Dick Hopping, big husky 210-pound Littlefield Wildcat football star, left yesterday morning for Memphis, Tennessee, where he will play with the All American Football Team. The game is scheduled for Friday night, August 19, to be played in Crump Stadium at Memphis.

Hopping the son of Mrs. Jim McGuire of this City, will play with the West team, which includes players from six states, namely, Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas. The only other Texan on the team is Larry Graham of Houston.

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COTTON CEILING PRICE CONTINUES AT FORTY-FIVE

Large Crop Is Certain to Force Prices Lower

The new announced support price for 1951 cotton came from the Agriculture Department last Friday, when it was announced that the support price had been raised 2.56 per hundred, average over last year's support price. Last year's average support price was 27.90; this year it has been set at 30.46.

Many farmers had hoped for a considerably higher support price, contending that costs have increased considerably more than the approximate eight per cent increase that has been granted—is now official.

The ceiling price for cotton continues at 45 cents, but mid-July quotations have averaged around the 39 cent level, and are expected to go considerably lower, as the enormous crop now in process of being ginned and growing is almost certain to force prices lower.

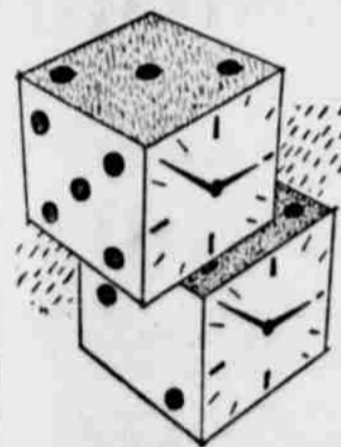

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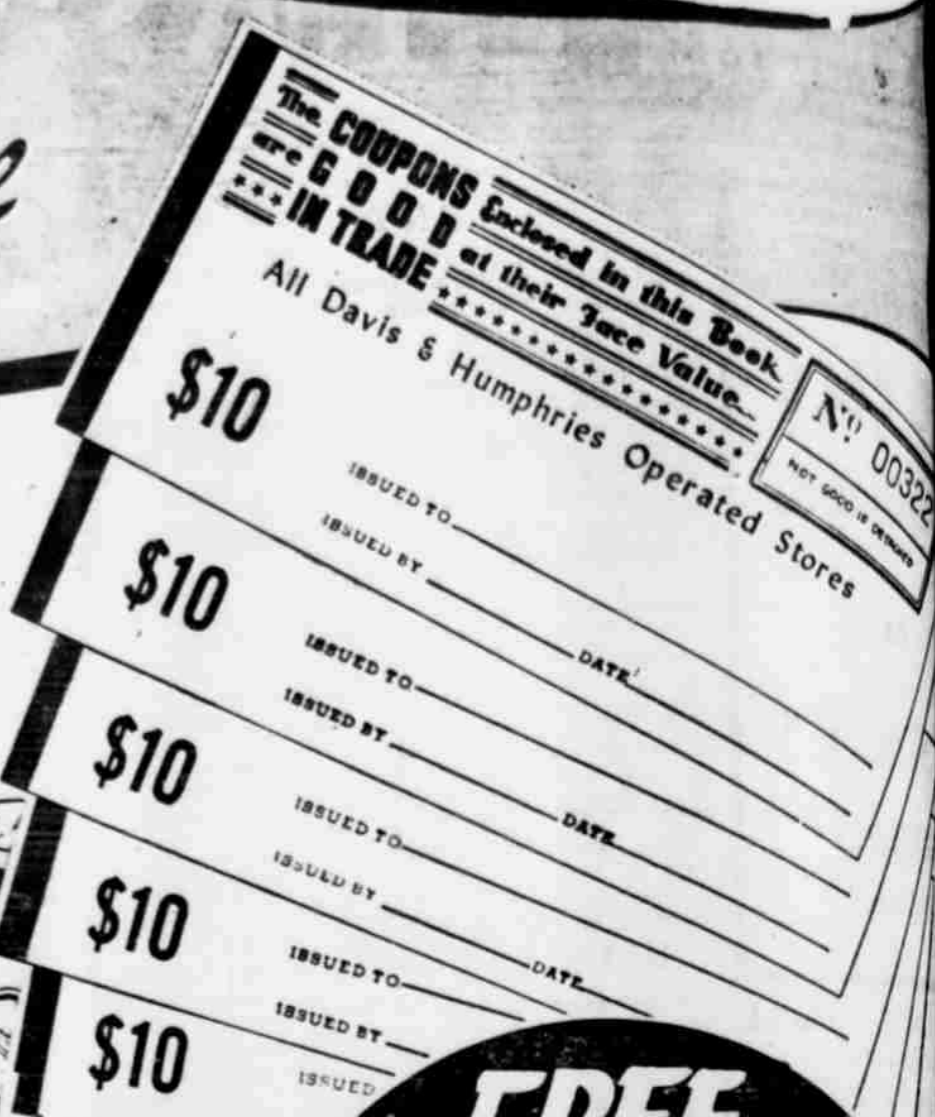

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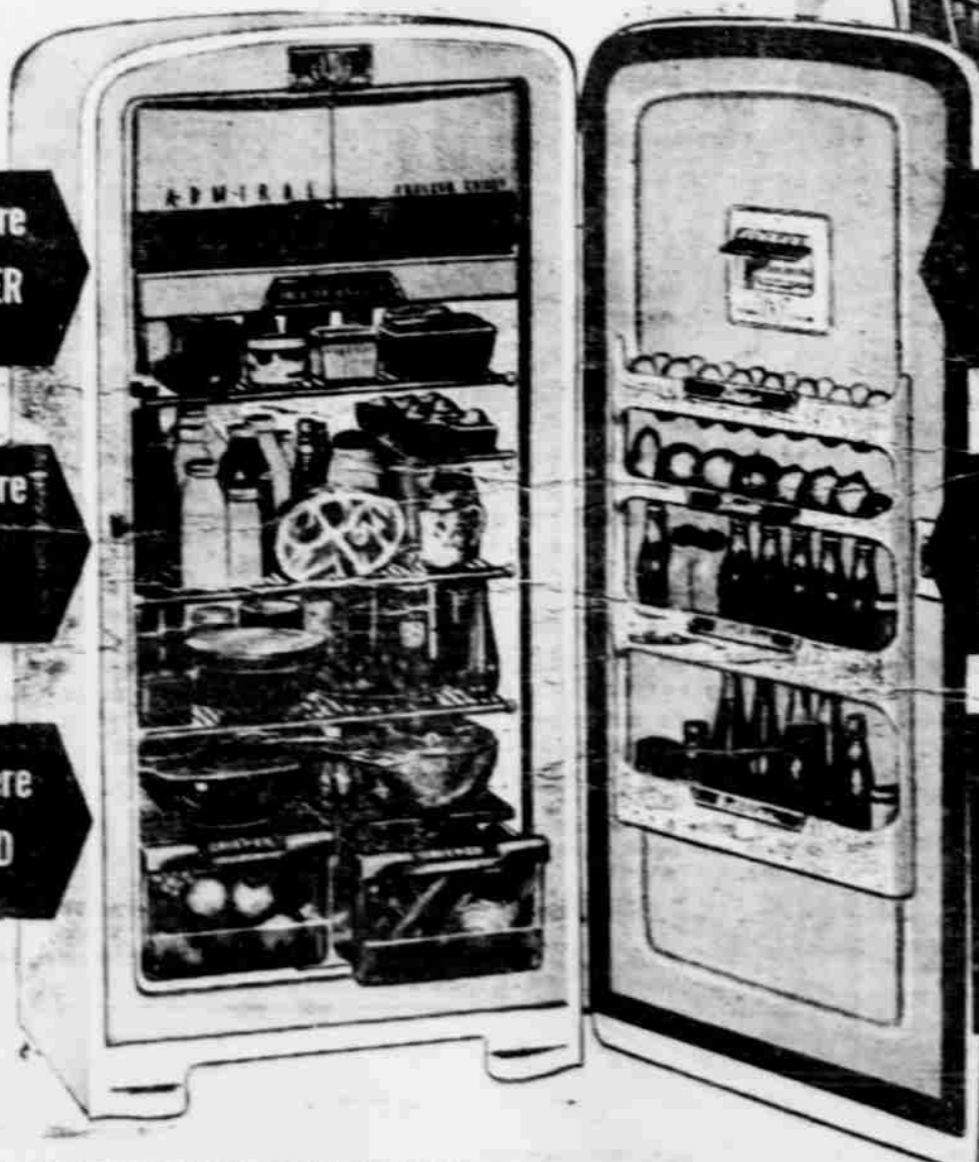
