

## Littlefield Veteran and Dutch Fiance Met Four Years Ago are Reunited

Margaret Kayser of Vaals, arrived by plane in Lubbock Monday morning to be greeted at Municipal Airport by J. C. Stovall, of Littlefield, her fiance, who met her in Europe.

Mrs. Kayser barely beat the December 31 deadline for entry of European war bride-elect into this country. She left Holland December 29, arriving in New York December 30, and spent four days on Ellis Island before continuing her trip to Lubbock.

Asked her opinion of this country, Mrs. Kayser said "Oh, I like America."

Mrs. Kayser is the daughter of Mr. Wm. Kayser of Vaals, which is in Southern Holland. Mr. Stovall is son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Stovall, of South Twichell, Littlefield, and she is a guest in their home.

Mrs. Kayser, while serving with the Second Armoured Division, under General Patton, and after participating in the Battle of the Bulge. His service was consisting of 4 men, was transferred in the Kayser home four days during Feb. 1945. He came to the United States in June 1945 and was discharged from the service and since been connected with his father and brother, Billy Don, in the operation of the Littlefield Fender Body Works.

During the trip to Lubbock Thursday morning to greet Miss Kayser, her fiance, were his brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Billy Stovall.

Mrs. Kayser, who is 25 years of age, is a charming blonde, is a graduate of Vaals High School, a registered nurse and speaks three languages—Dutch, German and English. Her father is in the automobile business at Vaals.

According to Miss Kayser: when the Germans occupied Holland in 1940 they confiscated their gold, cars, radio, and everything of value to the Kayser place. Miss Kayser, had just entered the hospital at Aachen, Holland, which is close to the front, for training, was transferred to St. Elizabeth's Hospital at Aachen, Germany where she completed her training.

The couple's wedding plans are indefinite, but they probably will be held within a few days, they indicated.

## Area Held In Icy Grip Of Winter For Three Days

## Near Two Inches Bring Relief To Dry Lands

Lamb county and the South Plains began to show signs of returning to normal Wednesday evening after three days of freezing rain, sleet, snow and sub-freezing temperatures. 1.53 inches of moisture had fallen up to 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, and farmers were heartened with the prospect of further precipitation.

Rain, which started Saturday night in Lamb county chalked up an unofficial moisture reading of .65 of an inch by 8 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Temperatures dropped late Sunday evening to below freezing marks and turned the rain to ice as it hit and later to sleet and snow. The sleet and freezing rain fell intermittently through Sunday night, and Monday found still more sleet falling.

Highways were reported slick but passable by motorists and no serious accidents were reported. However, stalled cars and those that couldn't move because of the slick conditions were common. Downtown traffic in Littlefield was very light although there was no difficulty in driving. Parked cars were the only ones having trouble.

Most of the Lamb county schools were closed three days, although the Littlefield schools only closed Wednesday.

The Southwestern Public Service Company was not inconvenienced to any appreciable extent according to Hardy Shelby, district manager. The normal work routine was disrupted just as it was in most places. But no lines were down or anything of that sort because of the storm.

The coldest temperature reported by the West Texas Gas Company was 16 degrees at 6 a. m. Monday. The temperatures since last Friday were reported: Friday low 28, high 60; Saturday low 42, high 64; Sunday low 20, high 48; Monday low 16, high 24; Tuesday low 20, high 26; Wednesday low 26, high 36 about 3 o'clock.

Texas-New Mexico and Oklahoma Bus Lines reported buses were running almost on schedule Monday, about four hours late on Tuesday and no buses ran Wednesday. Predictions on Thursday were not available.

Santa Fe Railroad trains were running on or near schedule and the only inconvenience reported was freezing of switches.

The Southwestern Associated Telephone Company reported long distance calls have been going out of Littlefield without delay. Two lines were down for a short time between here and Lubbock Wednesday, but service was resumed quickly. Lines to the south of Lubbock were out Tuesday and Wednesday cutting service with Midland, Odessa, Sweetwater, Abilene and other cities. This also disrupted service with parts of New Mexico. No lines were down locally, and service was near normal.

Postal service was normal as far as late buses and such exceptions would allow. Not a local route was missed.

The nearly 2 inches of moisture reported by the Western Cotton Oil Mill is the most for this area since the late June rains brought 4.3 inches and considerable damage.

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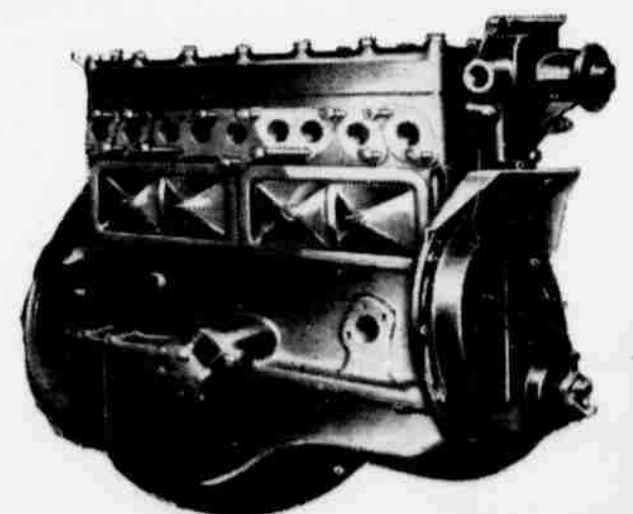

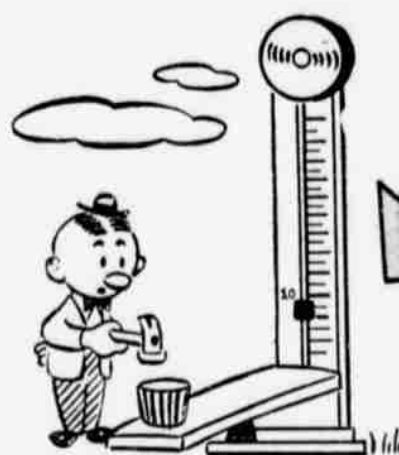

## Importance of Retaining Underground Water Control Discussed Over KVOW

David Eaton, Lamb County Agent, in connection with the regular Littlefield Chamber of Commerce meeting, stated that between 1350 and 1400 irrigation wells were in operation in this County at the present time, supplying water to approximately one-half of the acreage planted, or at 200,000 acres.

Mr. Eaton pointed out that the portion of the crop irrigated would vary from time to time, as about two years ago about 60 percent of the crops grown were irrigated, but that the past year above 70 per cent of the crops realized were grown on irrigated land.

Arthur Duggan, local attorney, and member of the legal staff of the High Plains Water Users and Conservation Association, also took part in the discussion answering a series of questions put to him by Jim Roby, manager of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, over KVOW Sunday afternoon.

Mr. Duggan, as an example of the benefit derived from irrigation, the importance of farm owners retaining the ownership of underground water, stated that he knew of a farmer on a dry farm making a net income of \$2000, out of which \$1000 to be deducted the expenses in irrigating the land and his living ex-

penses, while on the other hand he pictured another farmer: he knew who on an irrigated farm made an income of \$20,000 bringing out the fact that water was more vital than many people realized.

He compared these times to pioneer days when ranchers had to protect their good horses from theft by putting up fences, stating that there were attempts at this time to take title of underground water from the land owners and put control in a central state agency. He stated that up to the present that these attempts were not successful due to the combined efforts of groups over this area, defeating the bill presented to the Texas Legislature at the last session, but he added that another effort would be made for such control at the coming session.

Mr. Duggan also stated that the High Plains Water Users and Conservation Association have prepared a bill to protect ownership and control of the underground water, which will be presented at the next session of the Legislature.

Farmers and business men are urged to take a very active interest in this water matter, and support the local cause with financial assistance.

## To Start Erection of Church Building

The First Baptist Church officials have voted almost unanimously to begin the church building immediately which has long been planned.

A desire was also indicated for a conservative program of expansion, which will be carried out.

It has been the custom for some time to designate the offering each first Sunday towards the building fund of the church. At the first Sunday's service this month, a total of \$4,245.99 was received in the day's offerings. This amount went into the building fund, with the exception of a few designations to Lottie Moon, Buckner Orphans Home, etc., which amounted to about \$500.00.

The First Baptist Building Fund has now reached \$66,031.19, which is a decided credit to Rev. Lee Hemphill, pastor and the officers and the congregation.

It is expected that building will get under way soon.

## Cpl. Chapman's Body Enroute To States

Mr. and Mrs. Chapman received a telegram last week from the Quartermaster Department of the U. S. Army, stating that the remains of their son, Cpl. John Henry Chapman, of the Marines, who lost his life in World War II, were enroute to the United States for re-burial.

Cpl. Chapman, a Navigator on a transport, in the course of his duty evacuating the wounded from the battlefield, was killed when the plane crashed against the side of a mountain in a storm on October 7, 1944.

He was stationed on Vella La Vella Island in the Southwest Pacific.

He was graduated from Littlefield High School with the class of 1942.

Born February 1, 1925, in Ellis County, Texas, Cpl. Chapman was 19 years of age at the time of his death. He was the third son of Mr. and Mrs. Chapman; was graduated from the Littlefield High School with the class of 1942, and played with the Wildcats during 1941 and 1942.

He entered the Marines in July, 1942, and went overseas May 12, 1943, landing on New Caledonia Island on Mother's Day.

Cpl. Chapman was of a "Marine" family, all five sons of Mr. and Mrs. Chapman being members of the Marine Corps.

The Marines seem to be the choice of this family back many years, as A. M. Wilson, great-grandfather of Cpl. Chapman, was a Marine.

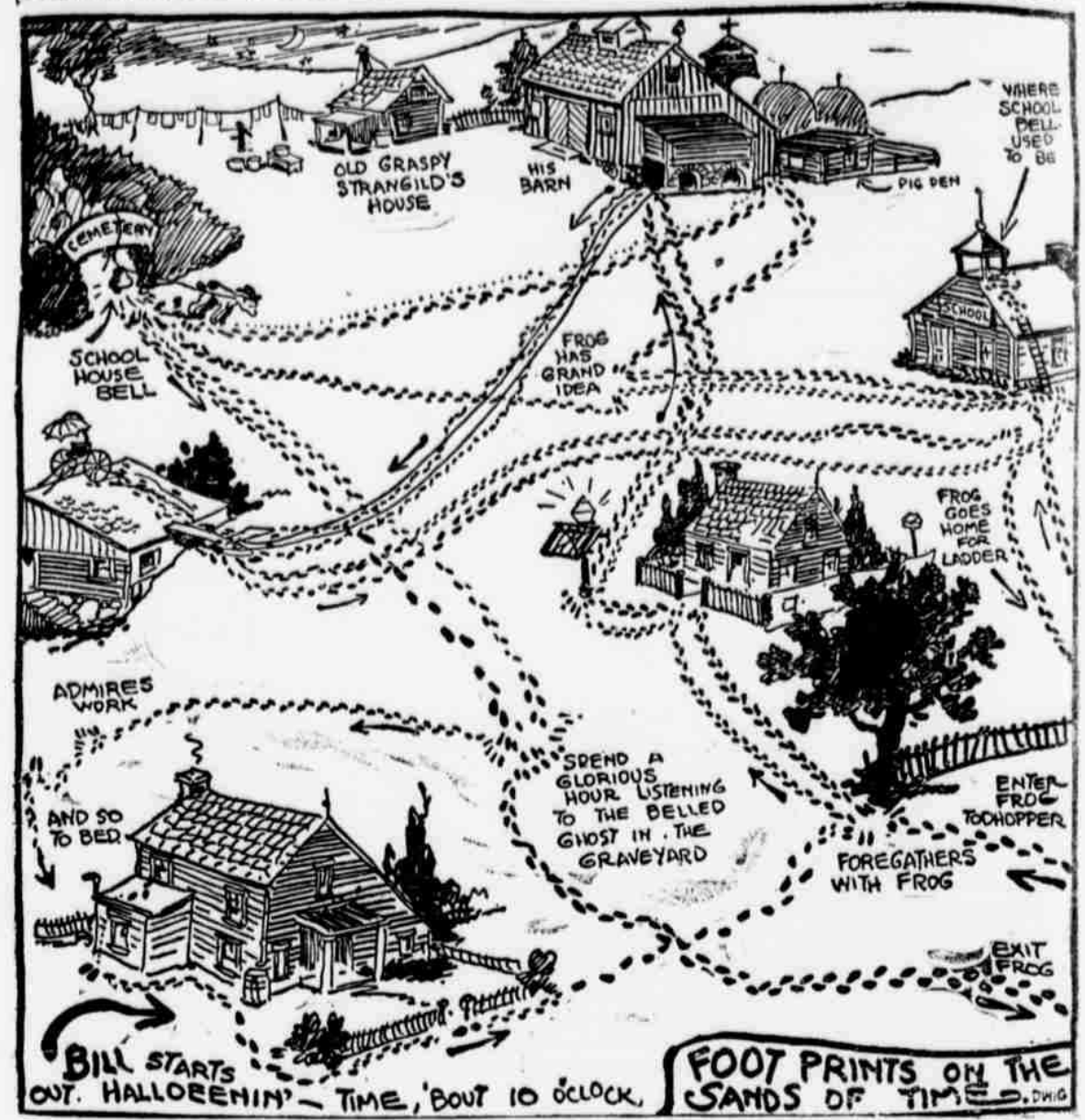

### ENLISTED MEN'S WIVES IN GERMANY CARRY ON CONSIDERABLE WELFARE WORK

According to Publicity Chairman C. Forrest, of the 601st A. C. W. Squadron, the Enlisted Mensives Club of Rothwesten Germany, is doing considerable welfare work in that area.

Mrs. Ray E. Swanner of Littlefield is now in Germany with her husband, who is in service with the U. S. Forces in the American Occupation Zone in Europe, is very active welfare work for German Youth Germany. She has sponsored box openers, which boxes were sold to raise funds for various German Youth activities.

During the months of November and December the members of the E. M. Wives Club of Rothwesten, Germany, have devoted their time and efforts to various activities for the German Youth. The infants range in age from birth to one year of age. Funds for this project and other German youth activities are raised by selling box suppers and sandwiches at the E. M. Club of Rothwesten, Germany.

On December 22, 1948 members of the E. M. Wives Club of Rothwesten, Germany distributed homemade cookies and candy in festive holiday bags to 155 German children (evacuees from the Sudeten Land, Zechoslovakia) who are now living in Holzhausen, Germany.

On December 15, 1948, the members of the E. M. Wives Club of Rothwesten, Germany helped serve a hot dinner to a group of 150 German children including a group of 33 children evacuated from Berlin. The dinner was sponsored by the G. Y. A. of the 601st Aircraft Control and Warning Sqdn.

Wives Club of Rothwesten, Germany were hostesses at a party given by the club for 33 German children who were evacuated from Berlin and are now housed in the Kinderheim, Kassel, Harleshausen. **Water Meeting To Be Held At Amarillo Monday, January 17**

ABILENE, Jan. 10.—Protection of the domestic water rights of West Texas today was termed by President John Mitchell of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, as the most important task for 1949. Mitchell, who is president of the First National Bank of Odessa stopped in Abilene for a conference with General Manager D. A. Bandeen.

"We are launching on all fronts a very comprehensive and constructive program as worked out by our executive board, eight district meetings and board of director action during October and November," Mitchell said.

"Our first and most important task is to protect our municipal and domestic water rights now being seriously threatened by legislation requiring that all big power dams be first filled with water before our West Texas towns can get water.

"My town of Odessa would be foolish to participate in a \$12 million tri-city water project if our water supply on the Colorado is first dependent on the big power dams around Austin being filled before we have water. The same applies to all West Texas towns."

To assure action on this before the legislature the Municipal Legal Rights and Defense Committee meeting has been called for Amarillo 10 A. M. Monday, January 17, in the office of Mayor Lawrence Hagy, who is co-chairman with Charles South of Coleman of this important committee. Other members are Preston Kers, manager of the Odessa Chamber of Commerce, secretary; Charles E. Coombes, Stamford, legal consultant; Mayor Lance M. Davis, Rotan; Mayor A. C. Humphrey, Stamford; Mayor A. F. Little, Jackboro and R. M. Wagstaff, Abilene, who was one of the authors of the WTCC—Wagstaff-Woodward act which is the law which now gives domestic users prior rights to water.

Proposed new legislation would place a vested right to water that falls on West Texas water sheds with present appropriation holders, which include power for domestic use, under

the present law, according to Mitchell. At the same time he pointed to the importance of another committee, which met in San Angelo, Jan. 10. This is the legislative enactment committee of the Soil Conservation Commission, and is headed by W. R. Guenbery of Sonora and Wendell Mayes, Brownwood.

It is the duty of this committee to assist in passage by the 51st session of the legislature an enabling act prescribing terms and conditions of use by the respective counties of the state general fund ad valorem as constitutionally diverted to the counties. Under this bill the counties are assured the maximum local self government in the expenditure of these funds within the counties for soil conservation, farm-to-market roads and water conservation purposes.

**Deadline For Filing Declarations of Tax January 17**

John B. Dunlap, Acting Collector of Internal Revenue for the Northern 144 Counties of Texas, reminded taxpayers that Monday, January 17, will be the deadline for filing Declarations of Estimated Tax for 1948. The final date normally is January 15, but since that date falls on a Saturday this year, the filing period is automatically extended to the next official workday.

Acting Collector Dunlap explained that this filing date is of especial importance to farmers, since they were excused by law from filing their 1948 Declarations until this time. The date is also important to many business and professional persons, investors, self-employed and similar taxpayers who were required to file Declarations last spring but who now want to change their estimates by filing amended Declarations. Most wage earners whose pay is subject to withholding are not required to file De-

clarations since the withholding substantially covers their income tax, although some wage earners with large salaries or supplemental non-salary income are required to file Declarations.

He also pointed out that many of these taxpayers can "kill two birds with one stone" by filing their final 1948 income tax returns instead of a Declaration. In other words, a farmer required to file an original Declaration or a businessman desiring to file an amended Declaration at this time Form 1040, which he might otherwise

waive to file on March 15, if he files his return and pays the tax in full January 17, he can save the tax preparing and filing the 1948 Declaration or amended Declaration when due then.

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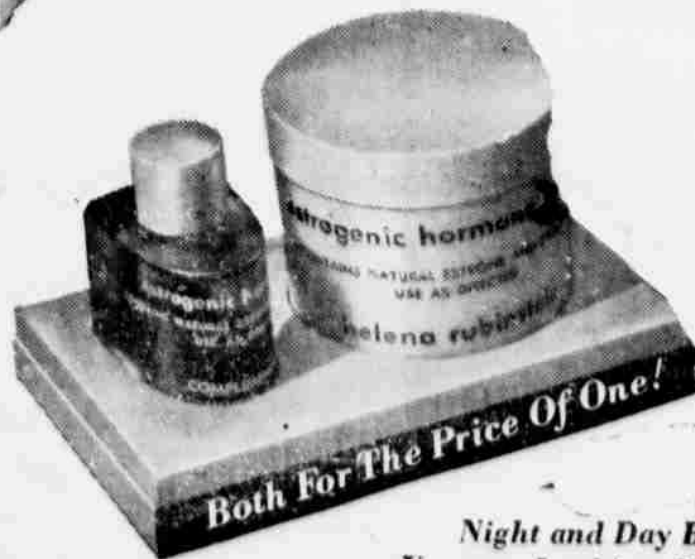

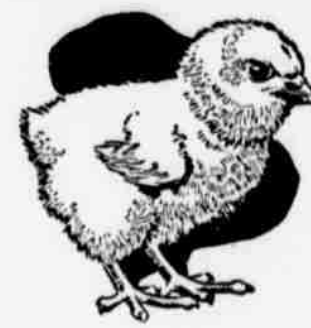

### Seventeen Students Participating In D. E. Program

Distributive Education, in its second year at Littlefield High School, is progressing steadily according to E. H. McKinney, director of the program.

This program, which is nationwide in scope, has two major objectives—to enrich the education of young people who desire to prepare for careers in the field of distribution and to provide training for people in retail, wholesale and service vocations, training which they want, which they can use and by which they can profit.

The program rounds out the education of interested young people, according to Mr. McKinney, by providing them equipment for making a living. Of all the wage earners in Texas, 31 per cent are employed in Distributive fields, either in retail, whole sale or service jobs. Through Distributive Education, trainees are getting the important "know how," they are learning the right habits, attitudes and procedures.

Benefits from this program affect various persons. Business profits, because training always improves efficiency. Improved efficiency means the number of sales and size of the average sales increases, the guess-work regarding merchandise information is eliminated, and stockwork and other non-selling duties are more thoroughly understood.

One of the big advantages of Distributive Education is the trainee,

they are young, enthusiastic and eager to learn. They have not usually formed bad work habits, and can be easily be trained to do things correctly. Usually when new people are employed, they are neither all good nor all bad; each person has some good points and some bad ones. The training helps the employee to capitalize on the employee to capitalize on the employee to capitalize on the employee to recognize bad characteristics of himself or herself.

Seventeen students are now working on various jobs here in Littlefield through the Distributive Education program. The demand for further positions is increasing as the program expands and students become more familiar with it, according to Mrs. McKinney. Any business man who is interested in employing a Distributive Education student should contact Mr. McKinney at the High School.

A small increase has been made on parcel post matter and money orders and registration costs have increased slightly.

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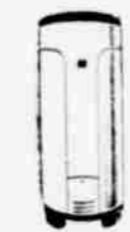
