Water Expansion Program For Littlefield Underway

Improvement To Represent Total Of \$40,000.00

Two Wells Drilled; 200,000 Gal. Concrete Reservoir To Be Built

According to W. G. Street, city secretary, an extensive improvement program is underway in the water

This project includes the drilling of two wells, which are expected to be ready for operation by July, the erection of a 200,000 gallon concrete reservoir, two new pumps, and two new booster pumps. Mr. Street explained that the booster pumps are for pumping the water from the top of the wells up to the town About three-fourths mile of eight-inch water pipe and electric power line to pump with will also be features of the Littlefield Water department improvements.

This water expansion program will represent an investment of about

The Panhandle Construction company of Lubbock are general contractors, with George L. Taylor of Plainview, drilling contractor, and H. N. Roberts of Lubbock, as su-

pervising engineer. Both wells have been drilled, which, Mr. Street stated, should supply from 500 to 1500 gallons a minute. Due to slow delivery of materials, it will be about July before they are ready for service.

In an interview with Mr. Street Saturday he said: "We may have some trouble supplying sufficient water between now and July, because we are now running just about to the capacity of present wells, and as the hot weather sets in, there is bound to be a shortage, especially if we don't get some rain."

Littlefield Now Has 1038 Water Meters In Use

Shows Increase Of 90 Over Last Year When 948 Reported

A checkup by the Leader Saturday disclosed that Littlefield now has a population of about 5700 peo-

In an interview with W. G. Street, city secretary, he stated that a checkup on the water meters recently for the bond holders of the City's indebtedness, indicated they have 1038 meters in service now, as against 948 meters a year ago.

Mr. Street explained that engineers and water experts determine population at a rate of 5 % persons per meter; and on this basis, Little-field would have a population of 5700 people.

The city secretary added, "Some say it is too high, but in my estimation, this figure is not far from being right."
