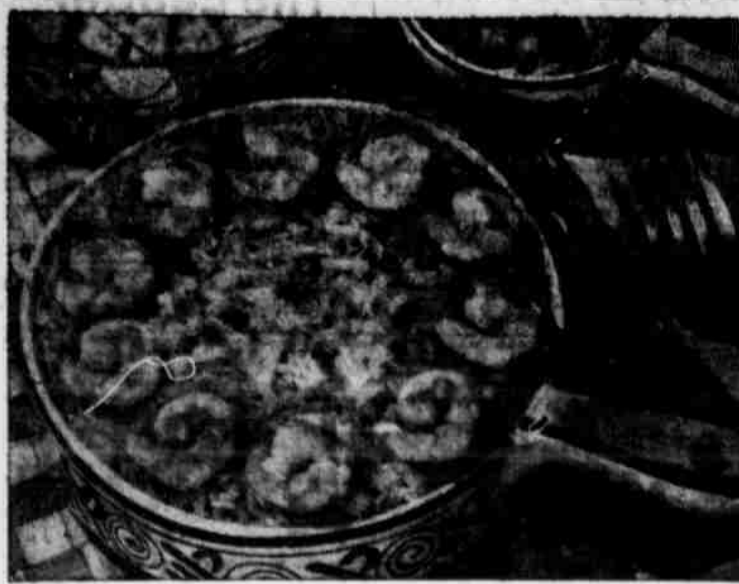

Shrimp Jambalaya

**INGREDIENTS:**

- 3 cups cooked rice
  - 2 tablespoons fat
  - 1 tablespoon flour
  - 1/2 cup chopped onions
  - 1 clove garlic, minced fine
  - 1 cup canned tomatoes
  - 1/2 cup water
  - 1 green pepper, chopped fine
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/4 teaspoon red pepper

To make 3 heaping cups of white, fluffy, perfectly cooked rice:
1. Put 1 cup uncooked rice, 2 cups cold water, 1/2 teaspoon salt in saucepan and vigorous boil.
  2. Turn the heat off, cover with a lid. Do not remove lid or stir rice while it is cooking.
  3. Leave saucepan over this low heat for 14 minutes. Turn heat off. The rice is now ready to use. However, leave the cover on the saucepan to keep the rice warm if you are not ready to use it immediately.
- For extra fluffy, tender, separate grains—allow the rice to steam for an additional 10 minutes—without removing lid.
- METHOD:** Melt fat in skillet, stir in flour and blend thoroughly. Add the onions and cook until the onions are tender. Add garlic, tomatoes, water, green pepper, salt, red pepper, thyme, and Worcestershire sauce. Cook until pepper is tender. Stir occasionally. Add rice, shrimp and tomato juice. Pour into a greased baking dish. Sprinkle the cheese and parsley over the top. Place in a 350° F. oven for 15 minutes.



**It's the Law In Texas**

Baby-sitting, once upon a time, was pretty simple. You put the baby to bed and got the little girl next door to come in and study or read comic books. Back from dinner, or a movie, you gave her an apple and fifty cents and sent her home happy.

Then things began to happen. The neighbor's children developed their own activities. More parents took more evenings off, and the price of baby-sitting went up. The later the hour, the greater the pay. Parents of teen-agers objected to 'school night' baby-sitting. Dear old ladies, once gladly available, couldn't stand up to six and eight-hour sessions with pestiferous youngsters.

Now, we hear, good baby sitters are dated up a year ahead during football season, on dance club nights, and for other big events. Without a television set you can't even get one. Moreover, a few weird accidents have made people just a little jittery, and that adds to the shortage.

Yet in the face of all this, some happy idealist up in Indiana has come out with a pamphlet for baby-sitters to score themselves by. The list of qualities they're supposed to have would make a gold star mother look like a second rater. Such questions as "Am I calm? Dependable? Unselfish? Have I a sense of humor? Do I love children? Can I meet emergencies? Can I meet kids on their own level?" And so on, through several pages.

We've heard many a definition of optimism, but we submit the author of this ambitious little booklet as the living example of it.

Some people feel that doubt has been cast upon their basic honesty and fairness when they are excused from serving on a trial jury following a challenge by an attorney. This is definitely not true in the usual situation. To be questioned and challenged by a lawyer and excused by the judge is not a reflection upon the prospective juror's integrity or intelligence. It simply means that, in one particular case, the judge may deem it proper to excuse that person.

When involved as a party to litigation everyone wants, and is entitled to, a jury of 12 disinterested and completely impartial persons — men who will try the case fairly on the law as stated by the judge, and on the evidence admitted at the trial. This kind of jury is what lawyers and judges are trying to secure when they orally examine members of a jury panel.

There are many reasons why a person originally called for a jury panel might not be a fair and impartial juror. He may be closely related to one of the litigants, have a business relationship with one of the lawyers, or have personal knowledge of the case to be tried. He may show some leaning, one way or the other, regarding the type of case being tried that would make it difficult for him to render a strictly impartial verdict.

Even where there is no condition producing a conscious or readily apparent bias, a lawyer may ask that a panel member be excused under the peremptory challenges allowed his client. He usually does this because he feels there is something in that person's background which might unconsciously sway his judgment, even while honestly attempting to be absolutely fair. Many apparently irrelevant questions may be asked by an attorney in reaching a decision regarding this unconscious factor. Under the law each juror must be a citizen of Texas and of the county in which he is to serve. He must be qualified to vote in such county, except that he need not have paid his poll tax. He must own land within the State or he must be the head of the household within the county. He must be of sound mind and good moral character and able to read and write the English language.

A juror is not qualified for service if he has served as a juror within a certain specified length of time. No one who has been convicted of a felony is qualified to serve as a juror; nor is an individual who is under indictment or other legal accusation of theft or of any felony.

The statutes of Texas exempt certain persons from the obligation of serving as jurors. Persons over sixty years of age, civil officers of the State or the United States, ministers, physicians, attorneys, publishers of newspapers, school masters, druggists, undertakers, telegraph operators, railroad station agents, ferrymen, millers engaged in grist, flouring and saw mills, certain railroad officials, firemen and certain state forestry employees may claim exemption from jury duty. The exemption must be stated and claimed under oath.

University of Maryland students were so wrought up in 1943 when Bryant left to coach

football at Kentucky that they staged a classroom strike. Earlier the students staged a demonstration outside the home of Dr. H. C. Byrd, the university president, in protest to Bryant's departure.

Bryant, the new coach at Texas A. and M., had to assure the students he was leaving voluntarily. He told a mass meeting of 2,000 students that Dr. Byrd had nothing to do with his decision to leave the Terrapins.

"I'm going to Kentucky of my own free will," he said. "I think it's a better job and a better future for me."

Bryant was named Maryland coach Sept. 7, 1945. He got only a one-year contract because it is a state university and can't commit itself beyond the annual budget.

More than a score of players he coached at North Carolina Pre-Flight Naval School showed up 12 days later, hoping to play for Maryland.

"We followed Bryant to Maryland," they readily admitted. But he quit after his team won six, lost two and tied one in his only year here.

He went to Kentucky on a five year contract. The job lasted 8 years. At Kentucky his teams won 60 games, lost 23 and tied 5. When he left Kentucky, authorities were in a dither. They didn't want to see him leave and for a time they refused to release him from a contract. But now he's in Aggie land, ready to accept another challenge.

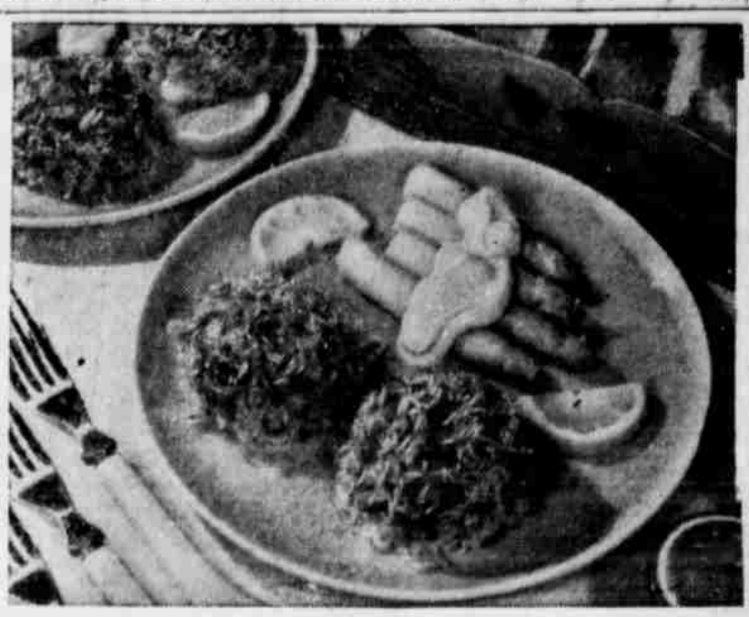

Rice and Salmon Porcupines

**INGREDIENTS:**  
 1/2 cup uncooked rice  
 1 1/2-ounce can salmon and liquid  
 1/4 cup grated carrot  
 1 egg  
 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion  
 1/4 teaspoon curry powder  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon pepper  
 1 10 1/2-ounce can cream of mushroom soup  
 1 1/2 cups water

**METHOD:** Mix together the rice, salmon, carrots, egg, onion, curry powder, salt and pepper. Press the mixture into six balls. Place in a greased baking dish allowing space between, since balls expand during cooking. Mix together the soup and water and heat to boiling. Pour over the rice and salmon balls. If a very large baking dish is used, almost all of the soup mixture may be poured over the balls. But if the dish is somewhat small and shallow, use only half of the soup mixture since it is likely to cook over the sides of the dish. Cover baking dish and place in a preheated 350° F. oven. Bake about 1 to 1 1/4 hours or until the visible rice is tender. Pour more soup over the balls as the rice absorbs the liquid. Serve with additional sauce made of mushroom soup plus water, if desired. This recipe makes 6 porcupines. Porcupine meat balls may be made with ground beef as well as with salmon. Uncooked rice and beef are mixed together and during the baking, the grains of rice absorb moisture and pop through the surface to make "white quills." These little fellows, porcupines, are certain to please and satisfy every family.

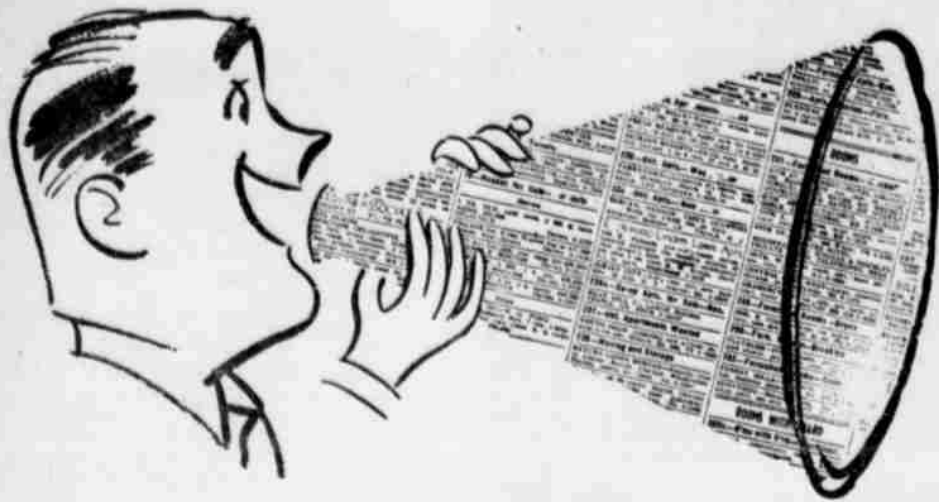

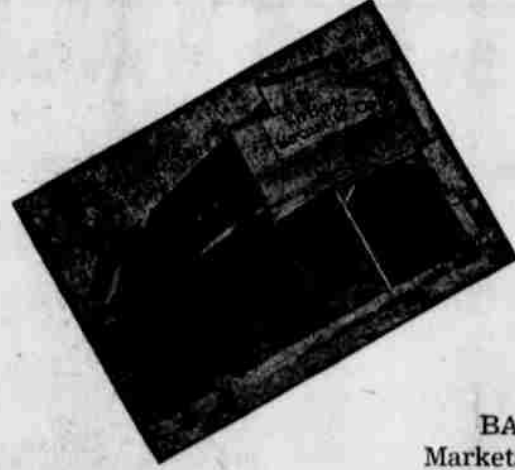

FOUNDED IN 1904

BACK IN 1904, C. W. Furr, now deceased—founder of Furr's Super Markets, set up a grocery business in Kirkland, Texas, a small town near Childress.

He had dreams of a wordly enterprise, for it was not long until his wooden grocery store, cracker barrel and all, became a brick structure to include groceries, hardware and clothing departments. The business retained the original name, The Kirkland Mercantile Company.

In 1929, Mr. Furr moved to Amarillo. Here he founded the Furr Food Stores, and son Roy Furr became a key figures in the operation.

Four years later, in 1929, Roy Furr moved to Lubbock where he purchased the M-System stores, six units: three in Lubbock and one each in Littlefield, Idalou and Shallowater. Key Furr, a brother, took over where Roy left off in Amarillo, as No. 1 aide to C. W. Furr.

In 1934, the M-System stores became the Furr Food Stores. At that time three units were in Lubbock and six others in Slaton, Tahoka, Hale Center, Littlefield, Clovis and Hobbs, a total of nine stores.

Today, fifty years later, Roy Furr, as president of Furr's Inc. (Furr Super Markets) operates a group of 31 super markets in West Texas and New Mexico. The Amarillo unit has some 29 stores, giving an overall total of 69. From the start of 25 personnel in his stores, the Furr's group now has more than 1,000 persons on the payrolls. In addition to the 31 stores in the Lubbock division, Furr's operates a packing plant, creamery, bakery, egg department, a wholesale house and five warehouses.

Stores are located in Childress, Plainview, Brownfield, Levelland, Lamesa, Littlefield, Snyder, Big Spring, Midland, Odessa (2), Monahans, El Paso (9), Lubbock, (7), Hobbs, Roswell and Albuquerque.

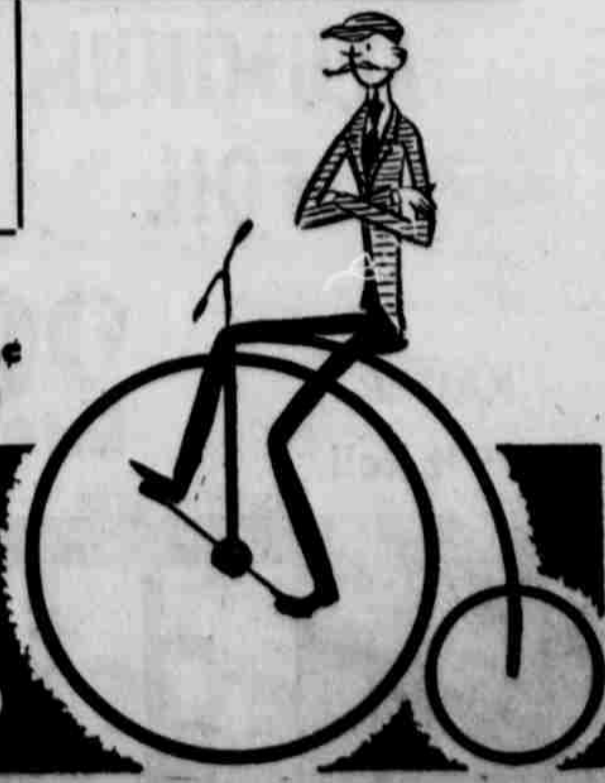

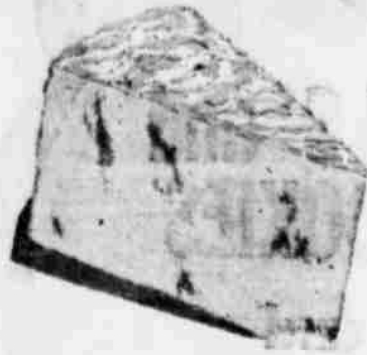

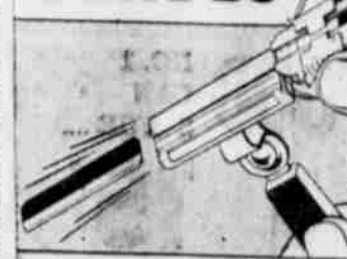

# Let's Talk Livestock

Fort Worth—Secretary of Agriculture Benson announced on April 14 that if the favorable situation in Mexico with regard to foot-and-mouth diseases continues, and there are no new outbreaks—the U. S.—Mexican border will be opened to meat and livestock imports at the end of this year.

The prospect for heavy imports of Mexican cattle, and beef, are considered likely since the Mexican devaluation of the peso recently. The dollar balance of Mexico can be replenished to considerable degree by sale of cattle and meat in the United States, but this is not likely to meet with much favor among the bulk of the cattle producers. Especially affected will be the producers of the "plainer" kinds of stocker cattle.

**RAINS FAILED TO SLOW CATTLE MOVE.**

Cattle run at Fort Worth Monday was 1,100 above a week earlier and 1,300 above a year ago on the same date. Same pattern developed at all the nation's major markets as shipments were unusually large for the season. 24,500 more cattle, 2,100 more calves, 20,000 more hogs and 13,000 more sheep were reported by 12 major markets than on the same day a week earlier.

The heavy movement turned virtually all classes lower, except fat calves and high grade stockers. These classes were steady, but most other cattle were weak to 50c or more lower. Good and choice fed steers and

yearlings sold for \$17.50 to \$23, with common and medium kinds \$13 to \$17. Fat cows drew \$10.50 to \$13.50, a few to \$14 and better on the hellefish type. Cannors and cotters drew \$7 to \$11. Bulls \$11 to \$15.

Good and choice fat calves \$17 to \$22, and common and medium sorts \$13 to \$17, with culls \$10 to \$13.

Medium, good and choice stocker steer calves and steer yearlings sold for \$16 to \$20 and similar heifers sold around \$2 to \$2.50 under.

**LAMB PRICES SAG AT ALL POINTS.**

Sheep and lamb trade, facing numbers nearly one-third larger than a week earlier at the 12 major markets, weakened at all points. Bearish tone of the Eastern dressed meat trade in which some points reported lamb another \$1 or more lower, had an adverse effect.

Good and choice Spring lambs drew \$20 to \$23, this compared with a \$24 top late last week. Cull, command and medium slaughter Spring lambs drew \$10 to \$19. Stocker and feeder Spring lambs sold at \$13 to \$17.

Shorn fat lambs of good and choice kinds sold for \$18 to \$20, while cull, common and medium kinds sold from \$7 to \$17. Stocker and feeder shorn lambs drew \$14 to \$19, the latter price on mixed and fat lambs.

Aged wethers sold a \$10 to \$12, and yearlings and two-year-olds sold at \$12 to \$15. Old ewes drew \$4.50 to \$6. Old bucks sold for \$4 to \$5.

**HOGS LOWER DUE TO LARGER RUNS.**

A surprising increase of some 21,000 head in the hogs offered Monday at 12 major markets lopped 50 cents per hundred off prices of butcher hogs and sows at Fort Worth Monday. Some longer declines were chalked up at Corn Belt points.

Top at Ft. Worth was \$27.75 to \$28, and sows sold from \$22 to \$24.

**PROTEIN PRICES MAY COME DOWN.**

On May 3 millfeed makers will be able to submit bids for surplus dried milk now in government hands. The USDA has been under pressure from many quarters to sell this protein to help stem the soaring protein feed prices. Short supplies of

feed prices. Short supplies of soybean meal are a factor.

A bigger than anticipated turkey crop, and vastly expanded business in hog and pig feeds, has served to push the protein prices up and up.
