Many File For School Board

Eight File At Olton

As of noon on the final day for filing for the various school board posts throughout the county an interesting contest is in prospect in many of the races.

Olton has by far the largest number of candidates in the county as they have had eight persons file for the three positions that expire this year and none of the three incumbents whose terms do expire have filed for re-election.

Those filing for the three positions on the board are Gerald Allcorn, Raymond Lewis, Bob Duncan, Bub Holt, Bartow Riley, Royce Collins, Dr. Basil Johns and Elmo Bryant. None of the three incumbents whose terms expire, Gilbert Roberson, Owen Jones, and Ed Thompson had filed for re-election by press time.

At Anton four persons have filed for the two positions that are up for election this year. Thomas C. James is the only incumbent that has filed for re-election and he will be challenged by three persons seeking their first term on the board.

The others to file for the board at Anton are J.C. Hodges, Don Stone and Floyd Morton. Bob Biffle the other board member whose term expires this year has not filed for re-election to the board.

There are also four running for the two vacant posts on the Sudan School Board. Wiley Mudgett, the present president of the board has filed for re-election but Nole Parrish the other member whose term expires this year has not yet filed for another term.

The other three running at Sudan are Dexter Baker, Dick West and Byron Ford.

At Springlake-Earth the situation is similar to that at Anton and Sudan where four men are running for two vacant positions with Orville Clavering one of the incumbents having filed for re-election.

The three seeking their first term on the board are Jimmy Banks, Johnny K. Martin and Norman Henchcliffe while incumbent Price Hamilton has not filed for another term on the board.

At both Pep and Whitharral the incumbents has all filed for re-election and all are running without opposition in the two communities.

At Pep the three incumbents are E.J. Kuhler, V.E. Glumpler and J.W. Walker and at Whitharral Ed Johnson and Clifford Throckmorton are the incumbents who have no opponents.

Voter Registration Begins Today Throughout County

A special two-week voter registration period will begin today in the tax assessor-collector's office at the Lamb County Court House and at city halls in Amherst, Sudan, Earth and Olton.

The voter registration period is for persons who failed to obtain poll tax receipts before January 31. By registering during the 15 day period persons will become eligible to vote in the national, state, county and local elections.

Truck Accident Kills 47 Sheep

An accident at 9 p.m. Monday night caused the death of 47 sheep, when the truck in which they were being transported overturned on its side. The driver of the truck, Jimmy Boatwright, San Angelo failed to make the curve off the Delano Ave. onto the Highway 84 by-pass and the truck turned over on its side.

Investigators at the scene of the accident stated that only one or two of the sheep were actually killed in the accident and that the others suffocated before they could be removed from the truck.

The damage to the 1966 Chevrolet truck was estimated at \$800 and the value of the sheep lost in the accident was estimated at approximately the same figure.

Colt League To Meet Friday

The Colt League baseball league will make plans for the coming season at their first meeting of the season which will be held Friday evening March 4 at 7:30 p.m. at the XIT Room of the Security State Bank.

Howard Reese, president of the league during the 1965 season said that he hopes all parents of boys age 15 and 16 who will participate in the Colt League this coming season will attend the meeting.

Among the items to be discussed will be the electing of officers for the coming season and the setting up of a tentative schedule.

Court Passes Four Orders

The Lamb County Commissioners Court passed four orders at their regular end of the month meeting held Monday, February 28.

The first two orders passed by the County Judge and four commissioners was the approval of paying bills to Jack Fore Ditching Service for work done on two highway projects. The first was the approval of a bill for \$721.30 for work done on Farm to Market Road 1072 and the other was for \$85 for work on Highway 84.

The commissioners then approved an offer from B.D. Garland Motor Co. to furnish a 1966 Dodge pick-up to the Lamb County agent for his use in his work with the 4-H club and other youth groups in Lamb County.

The fourth and final order passed by the Commissioners Court gave the County Treasurer authorization to transfer \$30,000 from the General Fund to the Officers' Salary Fund. The reason for the transfer of funds was that the salary fund had dropped to \$9,596.05 as of February 28.

Birkelbach Is Sixth To File For Board Here

Werner Birkelbach became the sixth candidate for election to the Littlefield School Board when he filed with the School Tax Assessor/Collector Monday afternoon.

Unless there is a late filing Wednesday afternoon which is the deadline date for filing for the April 2 election the six men will run for the three positions that become vacant on the Littlefield Board this year.

Birkelbach joined incumbent Dr. William Nowlin and Calvin Price, Jerome Kirby, Dick Hopping, and R.M. Nicholas in announcing for the school board posts.

The six will run for the expiring terms of Dr. Albert Perkins and Charles Duval, neither of whom filed for re-election for another three year term in addition to Dr. Nowlin. The election will be held Saturday, April 2 with the only polling booth being at the Littlefield Junior High School.

In addition to persons who have their poll tax receipts, persons who register during the fifteen day voter registration period which starts today and runs through March 17 will be eligible to vote in the school board elections.

County Tax Assessor Herbert Dunn stated that the April 2 is after the 30 day delay period just granted and that unless another decision be forthcoming that all persons who register during the 15 day period will be eligible.

The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the April 2 election will join board president Buster Owens and members John D. Smith, Jack Barton and Pat Downs on the seven man Littlefield School Board.

The Littlefield City Council will hold their regular meeting tonight in the city council room starting at 7 p.m. and as of press time three items are to be discussed.

The first item on the agenda will be to accept bids on the purchase of water pipes by the city. The council will then act on the authorizing of the city manager to take bids on the purchase of sewer pipes.

Girl Scout Cookie Sale Starts Today

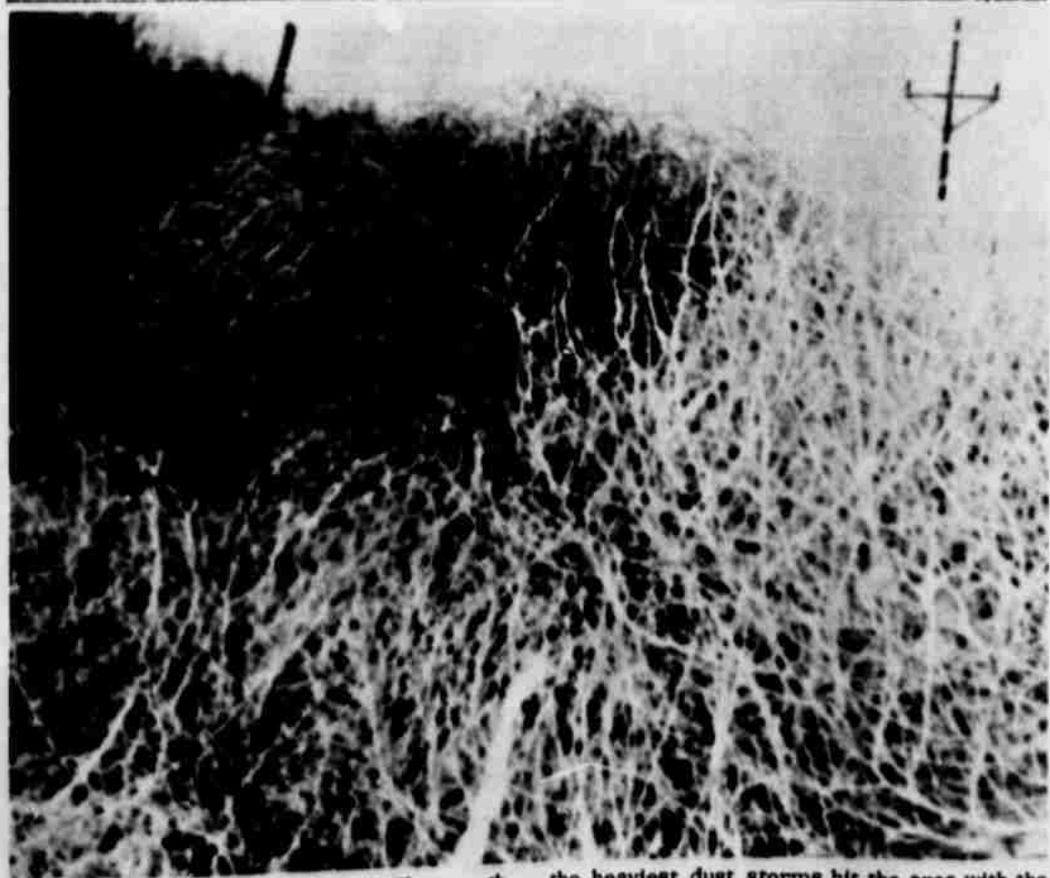
Girl Scouts of the Littlefield XIT Neighborhood will begin their annual cookie sale, Thursday, March 3, announced Mrs. L.T. Shortwell Jr. Council cookie chairman.

The Girl Scouts will be selling the cookies through March 17. The price will be 50 cents per box. The more than 300 Littlefield girls will be selling four kinds of cookies: chocolate and vanilla cream; chocolate mint; butter cookies; and peanut butter sandwiches.

Profits from the sale are divided between the troops and Council. Council profits will be used for building and improving Camp Rio Blanco. This year part of the funds will be used to purchase an all purpose Carry-All truck for the Camp.

Camp Rio Blanco is the camp for the entire Council. It is located northeast of Crosbyton. Summer sessions will begin June 13. Each session will be based on the Girl Scout Program in the out-of-doors. Camp activities include crafts, hikes, swimming, songs, campfires, cook-outs, nature study and star gazing. Six sessions are scheduled for girls of various ages.

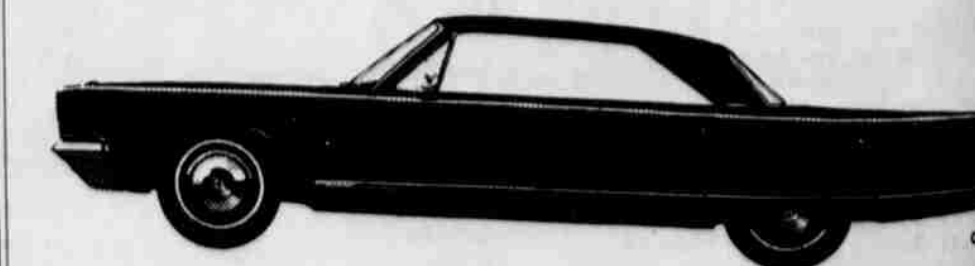

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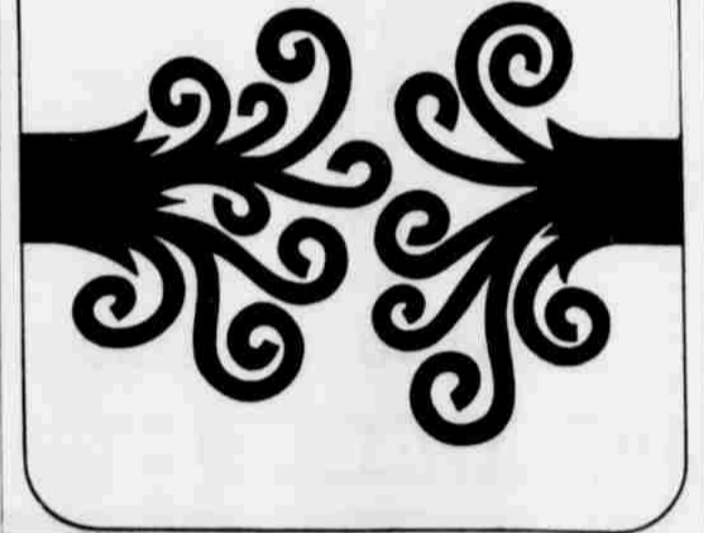
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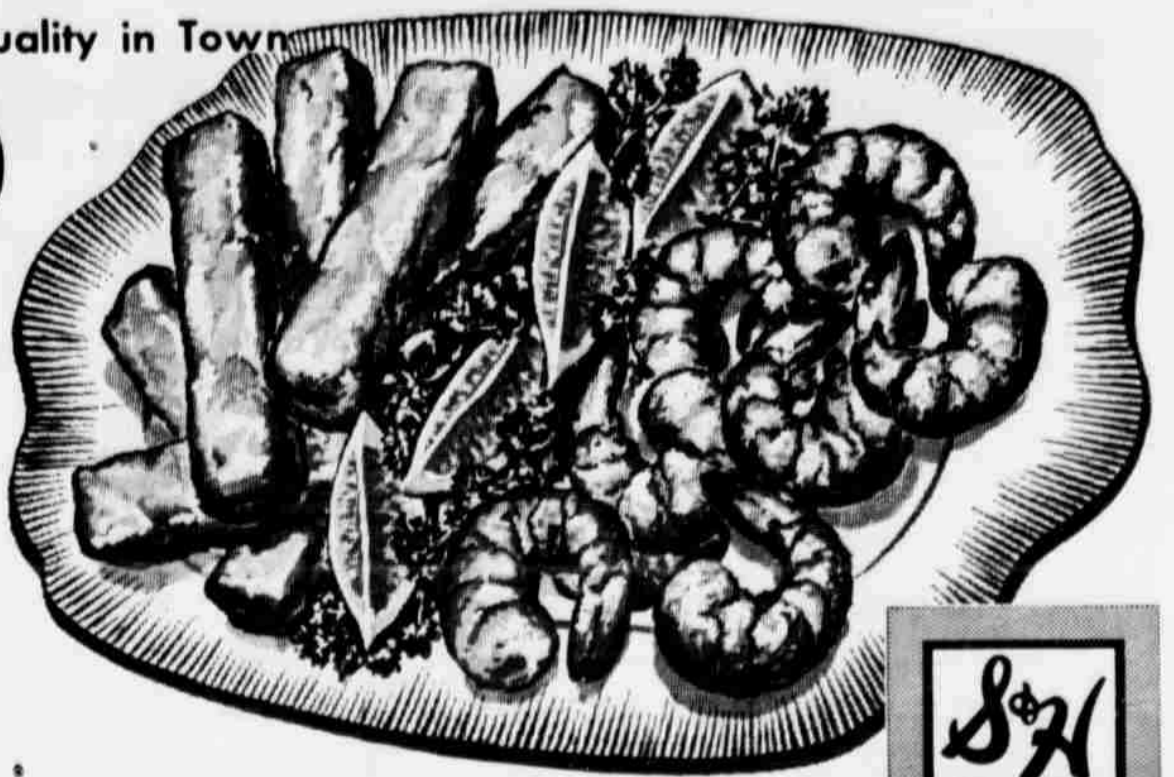

This is Mr. Ryan's first book since "The Longest Day", his widely praised account of the Allied landings in Normandy, "The Last Battle" is based on special research in official files and on interviews with hundreds of civilians and soldiers, both German and Al-

Nigerian Refugees Receive CWS Food

Two thousand self-exiled Nigerian refugees returning from Dahomey, where they had fled during violence in the Western Region of Nigeria prior to the fall of the Balewa government, have been supplied with food provided through Church World Service.

Responding to an appeal by the Nigerian Red Cross, Church World Service rushed 10,368 pounds of dried milk and 7,500 pounds of bulgar wheat to the Nigerian border village of Idiroko for distribution as the first returning refugees started passing through a center established by the government. In the absence of other facilities, CWS rented commercial trucks to speed the food to this destination.

In addition to providing these supplies, Church World Service has made available, through the Christian Council of Nigeria, funds for local purchase of additional food for the refugees.

CWS staff members made a further distribution of food from Idiroko to various entry points along the Nigerian-Dahomey border through which returning refugees passed. Their Federal government had appealed to them to return.

lied. It concentrates on the period of three weeks in April, 1945, when Berlin was invaded from the east by Russia and from the west by Britain and the United States.

In the course of his research, Mr. Ryan made many important discoveries. He was the first Westerner ever permitted to examine Soviet Defense Department files. He interviewed a number of World War II Russian military leaders, including Marshal Koniev, whose troops were the first to enter Berlin. He also spoke with Russian eyewitnesses to the discovery of Hitler's bunker and learned the facts concerning the identification and disposal of Hitler's body.

In Washington, he discovered President Roosevelt's original plan for the U.S. occupation of Berlin traced roughly on a National Geographic Society map -- a plan that was either lost or ignored. In Berlin, he interviewed many who were present when the city fell; among them a Mother Superior who worried about the safety of her nuns, a zookeeper who was forced to kill his lions (and who found some of them "good eating") and a dental assistant who worked on Hitler's teeth during the last days, a milkman, and a Swedish spy.

Cornelius Ryan was born in Dublin in 1920 and made his first acquaintance with war as a correspondent for the London DAILY TELEGRAPH in 1943. He made bombing runs with the U.S. Air Force and covered events of the war from D-Day to V-E Day. Then he headed to the Pacific and General MacArthur's headquarters, later covering the Bikini atom bomb tests and fighting in Israel. He has been on the staff of TIME magazine and COLLIER'S and is currently a roving editor for READER'S DIGEST. In 1950, Mr. Ryan became a naturalized United States citizen. "The Longest Day" was published in 1959.

Conservation Of Rainfall And Irrigation Water

Many of our leading agricultural leaders of today who are in research and carrying out studies of water use tell us, "This area's principal irrigation water supply will be essentially eliminated in the foreseeable future if current use trends continue." This is a problem faced by Soil Conservation Districts throughout the entire High Plains Area. One of the primary aims of the Lamb County Soil Conservation District is to assist land owners and operators to develop and use a sound conservation plan which includes a plan for efficient use of rainfall and for irrigation water. Conservation must start where rainfall is first received and irrigation is first applied.

Mr. E.L. Alexander said, "The potential for reducing water waste and prolonging the present water supply in the immediate future lies with the land owners and operators. For, unless they are willing to truly practice conservation, the present water resource will continue to be mined and any additional supplies developed will be wasted." (Mr. Alexander is Assistant State Conservation Engineer, Soil Conservation Service, Temple, Texas.) The first step to be taken in the conservation of water is to use water where it falls thus lessening the demands on irrigation water. The 3 primary methods of irrigation in this area are the level furrow, the bench or graded furrow system and sprinkler irrigation. In excess of 90% of the sys-

tems in this area are "graded systems", these systems are not the best because even under good management we lose rainfall and irrigation tailwater is often a problem. With a graded system on sloping land you will impound very little water when the rains come too much of the time it runs off.

Results published at the High Plains Research Foundation have shown that benching not only paid for itself, but maintained the productivity of the soil by reducing erosion, reduced production cost as better use was made of irrigation water and less water was pumped due to no loss of rainfall. Sprinkler irrigation is beginning to become more and more evident here in the county. Perhaps the best selling points of the sprinkler are as follows:

1. Efficiency of water used. A uniform application can be applied on sloping and rolling land as well as on flat tight soils.
2. Amount of water applied. If you need only one or two inches of moisture to get a crop up and growing, this amount can be applied quickly and efficiently and the field can be watered quickly.

Conservation of soil and water is your direct responsibility. I encourage each of you to take full advantage of the technical and financial help which is available thru the various pro-

grams and the technical assistance provided by the Lamb County Soil Conservation District. Each operator should be able to determine the right amount of water to apply at each irrigation on the basis of moisture holding capacity of the soil and need of the crop. With a good system and good management, efficiency can be increased and considerable amounts of irrigation water will be saved. I challenge each of you to take steps to make a more efficient use of your irrigation water this year.

non-conventional "Family Worship Plan" is taking dead ends of some of the favorite habits of masculine American householders.

When worship services and day school classes are scheduled separately, whether successively or simultaneously, it is all too easy for bad habits to afflict both institutions, according to studies made by leading members of The American Lutheran Church.

The Rev. Dr. Melford S. Knutson, St. Paul, president of The Lutheran Church of the Southeast in Minnesota, with 270 member congregations, continues to emphasize the importance of participation by all members of the family--particularly fathers--both in worship and study.

Some church schedules have made it easy for children to be teaching sessions while their fathers are at worship. The whole process is completed in one hour. Children seldom attend church services, and parents have no part in the church's education program.

Another concern is that too many fathers "tend the roast" at home and serve as Sunday morning chauffeurs while "mother and the children" take care of the religious phase of family life.

A Sunday morning schedule is now being encouraged for new congregations when established by the ALC churches worship and teaching a 90-minute unified program. Both Mom and Dad are expected to be present, with their children, for the whole hour.

The Rev. Russell Helgesen, Midwest Regional Director of American Missions, recently conducted a survey among congregations of The ALC in Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wisconsin. All of the congregations have been organized within the past four years. The survey revealed the following facts:

—Congregations with the family worship plan reported 59 per cent of the baptized membership worship; congregations with conventional programs reported 46 per cent attendance.

—Eighty per cent of the children who attended study sessions were present for worship in congregations using the family plan; 55 per cent of the children in Sunday School also attended church in conventional congregations.

—Seventy-five per cent of the children in the congregations using the family plan attended study sessions, compared with 68 per cent using conventional plan.

Funeral Services For Former Resident of Bula Dies

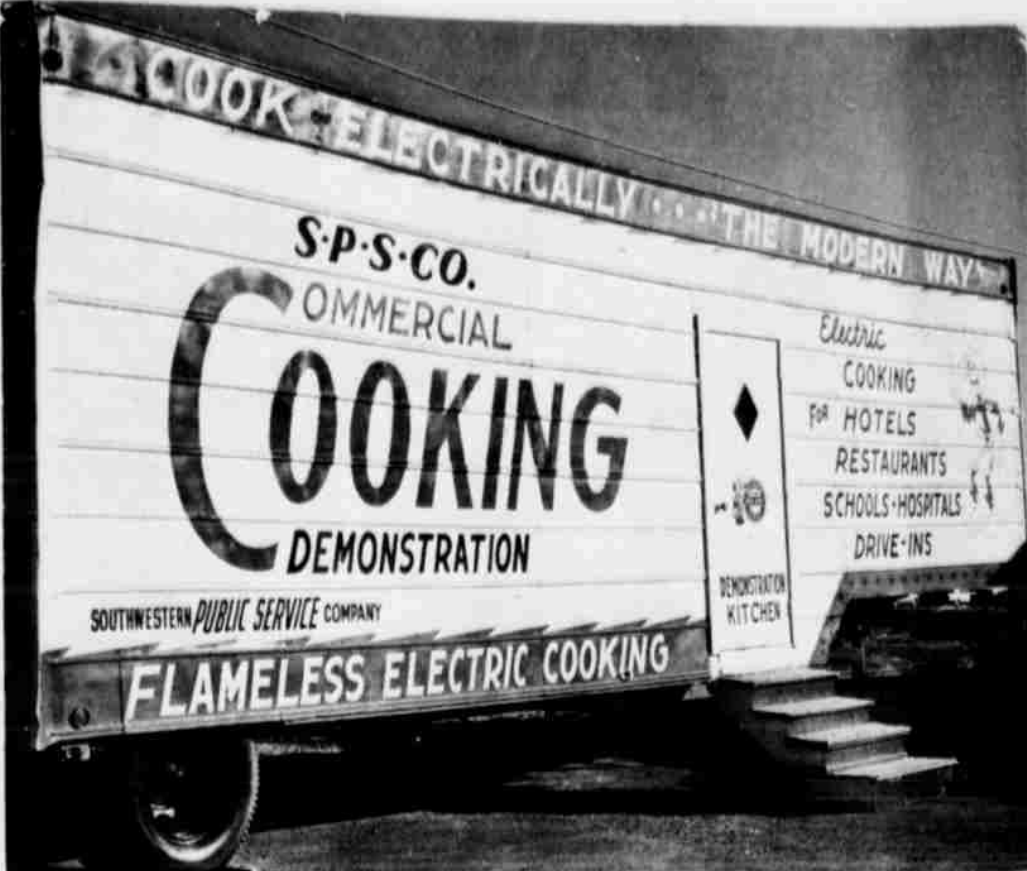

Texans who failed to pay their poll tax have another chance to register for a vote in the 1966 elections. This time it's "free!"

Registration period extends from March 3 through March 17. Any citizen eligible to vote can sign up with his county tax assessor-collector and his name will be placed on the poll list at no charge.

So reads the "emergency" provision in the new voter registration act just passed by the Legislature and signed into law by Gov. John Connally.

Hereafter, free registration will take place from October through January each year.

There is one possible hitch: Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr fears that names of those who sign up during March won't be available for local elections already slated on bond issues, local option liquor questions, etc. He asked the three federal judges who banned the poll tax to put off their order until March 26.

Estimates of the number of Texans who will take advantage of the free right to vote vary widely--from 50,000 to 1,000,000. Any figure approaching the latter could make a substantial difference in the outcome of many local and some statewide elections. Indications are that the number of new voters will be nowhere near that high, however.

All who paid poll taxes by January 31 will be entitled to vote as usual, without re-registering.

PECOS SULPHUR BOOM -- Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler compares reaction to the recent Pecos County sulphur discovery with California's Gold Rush days of 1849.

He said "operators are moving in both day and night attempting to locate and file claims on state-owned land...to mine sulphur."

Sadler declined to accept 50 cents an acre per year for sulphur leases when, he stated, leading sulphur operators paid up to \$2,000 an acre bonus for five-year leases in a recent federal sale off the coast of Texas.

State School Land Board rejected a rash of filings under an 1895 claim law. Board set a sulphur lease sale, along with oil and gas bidding, for May 3.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED -- Governor Connally appointed Hill County Attorney Steve Latham of Hillsboro to succeed Sam Johnson, resigned, as judge of the 66th District Court of Hill County. Latham formerly practiced law in Wichita Falls.

Governor chose former District Attorney Dan Walton of Houston as judge of Harris County's Criminal District Court No. 4, succeeding the late Judge A. H. Krichmar.

Connally's appointees to the new Texas Air Control Board are Clinton Howard of Irving, Henry J. LeBlanc Sr. of Port Arthur, Herbert Whitney of Corpus Christi and Dr. Wendell Hamrick, John Files and Dr. Herbert McKee, all of Houston.

Bob Cheatham of Texarkana and Clifford Hensley of El Campo were named by the Governor to the Texas Real Estate Commission.

WATER DEBATE RE-HEARD -- Supreme Court of Texas has taken under advisement a longstanding dispute between city of San Antonio and cities in the Guadalupe River basin. San Antonio is appealing a 1957 Texas Water Commission

decision. Ruling denied the Alamo City's application for from Canyon Dam near New Braunfels and awarded 50,000-acre feet from the reservoir to Guadalupe-Blanco River authority for municipal use downstream.

Attorneys for San Antonio claimed the city must import 138,000-acre feet for its needs by 1980. Meanwhile, Guadalupe basin will have a surplus over necessities of 180,000-acre feet.

GBRA attorney denied any surplus is in sight. He said some cities, including Seguin and Port Lavaca, already have suffered from serious shortages.

Major legal point involved is whether the Commission can delegate to GBRA rights to release water to unspecified municipal users, while denying San Antonio's application to pipeline water from another basin for high priority city and domestic needs.

AG RULES -- Attorney General has ruled that Texas Highway Department may grant the owner and operator of overweight mobile equipment, which transports frac oil in oil well servicing, a permit for movement of the equipment.

In other actions he ruled that: A county attorney isn't authorized to bring out proceedings against a city attorney of a city incorporated under the general laws of Texas.

A chain referral selling plan to promote sales, containing a prize awarded under the element of chance, is a lottery in Texas.

A County Clerk may use one or more volumes, properly labeled and indexed, to constitute "a well-bound book" to meet the requirements of recording deeds, leases and declarations.

Vehicles owned by an individual must be registered by law in the county where he lives.

Fraternal or Veterans Clubs may legally sell alcoholic beverages to members on the premises without a special license.

New act calling for deposit of justice of peace court fines and fees in officers' salary funds of counties is constitutional.

Funds appropriated to National Guard Armory Board can be legally spent for addition to the building at Camp Mabry in Austin subject to necessary agency approval.

Harrison County juvenile board or commissioners court has no authority to hire a secretary for the county juvenile officer, but can hire a child service worker with added duty of secretary.

State Board of Control still has supervision of the Battle-ship Texas Commission.

TEST FOR BRUCellosis - Eleven counties, Atascosa, Brooks, Coryell, Falls, Hamilton, Hood, Jack, Limestone, McLennan, Milam and Roberts - are testing for initial brucellosis eradication certification.

Borden County has qualified for recertification.

During January, 16,331 back-tagged cattle originating in Texas were tested at slaughter. A total of 18,202 cattle were tested at Texas livestock markets for return to the county, and 284 reactors were disclosed.

Southwestern Public Service Company sponsors the "Cook's Tour", a large trailer in which the electric commercial cooking equipment is installed in operating condition.

The trailer will be located at Southwestern Public Service office while on display in Littlefield. It will be open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. for visits by local food service operators.

During the evening, institutional representatives, such as school and hospital dieticians, board members, architects and contractors will be invited to dinner meetings. The dinners will be prepared on the equipment in the trailer, which also has a dining area with seating capacity for 14 people.

The equipment is designed for the largest, as well as the smallest, eating establishments, and the display gives the operators an opportunity to see how it would fit into their place of business," Warren Dayton, manager for the Southwestern Public Service Company, said.

The "Cook's Tour" is a two-month long venture, which will cover 1500 miles and 30 communities served by Southwestern Service Company.

VISITORS INCREASE - Attendance at 22 Texas vacationland attractions increased 13 per cent last year, with total admissions of 30,403,000.

Six Flags over Texas rated as a top tourist stop with 1,713,000 visitors, outdrawing by 446,000 San Antonio's Alamo, according to Tourist Development Agency. Biggest percentage gain was marked by Bishop's Palace on Galveston Island. Big Bend National Park reported another big increase, as did the Aquarena at San Marcos, Old Stone Fort of Nacogdoches, Fort Davis National Historic Site and Padre Island.

BUILDING SALES DROP - Texas building and retail sales dropped during January. However, both December and January still were above the first month of 1965.

UT's Bureau of Business Research reported total retail sales in January off 28 per cent from a record December due largely to the "greater-than-seasonal rise" during the Christmas month. Nevertheless, retail stores generally posted gains of two per cent over January a year ago.

Building permits for the first month of 1966 dropped a whopping 22 per cent below December and four per cent below the 1965 average. But the \$133,200,000 total was 16 per cent over January, 1965.
