

# School Bond Election to Reach Public Soon

Plans are being received and made for the building and repair program for Littlefield schools, it was announced Tuesday. The proposed election will be put before the public in the near future in an amount not yet determined. School board members have estimated that the minimum cost would be between \$50,000 and \$75,000, with the amount depending on stipulations in circulation and call merely on the election. School officials state that the building of bonds in such an amount would entail no new taxes, but would entail the present 50c tax rate in effect for servicing the bonds with an amount.

## Hart Camp Writes Protest Letter to Leader

The following letter has been written by citizens of Hart Camp, and brought to the Leader office for publication. This letter is being published on the request of Hart Camp citizens, and in no way expresses the opinion of the Lamb County Leader: To The People of Littlefield: We, the citizens of Hart Camp community are glad to find who our friends are. It appeared to us Saturday that the only friends we have in Littlefield is the R. E. A. and our most sincere thanks goes to the R. E. A. for their services during the fire, which was restoring electricity to the water pumps here in Hart Camp after lines had burned out, and left us entirely without water.

And, there we were without any water and waiting for a fire department, which never came. Luck, hard work, and the R. E. A. prevented further damage in our community, but we feel a little bitter out here because when we called Littlefield for help you let us go to the blues. Well, Littlefield, you are going to the blues too, if it doesn't rain every time you have a fire. What about this, Littlefield? Should we look somewhere else for our friends? Should we trade with a town that is indifferent as to what happens to its customers? Tell us something, Littlefield! The Let Down Citizens of Hart Camp

However, if a pump truck had been at Hart Camp, there would have been an ample supply of water within 50 yards of the blaze. The Littlefield Fire Department was called twice or more by phone and we were assured that they were on the way within 15 minutes after the fire started. For some reason (we assume they should have a reason) the fire trucks turned around and went back to Littlefield without ever seeing Hart Camp. This action left us in the following predicament: A blaze which destroyed a filling station and threatened a grocery store a few yards away, and threatening gasoline storage tanks containing hundreds of gallons of gasoline; Also in great danger were our school building and several homes and other buildings.

## Fire Department Issues Statement

In order to secure a statement from the Littlefield Fire Department in connection with the Saturday Hart Camp fire, a Leader reporter interviewed Bob Cox, Littlefield Fire Chief Tuesday and he stated the following: The Fire department started to go out there, and got across the railroad tracks, when someone phoned again to the City Hall stating that it was a gas tank on fire, and they were afraid it was going to blow up. As we had no foam or chemical for gas fire, we knew we could not help them, and we stopped the truck. If we had thought we could help them in any way we would have gone out there."

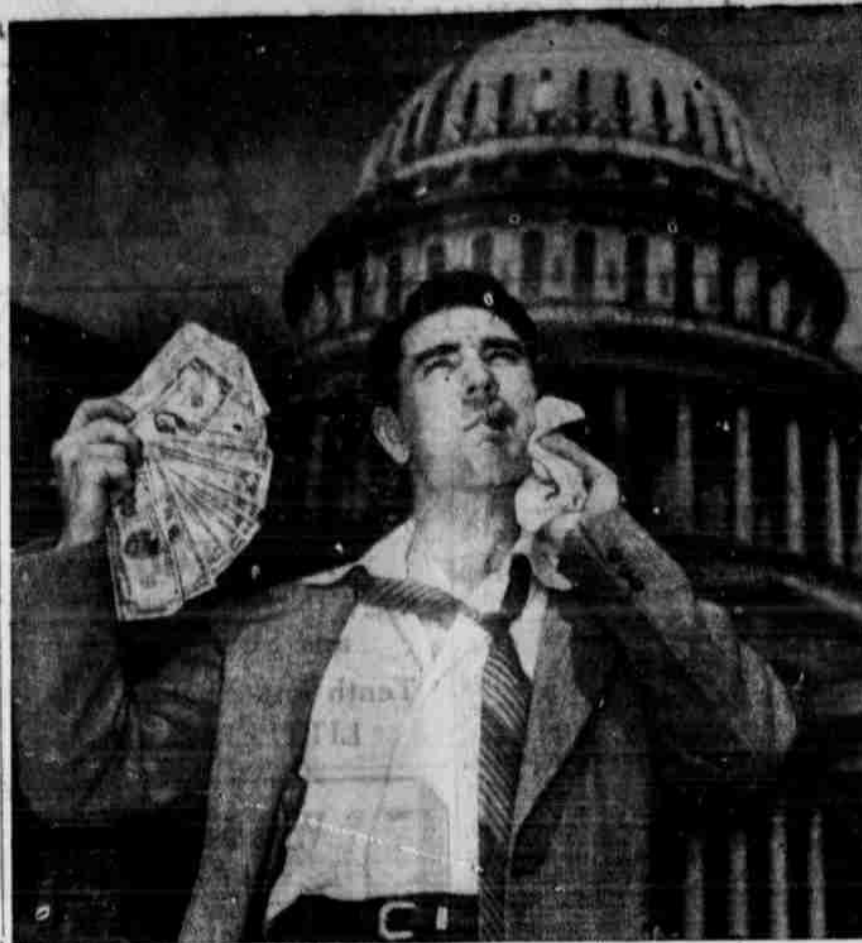
#### Veterans Wives Meet

9,138 Machines Harvest Texas Crop

Nearly 5,000 combines from other states and Canada moved into Texas to help harvest Texas' record crop this summer, records of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service's farm labor program disclose.

Not including uncounted thousands of combines which operated only within single counties, a total of 9,138 machines were used for custom combining. Of that number, 4,608 were from other states and Canada and 4,530 were Texas combines which went on the road, J. B. Kidd, in charge of the farm labor program's Plainview office, reported to the state headquarters.

The number of placements of combines, trucks and workers by county agents in connection with this year's harvest went up proportionately. Reports showed 18,158 workers placed in 1947 compared with last year's 9,755 and 5,437 trucks paced compared with 1,312.

The big increase in combines and workers made it possible to get through the harvest without undue delay except in a few areas where damage resulted when combines were not available at

the exact times they needed, the report declared.

This is the last year in which The Texas A. and M. College Extension Service will operate the farm labor program, which includes the direction of combine movements during the wheat and small grain harvest. The program was taken over as a war emergency job in 1943 and will revert to the Texas Employment Commission January 1.
