New Building Formally Opened Last Saturday, Capacity Business Reported

Within less than nine months, from the time they took over the Delano cafe, Mr. and Mrs. Barton Smith, found themselves compelled to increase the seating and service capacity of their popular restaurant and drive-in place on Highway 7.

L. B. Crockett, the owner of the property, built an extension which affords them double the seating capacity. The improvements were completed about two weeks ago, but the operators wished to have everything in readiness.

The formal opening was staged last Saturday and a record crowd filled both the lunch counter and dining rooms, all through the day and most of the night. Mr. Smith reports that the place has been filled to capacity.

The enlarged cafe has eight booths with ample seating capacity for 32 people and twelve seats at the counter. Two highly trained chefs are on duty, one at night and the other during the day shift.

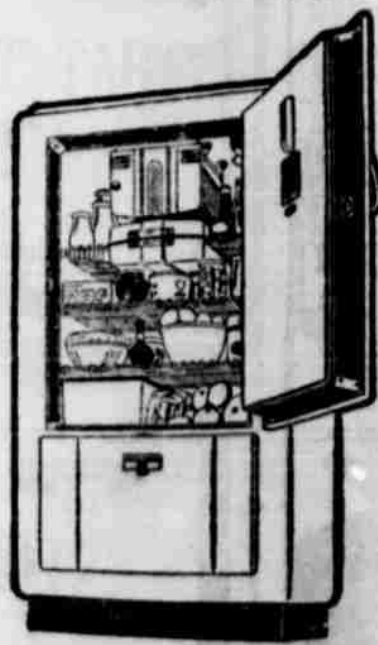

OPHALMOGRAPH SURVEY MADE OF 250 CHILDREN IN LITTLEFIELD SCHOOL

J. Y. Taylor of the Educational Laboratories Makes Records, Assisted By Dr. Ira E. Woods and Mrs. Taylor

During the past few days, 250 of the lower grade pupils at the Littlefield primary school, had their reading habits "Ophthalmographed" by Mr. and Mrs. J. Y. Taylor, representatives of the Educational Laboratories Inc. of Brownwood. This was a preliminary survey paving the way for the most efficient employment of the Metronoscope, which was recently acquired by the School Board and Parent Teachers Association.

Two ophthalmograph instruments were used in the survey. One is the property of Dr. Ira Woods; the other was Mr. Taylor's instrument. As previously announced in The Leader, Littlefield has won the distinction of being the first school in the Panhandle, to provide this improved reading method for its school children. Sixteen other school systems in Texas have adopted the Metronoscope. Included among those cities are El Paso, Brownwood and Vernon. All the large teachers colleges in the country have established separate courses for the teaching of the Metronoscope reading methods.

The next survey will be made in the Spring for comparison purposes—to show the exact progress made by the students with the use of the Metronoscope. The American Optical Co., according to Mr. Taylor, has graph records of nearly 7000 children in the same grades as those that were chosen in the Littlefield test. The first survey will be compared to the averages in other school systems. The graph made here this week will be returned after the experts have had time to make individual reports. The American Optical Co., through their educational research bureau, will also make a comparative report on the reading progress of the local school children. This report, as well as the costly survey, are being prepared without cost to the local school board.

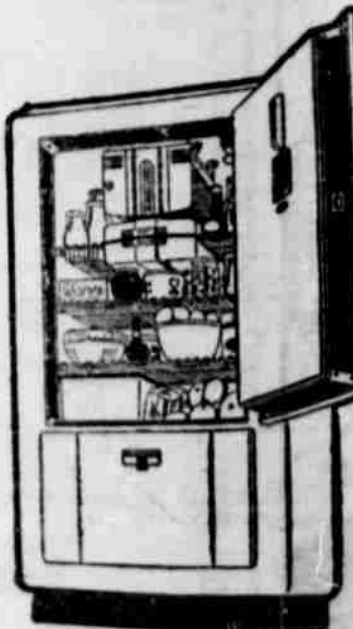

DIVERSIFICATION

Sugar beets are now being raised in increasing quantities, in Lamb, Hockley, Floyd and Hale counties. These beets test out 22 1/2 percent sugar content — South Plains beets find a quick and profitable market at the Colorado sugar mills. Last week two solid carloads totaling over 140,000 pounds of beets, were shipped out of Anton and Roundup. Commenting on this crop diversification — the Anton News announces that the farmers in that irrigation area, will make an effort to raise a 1000 acre crop of sugar beets next season.

Jack Stricklin, in the Brownfield Herald, urges housewives and cooks, in West Texas, to use more beet su-

gar in preference to cane sugar. The latter — he points out, is a product of South East Texas and Louisiana.

Raising sugar beets, is only one of many crops, that can be profitably engaged in by South Plains farmers who wish to get away from the single yoke of cotton farming.

The time may come when government cotton loans will be greatly reduced or withdrawn entirely. The independent farmer who looks ahead, will not gamble on a continuance of government aid. He will investigate the possibilities of raising sugar beets, feed crops and live stock, and he will do it now while he is still in fairly good financial shape.

Diversification of crops will prove the salvation of this section just as it has proven the greatest blessing wherever it is practiced.

The girl's neck was broken, and the boy's body badly mangled. Apparently the wheels of the truck had run over him.

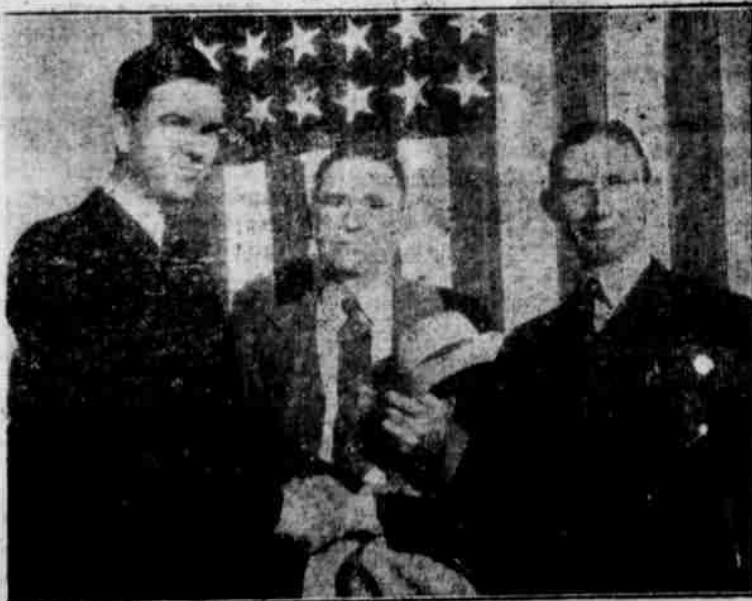
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W. D. T. Storey Attends Brownfield Ceremonies
